Household Notes. Add a small piece of butter the size of a walnut when starch comes to a good boil. This not only gives a nice smooth finish and makes ironing easier, but it prevents the starch from boiling over. Either will remove perspiration stains, but should be mixed with ammonia and water. One fourth ether, one fourth ammonia, and one-half water is a good mixture. Rinse and place in the sun. Old coffee grounds, if thoroughly dried, make the best filling for cushions; they are better than bran, which attracts mice, or hair, which attracts moths; besides, they don't sift out as sand does. Almost anything that has come in contact with sticky fly-paper can be thoroughly cleaned by sponging with kerosene. The odor will soon evaporate if the article is exposed to the air for a short time. Turn the gloves wrong side out, press the rent together and coat the edges with automobile gum. Cover with a piece of adhesive plaster. When dry the gloves may be turned and will be found as good as new. Delicious nut sandwiches are made of almonds, English walnuts and hickory nuts ground fine, moistened with mayonnaise dressing and spread on buttered slices of bread which are sprinkled with a little grated cheese. Protect embroideries that come to the bottom of the skirt by placing a scant ruffle of lace back of the scalloped edge. The lace should extend a half inch below the scallops. This adds to the appearance of a lingerie frock. The way to handle large rugs is to have a pole heavier than a clothes-prop. Preferably the pole should be round, but will answer if the edges are rounded off to make it octagonal. Roll the rug on this, and it can then be lifted and carried easily. Lukewarm water and the soap will remove fats from fast-colored woolsens, while tar and wagon grease will yield to lard rubbed on, then soaped and allowed to lie for an hour or so. Afterward wash alternately in water and spirits of turpentine. When a gas mantle breaks and the flinty ashes fall apart, do not throw them away. They make excellent silver polish. One woman saves these ashes and sprinkles them over the logs in her gas grate. The effect is brilliant when the gas is lighted. We had some pieces of brass chains and found them splendid to run through the hems of the table covers when in use on the porch in summer. Such "loaded" covers do not blow off easily, consequently they save quite a bit of annoyance and laundering. When eggs are high and it is almost impossible to obtain fresh ones at any price, put into the cake batter one less egg than called for, and add one tablespoonful more of milk. This makes a satisfactory substitute, and will help out in many a difficult place. Cover your bed pillows with a based on pillow-case of old thin muslin, which will keep the ticks from head stains, and the feathers from collecting possible disease germs, and will make the top pillow-case look whiter than when put directly on the ticking.

Violations of Bait Act.

It is most refreshing to find that the conversion of the Hon. M. P. Cashin to the policy of excluding Americans from the Newfoundland bait supply on the non-treaty coast has been so complete that he is taking a personal part in the pursuit of supposed violators of the Bait Act. The authority for this statement we find in the Daily News of this morning. This is what the News says:—

"Finance Minister Cashin, learning from Cape Race that the Arethusa, Captain Clayton Morrissey, and another Gloucester schooner were in that vicinity searching for bait at different coves, left yesterday for Ferryland, joined the Fiona, and started in pursuit of the vessels which had passed the Cape at 10 a.m. If captured the schooners will be brought here and prosecuted for violation of the Bait Act."

The ardent desire of this gentleman to take a personal part in enforcing the Bait Act against Americans resorting to the Ferryland waters will be watched with interest by those who remember that Mr. Cashin left the Liberal party for inaugurating a bait policy against Americans. We were not surprised that Mr. Cashin did not make the reversal of the policy a condition of joining Sir Edward Morris in forming the Tory Government. Nor were we surprised at the careful enforcement of the Bait Act this year after what took place in the House of Assembly last session, and we feel inclined to congratulate Inspector O'Reilly on his success on the seafaring and fishing in the Harmony case recently, for that was a gross violation of the Bait Act. But we were surprised at the activity and enthusiasm of Mr. Cashin in taking upon himself the direction and pursuit of the supposed violators of the Bait Act in the Ferryland District. Although we believe Mr. Cashin was unwise in superseding so experienced an officer as Inspector O'Reilly, we also believe that Mr. Cashin has shown wisdom in allowing himself to be converted to the Bait Policy, in spite of all he did and said from 1905 to 1909.

As a new and enthusiastic convert he has added the personal pursuit and capture of Bait Act violators and has been indiscreet in leaving Inspector O'Reilly at home.

Found House Open.

Mr. and Mrs. H. Cowan left by the Mongolian last week for England, and last evening Mrs. Howley drew the Const. Hutchings' attention to the fact that the rear doors of their house were left open, one of the front windows was up and thieves could enter the place. The room doors were all open when the officer investigated, and silverware and other valuables could be taken at leisure by any thief. The officer reported the matter to Mr. J. Cowan, and he had the place locked up.

Hurt at Bell Island.

Cyril Leary, of Brigus, C.B., drill foreman blaster with the N. S. Co. at Bell Island, will not be able to do any work for several weeks. He met with a serious accident there yesterday which obliged him to go home and get the doctor's attendance. He jumped on a loaded ore car coming up the slope on the way to get his lunch and in doing so got "squeezed" between the car and a prop. His chest and hip suffered. The company sent him home on the steamer.

