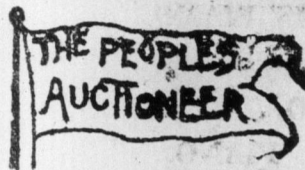

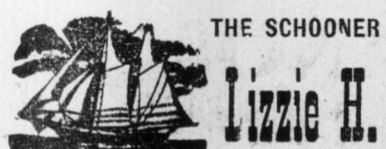

### Criticising the Newspapers.

"There, that's just about as near as newspaper gets to anything." The author's man's wife threw down the paper contemptuously as she made that bromidic criticism of the accuracy of newspapers. The author's man's wife had been interviewed and she did not think the interviewer had quoted her correctly. It seems that he, the reporter had asked if she did not think a certain thing was so, and when she had given a lukewarm assent, had quoted her as having of her own accord made emphatic statement to that effect. And the author's man's wife was most indignant. Justly, you say? And yet think how many people do just that same thing. "Gertrude says she doesn't think you have any right to do that, and that you are unreasonable even to think of it." So one friend of mine once quoted another. It certainly sounded as if Gertrude were very much opposed, but I had good reason for thinking she had no such strong feeling, and questioning proved that just what I thought was true. Our mutual friend, after saying very warmly that she felt thus and so about my proposed move, had asked Gertrude if she did not agree, and she being one of those people who always agree with present company, had said she did. Undoubtedly a great many things that one person quotes another as saying, are said in just about that way, and yet we blame the newspapers because they do the same. It is quite the fashion among cultured people to cry down the newspapers every now and then, which, quite aside from the justice of the accusation, seems almost as absurd as crying down what we see in our mirrors. For after all, your newspaper is nothing more or less than a reflection of your tastes and your interests. But to return to the justness of the accusation. As a rule I think the newspapers are not a bit worse than the people who criticise them. We object to the newspapers' inaccuracy in quoting. I have already pointed out how often we also are guilty. We inveigh against the scandal of the newspaper parades. If we never tell a juicy bit of gossip to our neighbor we have a right to complain. Otherwise not. And by the by, let me tell you that the newspaper is a good sight more careful about what scandal it repeats than most private individuals. It has to be—the libel law hangs over it. We talk about exaggeration! If the average newspaper is any more inclined to exaggerate than the average individual, I miss my guess. Besides, the newspaper exaggeration which the readers themselves give is often based on misinformation of the newspaper reporters. Take it by and large, it seems to me that our newspapers are one of the most wonderful products of our whole civilization and deserve our admiration a great deal more than our criticism.

Editor Evening Telegram: Dear Sir,—I have come across the following quotation which seems to fit our case with regard to Rae Island and Quidi Vidi so well that I cannot resist sending it to you. It is from Ruskin:—

"I have been asked to contribute to the purchase of Alexandra Park, and I will not; and beg you, my working readers, to understand, once for all, that I wish your homes to be comfortable, and refined; and that I will resist to the utmost of my power, all schemes founded on the vile modern notion that you are to be crowded in kennels till you are nearly dead, that other people may make money by your work, and then taken out in squads by tramway and railway, to be revived and refined by science and art. Your first business is to make your homes healthy and delightful; then, keep your wives and children there, and let your return to them be your daily 'holy-day'."

In the face of the many houses utterly unfit for habitation; The wretched state of affairs requiring "mud-light fuelsters"; The miserable drainage system; The Dust Problem! The need for a Boys' Reformatory; and other needs that are crying out for action, how in the name of humanity can a Council sit and complacently accept two Parks that as necessities rank away behind those I have mentioned? Yes, first make your homes comfortable! In our present condition I think it is a waste of money to expend it in the luxuries that will fill these Parks, and for whom? We are told of the two or three miles of motor drives. Indeed Mr. Six-Dollars-a-week-and-six-children will be overjoyed at this! He and his family will dissolve in tears of gratitude when they think of the motor drives! And with what joy will he spend his dollars to see a waterfall! Rennie's River waterfall won't do at all—it is too natural! But who thinks of the poor? They are in the mid-let them stay there—is our way. The Council, I believe is to keep these Parks up. Certainly. We have no money to give. Tank Lane water comes (although they pay us water rates), but we'll spend a thousand or two to support Mr. Bowling's Park. It was an opportunity for the Councilors to speak a word for the people. They did not do so. Will they speak now? Will they wake up?

