Moved by Mr. Ault, seconded by Mr. Harkness, that the Council proceed to elect a Treasurer by ballot for the United Counties for the current year.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Harkness, seconded by Mr. Alex. A. Stewart, that Mr. C. J. Mattice be Treasurer.

Moved by Mr. Connelley, seconded by Mr. Kerans, that Mr. Chas. Wagner be Treasurer.

Moved by Mr. Mulhern, seconded by Mr. McArthur, that Mr. Angus S. Macdonald be Treasurer.

Moved by Mr. Myers, seconded by Dr. Hamilton, that Mr. Cline be Treasurer. The Warden appointed Mr. Harkness and Mr. Bennett scrutineers.

SECOND DAY.

CORNWALL, January 25th, 1888.

The Council met.

Warden in the chair.

All the members present.

Minutes read and confirmed.

Communications were received and read as follows:

Moved by Mr. Bennett, seconded by Mr. P. A. Stewart, that D. R. Brown be appointed County Engineer for the current year.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. A. R. McDonald, seconded by Dr. Steacy, that the Warden leave the chair until 7 p. m. to give time for committees to work.—Carried.

The Report was adopted in Council, and the By-Law was read a third time and passed.

Upon motion of Mr. Harkness, agreeably to notice given, seconded by Mr. Coons, By-Law No. 831, to fill vacancies in the Nation River Drainage Committee, was read a first and second times and referred to Committee of the Whole.

Mr. A. R. McDonald in the chair. The Committee rose, presented the By-Law, with blanks filled.

Upon motion of Mr. Collison, seconded by Mr. Banford, was read a third time, passed and signed.

Upon motion of Mr. A. R. McDonald, seconded by Mr. McDermid, By-Law No. 833, for the appointment of High School Trustees, was read a first and second times and referred to a Committee of the Whole.

Mr. Redmond in the chair. Committee rose and presented By-Law, with blanks filled.

Upon motion of Mr. Bennett, seconded by Mr. Fraser, the By-Law was read a third time, passed and signed.

Upon motion of Mr. Ault, seconded by Mr. Coulthart, By-Law No. 832, appointing a Board of Audit, was read a first and second times, and referred to a Committee of the Whole.

Mr. Warner in the chair. Committee rose and presented the By-Law, with blanks filled.

Upon motion of Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. McIntosh, the By-Law was read a third time passed and signed.

Mr. Campbell gives notice that he will, to-morrow, ask leave to introduce a By-Law to appoint Preventive Officers.

Upon motion of Mr. Bennett, seconded by Mr. McIntosh, the Warden left the chair till 2 p.m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Council resumed. Warden in the chair. P. A. Stewart, Chairman of the County Property Committee, presented their Report.

The Report was, upon motion, referred to a Committee of the Whole.

J. Coulthart in the chair. The Committee rose, recommended the adoption of the report.

Upon motion of Mr. Cameron, seconded by Mr. Leclair, the Report was adopted.

The Warden appointed Mr. L. A. Ross associate County Auditor for the current year.

Dr. Steacy, Chairman of the Special Committee, re Canada Temperance Act, presented their Report.

Upon motion of Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Dr. Steacy, the Report was referred to a Committee of the Whole.

Mr. Hunter in the chair.

Committee rose, recommending the Report, with the additional clause added thereto, that the payment of half the fines to the private prosecutor be rescinded.

Upon motion of Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. Hunter, the Report as amended was adopted.

Moved by Mr. McDonald, seconded by Mr. Harkness, that Section 33 of By-Law affecting the Rules of Council be suspended, and that a By-Law, appointing three Valuers to equalize the assessment for County purposes in the different municipalities of these Counties, be read a first time and referred to a Committee of the Whole.

Moved in amendment by Dr. Steacy, seconded by Mr. Patton, that a special committee, consisting of Messrs. Bennett, J. J. McIntosh, McRae, McArthur, Col-lison, T. E. Coulthart, A. R. McDonald, P. A. Stewart, G. H. Whittaker, Fraser, the mover and seconder, be appointed to devise a scheme for the more satisfactory equalization of the assessment, and report before the close of the present session.—Amendment carried.

Moved by Mr. Harkness, seconded by Mr. Ault, that a Special Committee, consisting of the Warden, and Messrs. McArthur, A. R. McDonald, the mover and seconder, be appointed, with instructions to take such action as may be necessary to ensure payment at an early day, of all sums due by the late Treasurer, Aeneas Macdonald, and his sureties, and that the Committee be authorized to act during the interval between this and the June session, it being understood that should any action be taken by the Committee before the close of the present session that the same shall be submitted to the Council for its approval.—Carried.

Upon motion of Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. McIntosh, the Warden left the chair till 7 p.m.

