

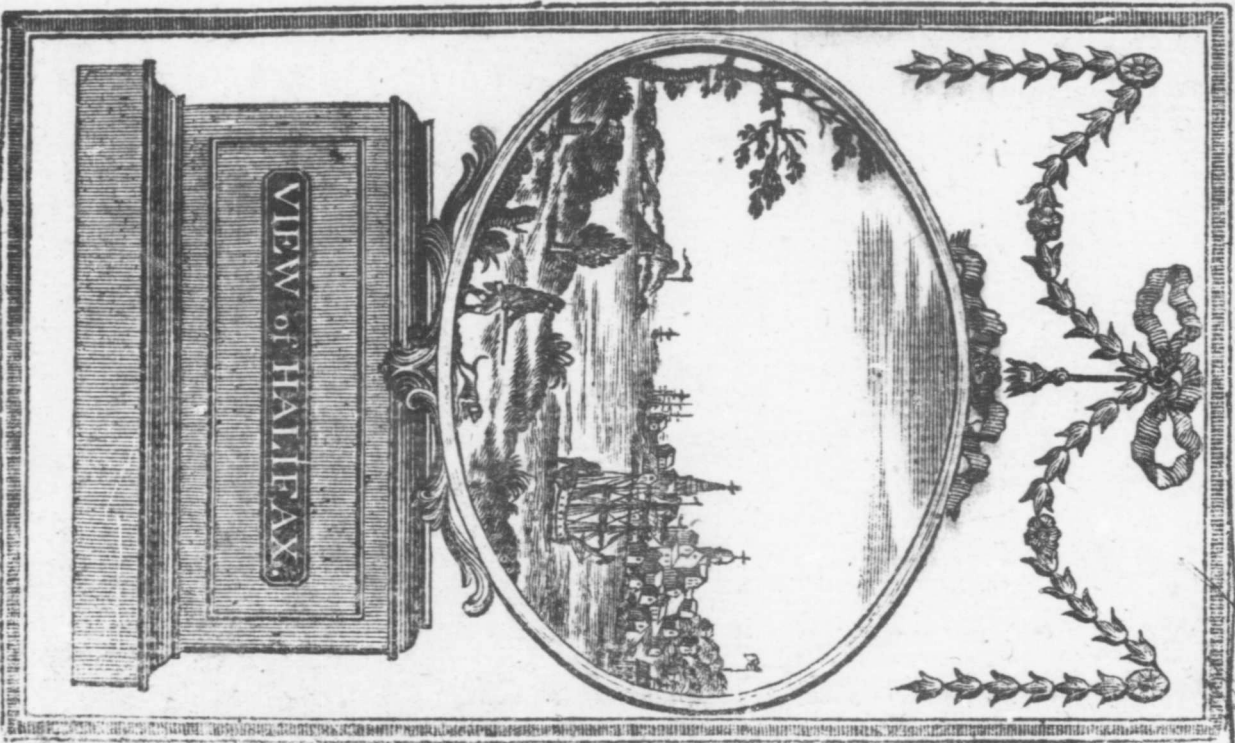
