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## WHEAT WE SAW

—FROM THE—

HOUSE OF COMMONS' GALLERY.

Perched in the "Upper Press Gallery" which is above the gallery occupied by the representatives of the great "Dailies," and directly over the "Speaker's Chair," your correspondent looked down on the political gladiators who are contending for honor and fame, as the people's representatives, on the floors of the House of Commons. Directly in front of the speaker's chair sits the clerk of the House, Dr. J. G. Bourinot, C. M. G., well known as an authority on "Canadian Parliamentary Procedure," and as an historical writer of more than average ability, his history of Cape Breton taking rank as a standard work. To his right is Mr. Rouleau, his assistant, whose duty it is to call the roll of members present when a vote is taken, after having read the motion in French and English. Further on is the table of the Hansard Reporters, whose duty it is to take down the sayings—wise and otherwise—of the people's representatives; while still further down, under the speaker's gallery, sits the Sergeant-at-Arms, staring into vacancy or mechanically transferring his sword from one knee to the other, until the speaker declares the House adjourned, when he marches up to the clerk's table and slyly deposits the "Mace" the symbol of sovereignty, bowing and—exit.

To the right of the Speaker are the government members, and occupying the front seats, which are commonly known as the Treasury Benches, are the Ministers of the Cabinet, Sir John Thompson, Premier; Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, Minister of Marine and Fisheries; Sir Adolphe Caron, Post Master General; Hon. Mr. Foster, Minister of Finance; Hon. Clark Wallace, Comptroller of Customs; Hon. John Costigan, Secretary of State; Hon. J. A. Oulivet, Minister of Public Works; Hon. John Haggart, Minister of Railways; Hon. J. C. Patterson, Minister of Militia; Hon. T. Daly, Minister of the Council; Hon. W. B. Ives, President of the Council; and back of them the main army of the sturdy supporters of the Government, and among them we recognize a number of faces familiar to your correspondent, and some well known to many readers of the Argus. Two seats back of the one occupied by the Premier are the popular representatives from Halifax, T. R. Kenny and J. F. Stairs, both influential, the first as a speaker to whom the House is always ready to listen, whose speeches are always humorous, pointed and practical. Three rows further on we catch the eye of C. E. Kaillach, recognized by men of both sides of politics as the most gentlemanly, and at the same time the most indefatigable worker in the House; Mr. Kaillach seldom takes part in the debates, but whenever there is work to do in "Committee" he is sure to be there. A few seats down from him sit John B. Mills, the member for Annapolis, one of the most popular representatives of Nova Scotia, who besides attending to business can do more to enlighten a dull student than half a score of ordinary ones. Then there is Patterson of Colchester, John A. McDonald of Victoria, and White of Shelburne, all Nova Scotians, besides Fairbairn, Smith, Bennett and other jelly fellows from the best province of Optaria, all of whom your correspondent entertains the best of feelings. There is one other that an observer from the gallery cannot fail to notice, and that is Dr. Montague, the eloquent member from Haldimand, who is justly regarded as the Demosthenes of the House, and whose sonorous tones and rounded periods is sure to fill the galleries and hold the attention of the House.

To the left of the Speaker, and facing the Cabinet Ministers are the recognized leaders of the Opposition. In the front row sits Hon. Wilfred Laurier, whose fine presence and silver-tongued eloquence has won for him a place second to none as an orator; next to him is Sir Richard Cartwright, the Canadian political Jeremiah; Hon. H. L. Davies, (P. E. Island) the leader of the Maritime Liberals; Hon. David Mills, known to the House as Philosopher Mills; and such other noted Liberals as John Charlton of "Sunday Observance" fame; Lister and Mullock, noted for their keenness in scuttling "Conservative Scandals," McMillen, who talks more to the Hansard Reporters than any other five members in the House; his particular hobby being "expenditure at Rideau Hall"; Patterson of Brant, nicknamed "Big Thunder," from the use he makes of his stentorian voice; and last, but not least, Dr. George Landierkin, the wit of the House, whose good natured badinage of the Government is often productive of roars of laughter from both sides. Here also is "Black Tarty" and "Yellow Martin," and Charles Develin the fiery "Home Ruler" from Ottawa county; Big D. C. Fraser from Guysboro and Frank Forbes from Queens, besides numbers of others of more or less notoriety.

There is one other, an old grey-headed man of noble presence,—on this side of the House to whom one almost involuntarily turns, and that person is the Hon. Sir Hector Lang, the life-long friend and Parliamentary companion of the late Chief Justice, Sir John A. Macdonald. A man who has not only been in public life during the lifetime of the Dominion—

father of Confederation—but whose political career dates back to the time of the Union of Upper and Lower Canada when Cartier, Dorion and Sanfield Macdonald were the great commoners of Canada. The last of the great representative men of half a century ago, he is still the idol of the province of Quebec, and still loyal to the great conservative party with which his whole political life has been associated.

In a few moments the chairman had signed the Report, handed it to the speaker, reporting progress and asking leave to sit again. Then the Premier rose and moved "the House do now adjourn." The motion was put by the Speaker, the Mace was laid on the table, and so ended an evening in the House of Commons.

The Montreal Herald has at last found a genuine grievance against the new tariff. It points out that the duty upon school slates has been very greatly reduced, but that the duties upon roofing slates are still kept high, the former being put at 20 per cent and the latter at 30 per cent.

A leading Grit journal, a year or so ago, discussing a change of government at Ottawa, said that the true test of what its party would do, if it attained power in the federal arena, was to note what the liberals had done in those provinces the governments of which it controlled.

Receipts.....\$217,473 Expenditure.....337,414 Deficit.....119,942 There are those who affirm that even this enormous acknowledged deficit amounting, as will be seen, to about 55 per cent of the provincial revenue, and consequently equal to a deficit of \$21,000,000 for the Dominion—does not disclose the whole truth, that the public accounts themselves show that large payments that should have been made in the year 1893, have been held over.

