War News

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

GREEK GARRISON SURRENDERED.
LONDON, Sept. 1.
Before the Greek garrison at Salonika surrendered, Reuter's correspondents cables, three companies of French Colonial Infantry marched to the parade ground and stacked their arms in front of the barracks. They were soon followed by two battalions of infantry which took up positions on both sides of the parade ground and in the rear of the barracks, machine guns were posted at several conspicuous points and armored cars were stationed opposite the entrance to the barracks. The Greek soldiers withdrew within the precincts of the building and meanwhile the Greek commander conferred with the French authorities. Just before 11 o'clock at night several unarmed Greek officers accompanied by two French officers crossed the parade ground pavillion at which Sarraill awaited them. At the hour of eleven struck all Greek troops marched from the barracks unarmed.

CONSTANTINE'S ABDICATION NOT CONFIRMED.
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GERMAN AEROPLANES SHOT DOWN.
PARIS, Sept. 1.
Four German aeroplanes were shot down yesterday on the Somme front and another was captured, the War Office announced to-day. French aircraft were seen to be engaged.

GERMAN RETREAT IN EAST AFRICA.

LONDON, Sept. 1. General Smuts, Commander-in-Chief of the British forces in German East Africa, reports under date of August 30th, that the German forces of that colony are in full retreat. He announced the occupation of Kirogoro, the seat of the German Provisional Government, and said he believed the German military headquarters of the Provisional Government had retired into the mountains.

KING CONSTANTINE.

LONDON, Sept. 1. A correspondent at Salonika to Reuter's Company, under date of Wednesday, sends a report that King Constantine of Greece has abdicated, adding, pending confirmation, that it must be mentioned with all reserve. The Greek Crown Prince has been appointed regent. Alexander Beaslis, supported by ex-Premier Venizelos, retains premiership. The despatch says that general mobilization of the Greek army has once more been ordered. Regarding the report from Salonika that the King has abdicated the throne, the Greek Minister in London said to-day: "I have received no such information. I certainly do not believe such a thing has taken place."

RUSSIAN ADVANCE.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 1. In the Carpathian region on Tomnatic mountain our troops captured a whole series of heights. In the region of Dornavitra on the Dumnasian border we made a slight advance westward. During yesterday's battles the Russians captured 289 officers, 15,601 men of whom 2,400 were Germans. They took six guns, 55 machine guns, seven bomb throwers.

NOTHING DOING.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 1. An official issued by the War Department this evening says: "Nothing to report."

A HURRICANE.

ST. THOMAS, Sept. 1. Fifty lives were lost in a hurricane which struck the British West Indian port of Dominica last Monday night. The wind reached a velocity of more than 70 miles an hour. The number of houses, schools, churches and other buildings wrecked or seriously damaged, exceeds two hundred. Many local craft were lost. The lime crop is considerably damaged and in some places wiped out.

ITALIAN OFFENSIVE.

ROME, Sept. 1. The Italian troops have begun the offensive in Southern Albania and have occupied Tapeleni, 31 miles southeast of Avlona on the Vorusha River, says an official statement issued by the War Office to-day. The Greek garrison has withdrawn from Tapeleni. Austrian attacks in Brentia Valley near Gorizia, were repulsed an official adds.

SOMETHING DOING.

ATHENS, Sept. 1. The Entente Allied Fleet, consisting of 23 warships and seven transports, have arrived off Piræus.

GENERAL JOSTOFF DEAD.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 1. A despatch from Sofia reports the death from appendicitis of General Jostoff, Chief of the Bulgarian General Staff.

CORNER STONE LAID.

OTTAWA, Sept. 1. The corner stone of the new parliament buildings, or in reality the corner stone of the old buildings was removed to the new site of the one now under construction and was well and truly laid this afternoon by His Royal Highness the Governor General, brother of the late King Edward, who as Prince of Wales, tapped the same stone into place 56 years ago.

SUCCEEDS HINDENBURG.

