### ST. JOHN ENTHUSIASTIC FOR DELEGATION.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Feb. 15. A master delegation, one thousand strong, embracing all political creeds and the business life of the entire Maritimes was the objective at a meeting of representatives of the St. John City Council, Board of Trade and the Port Committee held Saturday afternoon, when further arrangements were discussed for the proposed visit to Ottawa to lay before the Dominion Parliament the urgent necessity of immediately adopting measures to confine the benefits of the British preferential duties to goods routed through ports, and other measures that would aid the Maritimes.

### FAULTY WIRING CAUSES LOSS OF OVER \$2,000,000 AND ONE LIFE.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 14. Motordom's newest offerings for 1925 were reduced to a mass of twisted and charred wreckage early today in a fire that ended the Kansas City motor show by the destruction of the American live stock pavilion. Three hundred cars, approximately, seventy-five motor trucks, two airplanes and accessories were valued at \$1,500,000. The building, valued at \$650,000, was levelled. Captain John J. Crane, Kansas City's oldest fireman, was burned to death. The fire originated, it is believed, from faulty wiring.

### FLOOD DAMAGES.

BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 14. Three deaths, injuries to four men by a gas explosion at Montreuil, Vermont, caused by the carrying away of a cellar wall, the destruction of bridges and dams and demolition of rail, telephone, telegraph and highway communications in various portions, were listed this morning among the results of floods and ice jams that have occurred throughout New England during the last few days.

### BRETON SITUATION.

HALIFAX, N.S., Feb. 15. The week-end brought no change to the dispute between the Cape Breton coal miners and the British Steel Corporation. Neither would make any forecast to-night that would make the next move that it would be. The miners were to keep on working as long as there was work to be done and the company officials said they were planning to work seventy-five per cent. of their present.

### THREE WHITE MEN KILLED IN SHOOTING AFFRAY.

ORANGE, Tex., Feb. 14. Three white men were killed here today in a shooting affray between negroes and whites. Two negroes were arrested.

### NOT SELLING SHIPS.

OTTAWA, Feb. 15. Referring to a rumour that the Government was considering an offer for purchase of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine fleet, Hon. P. G. Graham, Minister of Railways and Canals, said to-day that there was no truth in the story. He said the Government had received offers in the last two years, of which had ever been considered.

### Produce and Provisions

(Trade Review.)

### Codfish—Three heavy steamer cargoes went out to European markets since our last issue, with a total of 51,000 qts. of dried codfish. S.S. Melrose Abbey took 15,700 qts. to Alicante from various John's exporters. The S.S. Andora took 23,525 qts. of cash fish from different shippers to Spain, Portugal, Italy and Greece, and S.S. Agna 22,330 qts. to Alicante. The foreign markets on these arrivals will have full stocks of fish for the Lenten season. In fact some of the markets are already overstocked, and prices have declined accordingly, especially in Italy, where the recently depressed condition of exchange makes selling at even a small margin of profit a difficult problem in view of the high prices that had been paid last fall for Labrador fish, together with the deteriorated quality of some of the shipments. Spain is holding out fairly well for good shore fish, and will evidently take all that is available here between now and April. The consumption at Oporto has this week gone up over the 5,000 qts. weekly limit, and the Newfoundland stocks are keeping under 40,000. Norway's first fishery report from Lofoten came in this week, showing 1,700,000 qts. fish, or 500,000 qts. more than at mid-February last year. Brazil is a little weaker, but the West Indian markets are very good. The stocks of fish now on hand in Newfoundland are reduced to a low figure, and there will be a record scarcity by the middle of April, as there are only a few cargoes of cured fish in the outputs. As to the market at Porto Rico Messrs. Ramez write us this week, saying: "The market here has assumed a stronger position, and superior large codfish sell at \$50 per caak, 448 lbs. We expect to see even better prices ruling during the course of the month. There is, however, a lot of inferior fish here which is moving out at great concessions."

