



War News.

Messages Received
Previous to 9 a.m.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, May 24.
The Governor, Newfoundland:
General French reports violent artillery engagements and some infantry fighting northeast of Festubert, and further progress south of Quinquette Rue.

The French Government reports several enemy attacks, between the sea and Arras, repulsed with very heavy losses. Extremely violent fighting continues north of Arras and Neuville. The Germans have again used asphyxiating gases.

Submarine E-14 is now announced to have sunk two Turkish gunboats and two transports, one full of troops in the Sea of Marmora, between April 25th and May 13th. She returned safely on May 18th.

The Russian Government reports that the enemy's thrust on the Galicia front shows signs of weakening. On the left part of the Lower San, Russian troops have assumed the offensive, carrying several villages by assault. One village also was captured from the enemy on the right bank of the San. On the rest of the Galician front the enemy attacks are becoming more isolated in character. HARCOURT.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, via St. Pierre, May 24.
On several points between Steenstraete and Ypres, the enemy delivered attacks after using asphyxiating gas. These attacks were repulsed. In the district north of Arras fighting continued all night. We took 120 prisoners. To the north of Neuville St. Vaast village the enemy delivered several counter-attacks, which were checked by our fire. The artillery contest continues intensely. The latest information received show that the check sustained by the Germans during the evening of 22nd and the night of 22nd to 23rd May, despite important reinforcements, brought hastily and vigorous efforts, renewed two or three times, the enemy failed in all his attempts, and sustained considerable losses. Nothing reported on the remainder of the front.

BRITISH VICTORY.

LONDON, May 24.
The following official statement has been issued by the Government Press Bureau: British troops made further advance in the Festubert section on Saturday. A German counter-attack, delivered early in the morning, met with withering fire from our artillery. The Germans were driven down by the score. The attack was shattered and few German soldiers escaped.

GERMANY DECLARES WAR ON ITALY.

LONDON, May 24.
(By Wolff Agency.)—Germany has declared war against Italy, and recalled Ambassador Von Baelow.

LEFT FOR THE FRONT.

ROME, May 24.
Lieut. General Cadorni, Chief of the Italian General Staff, left for the front at 9:15 last night.

AUSTRIAN-ITALIAN FORCES ARE FACING EACH OTHER.

LONDON, May 24.
Austrian and Italian forces are facing each other at some places only a half mile apart. The forces at the front are estimated at a million men on each side. The Austro-German headquarters staff has arrived at Trent, and the Austrians have mounted artillery in the Stelvio Pass which is still covered with snow. A continuous stream of troops from Tyrol is arriving near the Swiss-Italian frontier.

ITALY'S DECLARATION OF WAR.

ROME, May 24.
Details concerning Italy's declaration of war against Austria-Hungary, were given by Foreign Minister Sonnino this afternoon at a cabinet council, which lasted three hours. Diplomatic relations between the Vatican and belligerents also were discussed. Baron Sonnino referred particularly to the relations between Italy and Germany, expressing the belief that the latter would declare war as soon as official information was received regarding Italy's action against her ally. The council did not consider military questions, as they had been entrusted entirely to the General Staff, which will work in harmony with the command of the Allied staff. Financial matters were taken up, and it is believed that a loan will be floated, either at home or abroad, sufficient to meet the needs of the nation, even though the war lasts longer than expected. A royal decree has been published providing for rigid censorship. Authority is given to censor letters, news papers, telegrams, telephone messages, and parcel post packages; the decree also restricts personal liberties, especially as regards public meetings. The measure resembles those already adopted in other belligerent countries.

PRIZES OF WAR.

ROME, May 24.
The value of Austrian and German ships now in Italian ports, which have become prizes of war, is estimated at more than \$20,000,000.

A GERMAN AIRFLEET.

GENEVA, May 24.
A German airfleet, made up of Zeppelins of the latest type, and a large number of planes has joined a large body of German troops, concentrated in the Adige Valley, near the Italian frontier. (See also 5th page.)

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

THE WAR IN ITALY.

