ACCORDING to the report of the Minister of Education, school teachers throughout the province are getting higher salaries than they did a year ago. In urban schools the average salary for male teachers is \$1000, an increase of \$14 over 1909, and for female teachers \$532, an increase of \$16. In rural schools the average salary for male teachers has increased \$22 being now \$484. Female teachers in these schools are receiving \$17 more, the average being \$399.

AT the annual meeting of the District Fairs Association held recently at Wyoming a discussion was held on the advisability of having a uniform set of rules to govern the societies within the district, but no action was taken. It became felt that in cases where protests are entered, that it would be much better and more satisfactory to all parties concerned to have the question settled before the animals or articles in dispute were removed from the exhibition. A unanimous vote of thanks was passed to Mr. John Farrell, retiring president, for the distinguished and excellent services rendered the Association as its chief officer; for the untiring energy and zeal shown by him on behalf of all the societies within the Association and for the manifest interest shown for their welfare by his presence at their annual exhibitions. The dates for the several fairs and the names of the new officers of the Association appeared in last issue.

A BILL has been introduced in the Ontario Legislature by Hon. W. J. Hanna amending the Drainage Act, as requested by the drainage department of Eastern, Kent and Lambton that waited on the Government recently. The Municipal Drainage Act is amended by inserting therein the following as section 80a: "Notwithstanding anything contained in section 80 of this Act, the municipality which is to maintain it, or to keep in repair a drainage work, shall not be liable in pecuniary damages to any owner of land whose property is injuriously affected by reason of the non-repair of such drainage work, unless and until after the expiration of two months from the date of the service of a notice in writing upon the Reeve or Clerk of such municipality, describing with reasonable certainty the alleged lack of repair of such drainage work." Section 98 of said Act is amended by adding thereto the following as section 98a: "The amount to be awarded to a claim for a drainage work, the costs allowed to the plaintiff shall be on the Division Court scale, so far as the same is applicable."

After careful deliberation the judges decided in favor of the negative side by one point. An Irish program followed consisting of an Irish recitation by Rev. J. U. Stewart, pastor, addressed by Dr. Sawers, Mr. Cliff Lewis, Mr. N. McIntyre, Mr. Howard McLean and the President. Next meeting will be held March 31st. There will be an open debate on "Money vs. Brains." All are welcome.

Let's All Keep Hens. J. G. Cotton of Okanogan, Wash., who started in the poultry business about a year ago with nine hens, has compiled some interesting statistics. The hens began laying in December, and he has kept a close record of the eggs obtained from Feb. 1, 1910, until Nov. 1, 1910, as follows: February 107, March 165, April 203, May 166, June 114, July 135, August 161, September 146, October 108. This is an average of about 192 eggs per hen a year. Another record which promises to be as remarkable as that of the hens, is for pullets. Eight pullets that were hatched April 11, 1910, began laying Aug. 15, and during that month laid 29 eggs. In September they laid 196 eggs, and in October 178 eggs.

Choice butcher all round were from 5c to 10c higher. The advance does not apply to common rough mixed butcher and fat cows. These are decidedly draggy and off anywhere from 50c to 60c from a couple of weeks ago. Extra choice fat cows, however, are still quoted at \$5 to \$5.30, but these are few.

Calves steady at \$4 to \$8.50.

Sheep steady at \$4.50 to \$5.

Lambs, light, run at \$6.50 to \$7; heavy lambs, market dull and easier.

Hogs—Market steady at this week's decline of 10c, to \$6.65 f.o.b., and \$6.95, fed and watered.

**Cynic or Gentleman.**



Jos. E. Armstrong and the Farmers Bank.

In the House of Commons last week Jos. E. Armstrong, Member for East Lambton, made an excellent speech in favor of the resolution introduced by David Henderson, Member for Halton, demanding a Royal Commission to investigate the affairs of the defunct Farmers Bank. The resolution, as most of our readers know, was defeated by a majority of 35. On account of a branch of the defunct bank having done business in Arkona, in Mr. Armstrong's constituency, that gentleman spoke very strongly in favor of an investigation, showing that had a proper Government inspection been held there would not have been such an unfortunate collapse, and demanded that the Minister of Finance see that the people doing business with banks have proper protection. "Depositors in my riding," said Mr. Armstrong, "who had placed \$43,000 on deposit in this Farmers Bank in the town of Arkona, believed up to a short time ago that their money was absolutely protected by government inspection and control, and they are to-day surprised to find that they are likely to lose every dollar, because it is emphatically stated that the only asset the bank has, after the preferred claims have been paid, is the Keeley mine. And it has been shown by the men interested in the Keeley mine that the amount of money that is owing to the Farmers Bank at the present time is very small, and that the creditors of the Farmers Bank need expect to get very little out of that mine." The only men who are to suffer loss in this matter are the depositors and shareholders of the bank; the government, apparently, are not going to lose any money. Nor are they ready to spend a reasonable amount of money so that the men who were instrumental in wrecking this institution could be brought to justice. The liquidators, as I have said, have no money to carry on an investigation, nor have they power to incur indebtedness to raise money for such a purpose. And why should we saddle such an expense upon the poor people who have been so seriously injured already?" Mr. Armstrong concluded by saying:—"My object is merely to emphasize the statement made by the hon. member for Halton, and to say that I intend to support the resolution. My reasons are these: That Mr. Travers was not entitled to a certificate, because the sum of \$500,000 had not been bona fide subscribed, and \$50,000 had not been bona fide paid thereon. That the Minister of Fi-

nance had notice that the provisions of the Bank Act had not been complied with, and he did not make the thorough investigation he should have made into the facts connected with the issue of the certificate. That the president of the Bankers' Association urged upon the Minister of Finance the necessity of investigating this question; and this and the numerous private interviews that were held with the hon. member for Halton and others in regard to this important matter were surely worthy of consideration. That the minister had conclusive evidence, by the admission of Mr. Travers, that he had committed perjury even before the certificate was issued. For these reasons, I heartily support the resolution of the hon. member for Halton."
