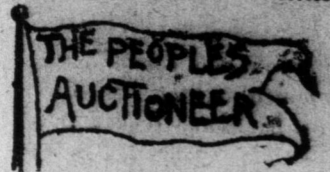

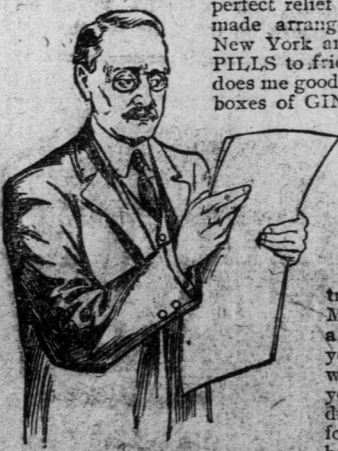

In the previous fight Storbeck was disqualified in the seventh round for fouling. Moran proved the winner tonight in a hard fought battle. Both received much punishment, and in the 12th round the American was unable to come up for the thirteenth.

The Terrible Experience

Of the Crew of the Schooner Morrissey.

(Western Star.)
The Morrissey first left Bonne Bay for Bay of Islands on the morning of 6th January, but carried away peak block and had to put back.

Tuesday morning, 9th January she again got under weigh in rock ballast, the wind blowing fair breeze from the southeast. At 2 p.m. the wind changed to south and very light. At between 3 and 4 o'clock in the afternoon wind of Cape Gregory, the wind again hauled round to southeast and blew a hurricane accompanied with snow, had to strip the vessel of all sail and put her under bare poles, single reef, and the foresail, and it blew out of the crew, then double reefed it at 5 p.m.

At 7 p.m. the double reefed foresail, (brand new) was torn in rivens from the craft off for about twenty miles under bare poles, but the sea being so heavy had to leave too at 9 p.m. in order to keep her from foundering. Took the riding sail single reefed it and put it to the foremast. At about ten o'clock that night the wind hauled to S.W. and continued to blow very heavily with high sea still running, also snow squalls, and lightning.

About 6 o'clock Wednesday morning the wind hauled to N.W. At about 1.30 p.m. met with slob ice. Tried to keep the vessel clear but found her difficult to steer in her condition, sea being all "awash" forward, seas going clean over her continually. Had one of the dories smashed by the sea that afternoon.

The vessel was still hove too making lee way when about five minutes after two Thursday morning land was sighted, through the snow storm. It was first thought to be ice. Immediately wore the starboard tack. They now discovered it was land and that the vessel was in the trough of the seas.

The vessel struck a reef 3/4 of a mile from shore. Three or four seas washed clean over the craft and carried her over the reef. Then it was a continual bump, till the vessel was thrown high upon the beach at Table Point Cove. This was about half-past two o'clock Thursday morning. And in the piercing W.N.W. gale, with mercury registered 10 below zero the shipwrecked mariners were compelled to leave their stranded craft and seek shelter on the shore.

The vessel was "ratt and rattle" with ice, and she could not possibly remain afloat more than three or four hours more had she not gone ashore. All hands did their endeavour "chopping away ice in order to keep her afloat. The windlass and dory on deck could not be disengaged, being completely covered up with ice. Her bulwarks had to be chopped away in order to let the water flow off, but yet the ice continued to make. The crew

had to hold on with one hand while chopping with the other, in order to save themselves from being washed over board, the sea making clean over her all the while.

Our first effort on reaching the beach was to find inhabitants, said Gillispie, and in the effort, the mate and J. O'Brien the cook, got astray in the woods and we did not find them till after daylight. In the meantime the captain and the rest of us, six all told, held a consultation in the woods, and it was decided that the Captain and Lewis Dunn should go and try to find inhabitants. They returned at 3.30 after an unsuccessful search for inhabitants, though they had succeeded in finding a house in the woods.

The skipper had also endeavored to again board the schooner but could not. Dunn told me that the skipper was almost played out and that he was compelled to take a little rest in the woods.

We all started off for the house, the skipper and myself (Gillispie) bringing up the rear. Had not gone twenty yards when the skipper dropped and could go no further. I called to the men ahead, but owing to the fierceness of the storm they could not hear me. The skipper could not walk any further so I had to pull him along, till we reached the edge of a cliff over which we both fell and rolled to the water's edge.