BERLIN, Sept. 1. In to-day's official German statement Prince Leopold of Bavaria, appears as the director of the German armies on the Russian front which hitherto had been controlled by Von Hindenburg before he was appointed Chief of the Imperial staff.

Has the Bremen Been Captured?

New York, Aug. 25.—The New York City News Association quotes an officer of the British merchant marine, who arrived here to-day aboard the White Star steamship Baltic, as authority for the statement that the German submarine Bremen has been captured in the Straits of Dover by the British and 23 of her crew of 35 made prisoners of war. The Bremen, it was said, while en-moored in the net, was sighted by a British patrol boat, her stern under water and her bow high above the surface. According to the officer quoted, the British Government has maintained silence in regard to the capture, as another German trans-Atlantic submarine, the America, was said to be on the way here, and it was hoped to capture her also. The officer who reported the capture of the Bremen asked that his name be withheld, and said that the Bremen was caught in a steel net and swung helplessly for four days until a British patrol boat discovered her. Four of the submarine's crew died from the foul air, he said, before the submarine was towed into Dover.

The Bishop of Newfoundland at Stephenville Crossing and Port au Port.

Special Evening Telegram. STEPHENVILLE CROSSING, Sept. 1, 1916.

On Wednesday morning Mr. George Shears, drove the Bishop, Rector and Chaplain from Robinson's Head through a lovely country to the railway station about two miles from the settlement. After a few minutes waiting the train drew up and we all got on board for Stephenville Crossing which was reached in a couple of hours without accident, fear or alarm. A large crowd were waiting to welcome the Bishop to their thriving and picturesque settlement. Although the Anglican population is small, a well built school-chapel represents the church here, in which building a reverent and devout congregation witnessed a Confirmation of their young people.

Immediately after the conclusion of the service we all drove to the house of Mr. and Mrs. John Romaine, some 15 miles on the road to Port au Port. What a glorious drive. Eleven years ago we drove over the same road and what was said then needs no alteration now. Every variety of tree from the lordly pine to the tiniest shrub is represented in this stretch of delightful country. Comfortable homes, prettily laid out farms, the lowing of the cattle, the bleating of the sheep, and the tinkling of the bells add charms to this delightful district unknown to our northern bays. The scenery is truly magnificent, great mountains heave to heaven in the distant background, gently undulating slopes, waterfall, stream and lake go to make up a country that Abraham, Isaac and Jacob would be well contented with. But everything comes to an end and so did this glorious drive, for with the setting sun we came in sight of the farm of Mr. Romaine. A few minutes after we are in his comfortable home and enjoying a renewal of friendship formed many years ago. Here amid the quiet solitude we rested for the night, glad that the weather was all we could desire and the hospitality of the same high order. The following morning gave promise of a lovely day and after an inspection of the farm and drinking in the glorious air from the sea which gave us a keen appetite for the coming meal to which justice was amply done we started for Port au Port where the Bishop held Confirmation in the afternoon. The little church has been considerably enlarged since the Bishop's last visit seven years ago, the work costing over six hundred dollars, the greater part of which has been subscribed by the people. Truly the Lord helps those who help themselves. A beautiful arch erected in front of the church ground was the outward token of love and esteem in which the Bishop is held by a loyal and devoted people. After the service the Bishop returned to Mr. Romaine's while the Rector and Chaplain remained behind for Evensong which was held at the close of the day. A good congregation assembled in the little church where the service was taken by the Rector and the sermon by the Chaplain.

This practically brings the Bishop's visitation of St. George's to a close, and we take this opportunity to thank his many friends for their kindness in forwarding his plans, the Rector and Mrs. Butler, of Sandy Point for their hospitality and kindness, and Sergt. and Mrs. Goodland for looking after the Chaplain, Messrs. Jeremiah and Isaac Chaffey, at Crabbe's; Mr. George Shears, at Robinson's; Mr. and Mrs. Martyn, at Stephenville Crossing; Mr. and Mrs. John Romaine, at Port au Port, and we also extend his grateful thanks to Mr. House, Manager of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company Works at Limeville; to Messrs. William Compagnon and John Hunt for placing at his disposal their horses and carriages.