Your committee recommend that a By-Law be introduced appointing a committee, composed of A. R. McDonald, George Elder, D. H. McDermid, Reeve and Deputy Reeves of Charlottenburgh; D. Cameron, D. A. McRae, and Alex. Leclair, Reeve and Deputy Reeves of Lancaster respectively; and D. A. McArthur, Reeve of Alexandria, to deal with the whole matter according to the provisions of the Consolidated Municipal Act of 1883 and amendments thereto.

SIR.—In accordance with your instructions I have had an instrumental survey and examination made by Mr. C. G. Horetzky of this department, of a portion of the River Beaudette in order to ascertain the extent of the improvements which would require to be made to allow the water in time of freshets to escape, and thereby prevent the low-lying lands bordering on the stream between McLennan's mill, on Lot 19, con. 7, Lancaester, and Munro's mill, on Lot 27, con. 8, Charlottentown, a distance of about 14 or 15 miles, from being kept submerged for a sufficient length of time each year, to render large portions of them practically valueless, and also to enable me to give an approximate estimate of the cost of the work.

A traverse of that portion of the river between McLennan's mill and Lot 22 of Lancaester, was made and levels taken between these points, also an examination of the valley of the river as far as Munro's mills, in order to obtain an approximate knowledge of the area affected by freshets, as well as of the extent of country drained by the river from the headwaters down to McLennan's mill, and from the information thus obtained have to report as follows:

The extent of area drained by the river may be roughly estimated at 25,000 acres, and from careful enquiry and observation it has been found that the quantity of land which is actually kept submerged during a portion of the spring and early summer months may be placed at from 800 to 900 acres, or in other words that a strip of 300 feet in width on each side of the river, from Lot 22, Lancaester, up to Munro's Mills in Charlottentown, would roughly indicate the area of flooded lands.

The greater area of drainage appears to occur from about Lot 23 to 28, Charlottentown, but of course the submerged portions are irregularly disposed, and it would therefore necessitate the expenditure of much time and labor to give an exact estimate.

I find that the improvements which require to be made to relieve the affected lands consist of the removal of McLennan's mill-dam and the excavation of a sufficient channel through a series of shoals, formed principally of earth, gravel and boulders, which obstruct the stream from the dam to Lot 22, Lancaester, a distance of about 11,000 feet.

The crest of the dam at McLennan's Mill was found to be at the same level as the water 4,400 feet higher up the stream, and only 1,60 feet lower than the surface of the stream at 11,400 feet above the mill, and I understand that dash boards are annually put on to further obstruct the passage of the water.

The profile of the river shows a descent of 53 feet in a distance of 11,400 feet between the mill-dam and the dividing line between Lots 21 and 22 of Lancaester, which is equivalent to an even grade of 0.48 per 100 feet.

The first rapid is situated 2,100 feet above the dam, and thence up to 6,748 feet the river is more or less obstructed by boulders, while at the first rapid there is a horizontal limestone bed, about 400 feet in length, which would require to be blasted in order to enable it to be removed.

The river above Lot 22 is generally deeper than below, but the course is tortuous and the current sluggish, consequently the originally deep channel has gradually filled up with

alluvium, rank vegetation and sunken drift-wood.

After careful consideration of the matter I am of the opinion that if the mill-dam were removed and the channel excavated to a bottom width of 10 feet, with side slopes 1 1/2 feet horizontal to one foot vertical and a regular fall of 0.048 feet per 100 from the present bed of the river at the easterly boundary of Lot 22, Lancaester, to the mill-dam, a distance of 11,400 feet, the loss and inconvenience now annually experienced would be greatly lessened if not entirely done away with.

As I estimate, the cost of the work, exclusive of the removal of the mill-dam, would be about \$4,500.

GENTLEMEN.—According to your request I have examined and taken levels of the River Beaudette, from McLennan's mills on Lot No. 18, to the centre of Lot 22 in the 7th Concession of the Township of Lancaester, a distance of 12,550 feet. The stream is very crooked, as you will perceive by the distance travelled on these lots. I find that the mill-dam is nearly as high as the rapids, and the water-mark on the sidewall of the dam (where it has been kept up by head-boards) is about 3 1/2 feet higher than the dam. If the water could be kept down to the level of the dam the drainage could be improved to the extent of about one foot, but when there is much water flowing over the dam, or with head-boards on, there can be no improvement made. There is about 8-feet fall between the highest point of the rapids and the bed of the river 200 feet west of dam. If the dam was removed this would give good drainage, but it would involve some cutting of rock, there being about 400 feet of it lying at a distance of 2,600 feet from the dam. I have made an estimate for a level ditch to commence by clearing off a little loose rock and extending up the stream through all the rapids to the centre of Lot No. 22 where there is near three feet of water. Proposed ditch to be six feet wide at bottom with slopes on each side of one and one-half feet horizontal to one foot in depth, and it will reduce the present level of the water something more than three feet. This would give good drainage at ordinary times, but in case of a high summer flood there is no doubt but it would make a better job if the rock was cut and the ditch extended further down the river. From what I have seen and heard I believe that there is clear water standing in the river from the centre of Lot 21 in the 7th concession Lancaester, westerly through the balance of the Township of Lancaester, and that part of Charlottentown which requires this outlet for drainage. The channel will require cleaning and deepening in some places, but the expense cannot be very great.