### To the Fore For Thirty Years

A Further Reply to the Chronicle's Misleading Statements Respecting Sir Robert Bond's Attitude in Relation to Agriculture.

Since writing our editorial of Thursday's date, we have been looking over the official report of debates in the House of Assembly, since 1882, and we find that for the past thirty years, Sir Robert Bond has been foremost in advocating agricultural development. In 1881 twenty-eight years ago, in a speech which the late Hon. D. J. Greene declared was the most eloquent he had ever listened to, Sir Robert Bond said: "At the present time there are about 36,000 acres of land under cultivation, and the annual value of the produce amounts to about \$360,000. The small area under cultivation may cause the importance of this industry to be ignored, but no one can rise to a conception of its varied possibilities in this country without the conviction that Agricultural settlement is the first corollary of railway extension. It is easy to see that Agricultural settlement is the great want of the Colony, and one of the most useful questions to consider is how best to swell the ranks of husbandry."

When we consider that the main test of national promise has always been Agricultural capability, and that this industry is the best beginning from which other developments can proceed, it is somewhat surprising that it has never met with the serious consideration of our Legislature. Its importance has been overlooked, it has never been pressed home upon the minds of our people. If we desire to overtake other countries in the march of progress, we shall have to look more to our lands. By liberal enactments we shall have to encourage our people to become farmers. We shall have to encourage practical farmers to come here and settle, that they be an example, instruct and encourage our people. Farming as carried on in our outports is of the rudest and most primitive style. It cannot be otherwise, for our people have had no opportunity of becoming acquainted with the various modes of clearing, draining, and enriching the soil. Bonuses have been given upon our fisheries to make them a nursery for seamen. It is the duty of a progressive government to hold out liberal inducements towards the promotion of Agriculture which is the best nursery for freemen."

The official reports show that throughout the whole of the past 25 years, Sir Robert Bond has strenuously urged the adoption of practical and proper methods for the advancement of Agriculture in Newfoundland.

### Gross Defamation.

Contemporaneous with our warning to him on Saturday, which of course he had not seen at the time of writing his articles for that day's issue, the Hon. P. T. McGrath continued his imputations against us of chronic drunkenness. This has become with him a constant mode of reply in any controversy in which we may be engaged. When we reply to him, his usual resort is that we are "full to the brim" or some insinuation of a like nature. Some years ago he insinuated that we were on a "drunk" at Brigus after the election of the fall of 1908, and that Mr. Herder had to send his son Arthur to Brigus to bring us home. The charge was false and malicious. We returned to town on the same train as Mr. Warren, our opponent, and that was on the day following polling day. The morning of the day of our return, we spent in settling our business there, and came in on the evening train. Mr. Herder did not send his son for us at all, or ever thought of doing so, or had occasion to do so. Mr. Herder, we are informed, joined the train at Topsail and came to town on the same train from that place. We may have exchanged a word or two with him on the train, and that is all he had to do with us, or we with him.

On Saturday last Mr. McGrath heads a word or two with him on the train, and that is all he had to do with us, or we with him. The object of italicizing the last three words was to convey the idea that we were a drunkard, who had to be carried home, or should take the pledge to abstain wholly from alcoholic beverages. McGrath emphasized his insinuation by stating that Dr. Lloyd had taken a pledge against gambling, and by retorting that "if he keeps this pledge no better than he keeps other pledges, he will not surprise anybody." The insinuation here is that Dr. Lloyd has frequently taken a total abstinence pledge and that he is notorious for breaking these pledges. This is gross defamation. Dr. Lloyd has not frequently taken any such pledges. In fact he has never taken a total abstinence pledge in his life, and has no intention of doing so. On Saturday, we gave Mr. McGrath fair notice of the course of action we intended to pursue in future. If Mr. McGrath makes any defamatory charge of such a character in the future we shall issue a writ for libel to cover the full period allowed by law during which the defamatory statements have been made.

