



New York, Dec. 5.-Twelve indictments charging murder in the first 996-Pte. James O'Driscoll, Tor's degree were returned by the Grand Jury as the result of confessions of Ralph Daniello, relative to the existence of a so-called "Murder Syndicate" controlling gambling and graft in the Italian colonies of Greater New

It was learned that five other men had been indicted carlier in the week for murder in the first degree on Daniello's statement to officials of the district attorney's office that the murders had been committed by Italian It was announced that bench war-

rants had been issued for the 17 inlicted men but at a late hour it was said none had been arrested.

In his confession Daniello is quoted as having said that a gang was responsible for the murder of Giuseppe deMarco on June 28, 1916, and that Charles Lombardi, a bystander,

was shot at the same time. Daniello then is said to have related how Salvatore deMarco set about organizing a gang to avenge the death of his brother Giuseppe.

When the gang, of whom Daniello was a member, believed that Salvatore deMarco might be able to carry out his threat according to the report of Daniello's confession, they cut his throat and threw the body under the Queensboro Bridge where it later was found. This was three months after the killing of the other

On the theory that members of the gang that killed the deMarco brothers and Lombardi may also have been instrumental in the death of Michael A. Giamari, a political worker, two years ago, Dist. Attorney Swann today assigned an assistant to work on his end of the case.

The body of a well dressed Italian was found this morning at the foot of a stairway in Thompson street. He had been strangled. Police expressed the belief that the man was killed elsewhere and carried to the

Explosion Destroys Huge Chemical Works and Munition Factory

in Germany -- Equivalent to a Big Military Defeat in the Field

LONDON, Dec. 12. In connection with the report of Nov. 22nd that a large chemical works at Grieshiemelekton, near Frankfort, has been destroyed owing to an explosion, it is authoritatively stated now that it is certain that the explosion completely destroyed one of the greatest munition factories in the world, through which Germany suffered a disaster comparable to a very serious military defeat in its effect on the issue of the war. The factory covered over fifty-four acres and was of prime importance as a source of synthetic nitrates. It also played a leading part in the production of poison gas, tear shells and poison shells, of which it was the gretatest centre of manufacture in Germany, producing nearly 600,000 cubic feet of poison gas daily in 1916. The factory also supplied large quantit es of electrolytic hydrogen for the inflation of Zeppelins and ossessed three reserve gasometers with a total capacity of over 300 000 cubic feet. So important was it in this respect that the Expelin sheds, usually containing two or three airships, were rected close to the works. It is reported to have been the only ir tory turning out saltpetre for the manufacture of black powders which it produced at the rate of one thousand tons daily. It supplied five nitroglycerine and dynamite factories and two powder works, the one at Rottwell being one of the most important in all Germany, with all the soda nitrate and concentrated sulphuric ac'd they required. It also manufactured large quantities of the explosive trinitroluluol. The disaster affects every concern in Germany both by cutting off supplies which many of them drew from Griesheim by necessitating making good the loss of those supplies from a plant already working at the maximum, and by the death of scores of trained workmen and specialists in the factory, which will make the task of coping with this defeat all the more difficult even if the material loss can be replaced. The prob-Jem of collecting miscellaneous quantities of explosives and acids from various quarters and conveying them over the greater disances thus made necessary is bound to increase Germany's transport difficulties, which already are most pressing. The work cannot be re reconstituted in war time and sooner or later Ger-