PARIS, May 24. The following official statement has been received from Home - It foresees that on the declaration of war offensive actions would occur against our Adriatic coast with the purpose of obtaining moral effect, rather than attaining military purpose, but we were able to prepare for these and render their duration short. Small naval units of enemy destroyers and torpedo boats fired their guns upon our Adriatic coast between 4 and 6 o'clock this morning, at the same time aeroplanes attempted to attack the arsenal at Venice. The enemy's ships, after a short cannonade, were forced by our torpedo boats to withdraw. The enemy's aeroplanes were fired upon by our anti-air craft. The enemy's aeroplanes attacked Porto Corsini, which replied, and obliged the enemy to retire quickly. At Ancona, where an attack was directed against the railway-line, with the intention of interrupting communications, slight damage was caused, which can be repaired easily. At Baletta an attack was made by a scout steamer destroyer, which was put to flight by our ships which were escorted by torpedo boats. Finally, at Gessi, the enemy's aeroplanes attempted to throw bombs upon a sugar, but without reaching the mark. All other news of operations last night has no foundation.

ALL OR NONE.

LONDON, May 24. Italy has given her assent to the agreement already signed by the Allied Powers, not to conclude a separate peace. Signature to a formal document to this effect is imminent.

IN THE SAN REGION.

LONDON, May 24. A Petrograd bulletin says: "The Austro-German forces in Galicia have assumed the defensive. Their active operations consist chiefly of counterattacks. According to an official statement issued last night from the headquarters of the Russian General Staff, slight progress is claimed on the left bank of the Lower San, and the claim is made that all assaults by the Austro-German troops to the southeastern theatre of operations were repulsed."

DARDANELLES REINFORCED.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 24. (By wireless to Berlin and London) - The number of British and French troops landed along the Dardanelles

TURKS MURDER CONSUL.

LONDON, May 24. A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Odessa, says it is reported that the Italian Consul at Constantinople has been killed.

A CENTURY OF PEACE.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 24. The century of peace between America and Great Britain, was celebrated to-day at the Panama-Pacific Exposition, by a parade of eight divisions, representing eight major British possessions. There will be a big illumination to-night.

ON THE INSIDE TRACK.

LONDON, May 24. Much curiosity is evinced as to how the Daily Express gets the first news of political events nowadays. Being a Unionist journal, the Government naturally does not give it exclusive information, yet the Express publishes the first news of the Government's plans regarding the drink problem, which ended in fiasco, and was also the first to give out the news of the present Cabinet crisis. The public are inclined to credit the statement made by the Express to-day, that Lord Fisher is likely to be succeeded by Admiral Sir Henry Jackson.

HINDENBURG FOR ITALY.

ROME, May 23. The few Germans left in Rome have taken refuge in the Chinese legation. The announcement is also made that Field Marshal von Hindenburg will take command of the Austro-German troops against Italy.

MARCONI JOINS ARMY.

NEW YORK, May 23. William Marconi, the inventor of wireless telegraphy, called to-day in response to a summons from the King of Italy, to serve his term on the military staff of the Italian army.

A WISE DECISION.

LONDON, May 23. The London County Council took drastic steps to-day to deal with the strike on the Municipal tramway system. It ordered the employment of military age, who are eligible for service in the Army and Navy, to surrender their uniforms and badges. Only men above military age will be employed during the remainder of the war.

THE RAILWAY HORROR.

LONDON, May 23. An official announcement was made to-night that 158 persons were killed or missing as the result of a triple collision, which occurred yesterday morning on the Caledonian railway, north of Carlisle. All except six of the killed were colliers heading for the Royal Scots Regiment, five hundred of whom were travelling on the troop train. At least two hundred persons, mostly soldiers, were injured. These figures establish a new record for railway accidents in the British Isles, the number of dead and injured being far greater than at any previous disaster of the kind. The death toll will probably be added to, as many of the injured are not expected to recover. Added to the horror of three trains coming into collision was fire, which broke out in the wreckage, rendering the rescue of those held in the tangled mass, impossible. Many were injured and burned to death.