**BULGARIANS PLAN MOVEMENT TO CAPTURE MAIN TURKISH ARMY.**  
Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. A dispatch to-night announced what may prove to be the most important move of the victorious Bulgarian army yet achieved, viz., the capture of Eskibaba. A dispatch describes this town as an important position on the main line between Adrianople and Constantinople, but omits to say whether the Bulgarians are in actual possession of the railway station. If they are ascribed the railway at this point, they have cut off communication between Constantinople and Salonika and with 40,000 Turkish troops now in Adrianople. It has been supposed the Turkish forces after the fall of Kirk Killisch were holding the line from Kullili to Lulch Burgas, a short distance east of Eskibaba. The Bulgarians plan a campaign, according to a well informed correspondent at Vienna, for the complete destruction of all Turkish forces along the Maritza River and those retreating across Erkene River. He described General Dimitrief's army as advancing along a line from Yenidje to Eskibaba, the western column to Havla, with a central column already in the vicinity of Kavaklia, the eastern column is effecting a movement by way of Bunarhisar towards Rvad from Lulch Burgas to Choriul. The correspondent says there are still large forces of Turks north of the railway line, with others at Cholu, and the Bulgarian forces have been dispatched in the direction of these places and Midia on the coast. The intention is to cut the Turkish army off from the capital and force it towards the seashore and there compel it to capitulate. He describes the attack on Adrianople as making excellent progress, and predicts that a successful conclusion within a week. A Bulgarian column from Ardia Valley has occupied Salpistalar and Emirilli. Another report announces the occupation of Pashmakel. There is no indication where the Turks will make a stand. They are everywhere falling back before the victorious allies.

**Complaint About the Mails.**  
Special Evening Telegram. BONNE BAY, To-day. On his electioneering visit to Bonne Bay, Sir Edward Morris made public and explicit reference to the great improvements made by his party in our mail and postal service. So much for theory. Now for straight facts. For this year we will just about average one mail a fortnight. During the winter the Postmaster General blamed the storms for delaying mails but this summer the same condition has persisted. For the fourth time since May we are waiting two weeks for mails and freight and Bonne Bay is only forty-five miles from Bay of Islands with three steamers plying regularly between the two places. On one occasion this summer we were three weeks without mails. The Portia calls here regularly each fortnight but we cannot get mails by her, unless we wire the Postmaster General a special request each trip, despite the fact that she gets an annual mail subsidy from the Government. So much for the Morris party progress and zeal for the public welfare.

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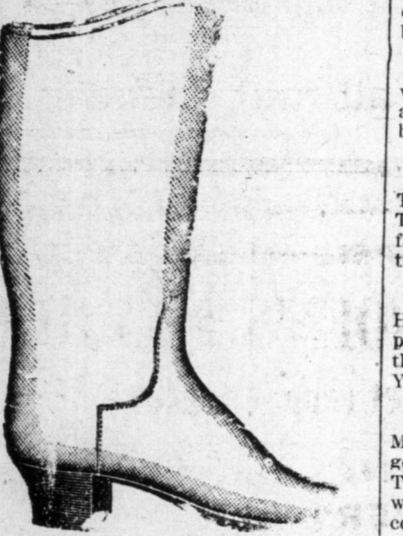

