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ABOUT the year 1812 the old fur traders, the North West Company,

established a post at the junction of what are now called the North and South Thompson Rivers

The name Kamloops is the Indian equivalent for "Meeting of the Waters." Its excellent water communications and its central position in open country, affording excellent grazing for horses and cattle, commended it, and here the Indians gathered from all parts of the country. Evidently both they and the fur traders had foresight and commercial enterprise.

Some 70 years later the Canadian Pacific Railway engineers, confirming the judgment of their predecessors, selected Kamloops as a divisional point, as did the Canadian Northern Railway engineers still more recently, bringing here another transcontinental railroad.

There are valid reasons why the City will always hold a commanding position in this great province. Kamloops' location geographically has made it the most important city in a very large district. It is 250 miles from Vancouver,

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390 from Calgary, and 540 from Edmonton, with no possible rival between it and those cities.

Kamloops is one of the most progressive cities in the Great West. With a popula-

tion of about 5000, it can boast with pardonable pride of having splendidly kept streets and pavements, with brilliant electric cluster lights on the main thoroughfares. Its trees and boulevards in the residential area, excellent water service and extensive telephone system are all evidence

of progressiveness. In every sense the City can claim to compare well with any other in the

West of anything like similar size, excluding only the two chief Coast centres.

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### Business Buildings and Institutions

Many Government officials, both Federal and Provincial, are located in this "Capital

of the Interior," and there is one beautiful building devoted to governmental work, the Provincial

Court House. The Dominion Government has voted funds for the erection of a new Post Office and other Government quarters. The Canadian Bank of Commerce, Royal Bank of Canada, the Imperial Bank of Canada, and the Bank of Hamilton, as well as the famous Hudson's Bay Co., for their Department Store, have striking modern buildings of their own. The Royal Inland Hospital, Provincial Pioneer Home for Old Men, and the Pro-



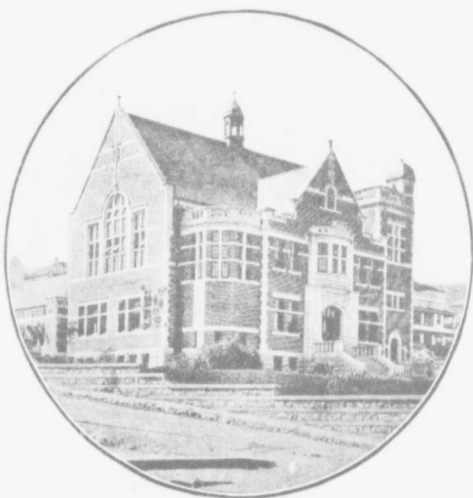

vincial Jail, are three institutions with well kept gardens and lawns, which constitute one of Kamloops' minor attractions.

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The Public and Private Schools are spacious, substantial and thoroughly up-to-date

and there are several conveniently situated Churches in the District.

The community's open spaces cover some 75 acres, and Coronation (or Riverside) Park, on the bank of the South Thompson River, is a charming little spot, containing a fine athletic ground. A block of about 300 acres on the mountain side is likely to be acquired later for conversion into a natural park with magnificent views.

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## Hydro-Electric Power System

In 1912 the City adopted a project to generate power at the Barriere River, some

40 miles north of Kamloops. This

great enterprise has cost close upon \$500,000.

In 1913 a new power house was built, which with

the plant and machinery cost about \$200,000.

At present 2500 horse-power can be generated at

the Barriere River plant, but 6,000 or 7,000

extra horse-power can be added when re-

quired. An additional 2,500 h.p.

is also available from the steam plant, used as an

auxiliary when needed. The City is now pre-

pared to furnish cheap power and light for manu-

facturing, domestic or other purposes. It is

already supply-

ing the Iron Mask Mine with all its power requirements. Farmers all along the main power line and extensions can utilise it

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also for pumping water for irrigation and other purposes.

### City Market

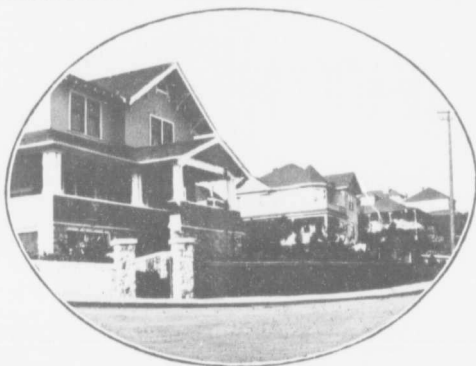
In June, 1914, a public market was

opened on a central site. The plan is similar to that followed in many European towns. The first year's results have proved that the farmers and citizens have both been able to benefit considerably. A Live Stock Market is contemplated

and the recent remount purchases for the army showed that Kamloops is ahead of any point west of Winnipeg for the numbers and quality of horses sold. A Remount Depot may be established here as a result.

