It Is Said There Will Be a Discount of 40 Per Cent.

The basic rates for Niagara power both for domestic and business lighting, and power purposes, have now been made public. heavy mass of steel count clush the man's body it was stopped by the heavy packed snow. He escaped with a broken hip and a few bruises.

The power rates, as phonsned yester-day, are from \$40 to \$50 per horse power, according to the amount used, minus the discount. The power rates, as published yesterminus the discount.

The lighting rates are 10 cents per month per 100 square feet of floor space in the house, and 10 cents a kilowatt hour per month, minus the discount. The London Electric rate is 18 cents, with a

per cent discount.
These latter figures contain very little information of the real cost of power, merely furnishing the maximum rate. The real rate will be determined by the discount, which must be settled by the information of commissioners. That will depend alto-gether on local conditions, and must be improved by the board. It is stated that the power rates will be given a discount of say 15 per cent, while the lighting rates may be reduced as much as 40 rates may be reduced as much as 40 per cent.

The statement is made at the city hall

that domestic lighting will be at least 40 per cent cheaper than under the present schedule.

The water commissioners will solve the question of discount in the near future, probably at the next meeting.

JOHN CHARLTON.

The late John Charlton was a muchreviled man prior to 1896, but he outlived all enmities. Long before his death he heard his own praises sounded in quarters which had been the least friendly. This experience would have been denied him if he had entered the Government. For some years past his party opponents have described him as an "Old Liberal." It is a term of which they are extremely fond, because it serves a double purpose. It is intended as a compliment to the individual and an aspersion upon his party. It is never by any chance applied to a cabinet minister until he dies or resigns.

Mr. Charlton was born in the United States of British parents. Although he came to Canada when a very young man, the circumstance of having been bern across the line was often unfairly used against him in the days of the agitation for closer commercial relations with the republic. 



"Therefore, be it resolved, that petition the Legislature, through the executive committee of the Dominion Alliance, to enact a law prohibiting the issuing of licenses within four miles of the limits of any incorporated town or

"That we favor an extension of the provisions of the liquor license act, so as to permit any wards of citles or towns to vote on local op-

"That, failing the abolition of the three-fifths clause in the liquor license act, we favor a substantial reduction in the majority now required

That we favor the removal of blinds or screens from barroom windows during selling hours, and the closing of bars from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. on all days of the week except Sunday."