May the visit of the Bishop with a ripe experience of nearly forty years as overseer of the flock in this oldest Colony be a real stimulus to greater spiritual activity among the church people in this Bay. Such a visit must do good, and our heartfelt wish is that the Church of England on the West Coast invigorated by this present visit may lengthen her cords and strengthen her stakes and be a power for good to all who come under her benignant influence.

The following morning the Bishop and party after saying good-bye to their kind friends at Romaine's drove back to Stephenville Crossing and thence by train for St. John's leaving the Rector behind, the Rev. E. A. Butler, to continue his good work among his loyal and devoted parishioners.

THE BALKAN MAELSTROM.

If a novelist with a taste for the sensational had two years ago conceived a plot resembling the present situation in Greece, his story would have smiled at as too highly improbable for serious notice. Yet the situation bids fair to produce developments, before the atmosphere clears, which would satisfy the most melodramatic cravings. While actual events, however, are involved in obscurity, the salient points of the position are reasonably plain.

Romania's intervention has given Greece the lead and opened her eyes. Her past shifting suited well the varying fortunes of the diplomatic field and the national character, but the time for it is now past. Greece must declare herself. If her voice is not clear and unambiguous, the guns of the Allied fleet can speak in no uncertain tone; that is probably the explanation of its reappearance before the port of Athens. Constantine, however, retains a large popularity and has a great hold upon the people, at least of the army; that probably explains the other bit of news of the disaffection in the garrison at Saloniki. In both cases we can see the trend of events. Venizelos is gaining daily in power and the issue between him and the King becomes daily more clear-cut and imperative. It seems now to be a question, not whether Greece will come in or not, but how soon—it will be remembered that this was exactly Venizelos' prophecy nearly a year ago, when his country defaulted from her treaty with Serbia.

There is not much in the whole business to cause the Allies much concern, but it is critical for Greece herself. If she cannot realize on which side her bread is buttered, so much the worse for her; but it is to the Allies' interest that she should realize it, and that her rulers be prevented from committing her to a course that is suicidal to herself and an embarrassment to the Allies. The importance of the coming elections seems to diminish as their date recedes. Long before they are held, the need of them will probably have disappeared and Greece have definitely aligned herself with the side to which her interests lean. Meanwhile it is satisfactory to note that the Serbians are getting the upper hand of the Bulgarians on the left, south of Monastir, and that the Italians have begun a formidable flanking drive from Albania, while the effect of Roumania's entry is already seen in the renewal of the Russian Cyprian campaign and the scoring of a great success there. Things have only just begun in the new act, but they have begun well.

Public opinion, however, is another matter which does not seem to be of any importance in this connection.

South of Willingate and particularly at Catalina fish are taken in abundance when bait is obtainable, but the scarcity of squid is a great drawback.

At Battle Harbor it was learned from vessels, which had recently returned from the Labrador and the poor fares, that there was nothing doing south of Mufgord.

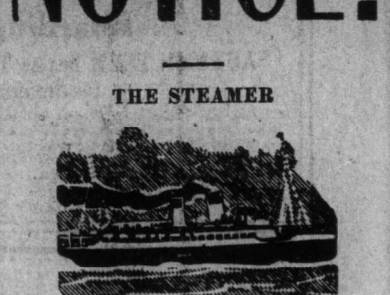

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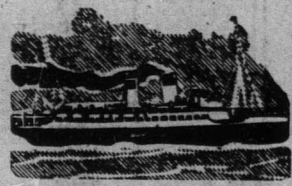

THE THOUGHTS OF THEOBALD.

RAILWAY ACCIDENTS.