### Transportation

There are admirable transportation facilities, both by rail and water. Having the

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Canadian Pacific Railway and the Canadian Northern Railway, two great transcontinental lines, and prospects of a branch of the C.N.R. to the Okanagan District, the City is bound to grow. Another possibility before long is a short line to Clinton, about

60 miles north - west of the City, where connection would be made with the P. G. & E. Line and thus with the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

The building of the C. N. R.'s new branch line, which is already surveyed to Merritt,

would, with a short link of 20 miles, give connection with the Great Northern Railway, making another and shorter line from Kamloops to Seattle.

### Agriculture

The district is one of the finest in the Province for general farming. British Columbia cannot vie with the Prairie Provinces as a great granary, but the finest quality of grain of all kinds can be grown here, not in enormous quantities as on the prairie, but most advantageously for feed-

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ing stock. Since a century ago stock raising had gradually become a considerable industry, until the later influx of settlers led to the ranches being cut up for small farms. With the adoption of scientific methods, farming is becoming more profitable. The Government Departments of Agriculture give advice and much educational work. Those seeking information as to land for settlement should get a copy of the Government's pamphlet just issued at Victoria, B. C., entitled "Kamloops

### Roads

From Kamloops radiating in every direction, are good roads leading up into the highlands, or along the river valleys. These are steadily being improved, and extended for the benefit of settlers. The efforts of the Board of Trade have led to important developments, greatly helping farmers attending the local market. This work will be persistently carried on by the Board, which has been met by the Government in an effective and liberal manner.

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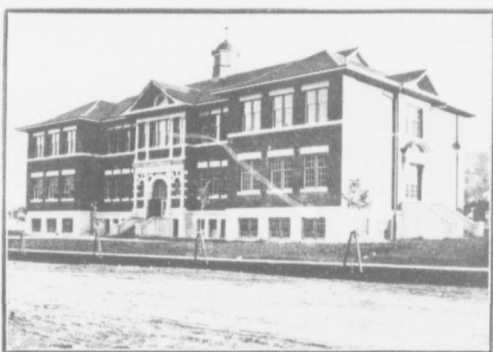
### Lumber

For the moment the lumber industry is in a depressed state following the past two years' reaction, but it will doubtless see

### Mining

Almost every mineral of importance is found within a radius of 50 miles. The copper-gold belt extends over an area of about 20 miles by 6. The Iron Mask Mine is

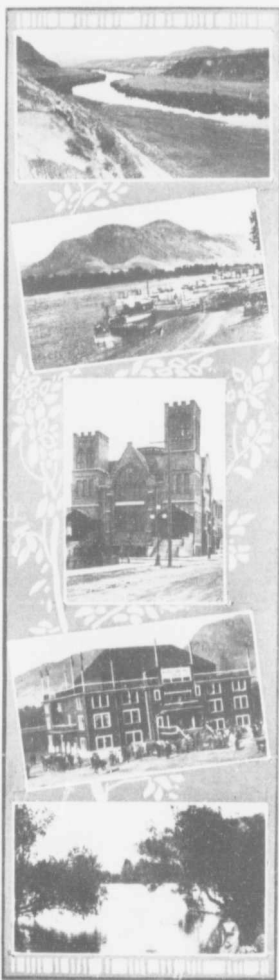
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the furthest developed yet, and, at the 750 foot level, they have struck the richest ore, a large amount being ready for treatment. Iron, silver, lead, zinc, cinnabar, coal, etc., all abound. The Glen Mine has a good body of magnetite ore. This important factor in smelter work would be very valuable to a local concern. Cheap power and fuel being available, all that is needed is work on a scale large enough to minimise costs.

### Industries, etc.

Manufacturing is in its infancy, but there exist a large brick yard, two lumber and planing mills (shut down temporarily at present), a brewery, ice and cold storage plant, bottling works, machine shops and foundry, automobile agencies, garage, etc., cigar factories, sash and door factory, as well as that valuable adjunct to modern life,

The man with small means, but thrift and intelligence, can make a comfortable

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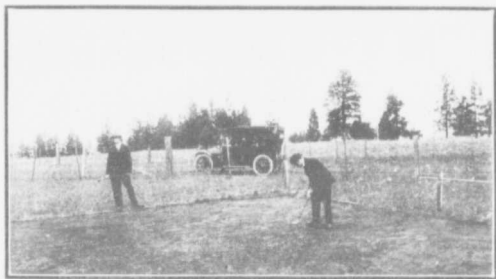
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living. Desirable land close to the City can be had in small plots, nearly all under irrigation, which is essential to success.