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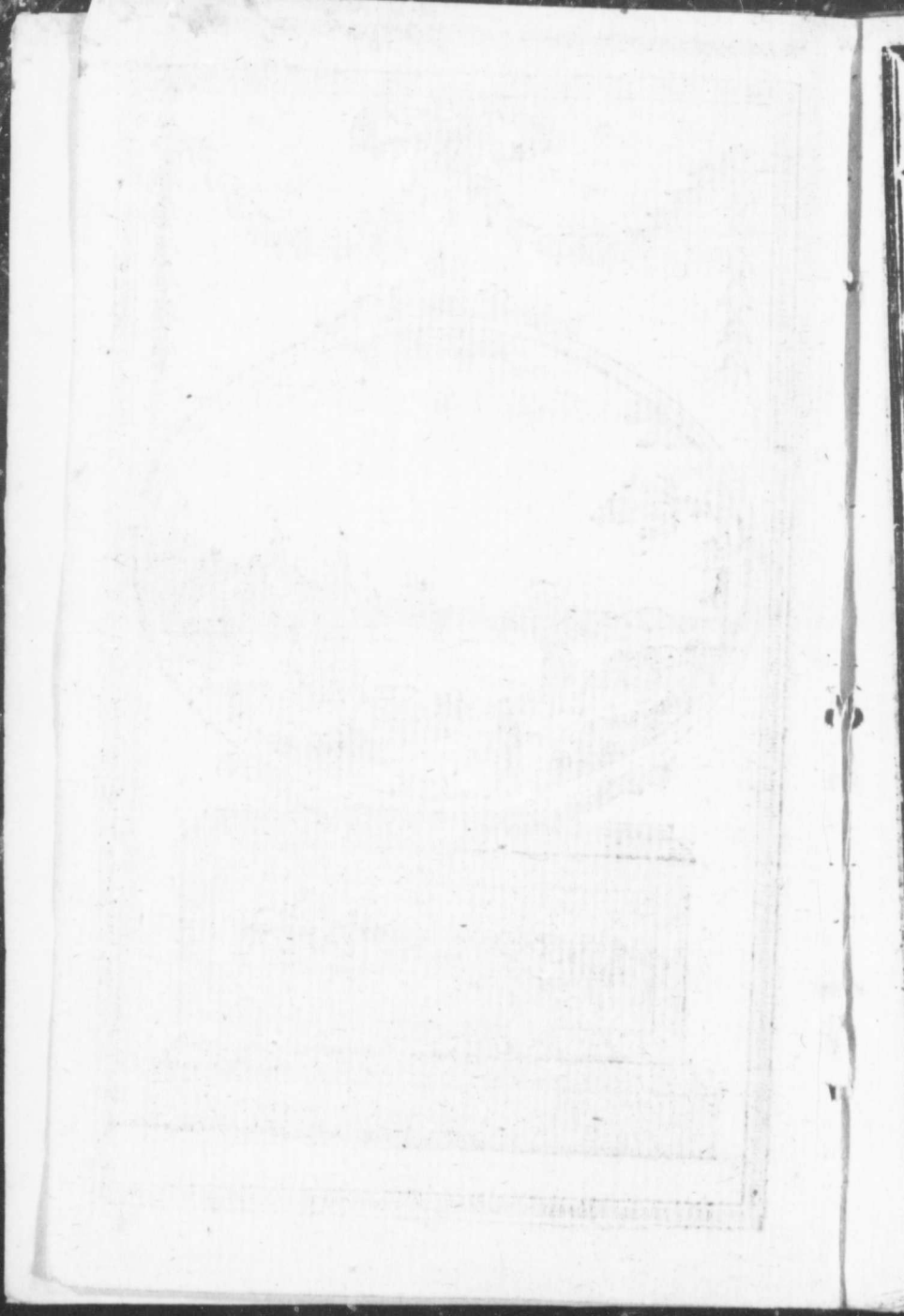