AUSTRIAN BARRACKS DESTROYED.

VERONA, May 23. The Austrian barracks at Rovereto, a town in the Tyrol, with about 12,000 inhabitants, was blown up to-day.

AGAIN IN ACTION.

OTTAWA, May 22. The whole Canadian division has again been in action, along with the newly-formed Fourth Brigade, commanded by General Seelye. Advice received by cable to the Militia Department this morning, state that a battle occurred on Thursday night, and Friday morning. It was a fierce hand to hand struggle. Fighting took place in an orchard. The Canadians made a brilliant attack on the Germans and distinguished themselves with a brilliant charge, in which large numbers of the enemy fell, and several of their guns were captured. Details of the Canadian casualties are not given, but it is believed that they are considerable.

CANADIAN CASUALTIES.

OTTAWA, May 23. General Hughes received a cable last night re the latest engagement of the Canadians, stating that fifty-five were killed out of total casualties of four hundred, including Major Wright, of Ottawa, and half a dozen other officers wounded.

BRITISH STEAMER SUNK.

BEECHHAVEN, Ireland, May 22. The British sailing ship Glenholm was sunk yesterday evening by a German submarine, 15 miles off this port. The crew were saved. The Glenholm was on her way from Chill to Liverpool with a cargo of nitrate.

ASSASSINS WARNED.

LONDON, May 23. A joint official statement by British France and Russia issued to-night, says: "For the past month the Kurds and Turkish population of Armenia have been engaged in massacring Armenians, with the connivance and help of the Ottoman authorities. Such massacres took place about the middle of April at Erzerum, Derhian, Monsh, Zetan, in all Cilicia. The inhabitants of about 100 villages near Van were all assassinated. The town itself, the Armenian quarter, is besieged by Kurds. At the same time the Ottoman Government at Constantinople is raging against the inoffensive Armenian population. In the face of these fresh crimes committed by Turkey, the Allies' Governments announce publicly to the Sublime Porte they will hold all members of the Government, as well as such of their agents as are implicated, as personally responsible for such measures."

WHY IS A COWARD?

By RUTH CAMERON.



RUTH CAMERON

Is there any epithet in our language which carries more scorn and is more bitterly resented than the stinging name of coward? It is somehow in the nature of man to revolt from cowardice as from something shameful and unclean. Selfishness (the greatest and the most insidious destroyer of all the faults), cruelty, greed, uncontrolled temper, vengefulness — most people would plead guilty to any of these sooner than to physical cowardice.

Is Courage a Virtue?

And yet, the older I grow and the more I study this manifestation of human emotion known as cowardice, the less I feel that any of us has the right to judge when cowardice is shown or to blame or scorn another for cowardice.

We all think of courage as a moral virtue, a manifestation of character. But is it?

Isn't courage, or the lack of it, far more closely connected with a man's physical condition and his nervous state than with his character? I think it is.

When I Am an Abject Coward.

If I go to the dentist on a day when I have slept well, when my nerves are quiet and my bodily condition good, I can bear the trials of the dentist's chair with some degree of fortitude. But if I go on a day when I am tired and my nerves are not in good condition I am an abject coward. Every time the dentist brings

forward that arch torturer, the machine drill, cold perspiration breaks out on my forehead. I cry out long before I am hurt. I leave the chair weak as a rag.

Yet my character is no different on those two days. My courage or lack of it was simply the result of physical conditions, just as much as color in my cheeks or lack of it, and as little a matter for praise or blame.

Another factor in this matter of cowardice is imagination. It is perfectly plain that people with vivid imagination must be more accessible to fear than those without. A big aviator declares that the only thing that makes some airmen brave is lack of imagination.

Experience a Factor in Courage.

The influence of past experience is also a big factor in a man's attitude toward danger. A man told me this experience of his youth. Four boys owned a sailboat. Of them all, the one who could swim the least was the most daring and venturesome. He called the others cowardly when they refused to go out on squally days. Then one day this boy fell off the boat and came within a breath or two of drowning. Never was a boy more changed. He could hardly be persuaded to go a hundred feet from shore on a calm day.