### Cod Oil—The stocks in the local market are pretty well all cleaned out, and attention will soon be centered on 1925 product as to whether the Norwegian fishery will be great, medium or small. Their first report this week shows an excess of half a million codfish over the first bulletin last February. The prices of our 1925 cod oil will depend largely on Norway's catch. Our Newfoundland cod oil in the New York market is holding steadily at 58 and 60 cents a gallon in barrels and 55 cents in tanks. This is a fairly good price and will give satisfaction to the producer should it hold out.

### Cod Liver Oil—It looks as if 1925 is going to be a good year for cod liver oil. The scientific investigations that have been going on the past three years, including those at Bay Bulls, in our country by Dr. Zilva, have been lately announced to the world. The impartial and disinterested verdict is that Newfoundland cod oil contains 400 times the vitamin potency than the Norwegian product, and is a certain cure for rickets and other diseases. This should create a good demand by the time our 1925 cod liver oil is ready. Already all prices on Newfoundland cod liver oil have been withdrawn in London, which has caused great excitement in the market. The last price on Jan. 23rd was 130 shillings c.i.f. London. In New York Norwegian cod liver oil has advanced sharply to \$32 on the spot. The market is firm and the trade expects higher prices will prevail when the new crop comes on the market. If the Norwegian crop is heavy there will likely be a recession.

### Flour—There is a decided weakness in flour this week owing to the slump in wheat prices, which declined 15 points in Winnipeg. It looks as if the boom has been burst and that flour prices will be kept under the \$12 in the spring. This seems evident from the fact that Canadian millers are anxious this week to quote prices for early delivery. It is now revealed that stocks of available wheat held in the west are much larger than was reported.

### Pork—The market is very bullish in Chicago this week, according to cable advices received Wednesday. The trouble seems to be that there is an abnormal quantity of lard on hand, and the export has fallen off in that commodity to a degree that is alarming dealers who hold large quantities. The export trade is expected to improve in the spring, and prices of all pork products to stiffen again. As it is now pork in Chicago is \$2 per barrel.

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### Tea—There was a temporary break in the London tea market this week owing to the unsettled condition of the Indian market, and prices declined 1 1/2 to 3 cents per pound on different grades. Dealers believe that the prices will react soon again on scarcity and values go back to early winter levels. It is pointed out by market experts that the increased number of people now consuming tea is the strongest factor in the extraordinary level of prices.

### Hay—The local market shows a higher level of prices this week, viz. \$35 to \$36 per ton for baled hay. While winter freight rates rule prices are likely to keep up. As hay is being moved about from town to town in Canada by rail there is very little upward change from autumn prices there. Home grown hay is getting short and many farmers are now buying imported baled hay.

### Oats—There was a decline in the Canadian oats market this week in sympathy with the fall in wheat quotations. The prices in the local market, however, are not notably lower. It looks as if the peak prices in oats were attained in January, and that any future change in values will be lower. Black oats, which are very scarce, \$4.40 to \$4.50 per sack; White \$4.20 to \$4.30; Mixed \$4 in the St. John's wholesale market.

### Sugar—The sugar market is a little easier this week in New York, according to cable advices received on Thursday. As the new crop sugar is now coming into St. John's in quantities, prices here will likely be a shade cheaper in the course of the spring. The present quotations are now \$6.60 to \$6.75 per 100 lbs., according to quantity taken by purchase. The S.S. Silvia brought a large quantity from New York.

New Loan to be Floated in England

We understand that 4,000,000 of the Government loan of \$6,000,000 authorized under the Loan Act of 1924 will be floated in England, the underwriters of which are the Dominion Securities Company. It is rated at 6 per cent. and is underwritten at 97.885.

The \$6,000,000 raised in 1922 was floated at 98.763 at 5 1/2 per cent., and the reduced rate quoted indicates conclusively that the financial stability of the Colony is viewed abroad with far greater confidence than it was when the former loan was placed on the market.