Report of County Property Committee.

Your Committee beg leave to report that they have examined the gaol and offices and find all in good order and comfortable for the occupants.

In conformity with our report of 20th October last, the Clerk has caused glass to be placed in the upper panels of the door at the head of the stairs leading to the basement, thereby contributing much to the safety of persons using said stairs. He has also prepared, as required by said above quoted report, a schedule of all furniture and other effects in the respective offices being county property, which schedule he has placed on record in one of the books of the corporation.

Your committee find that there is not that accommodation in the Treasurer's office which is necessary to assure the safety and care of the books and papers therein, and would recommend that proper shelving be placed in the vault for that purpose.

Your Committee also find that the room formerly allotted to the Public School Inspectors, is not suitable, owing to its being required frequently for other purposes, thereby rendering it often necessary for the Inspectors to remove their books and papers elsewhere in order to go on with their work, and we would recommend that the Inspector be allowed to occupy, conjointly with our Clerk, the room at present used by the Clerk.

Your Committee also find that as the mains from the Court House furnace are at present in an uncovered state, there is too much heat in the closet room in the basement, thereby causing a waste of fuel and an injury to the room, and would recommend that said mains be covered with asbestos, thereby ensuring a more equitable distribution of heat in the different rooms and offices, especially in the gaol.

Your Committee have had their attention directed to a storm-door at the entrance to the Court House, and beg to express the opinion that the material and workmanship are not

of such a nature as to warrant the payment of so large a sum as that demanded by the contractor.

Your Committee would recommend that all repairs mentioned in this report be done under the supervision of the Treasurer.

Your Committee would also recommend that immediate steps be taken to remove to an asylum the three insane females at present in the gaol here.

Report of the Drainage Committee.

To the Warden and Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

GENTLEMEN.—The Committee that had in charge the work on the Nation River beg leave to report:

That the work commenced this season about the 21st of May, and was prosecuted continuously until about the middle of December, when the dredging in the Nation River was completed. The work in the Branch that was passed over in 1885 was recommenced, and all but 292 yards completed, so that now the Engineer reports the contract completed, except this in the Branch and some trimming at Cass' Bridge, which he thinks the contractors should not be held responsible for, and recommends that should they so desire they be released from their contract and paid in full for work done. The total number of yards excavated during the season is 35,780—estimates having been given for the whole of this, and orders issued for all but 123 yards.

Estimates for 329 yards of rock have also been given by the Engineer, and also a recommendation to pay six hundred dollars to the contractors for widening the cuts at the ends of Barrigar's, Gray's, and Marsell's rapids. A portion of the percentage, amounting to \$483.26, yet remains unpaid.

The contractors also claim that the profile and specifications, according to which they worked, were more difficult than the plans attached to the contract, and claim as compensation for the difference, at least six thousand dollars. This claim your committee, though very desirous of amicably arranging any difference with the contractors, could not entertain for a moment. And it is feared that that arbitration, as provided for in the contract, will have to be resorted to, and we would recommend that power be given to the committee to appoint an arbitrator should such action be found necessary.

We herewith submit a detailed statement of receipts and expenditures to date. They are as follows:

There is still unpaid of the grant made by the Dominion Government, \$1,000.

As the contractors are yet unsettled with, it is impossible to say how much money may be required to meet the obligations of the council and to avoid amending the by-law more than once. Your committee would recommend that the Warden and Treasurer be authorized to renew the Notes discounted, and to borrow such further sum as may be necessary to liquidate our present liabilities and provide for the expenses of the arbitration should one be necessary, and that a by-law be passed accordingly.

Your committee beg further to say the removal of the dam and the lowering of the shoal at Chesterville formed part of this work as first contemplated, and was included in the survey and plans on which the contract was based, and was not provided for in the by-law only because it was understood that it would be removed by the Dominion Government. As this, for reasons assigned in an opinion

given by the Deputy Minister of Justice, bearing date Dec. 10, 1883, was not done, it now becomes necessary for the council to deal with it if the people interested are to derive a compensating benefit for the large sacrifices made.

Feeling the importance of the undertaking and the necessity of proceeding with care, your committee have consulted B. H. Osier, Q. C., with reference to the rights of the owners of the dam, the powers of the council in regard to its removal, and the proceedings necessary to effect that object. He has given his opinion in writing, a copy of which is herewith submitted. In that among other things, he says: "The information received by me from Mr. Harkness, and the consideration of the various documents produced to me by him, shew that the removal of this dam is part of the work contemplated by the by-law No. 738. And I am of opinion that the council can proceed under that by-law to remove the dam. If any dispute arises as to its value such dispute would come under the provisions of 591, and the damages to be ascertained would be by arbitration, under the provisions of section 393. Should further funds be required for the prosecution of the work the council can proceed under section 574. The expropriation proceedings should be taken under the direction of the Solicitor. From the plan produced to me I should presume that no further survey is necessary, and the only new by-law would have reference to providing means for the completion of the work."