So the ability to imagine danger, the experience of past danger and the condition of nerves and body all enter into everyone's attitude toward present perils.

The man you think brave may be really a healthy fool without experience or imagination.

And the man whom you think timid and hesitant may be bravely overcoming such inhibitions of imagination or past experience or such drawbacks of nervous or bodily ill health

Premier Salandra and Baron Sonnino

WILL REMAIN IN POWER.

Rome, May 14.—News that King Victor Emmanuel will not accept Premier Salandra's resignation, and that Salandra and Baron Sonnino, the Foreign Minister, will remain in power, is spreading like wild fire throughout Rome, and creating an excellent impression.

Italy is Determined.

The Giornale d'Italia, the organ of Baron Sonnino, the Foreign Minister, has an editorial on the actual situation in Italy which has aroused widespread interest. It says: "Italy is determined upon the realization of her national aspirations, cost what it may. It is for this reason that the Government hastened war preparations, which, when completed, caused Austria to offer compensation, thus recognizing the claims of Italy."

"When the Austro-Italian negotiations were initiated, Signor Giolitti unfortunately hampered their successful conclusion by his inopportune letter, affirming that war was unnecessary. Owing, however, to the Government's firmness and determination to resort to war, the conversations were resumed.

"Nevertheless, Austria, besides offering insufficient concessions, attempted a dilatory policy and tried secretly to conclude a separate peace with Russia. The Italian Government thereupon opened negotiations with the Allies, which immediately served to increase Austria's offers.

"During the last delicate phase of the conversation, when those who were advocating neutrality were causing great damage to the interest of the country and aiding its enemies, the Government, relying on the

support of the people is determined to expose the intrigues and plot intended to favor the Austrians and Germans. Hence it will, if necessary, make an appeal to Parliament. In the meantime it will retain power; and honorably defend the country's interest."

There was a pro-war demonstration in this city, which the troops called out to maintain order were powerless to prevent. Headed by a man bearing the Italian flag, an enormous crowd paraded the streets shouting "Down with Austria!" "Down with Giolitti!" "Long Live Salandra!" "Long Live Sonnino!"

The paraders feared the soldiers who were finally able to induce the crowd to disperse, when the procession arrived at the Piazza Colonna, where the Austrian Embassy is located. A military guard was drawn up around the square, isolating the embassy building.

Cheers for Russia.

M. Degiers, the new Russian ambassador, has arrived. He was cheered by a large crowd, which shouted: "Long Live Russia!" M. Degiers conferred with Baron Sonnino for an hour and was received in audience by the King.

There is no doubt that M. Degiers is the bearer of an important communication from the Czar for Italy's future position in the Mediterranean in case the Dardanelles are forced and the Entente Powers are finally triumphant. It is understood that this is, perhaps, the most important question as far as Italy is concerned, and that if sufficient guarantees are given, her entry into the war on the side of the Allies will be assured.

The Crown Prince of Bavaria has arrived at Trent and is inspecting the fortifications of what the Italian military critics refer to as the Tyrolean salient. He has assumed command of the Austrian garrison of Tyrol, which will be reinforced by Bavarians ready at the frontiers, the moment war is declared. The archives at Trent have been hurriedly removed and the inhabitants have received warning to be prepared to evacuate the town.

SAD DROWNING.



The depletion in the ranks were quickly made up for, due to the activities and zealous efforts of commissioned as well as non-commissioned officers.

Leaving their hall on King's Road, under command of Capt. J. J. McKay, the battalion, headed by its pipers and drummers discoursing appropriate airs, marched to St. Andrew's Church, where the Chaplain, Rev. J. S. Sutherland, M.A., delivered a patriotic sermon. After service a tour of the city was made. At the Armory the Rev. Mr. Sutherland took occasion to address the battalion, again mentioning that two members, Privates Martin and Morris—had died at duty's post, since the last church parade, the former being a victim in the Viknor and the latter being lost with the Clan MacNaughton.