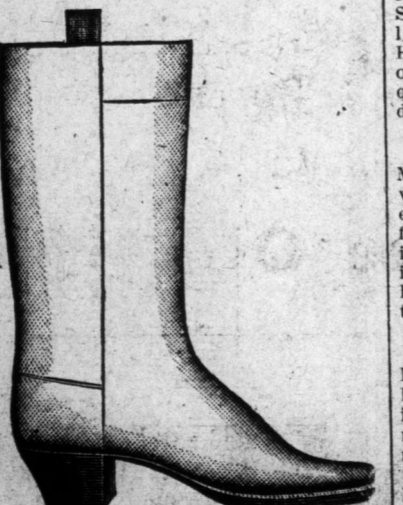

### Why Who's Who.

Undoubtedly the most successful song bird which Italy ever sent to our shores, at \$5 per seat, is Enrico Caruso, otherwise known as the Italian nightingale. Enrico is a trifle chunky for a nightingale, being built quite close to the ground and having a surplus of girth, but as a songster he is as lissom as a lean man in a bathing suit. He can throw his voice a long way without letting go of it, and then can pull it back in and use it all over again. This has enabled him to last longer than most singers, who usually give out at the beginning of the fourth act and have to resort to the sign language.

Caruso has a rich, high-spirited tenor voice, which nets him \$2,500 whenever he lets it start. This voice is full of top notes, which he discharges at the tinas and low necked gowns with great enthusiasm. There is also a loud, three-cushion-carom high C concealed in one end of it, and whenever Caruso takes this out and aims it at the second balcony, they have to reshingle the roof of the opera house.

As a breadwinner, Caruso makes the remainder of the foreign element look like the slide trombone in a barnstorming stock company. Whenever he needs a little ready money he sings something into the ear of a defenceless graphophone, which distributes his B-flat and tearful sob which the humble hearts of people who complain that they can't understand the words. Caruso has recently begun to operate in the English language, and succeeds in making it highly pathetic.

As an actor, Caruso does not cause anybody's hair to rise up and crinkle in unison. He is improving rapidly, however, and will finally get so that he can point his voice somewhere except in the direction of the family circle, when he is about to open a deep crevice in the baritone with a short sword.

Caruso does not associate with any of the Wagner music dramas, which he says are most effective when sung through a megaphone or interpreted to the accompaniment of a sneeze. Nevertheless he is the greatest tenor in captivity, and the critics have to give it to him.

### Hispaniola Again Wrecked.

**TOTAL LOSS THIS TIME.** The Collector of Customs at Chancel wired Mr. H. LeMessurier at this end this morning acquainting him that the banking schooner Hispaniola, Rose, master, dragged from her anchors at daylight and became a total loss in Mother Lake's Brook. The crew are safe. The Hispaniola was a fine vessel and one of our largest and most successful banking crafts. This is the second misfortune she has met with. It may be remembered she went ashore in a snow storm at St. Jacques last winter and was beached. After being re-floated and the spars and deck gear taken out of her, she was towed to Belleoram and sold at public auction. She was purchased by Mr. E. J. Burdock, repaired and refitted and was brought to St. Pierre. She was to have the finishing touches made to her. The Hispaniola in the first place was a new vessel. Her former owners were Job Brown, and her first commander Capt. John Lewis, the well known banking skipper.

### Hurt By Blast.

We learn by the Fogota that on Thursday last an accident occurred at Old Perlican which may cause Jno. Tilley of that place his life. He was blasting rocks, and after firing the fuse leading to the heavy charge of gunpowder, took shelter out of danger behind a forge, about 20 yards from the scene of the explosion. One large rock thrown high in the air descended on the man, hitting him in the side of the head and felled him to the ground. It also took the flesh off his shoulder, broke the bone, and he was a long time unconscious and bled a great deal. Dr. Peckford treated him and the man is dangerously ill ever since.

**Logging Booming.**

Hickman which arrived here laden with lumber from Dog Bay, Saturday, we learn that at that place (Dog Bay), Campbellton, Barwood, Red Indian Lake and other centres larger gangs of men than usual have gone in the forests logging. This is earlier than for many years past, and if the weather serves during the winter the biggest cut of wood on record will be made in Newfoundland. Most people, especially young men who have done well at the fishery do not take kindly to the arduous life of the woodsman, so that to get them to engage in it prices of labour have advanced from \$20 per month to \$32 and up to \$35. The men get their board with this so that they have good money coming to them by the end of the season.