He also says that the dam is subject to this limitation in its use: "That water cannot be pressed back by it so as to flood any public highway or road allowance." And also that on ascertaining "The amount of compensation to be paid by the arbitrators and in fixing the sum to be offered by the county council as compensation, it must be borne in mind that the owner's rights will be of little value if he cannot utilize the dam without pressing back water on the highway."

The report of Mr. McGeorge, the Engineer in charge of these works, dated at Chatham, 27th Oct., 1885, and printed in the minutes of that year, page 49, shows that the top of the dam is actually higher than the bottom of the cutting in the river at Cass' Bridge, some six miles up stream, and that when the wash-boards are on it leave between eight and ten miles in which there is no fall. He also says: "The dam is a very great cause of the flooding and damage to the low lands along the river," and recommends its removal.

We might add further that Mr. John E. Boyd, Engineer, who made an examination of the river in 1882, was so strongly impressed with the importance of the removal of the dam, even before there was any dredging done in the river west of it, that in his report to the Minister of Public Works, Ottawa, dated 5th August, 1882, he said: "The removal of the Chesterville dam would, I believe, remove all danger of summer floods and give immediate relief to the district affected."

Your committee would therefore recommend that the dam be removed by this council, and that the committee be instructed to take such steps, with the advice of their Solicitor, as may be necessary to effect the desired purpose and enable the council to pass a by-law at its June session to provide for the work should it be found necessary for the efficiency of the work that the dam should be removed.

A By-Law will be submitted to cover the above appointments and salaries.

Your committee passed accounts amounting to \$470.15, payment of which will be covered by By-Law.

It may possibly be 6 to 12 months before the amount due by ex-Treasurer can be collected, so that the probable amount of liabilities of the counties to be at once provided for is, say about \$14,000, to cover the deficiency and running expenses of the year, so that it would be advisable to issue debentures for a sum large enough to cover immediate and prospective wants. And we hereby instruct the Warden and Treasurer to prepare a legal By-Law for the issue of Debentures to the extent of \$14,000, to be spread over 20 years, to be paid in annual payments, and that a special levy be made on the several municipalities within the United Counties, based on the then last revised assessment rolls, to be collected with the county rates each year. As it is too late to prepare said By-Law for adoption at this session, that it be made complete and ready for the June session, and that a By-Law be now adopted authorizing the Warden and Treasurer to borrow from the Bank of Montreal, on notes, sufficient with the county rates coming in, to renew our notes as they mature till the June session.

The Auditors report great irregularity and carelessness on the part of many of the municipalities paying to the Treasurer the county rates, thereby increasing our interest account. It is therefore only fair that the Treasurer be, and he is hereby authorized, to keep an interest account with the municipalities in arrears, and on all monies due after the 1st day of March in each year, interest at the rate of eight per cent. be charged and collected with any overdue balance, and that the Clerk notify the Treasurer of each municipality to that effect.

Your committee recommend, and hereby instruct, the Treasurer, during the interval of sessions, to pay our Gas account when due and take the usual prompt payment discounts, and also to pay the small wood bills when certified to by the Sheriff.

Your committee also note that the Treasurer deposit daily in Bank of Montreal, any money he may have received, to the credit of the counties, and that the Auditors make check audits quarterly or monthly.

The Treasurer has offered as securities, each in two thousand dollars, Wm. Calquhoun, Nelson Turner, John McPhee, Donald McDonell (Ballif), and Patrick Denney, and himself in the sum of ten thousand dollars. The bond will be presented to the Council for consideration and acceptance.

Your Committee, appointed by By-Law No. 836 passed at the January session in Re River Beaudette Improvements, report as follows:

All the members present.

Your Committee met at Green Valley, in the township of Lancaster, on the 7th June, 1888, where they met a number of interested parties and, after some discussion with reference to the removal of the mill dam on Lot No. 19, 7th Concession Lancaster, a committee composed of D. Cameron, Reeve of Lancaster, James Rayside, Esq., M. P. P., D. A. McRae, Deputy-Reeve of Lancaster, D. A. McArthur, Reeve of Alexandria, and Alexander Leclair, Deputy-Reeve of Lancaster, was appointed to

wait upon Messrs. McLennan and family for the purpose of endeavoring to arrive at an understanding with reference to the removal of said dam and to agree upon the compensation to be paid for said same. Mr. Rayside and Mr. Leclair had an interview with the owners of the dam, at their premises, and, after a considerable discussion, offered on behalf of the Committee the sum of \$1800, which was not then accepted. On the 10th Inst. the McLennans agreed with the Chairman of this Committee to accept the sum of \$1800, which was accepted, and a written memorandum of agreement was made agreeing to convey all the property in the dam to this Committee.