Loan Failure Explained.

GERMANS WOULD NOT PERMIT INVESTIGATION OF FINANCIAL SITUATION.
London, May 15.—British official circles have just learned why the energetic endeavours of Count Bernstorff and Dr. Dernburg to obtain subscriptions in the United States to the latest German war loan have been unsuccessful.

A group of American houses were willing to take up a considerable block of the Imperial Chancellor, Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, would give a guarantee of the accuracy of Count Bernstorff's many statements, or allow a representative of the group to make a personal investigation in Berlin into the actual state of affairs.

After much temporizing, both courses were refused, with the immediate result that not only were the purely American subscriptions withheld, but, on the facts becoming known, many German-Americans abandoned the idea of subscribing to the loan.

Count Bernstorff now is reported to be making efforts to borrow money in America for war goods already purchased there.

Schwab Has Booked \$100,000,000 Orders.

New York, May 15.—When Charles M. Schwab returned from Europe several months ago he made the statement that war orders received by the Bethlehem Steel Co. aggregated a total of more than \$50,000,000. It is now conservatively estimated that Bethlehem Steel has booked at least \$100,000,000 of business in war contracts. The total, taking into consideration the work that has been sublet is greatly in excess of that figure.

The Bethlehem Steel Works, due to inadequate capacity to meet the extraordinary demand for shrapnel, has farmed out work valued at millions of dollars to companies with facilities for machining shells or making shell parts.

Bethlehem has closed a contract with one company which calls for the machining of 10,000 shells a day, or 3,000,000 a year. The steel shells are forged by the Bethlehem Co. and finished by the machine company. The machine shops of the Bethlehem Co. are not capable of taking care of the vast amount of war business received.

Making a Crime Blacker

Philadelphia Public Ledger:—Burke, in his "Speech on the Conciliation of America," made that much-quoted remark, "I do not know the method of drawing up an indictment against a whole people," he did not foresee the astounding circumstances that a century and a half later there would be a people, skilled in all the arts of civilization, justly proud of the high position they had won among the nations of the world, so completely obsessed by the worst passions of human nature as to relapse into the kind of barbarism of which even the darkest of the Dark Ages might have been ashamed. It is true that the German Government has sent to Washington a perfunctory message of sympathy with the victims of the Lusitania horror. But this action cannot weigh for a moment in public opinion with the outbursts of savage joy with which the news that hundreds of innocent lives had been lost was received all over Germany.

LONDON GOSSIP.

LONDON, May 24, 1915.
GOODWOOD AND FUTURE OF BRITISH RACING.

A discussion is understood to be taking place between the Duke of Richmond and Gordon and the Stewards of the Jockey Club, respecting the holding of the famous Goodwood race meeting this year. It is believed that the Duke would rather the races were abandoned, but he is prepared to abide by the decision of the rulers of the turf. He takes little or no interest in racing, but he continues the tradition of his house, and maintains the only "private" race course in England. In any event, Goodwood will be entirely shorn of its social aspect, and not only Goodwood House, but all the principal residences in the neighbourhood will be closed for entertaining. Like Ascot, the meeting is likely to be restricted to three days, in place of the usual four--if it takes place at all. It is understood that a decision will be arrived at in the course of the next few days, and is likely to have a considerable influence upon all the subsequent racing during the season.

NEW TAXATION AND BEER.

Lloyd George's proposed surtax on stronger beers is evidently so calculated as to enforce the German or American standard of alcoholic strength. Seven per cent. of proof spirit, the limit over which his surtax is to be imposed, means about 4 per cent. of alcohol by volume. German beer contains from 3 1/4 to 4 per cent. of alcohol by volume. Mr. Sherwell reckons American beer at 4 per cent. and average English beer at 5 per cent. Dublin stout is said to contain 5 1/2 per cent., and probably Burton bottled beer is about 5 1/4. The pass-

GIRLS AT THE WAR OFFICE.

