#### ADVERTISING HUMBUGS.

The Listowel Banner of this week has a timely and sensible article on the advertising humbugs and swindlers who, with scarcely a week's interval, continue to annoy publishers of newspapers. It comes down heavy on that numerous class of swindling advertisers who have their field of operations in the States, and who periodically pester Canadian publishers with shoals of advertisements, for the insertion of which they offer all sorts of articles at fabulous prices, from a needle to an anchor, from a piano to a toothpick. These are invariably valued at double what they are worth, and after offering the publisher a certain amount for inserting the advertisement, he is modestly asked to pay the balance due on the article in cash before he can get possession of it. Sometimes we receive as many of these advertise-ments at one time as would fill half a page of the Mercury. Were we too comply with the request we would have to pay out hundreds of dollars, while all we would get for our money and our work would be a lot of trumpery articles not worth half the value put on them. Our rule is to consign all such advertisements, with their accompanying circulars and due bills, to the waste paper basket, and we are glad to observe that almost every respectable paper in Canada treats them in the same way.

But there is another class of adver. tisers who are willing to pay, and who do pay cash for their advertisements. but who want them inserted for the merest trifle-usually about a third of what would be considered a fair price. These parties are generally the makers or vendors of patent medicines or other nostrums, who make their living solely by advertising or puffing, and who somehow have reduced it to such a nice system as generally to get their puffing done for much less than those who are in what we would call legitimate business. The Banner instances Dr. Radway, of Montreal, the man who has made a splendid fortune out of the three K's-who had the impudence to offer \$20 for a yearly advertisement of one column, together BOOT & SHOE STORE with fifty-two special notices! There are many similar cases we could mention within our own knowledge, but we have invariably given these gentry a wide berth, or sent them off to some more accommodating customer. Radway has tried us several times with similar offers, but we took no notice of them. There are other parties outside the medicing business who imagine the medicine business who imagine because they get their advertisements inserted in some third-rate backwoods paper for a mere song, that all the paper for a mere song, that all the other papers in Canada should do likewise. 