The New Targets Will Imitate Men.

London, July 13.—To improve the marksmanship of soldiers the British army is introducing a new kind of moving target. This device, which is operated electrically, provides targets moving in different directions, in straight lines, curves, forward or back, to represent actual conditions. The apparatus used by the English and other European armies is a target moving in certain directions. By observing the speed it is easy for the men to reckon the range. Thus it is said they fail to get the practice needed and soon lose interest, failing to develop the necessary accuracy.

In the new system, which has been adopted by the Society of Miniature Rifle Clubs, there is scarcely a movement of making which this new target cannot imitate; running at right angles to the firer, disappearing, running straight for the firer, or advancing straight for the rifle's mouth. The targets are manipulated entirely by switches at the firing point or any convenient place, and may be used either indoors or out. In general the targets are laid out in curves, not unlike a trove railway, over a large area, providing hills and hollows. The targets are in armored carriages so that the hits will not destroy the apparatus. Three targets going in different directions can be provided at the same time.

The operation of soldiers' new target which is called the Whitney, after its inventor, Asa Whitney, is comparatively simple. A wire is run from an electric main to the rails of the tracks on which the target travels. This current works the motor which is protected by an armor plated carriage. The targets are kept broadside on to the firer. The current necessary for an entire day costs only a few cents, but where storage batteries have to be used it is slightly more expensive.

Workman Lost His Eye

Court Awards Him \$425 Under Compensation Act.

As compensation for the loss of his eye, resulting from an accident while working as a riveter at the C. P. R. Co.'s Angus Shops, William Harland has been awarded \$425 by a judgment of Mr. Justice St. Pierre, in the Superior Court. Plaintiff claimed \$600 when he entered his action under the Workmen's Compensation Act, but the attorney for the defendant got together and it was agreed to settle the claim out of court on the company paying the plaintiff \$425. This agreement was formally ratified by court judgment.

Trial Fixed for Oct. 11

Los Angeles, July 14.—Judge Bordwell to-day set the trial of the McNamara brothers for Oct. 11. The District Attorney and counsel for the McNamara Brothers did not enter the proposed conference as to the time set for the trial of the alleged dynamite plotters, but went into the court to-day prepared to argue the matter vigorously.

Longest Telephone Circuit in the World

On May 8 the longest telephone circuit in the world was opened for public service, being between New York City and Denver, Colorado. The distance is 2,620 miles, over which the human voice can be plainly heard. The amount of copper in the circuit is over a ton to a mile, a total of 2,100 tons, and the circuit represents an investment of more than two million dollars.

Scientific wonders reach their climax in the new line. With the two circuits of four copper wires, it is possible not only to carry on four telephone conversations at the same time between the two cities named, but as many as seventy-two telegraph messages may be sent over the circuit simultaneously with the conversations. The cost of using the line is somewhat expensive. For the first three minutes of conversation between Denver and New York the charge will be \$1.25, and \$3.75 for each additional minute. It is expected in time that through circuits will be completed to Los Angeles and San Francisco, and it will then be possible to talk from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific, at a cost of about \$25 for the first three minutes of conversation.

GRAPHIC STORY OF THE DISASTER

Told by Newspaper Men Who Escaped From South Porcupine.

Toronto, Ont., July 13.—One of the earliest as well as one of the most graphic descriptions of the Porcupine disaster is given by Edward S. Little, a newspaper man who was in South Porcupine when the fire broke out, and who, with extreme difficulty, made his way out, and reached Cobalt, from whence his story was telegraphed to Toronto. He says:

In four short hours, commencing at 12.30 Tuesday afternoon the fire raged from the Standard mines right through to the shores of Porcupine Lake, eating up South Porcupine, Pottsville and part of Golden City, as well as many small buildings along the lake front.

While part of the loss of life occurred near Porcupine Lake, the greatest havoc will be around the main mines, notably West Dome and Big Dome. Here the entrapped miners, cut off by the flames, took to the shafts, where they perished.

At Preston, East Dome safety was sought in an untimbered shaft, and there was no loss of life.

The streets of South Porcupine are strewn with dead human beings, horses, dogs and cattle, while along the mine roads charred corpses lie at intervals. The names and number of dead can be but roughly estimated, but a large number of prospectors in the bush must have perished in the seething furnace of flames, driven by a sixty-mile gale.

It is known, however, that of the staff of 300 at the Dome but a few were saved, while at the West Dome but three out of 84 employees are now known to be alive. Along the highway between West Dome and South Porcupine, over a comparatively open section, the wide six charred bodies.

In the ruins of the town of South Porcupine there lie the bodies of Wm. Gohr and his clerk, Mac, Smith, Captain George Dubar and Tom Geddes.

People Were Slow to Appreciate Danger.

Early Tuesday morning dense clouds of smoke could be seen in the southwest, but the fire was apparently remote. A small fire also broke out in Lakeview, Porcupine town site, but this excited little notice, because of the frequency of bush fires.