It may be of interest to further note the fact that the P. E. I. government has no idea of reducing its expenditure within its income, but proposes to levy additional taxation to meet its expenditure. Mr. Peters, the premier proposes to levy a land tax of three cents per acre on all farm lands, to levy special taxes on banks, insurance companies and commercial travellers, and to extort tribute from the dead by means of succession duties.

Principle and courage usually go hand in hand. What do the people think of the conduct of Mr. McCarthy who denounced the National Policy in a three hour speech, offered no policy to the house, and then shirked the vote? Such miserable inconsistency upon the part of a professed leader, stands alone without a prototype in the political history of our country with the single exception of McMullen of North Wellington, who with childlike simplicity, crawled out of the house in order to avoid placing himself upon record on the Riel question.

The Grit party profess to be great friends of the Canadian farmer. They have been crying out so long and loud upon these lines that some people who do not keep track of public affairs may be inclined to believe their contention. Under the revenue tariff of Sir Richard Croker what, beans, barley, oats, peas and flour came in free of duty. That was reform doctrine in 1873. The present Government believe in retaining the home market for our farmers—in consequence of which they have a duty of 15 cents per bushel upon wheat, barley and beans, 10 cents per bushel upon oats and peas, and a duty of 75 cents a barrel upon flour.

BIRTHDAY HONORS.

OTTAWA, May 17.—It is intimated here, and the rumor finds credence, that Her Majesty will confer the honor of knighthood upon several members of the Dominion cabinet on the occasion of her birthday—May 24. Hon. Frank Smith, minister without portfolio and a member of the senate, is mentioned in this connection, as is also Hon. Mackenzie Bowell, minister of trade and commerce.

A BATTLE AT BRIDGEWATER BETWEEN OFFICERS FROM HALIFAX AND A PARTY OF LOCAL FISHERMEN AT A FAMOUS SALMON POOL ON THE LAHAYE.

BRIDGEWATER, May 18.—An interesting and amusing, but not very sanguinary conflict took place here yesterday between the English and the Italians. The battle-field was near Davison's lower mill dam. The cause of the fight was a dispute arising from the occupation of certain fishing pools in the river by a party of officers of the Halifax, which were claimed by Messrs. T. R. Pattillo, Starr, Pattillo and Sherman. The officers were Major Brady, Major Smith and Mr. Silver.

DESTROYED THE BRIDGES.

ST. JOHN'S, N.B., May 17.—There is further trouble at Bay de Verde. Sir William Whitehead and Hon. Mr. Bond were not allowed to hold a meeting at Island Cove the night before last and started to visit Perlican yesterday. They had a most uneventful experience on the road. They found all the bridges destroyed to prevent them getting along and had to hire a body guard of fifty men to carry planks to temporarily bridge over the ravines. The men had to ford the rivers. The horses also crossed in the same manner. When they arrived at Perlican they held a meeting with very poor success amid frequent interruptions. The government team was divided up, Macpherson, one of the candidates, with Morine, Penny and others, is taking one half the district, and Mr. Ayre, the other candidate, with Morrison, Dawson and Knight, are following Whitehead and Bond. The excitement here is at the balling point, Colonial Secretary Morine takes a libel suit for five thousand dollars against ex-Surveyor-General Woods, who charged that Morine was starting rinks to arouse sectarianism. The trials are progressing and the docket will be cleared next week. The new trial of Hon. Mr. Fox is fixed for the twenty-eighth. It is expected to only last one day. The Telegram, Whitehead's organ, published a series of private telegraphic messages between members of the executive in St. John's and Bay de Verde, including one cypher despatch. The publication has created a great sensation. Conjectures are numerous as to how it obtained these messages. The general belief is that some clerk in the government offices was bribed to make copies or else the wires were tapped. The government will investigate and the supreme court will also be moved in the matter. Much indignation is felt, as confidence in the secrecy of the telegraph service is greatly shaken.

D. D. CURRIE'S DEATH.

Three passed suddenly away at Shelburne, N. S., on Sunday, a man who held a very prominent place in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia a few years ago. There was no more popular preacher in the Methodist denomination in these provinces fifteen years ago than Rev. D. D. Currie. Not only was he popular as a clergyman but as a man also, he was generally liked by all with whom he came in contact. He was a leader in his denomination and his name was familiar to all leading Methodists in the Dominion. Ten or twelve years ago when charges of immorality were preferred against him the public received a painful shock. The sinners of the grounds upon which these charges were made, the unfairness of the treatment accorded to him, the different statements made by the woman who preferred the charges, are all fresh in the public mind, as they have been before the public in a new form within the last few days.

NO ICICLES IN HIS WHISKERS.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 19.—Wilhelm Boetner sailed for Honolulu yesterday on the steamer Australia as the advance guard for a German colony of fruit eaters, who believe in a diet of fruit and herbs, and in the costume of Eden before the fall. Boetner is searching for some island where the colony may demonstrate its theory without conflicting with the German army and, though dressing in the height of fashion, he wears no hat, as he wishes to become accustomed to the tropical sun. Just before sailing he said: "My idea in going to the tropics is to live as near nature as possible. The climate there is suited to my plans. You know a man cannot go naked in a country where icicles form in his whiskers, but I will be happy in Hawaii."

BOTH DAUGHTERS ELOPED.

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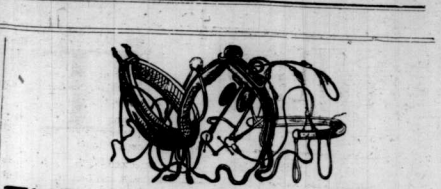
