



How Chrysler Puts 'Em on Their Feet

Walter P. Chrysler, president of the Maxwell Motor Corporation, is noted for his remarkable ability to take charge of a bankrupt concern and make out of it a profitable undertaking. How does he do it? When asked this question by a writer for Forbes Magazine, (N.Y.), Mr. Chrysler replied:

"The first thing I do when I start to look into the affairs of a failing company is to study the personnel of the organization and the individuality of the men. I am concerned first of all with executives, because if their principles are not right it is useless to look for results from the men. When I have measured up in my own mind the capacity of the executives, I get out into the operation of the plant and watch the men. I look around to see how many of them are standing still and how many of them are moving around the plant. Highly paid workmen should be busy with accomplishment, not useless motion. If there is a lot of movement I know the plant is being