Public Health and Food Inspection

The Montreal Daily Star has for some time been urging that more stringent regulations should be made to prevent the distribution of adulterated or contaminated milk in the city. In its issue of February 4th it published an article showing the experience of Toronto since compulsory pasteurization had been adopted. It reads as follows, and a study of the facts cannot but prove convincing as to the effectiveness of the method:—

"Prior to 1914 only a portion of Toronto's milk supply had been pasteurized. After June 1st of that year it became compulsory to pasteurize the whole supply. Striking results are shown in the form of reduced death rates from diseases which are carried in unpasteurized milk.

In 1910 Toronto's death rate from typhoid fever had been 44, due in part to impure water, and in part to impure milk. In 1914, when milk purification became absolute, the typhoid death rate was 12.4. By 1924, after ten years of pasteurization, the typhoid death rate was reduced to nine-tenths of one per cent.

Tuberculosis, another milk-borne disease, showed a death rate in 1914 of 102. After ten years of pasteurization the death rate was only 62. Surgical tuberculosis in children, which is traceable chiefly to milk, has been almost wiped out. In 1924 there were only four deaths from abdominal tuberculosis in children. Three of these patients had been brought in from outside for hospital treatment, and the other had spent a year in the country, where milk is not pasteurized.

The general infant death rate also shows a gratifying decrease. In 1914 it was 112. In 1924 it was only 70. Deaths from diarrhoea in infants under two years of age averaged 26.2 per thousand children in the year 1909-13, prior to general pasteurization, and only 4 in 1924, after ten years of completely purified milk."

In the Registrar General's Report published on January 8th the Infant Mortality rate in St. John's was shown to be 141.80. The number of deaths from Pulmonary Tuberculosis was 64, an increase of 22 over that of 1923, and by far the highest figure in five years. The Report states that the great increase in infant mortality was

due to the epidemic of Diarrhoea and Enteritis during the months of August and September.

We have a Public Health Department and food inspectors, but it would seem from the statistics quoted that the methods adopted are not nearly as effective as they might be. It has clearly been shown that the diseases mentioned are largely caused by foods unfit for consumption, and we submit that the time has come when the whole system of inspection should be investigated and if found ineffective, scrapped and remodelled.

A Good Business Deal

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STEAMSHIP COMPANIES REPLY TO THE CHARGES OF A COMBINE. MONTREAL, Feb. 15. That the North Atlantic Steamship Conference is not in any sense a combine, and only exists to promote and protect the interests of the public as well as those of the steamship companies forming its membership, is called in a statement issued to-day by the following Canadian steamship lines: The Anchor Donaldson, Canadian Pacific, Cunard, Inter-Continental Transports Limited (associated with Canada Steamship Lines Limited), Scandinavian America, White Star, Dominion Line, Furness Withy and Company Limited, and the Thomson McLean Kennedy Limited. It is in reply to the charges made by W. T. R. Preston in his report to the Minister of Trade and Commerce at Ottawa. The statement cites certain advantages which are said to result directly from the taking of joint action by the companies in respect to freight rates. Among these are fixed dates of sailing at regular intervals, enabling shippers to work with smaller stocks than they could otherwise without the necessity to engage cargo space—considerably in advance, thus enabling merchants to make forward contracts for delivery of goods at a definite date, a better distribution of sailings, and greater security for capital invested in the steamship business, which enables shipowners to supply an adequate number of vessels of a higher class and greater speed than the ordinary tramp, and also brings about the delivery of cargo in better order, with greater despatch and regularity, as well as the reduction of insurance premiums owing to the better class of vessels employed.

