TOWN COUNCIL HOLDS MONTHLY MEETING

Slightly Reduced Assessment Ordered—Old Assessors Re-elected—Annual Reports Received—Annual Interest Charge is Now Over \$10,000.

The town council met Thursday night, full board present except Ald. Sargeant.

The Salvation Army request for aid for rescue home was not complied with because of lack of funds.

The following assessment was voted for 1911:

Total \$24,600
County contingencies to be added.

The police and light estimates were reduced from \$2200.

The interest amount was reduced from the estimated \$8000 because of expected surplus in the light department. The actual interest charge is \$10,600 a year, which includes \$2600 of the schools' grant.

Aldermen Clark and Butler opposed the reduction in assessment because there was no provision made for cost of additions to capital account or for wear and tear of machinery.

Ald. Morrison said the assessment was ample, but if more taxes were not collected the rate of taxation would soon be four per cent.

The unusually light expenses of the police committee are due to Ald. Butler, who has been the Scott Act lawyer for years, having since his election in April, given his service free of charge. Ald. Butler received the formal thanks of the council to which he responded, saying that he had merely done his duty as he saw it. He had merely given his time and knowledge to the town as other Aldermen had.

Ald. Layton blamed the police committee for not bringing second and third offences against violators of Scott Act.

Licenses receipts during the year were \$247. No fee had been charged the moving picture show as yet.

A change made in order of apportioning salaries of the two men who act as policemen and Scott Act inspectors. In future \$1.20 of their \$1.60 a day will be taken from Scott Act funds, and half the current expenses of police department will be taken from said funds.

The following were elected assessors for the ensuing year: R. H. Armstrong, John Ferguson and Edward Hickey, P. J. McEvoy being defeated by Mr. Hickey by one vote.

The town treasurer was authorized to take proper steps to apply for legislation, to have poll tax fixed at \$5; incomes exempted up to \$200; exemption from taxation of money loaned by citizens other than corporations on real estate or to the town and for authority to issue bonds for a new loan not to exceed \$30,000.

The annual report of the Public Works committee endorsed the work had been done on the streets and sewers.

The report of the fire company showed that during 1910 there had been 11 alarms of fire and one false alarm.

150 feet of new hose had been bought, making 2100 feet on hand. During the year there have been eleven alarms of fire and one false alarm, viz:—

Board of Trade Held Meeting

Ask For Completion of Dredging; Rap Telephone Company; Publish Statement of Newcastle Steamboat Co.

Newcastle Board of Trade met in adjourned session last night. President Hennessy in the chair.

Communication from Remus Bridge Lumber Co., stating that company were willing to transfer their new wharf in Millerton to Dominion Government seeing that no public wharfage was available in that vicinity, and asking the Board's Co-operation in the matter.

Secretary was directed to bring this matter to the attention of the Public Work department, and also to ask the department to complete the dredging required on the Northwest Miramichi, where there is a shallow channel which in many places is obstructed by sunken logs, etc.

Secretary was directed to urge upon the Chief Commissioner the necessity of the Local Government lighting the Northwest Bridge draw for navigation purposes, it having been declared a provincial matter by the Dominion government; also to memorialize Local government for a new wharf at Redbank and a wharf on south side of the Northwest at or near Scott's shore.

Committee on down river mail service were given extension of time.

Ald. Morrison of the Newcastle Steamboat Co., spoke in behalf of an increased subsidy for the Newcastle-Nelson ferry service. Last year the ferryboat ran 140 days with the greatest care as to wages, fuel, etc., and sustained a deficit of \$1400. At that rate the deficit for a full season's service this year would be \$1559.

Following were appointed a committee to take up this matter with the town council: James Falconer, R. A. Murdoch, E. A. McCurdy, P. Hennessy, John Ferguson, Hon. John P. Burchell.

Repairing of ferry slips was also referred to above committee. It was decided to ask Post office department for letter boxes to be distributed through this as is customary in other towns.

DRAUGHT DEATH IN MONTREAL PULPIT

Rev. Dr. A. J. Mowatt, Formerly of Fredericton, Passed Away Suddenly at Sunday Morning Service—Subject was "A Vision of Christ."

