**THE LATE ROMAN CATHOLIC PRIMATE.**  
In our last we printed the letter of Mr D'Israeli, on the Romish hierarchy. In that letter he has adverted somewhat strongly on the favour shown by Lord Clarendon to the Roman Catholic bishops of Ireland, speaking of his having, *autostorice sua*, gives them precedence over the "nobility and dignitaries of the National Church." On this point, Mr C.C. Grenville, Secretary to the Privy Council, grapples with Mr D'Israeli, and in a letter addressed to the Times, shows that if Lord Clarendon did wrong, he only followed the example set by the Peel Government of 1845. He says "Whether the recognition of the status and precedence of the Irish Roman Catholic prelates was right or wrong wise or unwise it was an accomplished fact before the present Government came into office, and therefore before Lord Clarendon went to Ireland. He found the thing done, and had only to conform himself to it. It was done (no doubt after mature deliberation) by the Government of Sir Robert Peel (before the schism); and the recognition came forth in the shape of a formal instrument of the highest authority, bearing date the 13th of January, 1845. A warrant or royal commission approved by her Majesty in Council on that day (to carry out the Charitable Bequests Act) runs as follows:—'Know ye that we, representing the special trust and confidence in your knowledge, discretion, and ability, do hereby, &c., and with the advice of our Privy Council, appoint you the said John George, Archbishop of Armagh; Richard Archibishop of Dublin; Arch bishop, William Croly, Archbishop David Murray, John Holy Earl of Donoughmore, Bishop Cornelius Denver, Henry Pakenham, &c., to be Commissioners, &c.'—This was (and was deemed) a royal recognition of the spiritual rank of the Irish prelates, and a concession of precedence corresponding with that of the prelates of the same degree of the Established Church. Such rank and precedence it was not in the power of the Lord Clarendon either to confer or to withhold. His attitude was in what we call an Orangeman, it was his duty to treat them according to the dignity which it pleased the Sovereign to recognise in their persons. And this is what Lord Clarendon did. He did not 'insult' persons as *Protes*, he neither 'sought their counsel,' nor 'courted their favour'; but he received them all with becoming courtesy and respect, and those prelates who were distinguished by their loyalty to the Crown, their attachment to the Queen, and their personal virtues, he treated with peculiar marks of regard and confidence."—Birmingham Journal.

**"FIRE AT THE PALACE."**  
On Wednesday morning, about ten o'clock, the inmates of the Episcopal Palace, Front-street, were alarmed by the sound of a fire bell, which had been permitted to become too loud, and the flooring of some of the rooms was found to be in a state of ignition. Most providentially the fire was extinguished before any great damage had occurred. If the flames had been permitted to spread for a few minutes longer, the Palace must, in all probability, have been a mass of ruins. When our eye caught the title of "Fire at the Palace," we were filled with astonishment that a Palace should have set itself down so quietly in the heart of Canada, especially as a member of the Royal family had ever been known to visit Toronto. Instantly, it occurred that perhaps the spring to receive the warm expressions of attachment of her Canadian subjects, and the house intended for her Majesty's reception had by anticipation been styled the Palace. But these conjectures were put to flight when we read on, and found that it was only the brick house of "John by Divine permission." Now there can be no objection to any man assuming that he is pleased to receive himself to live in the Palace when it is a comfortable dwelling house, but we do object decidedly to the public acknowledging such distinctions, which are totally opposed to the fact that there is no established sect in Canada. The residence of the Governor General has but the modest title of Government House; but it seems that to make up for this deficiency, we have Ecclesiastical Palaces, occupied by Spiritual Princes! Numbers blindfolded and overawed by such assumptions of rank, bow down to such pretensions without considering what they do. Every day Preley shows a bolder front, and puts forth claims which will be yielded to only by the ignorant or superstitious.—Globe.