The recent accident at Arnold's Cove is rightly getting a good deal of publicity. Unfortunately all railway accidents do not reach the public ear in this way. One which happened three or four years ago near Placentia Junction, in which the engine and tender were thrown over an embankment, was forgotten quickly and I do not remember that any enquiry was made. I happened to be on that train and can witness to the extremely narrow margin which saved a very serious situation. I suppose "accidents" are bound to happen—at least every one seems to think so, but at the same time, the Government Engineer has a very responsible duty to perform in carefully going over the road, and without fear or favour, have the railroad put in such condition as the public safety demands. Such portions of the line which are so uncertain in the spring of the year and as a consequence make the service anything but punctual or satisfactory, should be attended to. It is not for the public to suffer if money and work can improve these conditions in the spring. But the public does suffer, and the very uncertain service has become a by-word in the Colony. The public is suffering now when the "daily express" three or four times a week has become an accommodation or freight-passenger train, which menders its weary way across country and may be expected six, eight or twelve hours after it is due. Consequently the express trains are generally overcrowded. Just here it might be well to ask for a few more first class cars, or even to have the present ones renovated, as they show decidedly the worse for wear. I don't know if the cushions are thoroughly dusted and cleaned after the day's use, but most people hesitate to sit on them without another covering.

Another "growl" is due the Bay Service, which is suffering since the Reid steamers have been sold. These steamers have been replaced by very inferior boats and it means much discomfort to those who have to travel to find that the accommodation on board is very bad indeed. For instance, the "Wren" on Trinity Bay is a wretched substitute for the "Ethie," and some passengers refuse to take

passage by her. There seems to be a disregard for the public service that would not be tolerated in other countries. We are all prepared to sacrifice for the Empire, but when steamers are sold at enormous prices, we have a right to obtain suitable passenger boats to take their places. This is not antagonism to the Reid Nbd. Co., but a protest that they live up to their obligations as contractors in the public service.

THE TEACHERS' LOT AGAIN.

I met an old school-fellow the other day and among a few general questions I asked him if he was married. And in return he asked me how could a teacher afford to marry. And it is indeed difficult to see how a teacher with his present salary can afford to ask another fellow-being to share with him the anxieties as well as the joys of living. This man told me of one place in Newfoundland which gave the teacher \$400.00 and fees, 20 years ago. Then the fees were not allowed, and now the salary has been cut to \$350.00. This is not because the scholars have grown fewer, but because there are more scholars and a new school nearby is necessary. So that while our educational grants are increasing because of more children and more schools, the teachers themselves are paying a portion of the increase. How unfair it seems. One of the reasons why the teacher's complaint falls flat is because there are always a number of young men who are willing to take schools, who only intend to make use of the school to aid them in stepping from the school to the Church. They are young men, and glad of a few dollars to help them through college, so that in most cases, the teaching profession in itself does not hold the first place in their thoughts. All this serves to make the lot of the genuine teacher an unhappy and unappreciative one, and by this, our action, we degrade our teachers, instead of raising them to the dignity and position which belongs by right to those in whose charge we place the future men and women of our land. Pay our teachers well and see that they are fitted for their great office.

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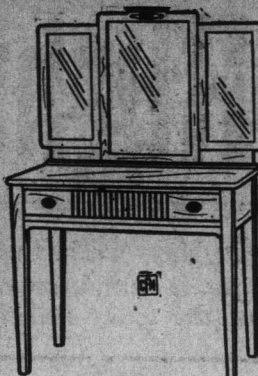
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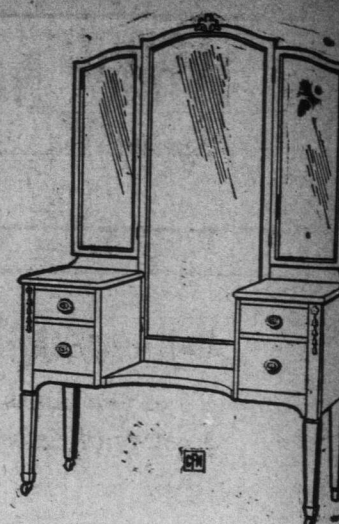