The War Office, with great intrepidity, had made a quite startling innovation, and engaged half a dozen little messenger girls to work at the Contracts Department in Tot Hill Street in place of the Boy Scouts, who by the rules of their order cannot do evening work. The girls will remain on duty till nine o'clock at night. They wear nice uniforms of dark brown linen, with gold crown badges, and look very smart. If the experiment proves a success probably messenger girls will be employed in many other departments. Since the beginning of the war many Government offices have greatly increased the number of women on their staff. One of the women's societies which was asked to send a typist in an emergency sent a capable clerk, who demanded thirty shillings a week and when, after her day's work the office protested that it would only pay twenty shillings a week, the secretary sent them a twenty shilling girl, who was worth exactly twenty shillings. By the end of the day the Government department quite understood that good work was worth

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THE FIFTIETH VICTORIA CROSS.

The list of awards of the Victoria Cross announced last week brings the total conferred during the war to fifty-one, in addition to the clasp given to Lieut. Martin Leake, who had won the decoration in South Africa. An analysis of the recipients reveals several interesting points. For instance, nineteen of those who have won the cross are officers, and thirty-two, at the time they performed their brave deeds, non-commissioned officers and men, a few having since been promoted to commissioned rank. Out of the fifty-one a dozen, including eight officers, gave up their lives, while another has been unofficially reported as having been killed. The artillery and the Royal Engineers have secured the largest number of crosses, while three have been given to native Indians and two to naval officers.

JAPANESE BLUEJACKETS.

There are just now many Japanese sailors in London. He who runs may read if he can, for the name of the ship to which he belongs is emblazoned on every man's cap ribbon. But as the gold lettering is in Japanese characters it conveys little or nothing to the average Londoner, although it may set him wondering why these parties of muscular sturdy built "bluejackets" from the Far East have chosen this particular moment for their sightseeing. In war time there are some questions that are best left unanswered, and perhaps this is one of them. Suffice it to say that the smart blue uniforms--closely resembling those of our own Jack Tars, but a trifle more ornate--afford a picturesque set off to the all-pervading khaki which continues to flood every thoroughfare of the Metropolis. Our Japanese visitors who are accompanied by a most workmanlike set of petty officers, seem to be "doing" London in the methodical way that is characteristic of their race, and as souvenir-hunters and buyers of picture postcards they are helping our shopkeepers to reap a nice little harvest. A good many of them have a fair knowledge of English. Although not all they are of a conspicuously bulkier mould than the dapper little civilian Japs who are now such familiar figures in our midst that they no longer attract even passing notice.

THE RESPIRATOR RUSH.

The War Office appeal for respirators has resulted in a really remarkable episode. It was understood that half a million of these appliances were needed. Within thirty-six hours of the announcement of the "want," something like three times as many as were either received or had been promised. The Department was, of course, quite unable to gauge the quantity which it would receive hour by hour, and at noon actually sent out a further instruction in regard to the make-up of the respirators. Last Thursday afternoon, however, newspapers which announced "urgent need" of them had on another page the War Office announcement that no more need be sent. The parcels arriving from all parts of the country, and the vast bulk of them were sent directly to the Department without the intervention of any collecting agency. The shops had set themselves to supply the enormous demand which made itself felt. Some of them turned their workpeople from occupations like shirtmaking to the rapid manufacture of respirators. The episode shows once more how brimful of energy and goodwill the country is, and especially how ready the women are to perform whatever national service they can find to do.

WAR WEARINESS AND FRUITARIANISM.

