ADVICES FROM JAPAN.

Sea Hunting Engaging the Attention of the Authorities—The Law to be Enforced.

Heavy Rains Interfere with Railway Traffic—Holders Spreading—The First Woolen Mill Opened.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—The steamship *Relic* arrived this morning, 23 days from Hong Kong and from Yokohama. Japanese sailors state that sea and other hunting about the Hokkaido Nemuro and Saghalien islands are again engaging the attention of the authorities, and native papers state that the provisions of the act of 1894, regulating such hunting by foreigners, will be enforced to the extent of sending men-of-war to the island.

Heavy rains in the Chikuma and Buzen districts from July 4 to 6 washed away bridges across all streams, considerably delaying railway traffic. A number of houses were washed away and one person was killed.

On the eleven last, the total number of cholera cases reported was 228 with 114 deaths, 47 fresh cases and 16 deaths were reported that day, and on the 13th instant 20 fresh cases and 27 deaths were reported from Nagasaki. The Emperor has sanctioned the expenditure of \$42,120 from the government reserve fund for disinfection purposes. A native paper, in commenting on the recent elections from the prefecture of Nagasaki, says: "All the great statesmen have been forgotten. Of 15 counts elected, but four, Ito, Matokata, Kato and Nagata, have any claim to statesmanship. It is generally believed the Emperor will nominate Count Okuma, Iwano, Goto, Itagaki and Potashima to be members of the house of peers. A noticeable feature is that only those counts accredited with conservative tendencies have been chosen, and owing to their numbers they will be weak party in the House, as will also the baronial section of vassals. However, 70 returns from all the prefectures estimate that about 450,000 entered to vote, nearly 20 per cent. remained from so the strength of the parties is estimated as follows: Radicals 101, Katholicals 98, Conservatives 25, Kinshu Liberals 10, Independents 15, Jiji 15, unknown 15.

On the 20th instant the first woolen mill in Japan supplied with English made machinery was formally opened by the Japanese Manufacturing Company, a Japanese company, with a capital of \$35,000.

The latest China News states that United States Minister Denby, on a recent visit to Canton, succeeded in having settled all American claims for compensation, some of which were in connection with the destruction of missionary property in Canton province eight years ago.

The latest report of disorder on account of the high price of rice comes from Aikawa, Saitama. Two thousand people, aided by money, began to riot on the first instant and the police being powerless, the governor ordered troops from a neighboring garrison. Telegraphic news on the 4th inst. stated that the rioters were becoming more powerful and were destroying the residences and property of rice merchants. A company of thirty were detached from Suifu to Saitama, and Councillor Kuroda, of the home department, also learned to Aikawa. Aikawa is one of the most prosperous towns of Saitama and has a population of 13,000.

THE SALMON SEASON.

The Columbia Pack Estimated at More Than 380,000 Cases.

PORTLAND, July 31.—To-morrow the salmon fishing season in Oregon closes. The Washington law allowing to continue ten days longer, but it is doubtful whether many more fish will be caught, and by Saturday all canneries on both sides of the Columbia will probably be closed down. The three fish commissioners of this state, after a careful estimate, fix the season's catch at 383,000 to 384,000 cases. This, of course, means Chinook salmon. Last year's pack was 380,000 cases. Active operations at the Cleckhams hatchery will commence about December 1.

WEEKLY TRADE REPORT.

Bradstreet's Financial and Commercial Review for the Week Ending August 1st.

Special telegrams to Bradstreet show no local gains within a week. The wheat crop has not improved. Indian corn has not yielded, owing to dry weather in Eastern Kansas and Nebraska. Rice promises the largest crop on record, and cotton crop outlook is quite favorable. Crop outlook from Eastern Kansas are as compared with one year ago; potatoes, one-fifth; wheat, one-fourth; wheat not quite one-half; flax and oats are worth twice last year's prices at primary markets. Wheat, flax and corn are one-fourth more, and potatoes three times as much. Rain would help corn and potatoes and double the bean crop. Weather very warm; prospects for rain upper dull and weaker, the heaviest showers appear to have supplied immediate needs. Visible stocks abroad are nearly 40,000 tons less than one year ago. Raw cotton is off one-eighth per cent, with the bulls in control and predictable iron and steel and anthracite are as quiet as before, and still without prospect of an early change for the better. Hides are stronger and the price is higher, and shoes naturally feel this better. 8000 autumn demand has begun at increased figures. The importation of foreign hides has been heavy and tend to depress woolen goods. Cotton goods stocks are fairly well held with a prospect of a further advance in brown and checked sheetings and shirtings. The export of both wheat and flour, as wheat on both coasts this week are larger, notwithstanding the falling off in the Atlantic coast. The total is 2,722,358 bushels against 1,644,566 bushels last week and 1,672,397 bushels in the last week of 1899. The aggregate exported July 1 to date against 1,370,776 bushels against 7,370,694 bushels in 1899, and 1,371,561 bushels in July, 1898. The wheat market has been irregular on the coast and shows naturally feel this better. A third report.

THE HUDSON'S BAY COMPANY.

General Business Meeting in London, Eng., at which an Important Proposition to the Shareholders is Considered.