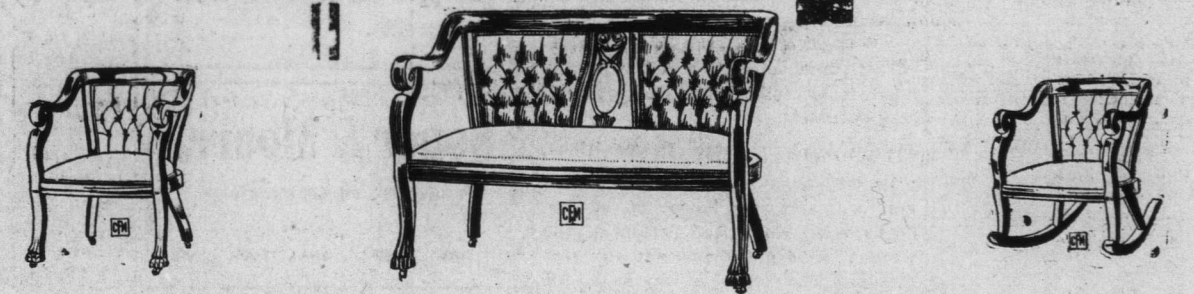

BILLY SUNDAY.

The Rev. Billy Sunday is a preacher with a punch. The Sunday punch is not intoxicating, being composed mostly of adjectives rimmed out with a cross-cut saw, but it is very disconcerting to people who stand for law and order and strict observance of the Sunday morning ritual.

Mr. Sunday was for years a professional ball player, and was never caught alive between the bases, being equipped with one of the most agile pair of feet ever planted on the

human frame. He left baseball to enter the evangelistic field, upon which people who found fault with his batting average said he was a crook, and having been saying it ever since, with a rising inflection. Objection is made to Sunday on the score that he takes more money out of town than a three-ring circus, but nobody ever saw him out behind the tabernacle hiding the little pea under a walnut shell.

Billy Sunday is one of the few preachers who can draw a crowd at the evening service without serving

ice cream and cake, furnishing motion pictures or advertising a wholesale attack upon Christian Science. It is harder for a stout man to get into one of Sunday's meetings than it will be for a professing church member with a peroxide affinity to get into the kingdom of heaven. Another queer thing is that people will go and listen to Sunday for two hours and a half, without discharging a single yawn, but if the local clergyman runs over thirty-five minutes everybody in the church will cast reproachful eyes at the wall clock.

Mr. Sunday believes in the use of gestures in expounding the Gospel and much of his expounding on a deal table sounds like opening the muffer cut-out in a closed garage. His legs and arms are movable and can be made to revolve rapidly in any direction, and his language is of a plain, durable type which can be under-

stood without running to the dictionary. Some people object to Mr. Sunday's language on account of bristles, and would rather have use long, compound words which not rasp the feelings and arouse memories of some war-time scrape. But as Mr. Sunday invests this language for his own purpose, he will probably continue to use it until his voice refuses to get on its chair at the sound of the bell.

Proud of Premonitions.

Do you ever have premonitions?

I have a friend who has them, and who is very proud of them.

It is useless to try to persuade her that they do not mean anything. She will indignantly tell you of an occasion when she had a premonition and something happened.

"There was the time when I didn't want John to go on the fishing trip, and the baby was taken so ill while he was away," she will say.

"And then there was the day I had the premonition my sister wouldn't come when she wrote me she was going to, and sure enough, she didn't. And so forth and so on, as long as you care to listen.

How About The Things That Never Come.

Now I do not dream of questioning her veracity. I am quite willing to believe she had the premonitions, although she did not always remember to speak of it before the event. That is a mistake that prophets often make.

But what I do question, is this—whether she ever took account of the number of times she has had premonitions and they did not amount to anything. I have a suspicion that if she did this she would find that they outnumbered the others ten to one.

