### **GETTING RID OF WEEDS**

Co-operative Methods Have Been Tested for Ten Years.

More Farmers Should Get Into the Game—How to Control Perennial Sow Thistle and Twitch Grass— Other Weed Destruction Methods Given Next Week.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

During the past ten years (1911-1921) the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union has conducted co-operative experiments in weed cradication. Over ninety farmers have carried out successful experiments. The weeds experimented with were:—Perennial Sow Thistle, Twitch Grass, Bladder Campion or Bell, Wild Mustard, Ox-eye Daisy, Field Bindweed, Wild Oats and Chess. Those who took part in and Chess. Those who took pair in these experiments profited by the ex-perience. In nearly every instance they cleaned the field experimented with, and demonstrated to their own satisfaction the effectiveness of the method tried, and at the same time their results furnished practical information to others.

Experiments For the Current Year.

9. A method of cultivation and cropping for the readication of Wild Oats (requires two years to complete.)

10. A method of cultivation for the

oats (requires two years to complete.)

10. A method of cultivation for the destruction of Chess.

All who have any of the above weeds on their farms are invited to co-operate in this work. Information regarding the carrying out of these experiments may be secured, by writing to Prof. J. E. Howitt, Director, Co-operative Experiments in Weed Eradication, Botanical Department, O. A. C., Guelph.

The results of the ten years' experiments would warrant the recommendation of the following method for the eradication of Twitch Grass and the Perennial Sow Thistie. How to prevent Mustard from seeding in cereal crops, and how to eradicate Biadder Campion or Cow Bell, will be dealt with next week.

The Rape Method for the Control of Perennial Sow Thistle and Twitch Grass.

Cuitivate the field until about the middle of June, running over it requently with the cultivator so as to keep the tops down and thus weaken the "roots." A cultivator with broad points should be used, which will cut off the Sow Thiztle or Twitch Grass below the surface of the ground and not break up the root stocks too much. About the middle of June apply manure at the rate of about twenty tons per acre (twelve good loads). Cultivate the manure in thoroughly and with a double mould board plough slightly ridge up the land, making the ridges about twenty-six inches apart. On the ridges sow pasture rape (Dwarf Essex variety) at the rate of about one and a half pounds per acre. It is important that the right amount of rape be sown, for if too little is sown the stand will not be thick enough to smother the weeds and if, on the other hand, too much is sown the rape plants will be too crowded and not grow vigorously enough to keep ahead of the Twitch Grass or Sow Thistle. Sow the rape when the land is sufficiently moist to secure quick germination of the seed. If the rape is slow in starting the Twitch Grass or Sow Thistle may get a start in the rows and thus necessitate hand cultivation. Cultivate the rape every week or ten days until it occupies all the ground and makes further cultivation impossible. If, when the rape is cut or pastured any of the weeds remain the field should be ridged up last thing in the fall and put in with another hoed crop the following year. This has not been found necessary when a good stand of rape has been secured.

In our co-operative weed experiments it has been found that rape is a much more satisfactory crop to use in the eradication of Twitch Grass and Perennial Sow Thistle when sown in drills and cultivated than it does when sown broadcast.—J. E. Howitt, O. A. College, Guelph.

HOME OF GIANT TREE.

Large Portion of Canada's Total Tim-

Giant trees towering hundreds of feet above the densest undergrowth outside the tropies, pretty bungalows nestling amid roses, are conjured up at mention of Vancouver Island, Canada's western outpost which, in conjunction with Northern British Columbia, talks of setting up as a separate province. Vancouver Island has often been compared to England, with which it has much in common, yet from which it differs so utterly. Whereas open and densely populated England and Wales have an area of 58,324 square miles, Vancouver Island, 280 miles long and from 40 to 80 miles wide, sparsely settled, backboned with mountains and covered with dense forests, is only 15,937 square miles in extent. Both countries have very moist climates, and English trees, shrubs and flowers, unknown in Ontario, flourish exceedingly on the B.C. coast. English lvy, brought out from the Old Land, clings to the sides of houses and spreads its dark green mass over walls. English roses riot as they do in Devon. The yellow flowers of the gores will be blooming there now just as you would see them in the Kentish country. It would make a Toronto gardener sick with envy to see with what marvellous speed English box or privet turns into a hedge in the genial soil and air of Vancouver Island. Holly bushes with red berries stand in the gardens. And the grass is always green, never withering as here.

In addition to the above and other imported flors, lower British Columbia has a wealth of her own lvys and bushes whose evergreen leaves and ferns help to make a veritable jungle of her forests. Many Old Country folk, too, are settled there. Moreover, the damp atmosphere makes for a tranquility of disposition reminiscent of England and unlike the keyed-up nervousness of Ontario and other inland provinces. But there the resemblance stops. The winters in lower British Columbia are wetter than in England, and the summers much warmer. The soft air of the Pacific Ocean lacks the snap of the Atlantic breezes off the English coast. In fact the warm Japanese current g

the English coast. In fact the warm Japanese current gives the shores of Canada it laves a real touch of the tropics.

The luxuriance of the vegetation is the first thing to impress new arrivals. It is officially claimed that the climate of the B. C. coast will produce as much timber in 60 years as the rest of Canada in a century, for trees grow all winter out there. No forests in the world have a heavier stand of timber than those on Vancouver Island. Of British Columbia's estimated total stand of 366 billion feet of board measure and pulpwood, it is estimated along the coast, and half of this—100 billion feet is situated along the coast, and half of this—100 billion feet on Vancouver Island. The writer, who knows the island well also the lower mainland, once saw a single log at Vancouver from which they would cut 16,800 feet of good merchantable lumber. Douglas firs 200 feet high are common enough, and 50,006 feet board measure per acre is not regarded as phenomenal in those forests, compared to whose trees our second growth Ontario pine looks like matchwood.

Coal mining and fishing are, in addition to lumbering, Vancouver Island's main industries. Soft coal of excellent steam quality has long been mined, and a large quantity of it goes to the Pacific coast states. Of fish, salmon are, of course, very plentiful, also halibut — large shipments of which have long been actually shipped to Boston—herring, cod, stc. Toronto capitalists are interested in several big whaling stations on the coasts of Vancouver Island, About the Dunsmuir railway interests, and has since extended tife original lines to various parts of the island. Aspriculture flourishes moderately on Vancouver Island, but not quite as well as might be imagined. Soil is very rich in the low-lying parts, but the expense of clearing timber is excessive. On the higher land, where smaller timber is encountered, the soil is agt to be light and sandy. And for all the wet winter, the summers can be very dry on occasion.