Your Committee recommend that a By-Law be passed empowering the Committee to employ an Engineer to make an assessment on all the lands to be benefitted, from Lot 27, 8th Concession of Charlottenburgh to Lot No. 1, both inclusive; also from Lot 19, 7th Concession of the Township of Lancaster to Lot No. 38, both inclusive, all expenses to be charged to the lands to be benefitted by the proposed improvements.

**The Select Standing Committee on County
Property Beg Leave to Report as Fol-
lows:**

Your Committee have examined the gar-
den and offices and find all in a generally good
condition and fairly suitable for the require-
ments of the occupants. In conformity with
our Report of the 26th January last, the Treas-
urer's office has been fitted up with shelves,
pigeon-holes, etc., thus rendering the books
and papers easy of access by the Treasurer and
less subject to wear and tear than formerly.

The mains from the Court House furnace
have also been covered with asbestos cloth,
as recommended by said Report, and your
Committee are informed that a more uniform
distribution of heat and a saving of fuel has
resulted therefrom.

Your Committee notice that there is a break
in the plastering of the ceiling in the Council
Chamber and would recommend that a venti-
lator similar to the one now in the ceiling be
placed in said break, and that the balance of
the said broken ceiling, around said venti-
lator, be plastered and tinted in a proper and
substantial manner, so as to conform in ap-
pearance to the other part of the ceiling.
Part of the plaster is also detached from the
ceiling of the Turnkey's room and your Com-
mittee would recommend that it be repaired
and would suggest as a method of doing so
that the plaster be all removed from the ceil-
ing of the room and that pine lumber of one
inch in thickness and grooved and planed be
substituted therefor and afterwards properly
painted.

Your Committee also find that there is an
aged woman called Betsy Grant, from the
Township of Charlottenburgh, confined in the
cells, being a destitute person but of sound
mind, and your Committee are of opinion
that such persons should be cared for by the
municipalities to which they belong, and
would recommend that the necessary steps
be taken to have said person removed and

provided for in accordance with the above
expressed opinion.

Your Committee have had their attention
directed by the caretaker to the injury done
to the building and furniture by a leakage of
water in his rooms and hall in the basement
caused by condensation on the outside of the
cold water pipe passing through said rooms
and hall, and find that said leakage has been
remedied in one room by placing a tin trough
or spout under said cold water pipe to convey
the leakage water to a proper receptacle,
which can be emptied from time to time, and
your Committee would recommend that the
balance of said cold water pipe in the hall
and closet room be protected in a similar
manner. Your Committee believe that the
cost of doing so will be small and yet suf-
ficiently effective to remedy the trouble com-
plained of, which will likely occur only at
certain seasons and under certain tempera-
tures. Your Committee would recommend
that the repairs enumerated in this report be
done under the supervision of C. J. Mat-
tice, Esq.

An application for permission to erect a
band stand on the grounds in front of the
County Buildings having been referred to
your Committee for the purpose of reporting
upon the advisability of granting said per-
mission, the Committee, after mature con-
sideration of the reasons for and against, have
decided not to recommend the granting of the
permission asked for.

Your Committee recommend that a By-
Law be passed authorizing the renewal of the
Bills Payable until the October Session, when
they will be partly reduced by the amount

payable on account Treasurer's deficit, and the amount of the Nation River Drainage is covered by debentures.

For the purposes of the County Expenditure an estimate, based upon an average of the past three years, shows that about \$125.55 is required, and to this will have to be added this year the extra expense of say \$500 in connection with the defalcation of the late Treasurer's.

Your Committee would recommend that the sum of \$12,000 be levied this year to meet County expenditures, that with other receipts from Licenses, Jury Fund, etc., will cover sum needed.

It is hoped and expected, without increasing the levy and by due carefulness as to future expenditure, the Counties will within a short time be free from all indebtedness, and that without the expense of issuing the debentures thought at our last meeting to be necessary.

As about \$10,000 of our assets are not available and to save interest in increased discounts, it is recommended by your Committee that the sum of \$5,000, now lying to the credit of the Canada Temperance Act, be by a By-Law transferred to the general account of the Counties at the rate of 4 per cent. interest, until the meeting of the October Session when the Council will be in a position to finally deal with this account.

Your Committee, therefore, recommend for adoption the accompanying By-Laws to give power to the Treasurer and Warden to renew with the Banks notes maturing till October Session, and to make the transfer of the \$5,000 at C. T. Act fines.

Report of Special Committee Re Defalcation of ex-Treasurer, Eneas McDonald.

