Reports brought to Shanghai by river craft from the Upper Yangtse are that the Chinese authorities, in seeking to quell outlawry and suppress disorder, following the looting of the city of Ichang by mutinous troops, have adopted the most drastic methods. All captured bandits, say the reports, are executed with little or no formality. A scene characteristic of the working of Chinese justice was described by Captain T. F. Doyle, of the steamer Mai Shum, which recently arrived at Shanghai. When his steamer was at Wanshien coaling, Captain Doyle said those aboard saw 28 culprits led to the river bank.