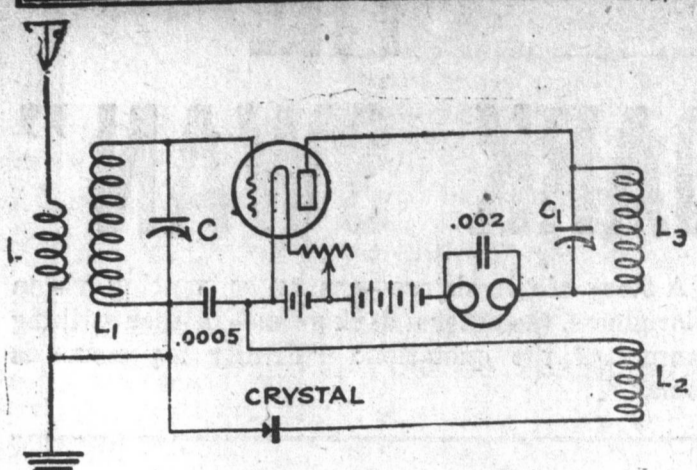

# Current Radio



## A Simple Reflexed Radio Frequency Set--2

Continuing from Saturday, we are showing the circuit of the receiver in a "standard" diagram. The symbols used in this diagram together with Saturday's are the same, so that the construction can be followed from either one. We strongly urge the beginner to carefully study both diagrams as it greatly facilitates constructional work to be able to read the more simple standard diagrams.

Either UV-199 (C-299) or UV-201-A (C301-A) tubes can be used. The 201-A's will be more sensitive but will require a 6-volt storage battery as source of filament supply. The 199 tubes can be operated from 3 standard No. 6 dry cells connected in series. If UV-199 tubes are used, the B battery voltage will be between 30 and 45 volts, while for the 201-A tubes a B battery voltage between 45 and 60 will be best.

If a fixed crystal is used, all that is necessary to tune the set is to turn the two condenser dials until a station is heard. After a station has once been picked up the two dials should be carefully and minutely adjusted so that full advantage of the sharp tuning qualities of the set will be taken advantage of. If the set will have to first be located before reverse the two connections to the coil L2. Simply switch the two wires running to this coil.

If an adjustable crystal detector is used, the crystals sensitive spot will have to be located before the tuning can be done. To-morrow we deal with Crystals and tell how to adjust the crystal detector for maximum sensitivity.

It is perfectly possible to "log" stations, that is to note the settings of the two dials for a particular station. This station can be returned, by setting the dials in the same position. There being no regeneration in the set—and hence no regeneration control device—the tuning is very simple. Again, this set is extremely simple to build, operate and understand, and it gives the beginner much constructional work on breaking in to the building part of radio. It is one of the best combinations of a crystal plus a single vacuum tube that we know of. Try it and see!

## Northland Scenes by Maurice Cullen

MONTREAL PAINTER SHOWS CHARACTERISTIC OILS AND PASTELS.

WORKS BY ROBERT PILOT. Effective Paintings About Quebec And Lewis By Young Artist of Great Promise.

There is diversity in the third annual exhibition of the paintings by Maurice Cullen, R.C.A., and by Robert Pilot, now being held in the Watson Art Galleries, 675 St. Catherine Street, west, and although the show only opened on Monday, the cherry red stars that indicate sales have already begun to appear on oils and pastels. Present plans are to close the exhibit on January 26th.

Prof. Cullen, picture-lovers have come to expect scenes of the Northland and as wild rugged country is the favorite sketching ground of this Canadian master of the winter season, there is mutual satisfaction on both sides. Two galleries are closing with oils and pastels, and while winter scenes predominate, there are paintings of other seasons—summer and autumn set down with the convincing fidelity which characterizes the period of snow and ice that Cullen has made distinctly his own.

In the years that Cullen has determinedly pursued his way to his present high place in Canadian art, he has painted a variety of subjects. It seems a far cry to his sunny paintings of women washing clothes in the streams of Brittany, stretches of bleak landscape in the same region and bits of rivers in Europe, painted with the bold vivid color of a modified Impressionism, to the admirable interpretation of Laurentian and Lower St. Lawrence scenery of recent years.