Members all present.
Immediately after the adjournment in January, your Committee instructed James Dingwall, Esq., Barrister, to proceed against the ex-Treasurer and his sureties for the amount shown from an examination of his books by the Auditors to be due by him to the Counties, and to enter suit so as to have the matter determined at the Chancery Sittings in April. Proceedings were taken as directed, and judgment obtained against the ex-Treasurer for the full amount claimed on, viz. \$4,187.45, being principal and interest on the apparent deficit, no defence being put in. The sureties, however, defended, and before the case came up for hearing our Treasurer, Mr. Matlock, had discovered a discrepancy between the payments made by the Ontario Government on account of Criminal Justice and the receipts as shown in the ex-Treasurer's books.

He at once communicated with the Provincial Treasurer and found that from 1882 to 1887 McDonald had received \$1,409.35 for which he had given no credit. He also found that it appeared from the books that in March 1886 an entry of \$1,586.43 had been made in the cash book and subsequently erased and the smaller sum of \$285.81 substituted, this latter sum being a subsequent payment.

The actions against the sureties for the acknowledged deficiency were at once stayed and arrangements made for a professional accountant to go over the books, from the time the Treasurer first had to do with them, and also instructions given to the Treasurer to

get as full as possible from the Local Treasurer, statement of amounts paid in by the different Townships. This was done with a view of getting at further defalcations, which were suspected, and also to enable the Council the better to prove their claim in Court, should that be necessary.

Warrants were also sworn out against McDonald for forgery and embezzlement.

He, at that time, was in Canada and was traced to Belleville. It was expected that he would return to Cornwall in a day or two, when he would have been arrested. But he is supposed to have got information of what was going on and fled to the American side of the river. It was then decided by the Committee to make an effort to effect his arrest and extradition, and the services of J. W. Murray, Ontario County Detective, were procured, and the fugitive taken to St. Paul and arrested.

In the meantime Mr. Pilmsoil of Montreal who had been employed on the books, had learned that in 1877 and every subsequent year, until the ex-Treasurer fled, more or less money had been received and had not been entered in the books and that in some instances figures had been changed after being entered.

At this stage of proceedings it became apparent that it might be possible to effect an arrangement with the sureties that would save enormous cost, that was likely to result from prosecuting six or seven defendant suits, and yet save the Counties from actual loss.

A conference was arranged between Messrs. Colquhoun, Leitich and Ross, sureties, and Mr. James Dingwall and the Chairman of your Committee, and held on June 8, at which it was agreed that judgment be taken by the Council against Eneas McDonald and against his sureties, in separate actions, for the amount due by him, and against the estate of R. McDonald, late Treasurer, and against his sureties, in separate actions, for the amount due by him with interest, and that in view of sureties settling without defending suits, the Council forego the interest so far occurred and accept payment of the judgment for the principal, and as follows: \$4,000 on 1st October, 1888, and the balance, \$10,215.50, in two equal annual instalments payable 1st October, 1889 and 1st October, 1890, without interest.

It was agreed also that this arrangement should be subject to approval of Committee and a meeting of Committee was called for the 12th June, inst.

At which meeting resolutions approving the agreement were passed.

A copy of the proceedings of that meeting is hereto appended, also copies of the Report of Mr. Pilmsoil. Judgments have been procured and executions taken out against Messrs. Leitich, Ross and Colquhoun for the principal due by the ex-Treasurer, Eneas McDonald, and against Messrs. Colquhoun and McIntyre for the principal due by his father, and against Eneas McDonald and against the estate of the late Dr. McDonald

for the amount due from each, principal and interest.

The judgment against the sureties being ample security for the payment of the principal sums as agreed on, your Committee recommend that the judgments against Eneas McDonald and against the estate of the Dr. R. McDonald be assigned to Messrs. Colquhoun, Ross and Letch, sureties, in consideration of their paying the \$1,215.51, as agreed on, the judgments and executions against the sureties being held in the meantime as security for the payment of such sums, and the assigned judgments to be used by assignees at their own risk.

We would also recommend that a By-Law giving effect to the foregoing recommendations be passed.

Re Nation River Drainage Report.

To the Warden and Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

On the 30th January last, the Committee paid the contractors \$1195.85, the balance due on excavation as shown by the January Report, and on the 11th February following \$600, the engineers' estimate of the value of the widening of the cut at the lower end of Rapid No. 9 and at the upper end of Rapid No. 7 and 8. But though meetings of Committee were held on February 10-11, and again on the 27th, at which the contractors were represented, no agreement was reached as to the compensation to be given to the contractors, either for disturbance in Branch in 1887 or for the shallowness and greater length of cuttings as compared with those shown on the plan. At a meeting at South Mountain, however, held on the 28th February, at which all the members except Mr. Ault were present, it was moved by Geo. Steacy, and seconded by R. B. Fulton, that the sum of \$1,500 be placed to the credit of Whitebread and Clancy, contractors, in the Molson's Bank, Morrisburgh, to apply on Nation River drainage.

This was carried on the understanding that no further action would be taken by either of the parties for a time, in the hope that arrangements might be made for more fully completing the work as at first contemplated and in any event that more time be given for consideration and negotiation.

