A BILL has been introduced in the On A BILL has been introduced in the Ontario Legislature by Hon. W. J. Hanna amending the Drainage Act, as requested by the drainage deputation from Essex, Kent and Lambton that waited on the Government recently. The Municipal Drainage Act is amended by inserting therein the following as section 80a: "Notwithstanding anything contained in section 80 of this Act, the municipality whose duty it is to maintain and keep in repair a drainage work, shall not become liable in pecuniary damages to any ownliable in pecuniary damages to any owner of land whose property is injuriously affected by reason of the non-repair of such drainage work, unless and until after the expiration of two months from the date of service by or on behalf of of su h owner of notice in writing upon the Reeve or Clerk of such municipality, describing with reasonable certainty the alleged lack of repair of such drainage work." Section 98 of said Act is amended by adding thereto the following as subsection 7: "Where the amount awarded is upon a claim for damages by reason of the non-repair of a drainage work, the costs allowed to the plaintiff shall be on the Division Court scale, so far as the same is applicable."

The U. S. and Japan.

The trade treaty which has been arranged between the United States and Japan will put an end to some extent at least to the talk of possible hostilities between the two countries. Neither at Tokio nor at Washington has there apparently been any feeling of an unfriendly nature, nor has the protest of the American government against what were manifestly designs by Russia and Japan on China aroused any animus. International relations are not easily strained at the present day when war means so much in the way of expenditure.

Undoubtedly, however, alarmists Undoubtedly, however, alarmists will still continue to tell us that war between the aggressive empire of the Mikado and the United States is inevitable and that when it does come the Pacific coast states will be scourged by the Japanese fleet. As in many similar sensational predictions and sensational predictions are sensational predictions. Second, it is soothing. Toronto, March 21.—Receipts to-day at the City Cattle Market were 50 loads, with 776 head of cattle, 464 sheep and lambs, 400 hogs and 326 calves.

The run was light and the trade for choice butcher cattle was correspondingly active. There is, in fact, a scarcity of choice butcher, and anything in the way of real fancy light heifers is eagerly sought after. A few in this class picked out to-day, weighing in the neighborhood of 1,000 pounds, sold at \$6, or about 10c. higher than the best for export cattle in yesterday's market. Choice butcher all round were from 5c. to 10c, higher. The advance does not apply to common rough mixed butcher and fat cows. These are decidedly draggy and off anywhere from 50c. to 60c. from a couple of weeks ago. Extra choice fat cows, however, are still quoted at \$5 to \$5 30, but these are few.

Quotations to-day are: Extra choice fancy butcher heifers, \$5 90 to \$6; choice steers, butcher or export, \$5.85 to \$6; medium choice, \$5 50 to \$5.70; cows, \$4 to \$5; bulls, 4.60 to \$5; common mixed butcher steers, cows and bulls, \$3.50 to \$4; canners, \$2 to \$2.50.



MILITARY HAZING.

Carried to Brutal Extremes In German Army Schools.

CADETS MAIMED AND KILLED.

The Most Dangerous Punishment Meted Out to Erring Freshmen Is "the Gantlet of Fire," and the Most Repulsive Is "Bacon Swallowing." Germany is, of all countries, the one

in which the science of hazing in mil-Itary schools has attained the greatest development. The army plays in the fatherland's life a part the importance of which can hardly be realized by an untraveled American. Military service is compulsory, and in time of peace 600,000 men are kept armed, uniformed and drilled. To command that huge contingent 80,000 commissioned officers

are necessary.

This large officer corps has developed customs, ethics, even a morality, of its own. These customs and ethics are imitated at an early age by the boy who aspires to enjoy the veneration which German officers generally re-ceive from the populace. Imitation in a young man usually means exaggeration, and some of the little military snobs are on their first day at school a joy to behold. Very soon, however, the precoclous stiffness is taken out of them.

A harmless though repulsive form of hazing cadets whose appetite verges on gluttony is called "bacon swallow-ing." The plebes to be victimized are lined up on the grounds surrounded by a group of second year men. A

slice of raw bacon is tied to a piece of string, and the plebe whose name is drawn first is made to swallow the unappetizing morsel. When the sicksensation of the twine tickling his throat threatens to nauseate him the bacon is pulled out. The name of another unfortunate is drawn, and he is in turn obliged to swallow the ba-con, the appearance of which has not been improved by the first man's chewing. On it goes along the line to the next man and up to the last one, and for days and days the sight of bacon, a staple article in German cuisine, will, if it does not spoil the healthy healthy youngsters' appetites, at least remind them that undue haste in assimilating food lacks refinement. After a few hours spent in "frog's

equat" the most dignified and snobbish plebes assume the good natured and perfectly chummy attitude which means that they have been tamed. Swelled heads are quickly noted and their owners made to sit on the floor with their chins resting on their knees, and their ankles and wrists are bound together. A solid stick passed under the knee joints and forcing the forearm back prevents them from moving arms or legs, and they are left there cramped and ridiculous position.

Other forms of hazing are the stomach dance, with or without obstacles; finding the keyhole, tossing in a blanket and star gazing. In the stomach dance the cadet is put flat on his stomach on a high table and four tormenters take him by the hands and feet and whirl him around on the table. In the case of serious offenses a few hard objects or "obstacles" are scattered over the table, making the "dance" rather painful.

ers Bank.

In the House of Commons last week Jos. E. Armstrong, Member for East Lambton, made an excellent speech in favor of the resolution introduced by David Henderson, Member for Halton, demanding a Royal Commission to investigate the affairs of the defunct Farmers Bank. The resolution, as most of our readers know, was defeated by a majority of 35. On account of a branch of the of 35. On account of a branch of the defunct bank having done business in Arkona, in Mr. Armstrong's constituency, that gentleman spoke very strongly in favor of an investigation, showing that had a proper Government inspection been held there would not have been such an unfortunate collapse and demanded that neid there would not nave been such an unfortunate collapse, and demanded that the Minister of Finance see that the people doing business with banks have proper protection. "Depositors in my riding," said Mr. Armstrong, "who had placed \$43,000 on deposit in this Farmers Bank in the town of Arkona, believed up to a short time ago that their monriding," said Mr. Armstrong, "who had placed \$43,000 on deposit in this Farmers Bank in the town of Arkona, believed up to a short time ago that their money was absolutely protected by government inspection and control, and they are to-day surprised to find that they are likely to lose every dollar, because it is emphatically stated that the only asset the bank has, after the preferred claims have been paid, is the Keeley mine. And it has been shown by the men interested in the Keeley mine that the amount of money that is owing to the Farmers Bank at the present time is very small, and that the creditors of the Farmers Bank need expect to get very little out of that mine. . . . The only men who are to suffer loss in this matter are the depositors and shareholders of the bank; the government, apparently, are not going to lose any money. Nor are they ready to spend a reasonable amount of money so that the men who were instrumental in wrecking this institution could be brought to justice. The liquidators, as I have said, have no money to carry on an investigation, nor have they power to incur indebtedness to raise money for such a purpose. And why should we saddle such an expense upon the poor people who have been so seriously injured already?"

Mr. Armstrong concluded by saying:—"My object is merely to emphasize the statement made by the hon, member for Haiton, and to say that I intend to support the resolution. My reasons are these: That Mr. Tavaers was not entitled to a certificate, because the sum of \$500,000 had not been bona fide paid thereon. That the Minister of Fi-