As noon approached, thick clouds of smoke reached the zenith, marking the approach of the fire and soon the sun was obscured. At 2.30 the fire had covered an area of 25 miles in length, and over two miles in width and had reached the base line of Tisdale mines in Delora township; Philadelphia, in Shaw township; and the Eldorado and United in Southern Whitney.

At 1.15 p.m. the seriousness of the situation was realized in South Porcupine. The fire call was sounded on the Dome Mine whistle, with repeated blasts from other whistles. By this time the sky was black with smoke and residents began to pack valuables and light baggage for a hurried departure. Soon the flames had reached the Foley & O'Brien mine, having enveloped the Preston, East Dome, North Dome and what remained of the Dome Extension after last Sunday's fire.

In half an hour the outlying shacks had been reached. This was the beginning of the end, and became apparent at once that the town and

possibly all the inhabitants were doomed; for the width of the fire was sufficient for it to sweep over the entire town of South Porcupine and around both sides of Porcupine Lake. The fire reached the frame buildings of the town with a roar heard for miles.

Town Destroyed in Twenty Minutes' Time.

In twenty minutes South Porcupine was completely in flames and in three hours there were but corpses and smouldering embers where the most flourishing town of the camp had stood.

Men, women, and children crowded to the water front. Launches and canoes, scows and boats were pressed into commission and the women and children were first packed into the boats and sent to Pottsville and Golden City, both safe at that time.

Panic and chaos prevailed. Men fought with each other for their families, and Police Officer Murray, with Jack Gardner, had to stand off the panic-stricken foreigners, who rushed for each boat as it came in. Men were hurled into the water and many rushed in as the only place of safety. Thirty launches and as many canoes soon had the women landed in safety on the other side of the lake.

Refused to Leave Without Her Husband.

There was one exception, and that the most pitiful of all. Mrs. William Gohr, with her baby in her arms, refused to leave the town until she had news of her husband. Mr. Gohr, like the others who perished in town, had gone back in an effort to save some valuables, and with his clerk was penned in the building. For two hours Mrs. Gohr stood in the water of the lake, a hundred feet from shore, calling to her husband and refusing to leave until he was found. Even after all had deserted the town, and the fire had died out, she remained in a tent on the shore awaiting recovery of her husband's body.

To add to the terror of the situation scores of horses, cattle and dogs ran wild in the town. Their disembowled and scorched bodies now line the streets with the bodies of dead men.

Many Acts of Heroism Performed.

Acts of heroism were too numerous to mention in detail, while the horrors of the holocaust are too gruesome for print. One man said after the fire:

"The man who could go through this, could travel through hell with a smile on his face."

One man was led through the town with both eyes burned out, and moaning because his partner had perished; another with his face and arms a mass of blisters, and still another had his abdomen burst open by burns. Harry Roche, a mining engineer, and A. S. Shields, representatives of the J. B. O'Brien Mines, beat their way back through town when the flames were at their height and brought out an unknown man who was so seriously burned that a portion of his head fell off when he was picked up.

Some of These who Lost Their Lives. Little will ever be known of the experiences of some of the prospectors in the bushes, as only the dead remained.

The men from the Eldorado all escaped. What occurred at the West Dome, the centre of the most terrible part of the catastrophe, will probably never be known, but no solid evidence is known to have been seen. 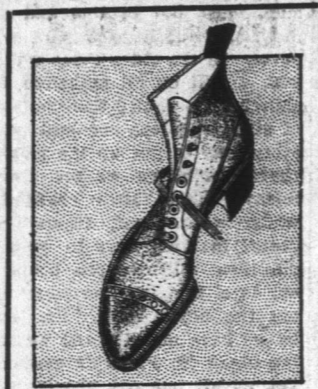

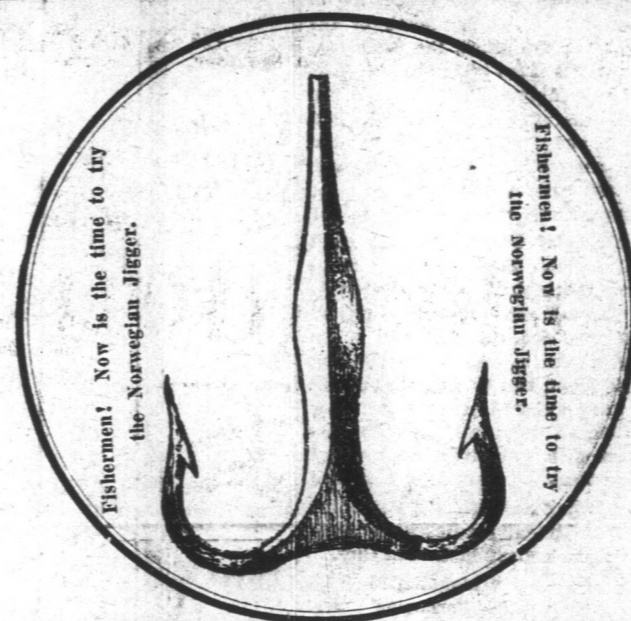

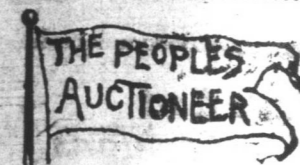
