



Occasionally there had been a foreman arrested, but he had invariably given bail, appealed the case and then gone on employing Chinese just the same. But within two weeks after the present government came into power all the Chinese were from the Dunsmuir mines. discharged and their places had been taken by white men, and white men were there yet.