The interim was filled with the painting of varied motifs—ice-cutters with teams at work on lake and river at high noon or dusk, oxen hauling provender across ice-bound rivers, old buildings and quaint shops in falling snow at sundown, atmospheric promlems seen by open water steaming in sub-zero weather on sunny days, and all these studies have brought him to the trail northward, where his recent work shows him to be at home. In the region about Mount Tremblant and the Cache River, he has found material congenial to his taste, and a lover of the out-of-doors, brought by age or infirmity to the comfort of an armchair, could in reviewing memories of his active years find solace in these canvases by Cullen. They are more than pictorial glimpses of a stated region, for the ice-fringed margin of open lake or river, with sun-flushed hills bold against the cloudy sky, might fit any section of the North Country—they permeate the spirit of that land in winter, its beauty, grandeur and silence.

**NATURE SANELY OBSERVED.**

To the casual observer the painting seems so amazingly simple and direct—head sweeps of paint with telling accents rightly placed, but it is the essence of a knowledge acquired through years of observation and of study. Spacious reaches of snow, white, blue, grey or ruby according to the hour, remain always snow that will give under pressure of the snow-shoe. The hills are anchored to the earth's core—are built to stay. There is a rugged solidity about the mountains that reflect their forms in waters icy cold. Spruces start up from shorelines banked with snow, and the odd birch, white against the white of leafless trees, mirrors its form in the still streams.

Of more temperate season is a glimpse of a sunny bank with birches, the stream, which tumbles in shadowed foam over leaf-littered

rocks, reflecting the orange and gold of autumn foliage. In another canvas the yellow of birches strikes a sharp note in the rich minor cord of spruces edging a lake with mountain in the background. The lowering sun flushes the sky behind a clump of trees fringing a speeding stream in a summer landscape.

Truth is stamped on all these works—it is Nature sanely observed and honestly interpreted in terms of paint by an artist in whom the eye and the hand are in happiest accord.

Marked is the advance in the work of Robert Pilot, who finds picturesque material everywhere. There is a solid quality about this young painter's work which spells great promise, and no indication that he seeks the easy paths to recognition. Apart from some scenes in France, Pilot has found congenial subjects about Quebec—the sleighs grouped about the landing-place of the Lewis ferry, quaint buildings in old-world streets and squares, with, looming into the sky, the new tower of the Chateau Frontenac. To all these subjects he has brought good drawing and sound color. Satisfying in arrangement and tone are some studies of horses and sleighs, the character of the sturdy, blanketed French-Canadian horses being well conveyed. There is a marked sense of design in the canvases of this artist, the placing of the groups in his street scenes being particularly effective. The winter season has made strong appeal to him, but it is the period of snow and ice in cities that he depicts, though there is spaciousness and atmosphere in his winter bits of the St. Lawrence about Quebec and Lewis, which have presented problems satisfactorily solved.

Throughout the range of work by Pilot there is evidence of sincerity and determination. Of serious intent, he is moreover a hard worker who is satisfied with Nature as she is, and apparently no sympathy with those so-called "moderns" who couple distorted vision with natural or applied manual incompetence.

This joint exhibition by Montreal painters contains much of interest to students and picture-lovers alike.—Montreal Gazette, Jan. 14.

Note—The talented artists referred to in the above are well known in St. John's. Mrs. Cullen was formerly Mrs. E. Pilot and Bob is her son. Many Newfoundlanders who have visited their home in Montreal remember with pleasure their charming hospitality, and their many friends will be delighted to read the high tribute paid to the work of the artists.

## Day of the Steamship is Nearing Close

Latest Returns Show 60 Per Cent. Craft Motor-Driven.

The possibility of the eventual disappearance of the "steamship" from the sea, and its complete replacement by motor-ships, is foreshadowed in Lloyd's quarterly shipbuilding returns, just published.