SIGNALS made at FORT GEORGE, when Vessels are coming into HALIFAX HARBOR.

One Ball,	For one square rigged vessel.
One Ball half hoisted,	For two do.
Two Balls close,	For three do.
Two Balls separated,	For four do.
A Pendant of any colour,	For five do.
A Pendant under one Ball,	For six do.
A Pendant over a Ball half hoisted,	For seven do.
A Pendant under two Balls close,	For eight do.
A Pendant bet. two Balls separated,	For nine do.
A Flag of any color,	For ten or more.

The above are hoisted at the east or west yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessel first appears in, with the addition of a ball in the centre of the yard, until the vessels can be seen, when one or more of the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast-head.

A Union, for a flag ship with or without a squadron

Do. with a red pendant over it, for a two-decker

Do. with a blue pendant over it, for a frigate

Do. with a white pendant over it, for a small armed vessel

A red flag, pierced white, for a packet

A blue pendant, for a merchant ship

A red pendant, for a merchant brig

A white pendant, for a topsail sloop or schooner

A red flag, for a neutral man of war

Do. with a blue pendant under it, for a neutral merchant ship

Do. with a red pendant under it, for a neutral merchant brig

Do. with a white pendant under it, for a neutral sloop or schooner.

Enemy's Signals.

A French Jack, for an enemy's fleet

A blue pendant under a French pendant, for an enemy's ship

A red pendant under a do. for an enemy's brig
 A white pendant under a do. for a do. sloop or schooner
 A union Jack over enemies signals denotes the vessels to be prizes.

Signals of Distress.

In cases when immediate assistance is necessary, a ball at the mast head, in addition to the descriptive colours of the vessel in distress, and guns occasionally, until the signal is attended to.

A red flag denotes a vessel	From Europe

BERENGERIA, QUEEN OF CASTILE.

BERENGERIA united to all the attractions of evanescent beauty, the eternal loveliness of a cultivated and expanded mind. She was in the castle of *Oziza*, with a very inconsiderable number of forces, when it was besieged by the Moors. She considered the terrors of her situation. The ammunition of the fortress was nearly exhausted, and to try the hazard of a sally, would be certain destruction to her few, but brave troops. In this dilemma, she sent the following message to the generals of *Texufie* :—“ Berengeria of Barcelona, queen of Castile, could not have imagined that cavaliers so renowned for their valor and gallantry, would have seriously determined to attack a castle which was defended by a woman.—These simple wards, in an age which is now called barbarous, were sufficient to induce men to abandon victory, when that victory would be the vanquishment of weakness, though the acquisition of territory. The Moors declared they would immediately retire ; only begging the queen would honor them with a view of her person, from any distance that might prefer. Berengeria adorned herself in the most magnificent and graceful manner and appeared on the walls with a majesty and sweetness that drew forth the loudest exclamations of applause and admiration from her gallant enemies. The Moors made every testimony of reverence and obedience, and filed off, leaving her exulting in her own presence of mind, and deeply impressed by their heroic honor.

Digits eclipsed 11 1-3 on the Sun's South Limb. The Moon makes her first impression on the Sun's Disc about 93 Degrees from the Sun's Vertix on the right hand. It will be total in the northern parts of the United States, its Center passing over Lakes Michigan and Erie, the Genessee Country, and very near Albany and Boston, thence out into the Atlantic Ocean to the Southward of Nova-Scotia.

This Eclipse, which had travelled Expanfum ever since the Creation, fell in open Space quite clear of the Earth at every return of the Chaldean Period 'till the Year A. D. 967 when it first began to enter the *Terra Australis Incognita*, at the South Pole; since which it has continued to wear to the northward at each periodical return, and according to the mean motions of the Sun, Moon, and retrocession of the Lunar Nodes, will go off at the North Pole about the Year A. D. 2355, whence it again commences its ethereal Circuit, from which it will not return to the Earth, so as to perform the same revolution over again, in less than 12,492 Years.*

ANECDOTES.

Sir Thomas Burnet was distinguished for the evenness of his temper, of which the following instance was recorded. Dining with a friend, the coachman, who was waiting, split some soup or gravy upon his clothes. On the Summer Complaint of Infants.

We are commanded by our great Lord and master, next to the love we owe our Heavenly Father, to "love our neighbor as ourselves." whoever possesses this Christian excellence will never fail to come forward with every thing which appertains to the good of our fellow creatures, without view to fee or reward. To a person of no strict observation, the present fatality of infants, by what is commonly called the summer disease, cannot escape attention. To the humane physician, conscious how little advantage the powers medicine are capable of affording, it is peculiarly distressing to be called upon with anxious expectation of assistance, and conscious how little he is capable of affording—he visits with reluctance, prescribes but to alleviate, and leaves the little sufferer with scarce an hope to cherish parental affection; and if he be himself a parent, his sympathy is such as parents only know. Under these impressions, I have a simple to offer you; do not my friends, I pray you, despise it because it is a simple! I have suffered for others, all I above described—at length the disease came under my own roof, and reduced in a few days, a fine child to near the brink of dissolution. My anxiety became increased almost to desperation—I rested little thro' the night season, and rose very early in the morning to walk my child in Howard's woods, when tasting different vegetables, as my manner is, I caught a simple whose astringent powers surprised and rejoiced me.