No further action was taken until the 14th May, when a meeting was held in Brockville at which were present all the members except Mr. Whitaker.

Previous to the calling of this meeting a large deputation from the Townships of Matilda, Williamsburgh, Winchester and Mountain had waited on the Minister of Public Works, at Ottawa, and asked for further aid to the work and the Chairman had been notified, by telegram from Dr. Hekey, that \$5,000 in addition to a re-vote of \$1,000 had been granted.

It was to determine on the action to be taken by the Committee under the altered circumstances caused by this grant as well as to settle with the contractors that this meeting was called. The matter of the contractors was first taken up and no agreement reached, when it was moved by Mr. Ault, seconded by Mr. Fulton, that a further sum of \$1,200 be placed to the credit of Whitebread & Clancy,

at Molson's Bank, Morrisburgh, it being understood and agreed that no further claim be made on the Committee for any extra work due to change of plans, and that the contractors will complete the work at Cass's Bridge, in accordance with agreement, and also any other part of the work that may not be fully up to the mark, receiving nothing therefor unless at discretion of Committee.

This was carried, and the contractors signed receipt in accordance with conditions stated.

It was then moved by Dr. Steacy, seconded by I. R. Ault, that, as the Dominion Government increased their grant of \$3,000 by \$5,000 (making in all \$8,000) on condition that the work be fully completed as originally intended, therefore be it resolved that steps be taken for the removal of Chesterville dam in accordance with the grant thus given, and as contemplated in the whole scheme of the Nation River drainage.

This was also carried, and the engineer in charge was instructed to prepare a profile showing the position of the excavations with reference to the dam, to enable the Council to see the more easily the necessity for its removal. The profile is herewith submitted, also a report from the engineer from which it will be seen that forty per cent. of the excavations are below the level of the top of the dam with headboards on and more than 25 per cent. below the top of the dam without headboards.

An understanding was also arrived at between the Committee and Mr. Whitebread to the effect that the dredge be left in the river until this meeting of Council, after which it was supposed the work would recommence.

Your Committee beg further to report that the new grant from the Dominion Government has proved to be \$4,000 instead of \$3,000, as first supposed, and that it is meant not to cover present obligations but to assist in completing the work.

In view, therefore, of the fact that the removal of the dam and lowering of the shoal at Chesterville formed part of the work contemplated by the By-Law and the petition on which the By-Law was based, and is necessary to complete the work, your Committee would recommend that the dam be removed and the shoal lowered, and that the necessary steps be taken to arrange with the owners of the property affected thereby by arbitration or otherwise, as may be found practicable.

By-Law No. 850.

By-Law of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry for licensing, regu- lating and governing Hawkers or petty Chapmen, and other persons carrying on petty trades.

Be it enacted a By-Law of the Municipal Council of the United Counties of Stormont,

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Council
Warden.

Dundas and Glengarry, as follows:

1st. That from and after the passing of this By-Law the following By-Laws of these United Counties shall be, and the same are hereby repealed, that is to say By-Laws 517, 573, 628, 719, 761, and 773, and all other By-Laws and parts of By-Laws relating to the matters herein enacted.

2nd. That any Hawker, Pedlar, Petty Chapman or other person carrying on any petty trade, or who go from place to place or to other men's houses, on foot or with any animal, bearing or drawing any goods, wares or merchandise for sale, or in or with any boat, vessel or other craft, or otherwise carrying goods, wares or merchandise for sale, shall only exercise such calling within these Counties after having first taken out a license therefor as hereinafter provided.

3rd. That the word "Hawkers" shall include all persons who, being agents for persons not resident within these Counties, sell or offer for sale, lay, dry goods or jewelry, or carry or expose samples or patterns of any such goods to be afterwards delivered within the Counties to any person not being a wholesale or retail dealer in such goods, wares or merchandise.

4th. Provided always that no such license shall be required for hawking, peddling, or selling from any vehicle or conveyance any goods, wares, or merchandise to any retail dealer, or for hawking or peddling any goods, wares or merchandise, the growth, product or manufacture of this Province, not being liquors within the meaning of the law relating to taverns or tavern licenses, if the same are being hawked or peddled by the manufacturer or producer of such goods, wares or merchandise, or by his bona fide servants or employees having written authority in that behalf, and such servant or employee shall produce and exhibit his written authority, when required so to do by any municipal or peace officer.

5th. That license fees shall first be paid for to the Treasurer of these United Counties, for which the Treasurer shall grant a receipt, and which said receipt shall be presented to the Clerk of the Counties, who shall forthwith issue the required license.

6th. That the sums to be paid for licenses shall be as follows:

(A). For every person travelling on foot as aforesaid, the sum of Twenty Dollars.

(B). For every person travelling with one horse, or other animal, the sum of Twenty-five dollars.

(C). For every person travelling with two horses, or other animals, the sum of Forty Dollars.

(D). For every person travelling in or with any decked boat, vessel or craft, the sum of Eighty Dollars.