As it is, they slip out of her mind and that is the end of them.

A housemate of mine said to me the other day when I was going on a little journey, "I hate to have you go—I have a premonition that something is going to happen you."

Another Way of Saying "I Shall Worry."

And then, before I could answer, he caught himself up and said, "I am ashamed of that. Saying I have a premonition is only another way of saying, 'I shall worry,' and I won't handicap you that way."

I think everyone with a pessimistic or worrying tendency has premonitions, a feeling in the bones that something is going to turn out wrong. Optimists have the opposite kind of premonitions, a feeling in the bones that something is going to come out right. On the whole, that is a much pleasanter feeling, at least for those who have it. Those who are connected with him sometimes suffer just as much inconvenience from his groundless optimism.

Always Analyze Your Premonitions.

In neither case should the premonition be made the basis of action. Analyze it. Go to the bottom of the matter. Find out if there is any real reason at the root of it, any cause for apprehending danger, any grounds for being sure of success. Then, when you have gone to the bottom, look carefully at what you find and act accordingly.

Premonition and superstition are twin cousins.

Of course there are times when sentiment, as well as reason, has some influence on our actions, but don't get the premonition habit. It will surely cause both you and those about you much needless unhappiness.

Besides, half the time premonition is just another word for indigestion.

Canada's Part in the War

BRIEF REVIEW OF THE PAST TWO YEARS.

The Ottawa correspondent of the Montreal Star gives an interesting resume of the part Canada has taken in the great war. Despite its consciousness, it contains so much useful information that we publish it for the benefit of those who may not have seen the original. He says:—

Ottawa, July 29.—With a record of patriotic achievement and general prosperity in the face of conditions at times adverse, Canada concludes next week her second year as a participant in the European war.

Such a lot has been done, so many events have transpired, and so much history made, that any brief review must be superficial and general in its character.

Canadian Army of 360,000.

The greatest problems were those which were encountered in the first year or more, and particularly in the first six months of the war. Since then, things have been systematized, the military machine has worked more smoothly, while the country's splendid response to the call to arms has been maintained. We are down to raise half million men. Nearly 360,000 of that number have so far been enlisted or will have been by the end of the month.

Predominant Spirit of Buoyant Optimism.

Likewise, the nervousness displayed at the outset of the war has completely disappeared from commercial circles. The country's business is good, crops are good, finances are in good condition, and underlying all, is the predominant spirit of buoyant optimism in the inevitable issue of the great conflict.

In view of all, the Canadians enter upon the third year of the struggle in better spirits and confidence than at

any time since the memorable August 4, two years ago.

The Men the Great Achievement.

The men we have raised and sent, or are preparing to send, to fight the Empire's battle, are the great and outstanding achievement of Canada's two years at war. While, as stated, the number is approximately 360,000, the latest figures up to July 15, give the total exactly as 350,655.

Ontario leads, with 145,193; Manitoba and Saskatchewan, comprising one military district, have contributed 71,825; Quebec province, 36,890; the three Maritime Provinces, 31,633; British Columbia, 33,379; and Alberta, 31,735.

Nearly Four Canadian Divisions.

Canada has three complete divisions at the front, with the greater part of the fourth division gone as reinforcements. The total overseas is around 175,000 men. To make up this total there have been sent abroad or in progress of organization, 13 battalions of mounted infantry, four divisional cavalry squadrons, 74 batteries of artillery, 246 battalions of infantry, five pioneer battalions, and two construction battalions.

There are big training camps at Barrie (Camp Borden); Valcartier; Seville, Manitoba; Sarsac, Alberta; Vernon, B.C.; and Aldershot, N.S.

The casualties reported up to date are around forty thousand, with about a quarter of that number dead—either killed in action or having succumbed as the results of wounds.

War Cost Canada \$260,000,000 to Date.