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### Sports and Pastimes

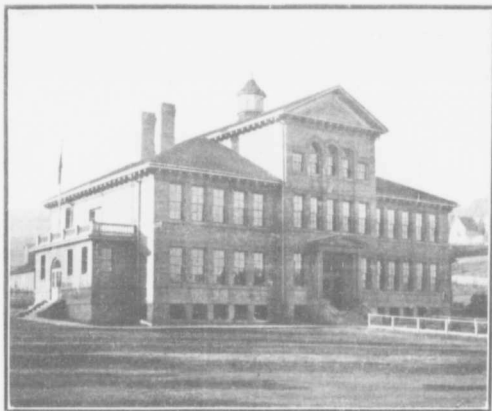
Sports of all kinds are popular as in most British centres, and Polo, Golf, Cricket, Baseball, Football, Lacrosse, Tennis, Bowl-

Good trolling can be had for salmon-trout, rainbow and Kamloops trout, and other fish are plentiful in the numerous lakes and streams nearby. Good accommodation and fishing outfits can be obtained easily.

### Climate

The climate of Kamloops is a wonderful asset. No spot on this continent is more delightful, invigorating and healthful all the year round. The seasons are even and temperate, and the air so pure and healthful, dry and sunny, that the district has world-renown as a resort for invalids.



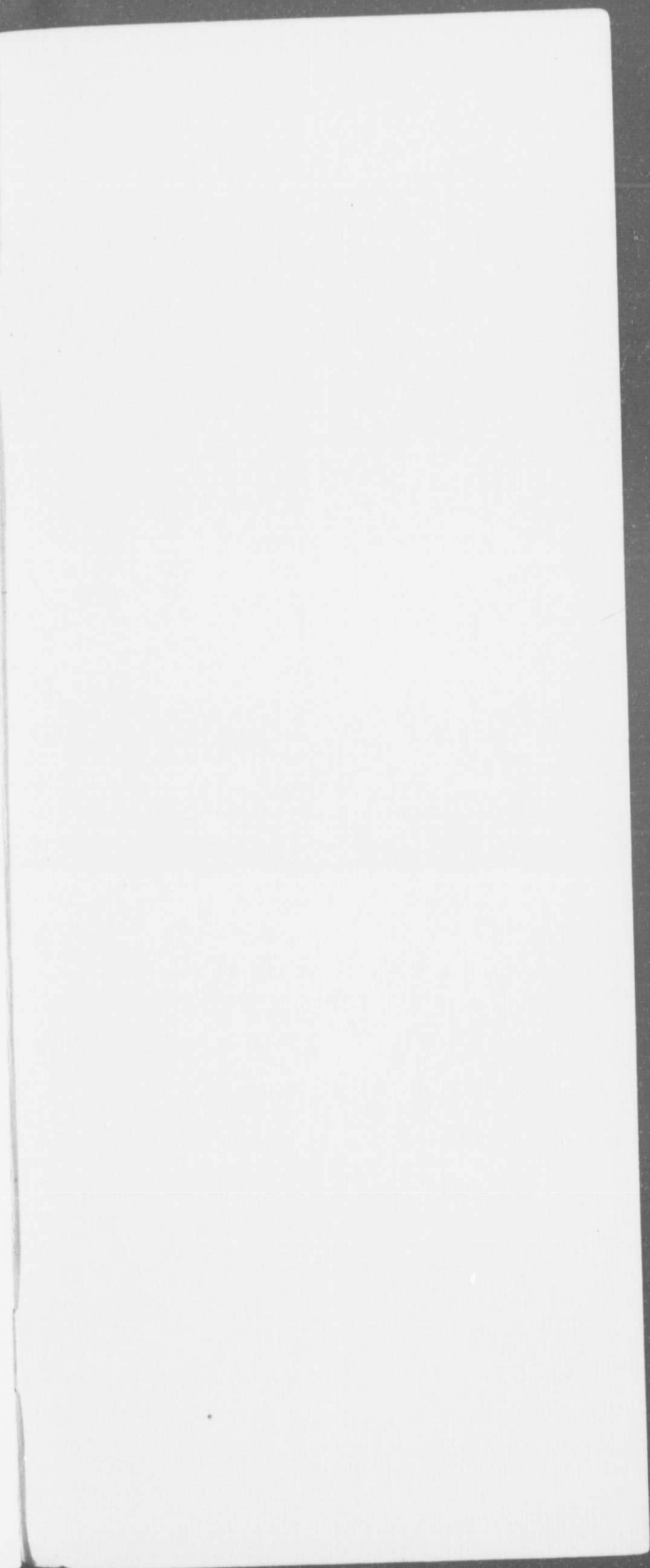

### Tranquille Sanitorium

The famous King Edward Sanitorium, for the treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis, is at Tranquille, nine miles west of Kamloops, where the Thompson River flows into Kamloops Lake. It has accommodation for about 100 patients. The number seeking admission has unfortunately outgrown its capacity, but active steps are now being taken to remedy this.
