Will Announce His Intention to Both Houses About January 3.

Martin Burrell—are likely to retire. In regard to Mr. Sifton, it is understood that his resignation was given to the that his resignation was given to the prime minister some days ago, the reason given being ill-health. His loss will be keenly felt, for, although playing a minor role in the Commons, where he was seldom heard, he was a tower of strength in council, and was conspicuous for his services to Canada, in Paris, where he was one of the Canadian plenipo tentiaries.

Urges Canadians To Put Religion First and Keep Their National Soul, Which Is in Danger of Being Lost.

The Empire ought to have an imperial parliament and not merely an imperial conference. Col. (Canon) J. M. Almond, C.M.G., C.B., director-general of Canadian Chaplain Services, declared at the Rotary Club luncheon today. He added that there would be a league of nations only so long as the British Empire could maintain it and no longer. If the British commonwealth could be made an unbounded success, then it would be possible to talk about a league of nations.

The speaker also urged that Canada's standing army of 9,000 men be used to train the youth of the country. "We want physical fitness, not military training," he said. "We can teach them to shoot in three weeks, but the physical training which these men could give would make our army a national asset. There is too much extravagance in this country. We have great natural resources, and the greatest of them is national character, but we don't want to dissipate them.

UNVEILS MEMORIAL TABLET AND SHIELD TO HEROES OF WAR

Rev. Canon Almond Officiates At Cronyn Memorial Church.

VICTORY'S FRUITS TO GOD

Urges Hearers To Dedicate Benefits Resulting From War To Heaven.

The 46th anniversary of Cronyn Memorial Church on Sunday was marked by the unveiling of two memorials. One was a tablet in memory of Sapper Charles E. Abbott, and the other a shield in memory of all the members of the church school who gave their lives during the war. This memorial was presented to the school in recognition of its contribution of a Victory Bond to mission work among the Eskimos and Indians.

Bond to mission work among the Eskimos and Indians.

Rev. Canon Almond, director-general of Canadian chaplain services during the war, officiated. Ven. Archdeacon Richardson, a former rector of the church, participated in the service.

In a forceful sermon, Canon Almond urged his hearers to dedicate the fruits of victory to God. He based his address on the incident in David's history in which that king poured on the ground the water which his captains had risked their lives to bring him from the well of Bethlehem, saying, "God forbid it me. Shall I drink of the blood of these men that have put their lives in jeopardy?" Canon Almond dealt with the significance of the war to Canada, to the Empire and to the world.

Principles of Right.

To Canada the war was an expression of consciousness that the fundamental principles of right were at issue, he said. Canada did not wait for the call of Empire. She offered herself to accept the moral challenge with those who were morally pledged to a scrap of paper.

"But if the 'scrap of paper' had never

But if the 'scrap of paper' had never existed I believe that the Empire would have waged war, and will wage war against any nation whose will to power and world domination recks not of millions slain and the piteous cry of women and children rising above the thunder of the guns," the speaker asserted

asserted.

He then dealt with the manner in which Canada's effort had found expression, pointing out that the wildest dreams of national pride five years ago had been surpassed. The first Canadian division within nine months of the outbreak of the war had filled the Empire with one heart throb. Other divisions had followed, until all the divisional viory was lost in the wonderful prestige.

EXPORTS OF COTTON ALMOST UP TO THE **BEFORE-WAR FIGURE**


Domestic Consumption in U. S. Also Shows a Big increase.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 13. — Exports of cotton were unusually heavy during November, amounting to 924,-751 bales, the monthly report of the census bureau today showed. This total equalled the aggregate of the previous three months, and was approximately equal to export before the war. Domestic consumption showed an increase of 35,000 bales over November a year ago. Cotton consumed during November amounted to 490,698 running bales of lint, and 25,132 bales of linters, the census bureau announced. During November a year ago, consumption was 455,611 bales of lint and 63,386 of linters.

cotton on hand November 30 in con-Cotton on hand November 30 in consuming establishments was 1,643,055 bales of lint and 256,284 of linters, compared with 1,671.268 and 198,186 a year ago; and in public storage and at compresses 3,987,466 bales of lint and 233,743 of linters, compared with 4,870,348 and 90,005 a year ago.

Cotton spindes active during November numbered 34,483,775, compared with 33,115,369 in November last year.

Imports were 924,717 running bales, including 3,119 bales of linters, compared with 350,003 bales, including 12,432 bales of linters in November last year.



NEWSPRINT MAKERS MUST OBEY ORDERS RESTRICTING EXPORT

Those Who Violate Regulation Will Be Prohibited From Exporting At All.

Montreal, Dec. 14.-The Canadian Pulp and Paper Association headquarters in Montreal was notified on Saturday that the Government at Ottawa is issuing a new order-in-council empowering the minister of customs to stop the exportation of newsprint paper from any manufacturer in Canada who fails to comply with any order issued by the paper controller. This is the second time that an embargo on the export of newsprint has been invoked in order to enforce the rulings of the controller. The new order arises out of attempts by the paper controller to compel the manufacturers to continue supplying Canadian newspaper publishers with paper at a price considerably below that obtainable for the same paper sold for export, and the notification, served upon the controller by certain of the manufacturers that they will cease on the 1st of January next to supply paper in Can-ada on any such conditions. Controller Pringle has announced that on Tuesday afternoon next he will hold on Tuesday atternoon next he win hold a hearing in the Windsor Hotel, Mon-treal, for the purpose of discussing with the manufacturers and the publishers the question of how next year's paper requirements of the Canadian publish-ers shall be met.







HOW CANADA HELPED DEFEAT LEGISLATION OF SLAVERY STATES

Interesting Paper Is Given by Fred Landon At "U."

"The Cause and Extent of the Negro Migration Into Canada Between 1850 and 1860" was the subject of a paper presented by Fred Landon, city librarian, before the arts section of the Arts and Science Club of Western University Saturday night at the University ilding. Mr. Landon's paper was a study of the effect upon negro migration of the femous fugitive slave bill. passed by the United States Congress in 1850 and approved by President Fillmore in the fall of that year. The immediate effect of the passing of the bil was to make the whole of the north un-safe for runaway slaves from the south and they proceeded to cross the border Canada in greater numbers than ever been known before or since. It estimated that three thousand came to Canada within three months, and uring the ten years before the open-ng of the civil war a total of probably 5,000 to 20,000 negroes crossed over and shook hands with the British lion." Mr. Landon's paper brought together a arge amount of data showing the origin of the migration, its general course, the character of the migrants, their recep-ion in Canada and the general effect of the movement upon the operation of the fugitive slave act itself. 