Montreal, Feb. 19.—When I saw I fell at His feet as one dead, from Revelations 1, 17, was the text chosen by the Rev. Dr. Mowatt, of Erskine church for his sermon this morning, the subject being "A Vision of Christ." The choir was singing the introductory hymn to the sermon, which members of the congregation noticed that their pastor was in distress. Willing arms bore him to the vestry, where he passed away immediately without recovering consciousness.

The congregation was at once dismissed. Dr. Mowatt was seventy-two years of age, and had been in ill health for some months. Two months ago he handed in his resignation, but was filling the pulpit pending the appointment of his successor. He came to Montreal from St. John N. B., in 1890. Tonight Rev. Dr. Scott, who was assisting at the service this morning, delivered the sermon which Dr. Mowatt was to have preached, to a tearful congregation.

FAVOR COMPULSORY VACCINATION

Provincial Board of Health Advocate Stringent Measures to Exterminate Smallpox.

The Provincial Board of Health met at St. John on Tuesday, among North Shore representatives were W. P. Foley, of Caraquet and Col. Maltby and Dr. Desmond of Newcastle.

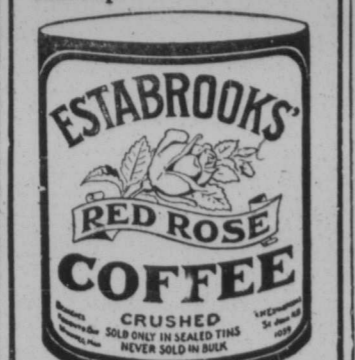
There were two sessions, forenoon and afternoon. During the forenoon the subject of vaccination as a preventive for smallpox among school children was thoroughly discussed. It was pointed out that there might be considerable difficulty in enforcing the law in counties where there was a preponderance of the French element, although there was difficulty even in counties where this was not true. In the afternoon Dr. Fisher said that ever since his appointment the provincial board had favored the adoption of compulsory vaccination. With such a safeguard the only cases of the disease with which they would probably be called upon to deal would be from the outside of the province, St. John, Moncton, Newcastle and several other towns in the province had compulsory vaccination of school children and he favored the extension of this system in the province. The appointment of such a health officer as they asked for would do much towards reducing the smallpox bills.

Col. Maltby advocated the extension of the quarantine from twelve to fourteen days, as at present to twenty-one or twenty-two days. Measures should also be taken more effectively to compel doctors to report cases of infectious disease.

He also endorsed compulsory vaccination. Dr. Desmond spoke of the importance of doctors ascertaining if the vaccination in the case of children was successful before granting certificates. Dr. Curran expressed himself as strongly in favor of compulsory vaccination among school children as the only effective safeguard.

A resolution was finally introduced and carried in favor of compulsory vaccination wherever practicable, as well as the appointment of a provincial health officer.

PLOTTING TO OBTAIN CHINESE TERRITORY

China Believes There is Secret Agreement Between Russia and Japan. Peking, Feb. 18.—That a secret agreement between Russia and Japan to strip China of a large part of her territory is responsible for the ultimatum sent by the czar's government to Peking is the belief of the imperial council. This agreement is believed to be part of the treaty entered into between Russia and Japan following the Russo-Japanese war. As a result of threats against M Keretvitz, the Russian minister to China, the Russian embassy is under guard today, and it is reported that Muscovite officials

ready to leave the empire at a moment's notice. The news that Russia was moving troops towards Mongolia, and that she would tolerate no delay on the part of China in the forwarding the answer to the ultimatum has shown conclusively that China faces the most serious crisis since the China-Japanese war. Students of international politics, moreover, than the treaty difficulty in seeking a cause for the hostilities between Russia and China. Russia will have an army upon China's border, and should war come Russia could have an army moving toward Peking, if such a campaign were deemed expedient with a twenty-four hours of the declaration of war. The council heard, the imperial council and the prince regent had further conferences today, and important notices were sent to the diplomatic representatives of China in this nation which were notified by Russia of the proposed military demonstration. It is obvious that China is seeking to delay, while the intervention of foreign powers can be obtained. There are many complications to the situation. Russia has already obtained from England concessions for railroad connection with the British lines in India, following, of course, the construction of the trans-Persian and trans-Beloochistan roads by Russia. China has all but closed negotiations for a vast railroad loan from United States and European financiers, which could not be carried through in the event of war, because of the national debt that war would entail.