Health lunches are the latest thing among tired workers in London who have missed their accustomed hollies owing to the war. The health lunch, as meals are expected, is a fruit and vegetable one, and is the creation of a well known West End fruiterer who is a firm believer in a vegetable diet. His fruiterian restaurant caters for all classes of people from liverish retired colonels to tired business girls, and he has drawn up a menu to meet the needs of all. The business girl, if she lunches healthily, should eat bananas, barley, lentils, spinach, strawberries, watercress and apples. An attack of the influenza which is now prevailing, should be met at lunch time by an assault on turnips, black currants, or pineapples. For insomnia, lettuce and the humble onion are recommended, but for rheumatism apparatus may be eaten. Liverish subjects are advised to eat red gooseberries, apples, carrots, and tomatoes, while in the case of a weak digestion vegetables and fruits should not be blended at one meal. The luncheon who is out of sorts has a wide choice. Honey, stewed apples or figs, cream, grated nuts, barley, tomatoes, braised onions, salads dressed with oil, olives, pineapples, bananas and cabbages are the pleasant variety of courses which he can eat and still have a healthy lunch. The health lunch is likely to have a great vogue in London this summer, according to this authority, one of the reasons given being its economy.

COMING ROYAL BIRTHDAYS.

A month of royal birthdays opened on Sunday last, with the sixty-fifth anniversary of the birth of Buckingham Palace of the Duke of Connaught the only one of Queen Victoria's three sons who is still living. Sixteen days later, on the 17th, His Royal Highness's daughter-in-law, Princess Arthur of Connaught (the Duchess of Fife) will complete her twenty-fourth year, and on the same day the King of Spain, who married one of the Duke's nieces, will be 36 years of age. King Alfonso's brother-in-law, Prince Leopold of Battenburg, is 26 on the 21st, and the Duke's eldest sister, Princess Christian, enters upon her seventeenth year on the 25th, while on the following day Queen Mary will complete her forty-eighth year. Other anniversaries of interest fall on Thursday next, when the King will have been on the throne five years, and on the 19th, when the Czar of Russia will be 47 years of age.





LONDON, May 23.
An official announcement says: On May 19th the southern area of Gallipoli Peninsula, the French forces in conjunction with the British, made an advance, and have consolidated the new position. Our aeroplanes dropped bombs amongst Turkish reinforcements landing at Ak Bashi and caused considerable losses. On the night of the 18th and 19th Turkish forces made determined attacks against the Australian and New Zealand Corps, but these were repulsed with heavy loss, the Turkish casualties being over 7,000 of which 2,000 were killed. Our loss did not exceed 500.

Will Save the Day at St. Pierre.

Seventy-seven of the 369 men of the little islands of St. Pierre et Miquelon, who left their homes last February for France to serve in the army and navy are now returning to the islands. They arrived at Halifax late Monday night by the Red Cross liner Stephane from New York, and will go from here on that steamer to St. Pierre. They say that after they had been in France for some time it was decided to send back to St. Pierre all those who were over thirty-five years of age. The islands had been depleted of all able bodied men and the fishing industry its sole support, was almost at a standstill. These seventy-seven men over thirty-five years of age, accordingly sailed from Havre on April 22 on the steamer Bordeaux for New York, and from the American port to Halifax by the Stephane. Four of the men will go to Montreal and the remainder will sail on the Red Cross liner for St. Pierre.

Henry Cook Meets With Heavy Loss

BY FIRE ON FARM.

This morning a fire destroyed the barn of Mr. Henry R. Cook, at Virginia, on the Logy Bay Road, and its contents, including live stock and farm implements, valued at over five thousand dollars.

Between 4 and 4:30 o'clock as Mr. Cook and sons were getting out of bed to start to work on the farm they were astonished to find the barn which is not any more than fifty yards from the dwelling house, in flames. The Cook family then began to fight the blaze, meanwhile Mr. Edward Cooker noticed from his farm the flames. Mr. Cooker hurried to Mount Cashel and got a Christian Brother to ring up the Fire Department. The Central men went in with the chemical but when they arrived the fire was beyond control and the barn with its contents was burnt to the ground. According to the firemen all that saved Mr. Cook's dwelling house from igniting was the fact that it was covered with tin sheet. The property destroyed included barn, 16 cows, 4 horses, a large quantity of seeded potatoes and feeds of various sorts together with an expensive outfit of farm implements rendered useless, all valued at about \$5,500 upon which only \$700 insurance was carried.