**MURDER.**  
On the night of Sunday last, the 8th inst., a most appalling murder was committed in the Township of Adamston, in the County of Renfrew. A man named William Barry who had lived in that place some eight or nine years, and had been, we believe, originally from Glasgow, was found murdered in his own house on Monday morning. It appears that the deceased was by trade a plasterer, and occasionally left his own place to follow his trade when called upon. For some weeks back he had been in the employment of Peter Morris, Esq., at Burnstown, on the Macdowall River, and the latter part of last week completed his work, and received his pay. He then proceeded to his home, some fifteen miles distant, and on his way saw and drank with some acquaintances who observed that he frequently exhibited his money which consisted of one gold coin, one large silver piece, and the rest in Bank Bills.—On his farm and in the same house with himself, there lived a man named John Wood, who was in Barry's employment in the capacity of a farm labourer. Wood who had a wife and two small children,—all of whom resided in the same house. On Sunday evening Mr. Barry was seen by some of his neighbors in his own house, with Wood and wife and family. Barry was unsmiling, and had no relatives residing with him. On Monday morning one of the neighbors went to Barry's house for the purpose of chopping wood, when he found the door fast. There was no stir nor appearance of any living creature being about the place. This appeared so remarkable that the man went to another neighbor and informed him of it. The two immediately went to Archibald Patterson, Esq., Postmaster, Adamston, who lived within a mile of Barry's house, and stated their apprehension that something might be wrong. Mr. Patterson at once proceeded with the two men to Barry's house, and finding the door fast, and having reason to believe that Barry had not left the house, they forced the door. On entering the house they found the body of Barry lying on a bed with the face upwards, and the fore part of the skull smashed in. His arms lay across his breast and his body was stretched at full length. To all appearances death had been instantaneous, and without a struggle. The body was cold and stiff, and it was evident that the horrible deed had been committed while the deceased was sleeping, and early on Sunday night. Suspicion immediately rested on Wood, who it was found had absconded with his wife and family, taking a span of horses, a sleigh, and a trunk belonging to the deceased. It appeared that the wretch had taken his horse and sleigh to make his escape. The sleigh was easily tracked to the village of Renfrew, some seven miles—owing to the fall of snow on Sunday night. Some of the inhabitants immediately decided to pursue Wood, but in the village of Renfrew we are informed, no conveyance could be obtained. It is most incredible to any place to show indifference to crime; and some of the people of Renfrew are justly open to severe censure. A conveyance was soon procured, however, from Wm. Morris, Esq. of Macnac, who hearing of the matter, immediately placed an excellent team at their service. Mr. Adam Curry, of Pakenham also deserves credit for assistance rendered in the same way. Thanks are also due to Roderick Ross, Esq. of Renfrew for much exertion in rendering assistance. Wood was being taken to Pakenham, but beyond that village it was not known which road he had taken. One party proceeded to Bytown and another to Perth, but neither party overtook Wood, or any obtained information respecting his flight. Since writing the above we learn that Wood, Alias Barr or Bear, was arrested on Wednesday by Mr. Fraser, Deputy Sheriff of Carleton County, at Killmarock on the Rideau, and the same day was delivered over to Sheriff Dickson, at Smith's Falls, by whom he was conveyed to Perth Gaol.—For the arrest of Wood, the supposed murderer, the public are mainly indebted to Mr. Robert Dickson, of Renfrew, and some two or three others of that place; and also to the activity of Deputy Sheriff Fraser.—Bytown Packet.

**TWO WEEKS LATER FROM CALIFORNIA.**  
New York, Dec. 20—3, P. M.  
The *Cherokee* touched the wharf at 12 o'clock, she brings 301 passengers, and \$1,694,000 in specie.  
The *Genesee* arrived at Panama on the 3rd, with two weeks' later news from San Francisco. The mails had not reached the *Cherokee* when she left. The *Falco* had not arrived at Chagres. The steamer *Philadelphia* arrived at New Orleans on the 9th, and would sail next day. Both vessels would be full of passengers.  
The *Pacific News* says: "Since our last issue, nothing of importance has occurred to mar the progress of California. The Cholera has made rapid strides in some localities, and laid many in the dust in this City, its first appearance. Some three weeks since, the number of deaths has been about 135, while in Sacramento they have probably reached 1000. The scourge, however, is abating, and the deaths in either city do not average over 10 per day. This, however, is not so gratifying a great measure, the business of the large cities and considerably affected every locality. During the winter a much larger number of miners will remain in the mountains than before, and consequently more gold will be taken out there than during any previous season. Much attention is being paid to the quartz mining. The Mariposa mines are yielding a good return, notwithstanding the machinery is not so powerful as desired. Within a short time another quartz vein of great richness has been discovered between the South fork of the Feather and Yuba rivers. Heretofore, the mines have only been scratched over, but a scientific mining, only just commenced. When fully under way, and a requisite amount of capital actively employed, the result will be even more wonderful than ever before. "We have seen persons from various portions of the mines, from whom we learn the cholera has spread to but a very limited extent. A few cases have occurred at Nevada City, Rough and Ready, and other towns. The Yuba mines have generally yielded well; the average yield per man being from \$5 to \$10, daily. A large number of miners will winter on the Yuba.

Turnips 1s to 1s 3d per bushel. Hay 20s to 22s 6d per ton.