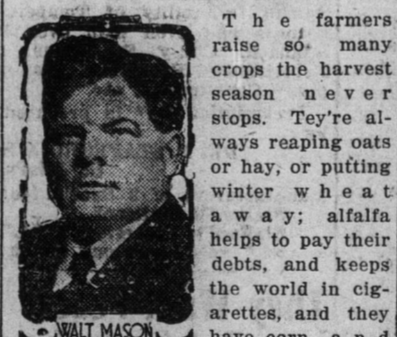

Private Peter Barron of "Ours"

is Prisoner in Germany—Is Safe and Sound—Writes to His Wife.

Appended is a copy of a post card received by Mrs. Alice Barron by yesterday's mail and sent by her husband Private Peter Barron, of the Nfld. Regiment. It will help to lessen in some degree the anxiety of parents and relatives here for their heroes who are supposed to be amongst the missing, because Private Barron was previously reported missing on two occasions. During the final preparations for the big drive he was one of a party of sixty sent out bomb-throwing on June 28th. Following a fierce engagement Private Barron fell into the German trenches, though he came through the ordeal unscathed, and was captured and taken a prisoner of war. The post card reads thus:—

Dear Wife,—Don't be surprised to hear that I am a prisoner of war in Germany. I am in the best of health and have been treated well by my captors. I will write when I get to my destination and send you address so you can write me. Good-By.

The foregoing is both encouraging and gratifying. However, it may be mentioned that a significant feature of the communication is that it did not contain all the feelings and expressions of Pte. Barron, but on the contrary it could be seen that the writing was "made in Germany." At the time the card was received yesterday, Mrs. Barron was packing a parcel to send away by earliest mail to her soldier husband.

The following is a letter Mrs. Barron also received yesterday from Mr. Henry Reeve, Hon. Secretary Nfld. War Contingent Assn., London:—

To Mrs. Alice Barron,
38 Duckworth Street,
Dear Madam,—We are extremely glad to know that Private Peter Barron, who was reported missing, has been notified to us by a Canadian Sergeant as being a prisoner at the camp of Giessen in Germany. This Association has made arrangements that he shall be supplied with comforts in the shape of food, clothing, etc., while there and will do everything it is possible to do for him. When you wish to write, his address is:—
Kriegsgefangenen- und Familien-Service, c/o G.P.O., London, "British Prisoners of War."

Yesterday a post card was received by Mrs. Barron from Nathan Rice, a Canadian prisoner of war, who was an old C.L.B. boy here, acknowledging her parcel sent some time ago and stating that he had divided its contents with two of "our" prisoners, Privates Combes and Barron.

THE GREEK PUZZLE.

LONDON, To-day. Following two days' silence in telegraphic communication with Athens, during which sensational rumors of revolution gained currency, but with no confirmation, comes the startling news of the arrival of an Entente Allied fleet with transports at Piræus, and that the general elections are likely to be postponed for a fortnight. The brevity of the despatches seems to indicate that something unusual is happening. The development of events is awaited with the greatest curiosity here.

NICHOLAS OF MONTENEGRO.

PARIS, To-day. King Nicholas of Montenegro left Paris last night for Italy, where he will visit the Austro-Italian battle front. On his return from France he will pay a visit to the British and Belgian armies.

BULGARIAN REVERSES.

ATHENS, To-day. According to information received here the Bulgarians are evacuating the town of Strytz on the Serbian front near Florina. The Bulgarians are reported to have fallen in their attempt to take Gornitchovo, a town east of Florina.

IN MESOPOTAMIA.

LONDON, To-day. Except for two successful bombing raids by our aeroplanes on the Turkish position on the Tigris there have been no developments, says an official statement issued by the British War Office last night regarding the situation in Mesopotamia.

LATEST STRIKE DEVELOPMENTS.

CHICAGO, To-day. Convinced that Congress will force them to surrender, the Presidents of the important western railroads last night ordered the resending of the modified freight embargo, established in preparation for the general railway strike. At the same time the executives announced defections from the ranks of the railway brotherhoods, and declared they had enough men to operate the trains, strike or no strike.