A general meeting of the Hudson's Bay Company was held in London, England, on the 7th inst., at which Sir Donald A. Smith, M.P., (governor) presided. In his address to the directors and shareholders, he referred to the depression existing in the fur trade consequent upon the mild weather which was experienced last winter. They sold this year 70,000 martlets at an average price of only \$2.50, while last year they fetched 71c. 3d. Twenty years ago the average price of the same fur was 30c. They sold also 40,000 minks at the same price in March last. These fetched only \$1.94, as against \$1.3d. the preceding year, and 10c, some twenty years ago. Had the same price been obtained as last year the net profits would have been something like \$44,000 more, and this would have enabled the directors to propose a dividend from the trade equal to that of last year, or 12c. per share. Taking the remuneration of sixty-three officers—equal to \$19,800—from what would otherwise be net profit, the net profit for the last year is only \$24,816 14c. 2d., as against \$28,022 4c. 4d., or a diminution of almost \$41,000, arising from the decline in the price of skins. The company has from the trade \$24,816 14c. 2d. As regards land, the receipts for the last year, to March 31, are \$37,071.8c. as against \$20,488.9c. 9d., in 1898, while the charges are less by \$5,040.6c. This arises in a gross measure from the fact that no charges were made last year by the government for surveys, and there has also been a considerable reduction in the cost of management. The surveys made by the company have cost \$28,643, charges on the survey of three and a half miles across in 1898 the sales of land amounted to \$2,189 acres for a price of \$144,960, an average of \$5.63 per acre, and during this year have been sold 34,733 acres for \$199,636, or \$5.75 per acre. The chairman summarized the figures thus: We have then a balance from the trade of \$24,816, and we have on the land account a balance of \$43,702 4c. 2d., or altogether \$68,518 4c. 10d. Add to this \$1,980 10c. 2d., taken from the balance of last year, and you will have \$70,500 yielding the 12c. per share which we propose to distribute to you as a dividend, leaving to be carried over to 1898 the sum of \$20,844, 10d. 7c. 2d. 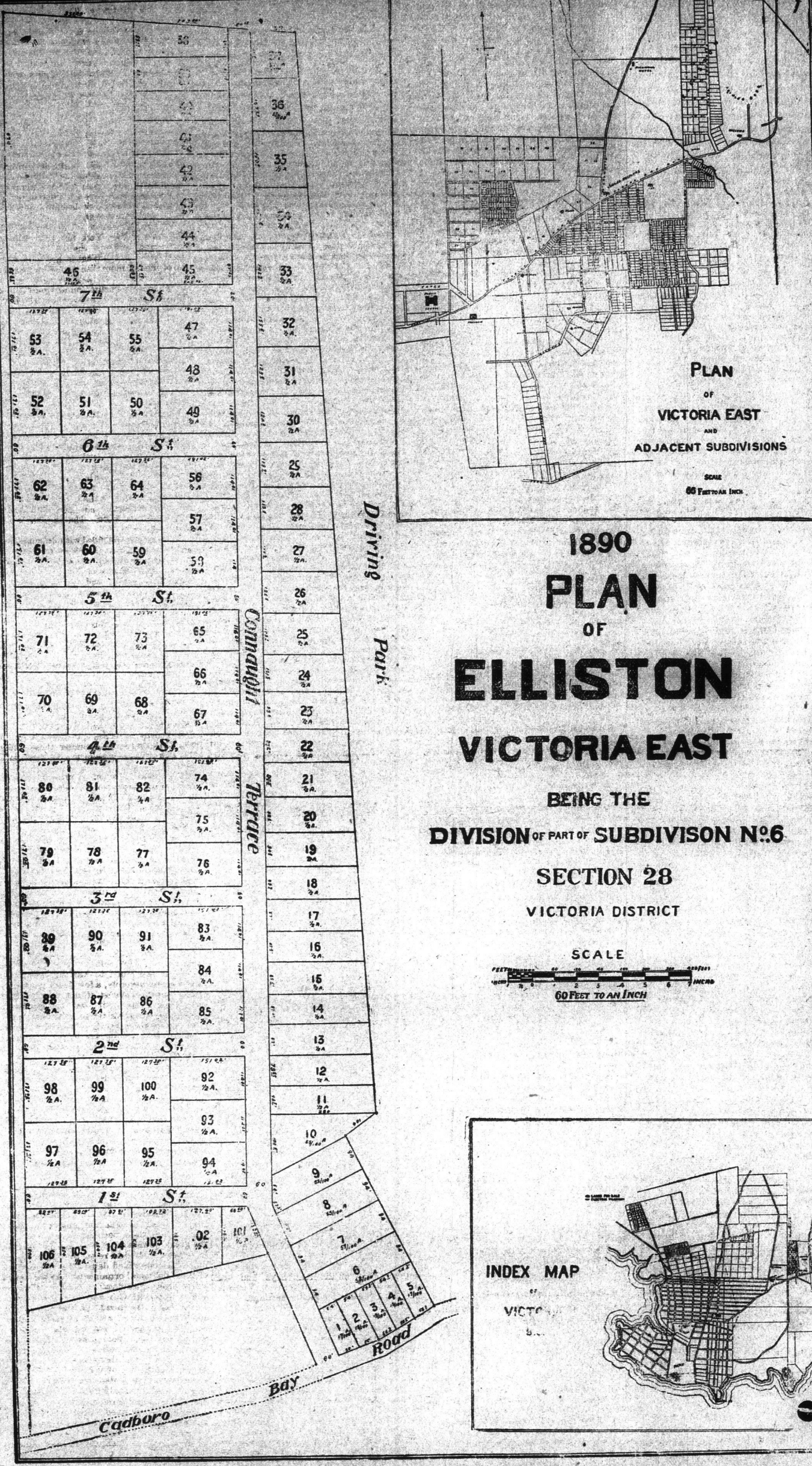