After a while I managed to drag the skipper from there to abreast where the schooner lay a distance of about 3/4 of a mile.

The captain asked me where the vessel was, and I told him we were just beside her. But he was unable to see the craft as the lashes of his both eyes were frozen together.

I now found myself, says Gillispie, very much done up and unable to get the skipper along any further. The skipper wanted me to leave him to die, after giving me a message for his mother. Gillispie declared that so long as a spark of life remained in his body he would not leave him, though he thought that by that time he would be well nigh dead himself. I had lost my sou-wester and the skipper wanted me to take his, as he said he would need it no more.

The skipper had lost his mitts so I gave him mine. Seeing that I could be no more help to him, I set out in the dark and deep snow to try and find the house in the woods where the rest of the crew had gone, and get them to help in getting along the skipper.

I had some trouble in finding the house, but at last succeeded, and found Dunn, Nickerson and Burton, with a fire in. I said for God's sake come and help me with the skipper as he is lying on the beach. I asked Dunn to come, thinking he being his countryman, his schoolmate and his shipmate, that he would be the first to come to the assistance of his skipper.

Followed by Burton and Nickerson I returned to the skipper and found him unconscious. Burton, Nickerson and myself carried him to the shack in the woods. When we were within about ten yards of the house, Dunn came out crying, "poor Charlie," but he had to beat it while his boots were good.

After we had got the unconscious skipper in the shack we resorted to various efforts to bring up circulation and restore consciousness. But not until five hours untiring efforts on their part was the unfortunate mariner restored to consciousness. His boots were frozen to his feet, and his face and hands also were badly "roast bitten." After daylight the inhabitants of the shack, seeing the wreck upon the shore, started out for the shack, where they found us endeavoring to restore the captain. They

took us up to their homes, where we were so well treated that their many kindnesses will never be forgotten by us.

The mate had his face and hands badly frozen. Ben More, and the cook, was badly frozen about the face and the captain's face, hands, and feet were so badly frozen that it would be some days before he could be able to travel.

A pretty wedding took place at St. Thomas's Church on the 7th inst. when Mr. James Burn, of Mortdale Penrith, Cumberland, England, led to the altar Miss Margaret Elizabeth Wilkinson, of Lancaster, Lancashire, England, in the presence of several friends of both. The ceremony was performed by Rev. G. R. Godden, and the bridesmaid was Miss Gladys Davis and the best man Mr. John Dooley. The groom is shepherd at the Golf Links and he and his bride are very popular. The Telegram extends congratulations.

LONDON, Feb. 15. The King's Speech proved a disappointment to the supporters of both Home Rule and Woman Suffrage. A telegram to the Times this morning from Dublin states that the scanty reference to Home Rule has greatly disappointed the Irish Nationalists, who hoped for a more fervent allusion to that pre-eminence of the session. The Nationalists are said to be still more seriously perturbed by a persistent rumor that the bill will not be introduced till after Easter. To Miss Pankhurst the speech has been more than a disappointment. She states that the Union of Suffragists will make an impressive demonstration at an early date, and that every opportunity will be taken of embarrassing the Government, thereby proving to them that women must have the vote. Miss Pankhurst said: "We had hoped for a distinct pronouncement in the King's Speech. We always expect the best, but are prepared for the worst. Now that they have given the worst, we shall fight for a Government measure until we win."

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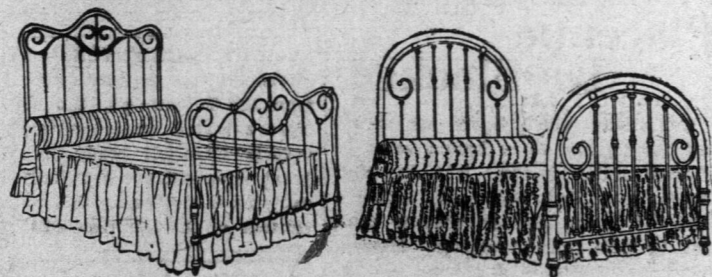

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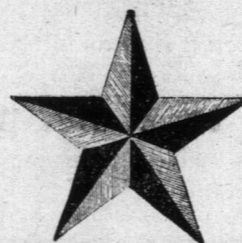