Lloyd's report, in emphasizing the remarkable development of internal combustion engines for the propulsion of ships at sea, says: "The tonnage of vessels now building in the world, which are to be fitted with internal combustion engines, amounts to 923,733 tons, while the tonnage of steam vessels under construction is 3,530,884 tons. The motor tonnage therefore equals over 60 per cent. of the world's new steam tonnage."

"In Denmark, Germany, Holland and Sweden the motor tonnage under construction greatly exceeds the steam tonnage; the combined totals for these countries being 142,823 tons of steamers and 477,006 tons of motor ships. The world figures include eighty-four motor ships each of between 5,000 and 10,000 tons, seven of between 10,000 and 15,000 tons, and six of between 15,000 and 22,000 tons.

Of vessels building in Great Britain and Ireland at the end of December, motor ships amounted to 32.75 per cent. of the steam tonnage under construction, the actual figures being, steamships, 976,834 tons; motor ships, 320,137 tons. Britain has just commissioned a monster motor passenger liner, the Aorangi, of 23,000 tons (for the Australian route), and although she commenced her maiden journey in the teeth of a pre-Christmas gale, reports have been so favourable that other vessels of this description are likely to be ordered immediately.

Though the capital cost of the motor ship is much higher than that of the steamship, shipowners throughout the world, say Lloyd's, are evidently reaching the conclusion that in some conditions the motor ship is the better paying proposition. According to other authorities, however, shipowners are expressing anxiety regarding the price they have to pay for fuel oil bunkers, and it is suggested that fueling some alteration, this factor may prove a deterrent to the progress of motor shipping. The case is quoted of a leading American line which decided to convert its oil-burning vessels to coal-burning, and stated that the saving effected in use of its vessels amounted to as much as \$75 a day.

Generally speaking, however, British shippers are disposed to agree with Lloyd's that the motor-ship has come to stay, and many believe it will before long displace the coal-burner altogether.