Mr. Grieve communicated the news to the Minister of Justice. The vessel will likely leave for here to-morrow.

**Improvements at Bell Island.**

The D. I. & S. Co. are making considerable improvements to their property at Bell Island. They are putting in a new and powerful crusher and are also building a large staff house, employing a big gang of men at the work. An effort is now being made to form a private company on the island to introduce a new system of electrically lighting the streets and the residential section of the island as well as Lance Cove. Men of means on the island are enthusiastically taking the matter up.

**Cable News.**

**Special to Evening Telegram.**

**LONDON, Oct. 27.** Turkish troops were the first to take the offensive in a desperate battle which ended in the fall of the town of Kumanovo into the hands of the Servian troops, and opened the way for their further advance on the stronghold of Uskub. During drizzling rain and heavy fog, the Turkish troops advanced no the Servian position, five miles from Kumanovo. Heavy fighting lasted throughout the afternoon, and both armies suffered severe losses; but the Servians succeeded in staying the Turkish onslaught. The battle was resumed at 1 a.m. on Thursday, the Servians taking the offensive, and attacking the Turkish troops during the lull in fighting. After an artillery duel a general advance was ordered by the Servian commander, at 6 o'clock, under the cover of artillery, to which the Turkish field guns vigorously replied. The ground over which the Servian troops had advanced was open, and the infantry was exposed to a sweeping fire. They stormed the Turkish trenches again and again, until finally, at the point of the bayonet, they drove the Ottoman troops out. It took the Servians four hours to clear the valley, but it was found necessary before occupying Kumanovo, to take the heights on the right bank of the river to which the Turkish troops had retreated in disorder. At one period of the fighting, the Servians' artillery annihilated three squadrons of Turkish cavalry. The Turkish losses are said to number 5,000 killed and wounded, while 12 of their field guns were captured. The Servian casualties were also heavy. They lost many officers, including two regimental and several battalion commanders. At the town of Novi Bazar, further to the north, there was a brisk battle. After the town was taken by the Servians, the Turks attempted to retake it, but were repulsed and virtually annihilated.

**BELGRADE, Oct. 27.**

It is officially announced to-night that the spoils captured at Kumanovo included 55 field guns, 6 mounted guns, 6 Maxims, quantities of stores and ammunition and two Europeans. At Sienitzta the Servians captured 13 big guns and 4 Maxims. Forty thousand Turks were engaged fighting in this district. They are accused of massacring many women and children before they were defeated. Most of the prominent Slav inhabitants were imprisoned, but were rescued by the Servian soldiery. A body of 5,000 Armenians and Turks raised white caps on their bayonets as a sign of surrender, and the Servian commander gave orders to cease firing.

**PARIS, Oct. 27.**

The *Matin* says that news has been received from Constantinople, through an indirect, but reliable source, that on Friday morning Bulgarians routed the Turkish forces massed at Kavaldi. According to the Turkish Headquarters staff, the affair cost the Turks 1,300 men killed. (As Kavaldi is just north of the Bulgarian boundary line, it would appear that the Turkish troops, despite the capture of Mustapha Pasha and Kirk Killiseh, and the siege of Adrinople, had succeeded in pushing their way into Bulgarian territory.)

**BELGRADE, Oct. 27.**

The capture of Uskub by the Servian and Bulgarian forces is confirmed. The town fell without resistance. Foreign consuls requested the Servian Army to protect the inhabitants.

**ATHENS, Oct. 27.**

Despatches from the front speak in glowing terms of the reception accorded the Greek Army by the inhabitants of Macedonia, the majority of whom are Greeks. Greek officials will be appointed in all the Macedonian towns occupied by them.
