UTHER McCARTY, heavyweight champion of the world, died in the ring in the Burns MANY arena, Saturday afternoon after one minute and forty-five seconds of fighting.

Death came to him in the stress of battle, with thousands looking on, while essaying to defend the place he had so quickly won in the fistic world, against Arthur Pelkey, aspirant for championship honors.

When he entered the ring he was apparently in the pink of condition; several blows had been exchanged. They were not blows that had the kick of death in them, but light counters, Municipal Pier of Long Beach East, Advises President Dev-enish, That the Campaign to others' strength.

Not a man among the thousands of spectators, not a few of them experts in the manly art of self defense, promoters and old time fighters, saw a blow delivered that would carry consequences with it.

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