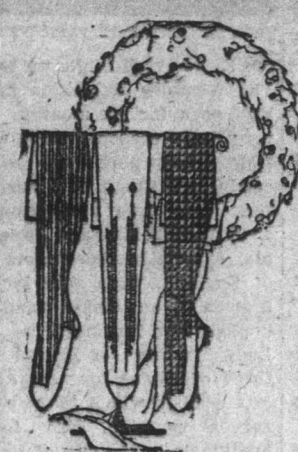

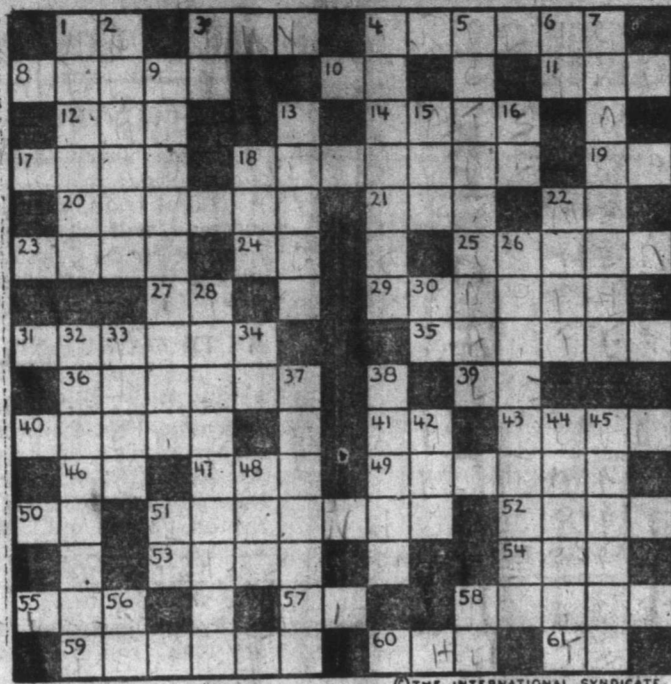

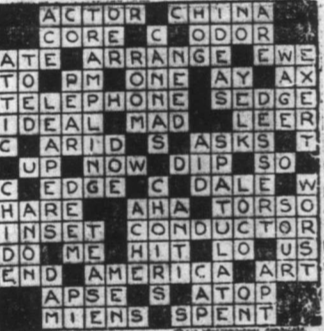

Nurmi's time of 9.08 clipped two-fifths of a second of Joey Ray's former record, set on the same lap track two years ago. Willie Plant, U.S. walking star, lowered his own two mile mark to 12.50 1-5; Jackson Scholz created a new record of 12 2-5 seconds for 125 yards; Carl Christensen, Newark, establish a new 100 yard high figure of 12 4-5 seconds, and the Newark A.C. relay quartette set a mark of 2.09 for 1,200 yards, three seconds faster than the former mark. Granville, of Hamilton, who competed at the C.A.A.U. championships at Halifax, forced Plant in the first mile, but finished a half lap behind.

50 MILE OCEAN RACE

LONDON, Feb. 9.—Yachts representing many nations are expected to cross the Atlantic this summer to participate in an ocean race being organised for August. The proposed course measures about 530 miles, starting from Cowes, extending thence around Fastnet and finishing at Plymouth. The race will be open to yachts not exceeding 50 feet at the load water line.

AGAIN IN HOSPITAL

CHICAGO, Feb. 8.—Ed. "Strangler" Lewis was in hospital to-day for the second time within a month as a result of being thrown out of the ring. Lewis suffered a six-inch gash in his back when he was thrown out of the ring Friday night by Joe Zickmund. "STRANGLER" LEWIS IS AGAIN TOSSED FROM THE RING. Pitched Over The Ropes Last Night By Joe Zickmund at Chicago. CHICAGO, Feb. 7.—Ed. "Strangler" Lewis, claimant of the world's heavyweight championship, despite his recent defeat by Wayne "Big" Munn, former University of Nebraska athlete was tossed from a ring here last night in a rough match with Joe Zickmund. That final indignity gave Lewis a victory on a foul, however, whereas Munn took the championship when he tossed Lewis out of a Kansas City ring and injured him so badly that Lewis was pinned easily for the deciding fall. Lewis was pitched over the ropes last night after Zickmund had struck, bitten and kicked him for 35 minutes and forty seconds. Lewis' back was lacerated badly and it was feared some of his ribs were cracked. The crowd resented Zickmund's tactics and swarmed into the ring when the referee ended the bout, but there was but little other disorder.

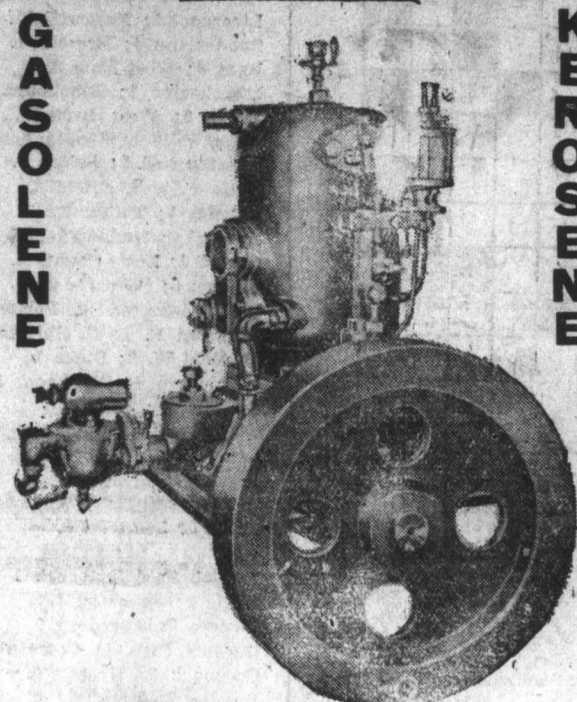