Thiepval's Doom Creeping Nearer

German Garrison Cannot Escape Annihilation by British—Amenities of the Field of Battle—Soldier Buried Alive and Rescued Complains of Stubby Chin.

London, Aug. 25.—Writing in the London Daily Chronicle under date:—"With the British Armies in the Field, Aug. 22. Philip Gibbs says: The British are drawing very close to Thiepval. Standing yesterday on ground to the right of the Windmill by Pozieres, within five hundred yards of Martinpuich, I could see how near the British lines had been pushed to both these places.

Thiepval I had seen several times from the western side, but yesterday I stood to the southeast of it looking straight across the cemetery of Pozieres to a long line of branchless trees and broken roofs, where the German garrison awaits its certain doom.

That doom crept a little nearer last evening, when some of the English troops left their trenches south of Lieuzig Redoubt and, following in the wake of a terrific bombardment on a short line of the German position, took that section quickly by assault. It was highly organized, and the grim bit of work was very quickly done, and with few casualties on the British side.

As soon as the guns had lifted after a concentrated fire which tore up the ground and made utter chaos of the German line of trench, the British followed. They went over in two waves at as rapid a pace as possible over the tumbled ground.

Devilish Fate in Front.
After a little while, less than a minute, the result of the attack was seen by a number of German soldiers coming out of shell craters with their hands up. A little later a large group of soldiers ran out and tried to escape. They ran as though the devil were behind them, but there was a devilish fate in front of them,

for they plunged straight into a heavy fire from the British guns and disappeared.

From the British batteries far away behind us there came a steady bombardment of the German ground just beyond us, and the shells passed overhead with that indescribable sound which is half scream and half a sigh, enormous in the volume of its noise. But those sounds were comforting compared with others which were coming overhead. They were coming from the German side with a savage overwhelming roar, which ended in a rending explosion.

"Eight-inch," said the young Scot by my side. "Heavy stuff."

It is surprising what effect an eight-inch shell can have in the way of upheaval, but one's sensation is not that of surprise when 500 yards away, or less, a mass of the field is suddenly lifted skyward and a smoke cloud as large as a cathedral stands there strangely solid in the wind.

The whole field of battle about us was vomiting up these things, and it was damnable, for there were no trenches near us, and we were in the open with these great shells bursting on every side. My young Scot is notorious for his luck, so I kept close to him, and hoped for the best, and we chatted pleasantly on the way.

No Bad Dreams in Death.
I went a good long way along the British front line trench and met some friends there. One of them had been buried alive not many hours before. I called upon him, but he was smoking a cigarette outside his dugout and looked pretty cheerful.

He complained bitterly of the beard on his chin as one of the worst evils of his situation—a situation which was complicated by high explosive shells, poison gas, trench mortars, and machine gun fire.

The real wonder of the British is only to be seen in such places as this. On these battlefields under heavy shell fire they were working calmly, as though they were building sand castles on an English seashore.

In the trenches some of them were sleeping as peacefully as new-born babes, curled up on the fire steps with rifles handy under a tumult of noise a few yards away from them across the parapet lay many of their dead comrades. But death does not give them bad dreams.

The evil death of corruption filled all these ditches with a sickly stench, but sitting there bunched up under their sand bags two Jocks ate their Maconochie with hearty appetite, not liking their surroundings, hating foul places, but enduring grimly all the worst things of war.

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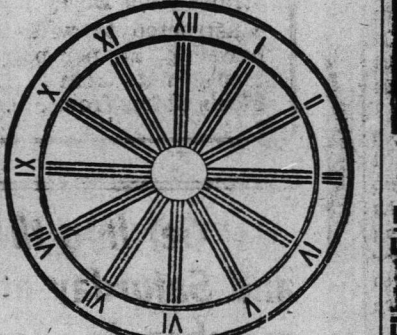
