





occurring, or of provision being vacancy made for the salary of an additional member, Sir John Thompson, Hon. Edward Blake, or some other Canadian jurist, is likely to receive the appointment. There is a growing feeling both here and in England in favor of the appointment of some Canadian to this the highest court in the empire for the trial of cases appealed from colonial courts. It can be taken for granted, therefore. that Sir John Thompson will be the leader of the conservative party through the next campaign. And if the election does not take place too soon it would not be surprising to see Mr. Blake in the front of the battle again on the other side.

-THE activity prevailing among the politicians just now is giving rise to the impression that a general election is likely to take place soon after the present revision of the electoral lists is completed. This might oc-cur in March, and should such be the case the election will come off before the next session of parliament. If report is to be believed the question of the exact time has not yet been considered by the government, with which body the decision lies; so all that is being said about it by the press is but conjecture. Still, the probability of such an event is causing both parties to make active preparations for it, so as not to be taken unawares. In many counties of Ontario candidates have already been selected and an active canvas begun, while in several provinces speakers are actively engaged in enlightening the electors upon

When the fowl is stone cold, but not frozen, remove the band and fold in a square of white cheesecloth, making it as square and compact as possible, pack them in a box or barrel, keeping the shape as intact as you can, and packing solidly. Mark plainly with the name and ad dress of your commission house, and the route you wish the package to go by, if there is more than one, and also your own name and station. Then, it is a prudent precau tion to stand by and see that it gets off on the train all right. A careless agent who

delays to send it on may lose you your mar ket. I must say, however, that I prefer to sell outright in the home market, and let the buyer take the risks of shipment, but I find a nice lot of birds, in shape for quick transmission, will always have the call above an ordinary lot. The second flock I feed just enough to