(E). For any person travelling in any open boat, vessel or other craft, the sum of Fifty Dollars.

7th. That each such license so granted shall not be for less than one year, and shall be in force for one year from date thereof and no longer.

8th. That the County Clerk shall keep a proper record of all such licenses so granted.

9th. That the terms "Goods, Wares or Merchandise" shall not be held to include printed books, maps or charts, provided that said books, maps or charts are not of immemorial character.

10th. That every Hawker and Pedlar shall exhibit his license when required so to do by the Municipal or Peace officer.

11th. That any person or persons guilty of any infraction of any of the provisions of this By-Law shall, upon conviction thereof before any Justice or Justices of the Peace for the said United Counties or of the Municipality in which the offence was committed, forfeit and pay, at the discretion of the Justice or Justices of the Peace convicting, a penalty or fine of not more than Fifty Dollars, and not less than Ten Dollars for each offence, together with the costs of prosecution, and in default of payment thereof, it shall be lawful for the said Justice convicting as aforesaid, to issue a warrant under his hand and seal, or in case of two or more Justices, acting together thereon, then under the hand and seal of one of them, to levy the said penalty and costs by distress and sale of the offender or offenders' goods and chattels, and in default of sufficient distress to satisfy the said penalty and costs, it shall and may be lawful for the said Justice or Justices or one of them convicting as aforesaid, to commit the offender or offenders, either to a Lock-up House within the said United Counties or to Common Gaol of the said Counties, with or without hard labor, for a period not exceeding twenty-one days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid.

12th. That when the pecuniary penalty has been paid under the By-Law, one-half thereof shall go to the Informer or prosecutor and the other one-half shall be paid to the Treasurer of these Counties, unless the action is brought in the name of the Corporation, in which case the whole of the penalty shall be paid to the Counties' Treasurer, and that the Preventive Officers shall be allowed the same remuneration as Constables received under the "Summary Convictions Act," and where a conviction is secured in the name of this Corporation, one-fourth of the fine or penalty in addition to the above Constable fees shall be paid to the said Preventive Officers by the Counties' Treasurer.

And whereas the said Corporation have now also judgment and execution in the Chancery Division of the said Court against the said Daniel Eugene McIntyre and William Colquhoun for the said sum of \$1095.70.

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And whereas the said Corporation have judgment in the Queen's Bench Division of the said Court against the said Aeneas McDonald for the sum of \$784.47 (being part of the said sum of \$9519.83) together with interest and taxed costs.

And whereas the said Corporation have judgment in the Common Pleas Division of said Court against the said Aeneas McDonald for the balance of the said sum of \$8519.80, being the sum of \$5735.14 together with interest and taxed costs.

And whereas the said Corporation have judgments and executions against the said sureties, James Lettich, Alexander P. Ross, and William Colquhoun in the Queen's Bench Division of the said Court for the said sum of \$9519.83.

And whereas the said James Lettich, Alexander P. 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The main motion was adopted in council.

Report of Finance Committee.

Present—I. R. Ault, Chairman; A. Harkness, James Fraser, C. J. Hamilton, A. Leclair, P. A. Stewart, A. Sweet, D. A. McArthur, J. J. McIntosh, James Diekey, and D. A. McRae.

Your committee passed accounts as per schedule Marked A, amounting to \$154.41. A By-Law will be submitted for adoption to cover the same.

The first instalment of \$4,000, due by sureties of ex-treasurer McDonald, has been paid. The sum of \$957.65 stands to our credit with Bank of Montreal payable on call. That sum will just about pay Councillors pay sheet and Jury of Assize Court next week. We have Notes under discount on general account with Bank of Montreal of \$15,000. A By-Law will be submitted to authorize the Warden and Treasurer to renew these Notes, or a proportion of them, till County Rates are paid in or to the January Session. Also a By-Law to borrow from the Bank or Banks as it may be needed on Note or Notes to the extent of \$2500, to enable the Treasurer to pay accounts passed at this Session and such other sums as may be required.

The Nation River Drainage Committee consider it advisable to authorize the Warden and Treasurer to renew their Notes in the Molson's Bank for \$11,000, with any over-drawn account for interest, &c., till the January Session, with the hope that that account will be closed by amending the By-Law to levy on the parties interested to meet the Debentures that may be issued.

Report of Committee on Education.

GENTLEMEN.—Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:—

All the members present.

Your committee have had under their consideration a claim presented by the Chairman of the Public School Board of the Town of Cornwall claiming the sum of \$1295.57 alleged to be due them as a refund of the money paid by the Town of Cornwall on account of Public School Inspector for 1887. Your Committee recommend the payment of the sum of \$600 as full discharge of said claim, said sum to be paid in two instalments of \$300 each as follows, that is to say, the sum of \$300 out of County Rate of the year; balance, \$300 one year from the date without interest.

The Chairman of the School Board to furnish to this Council a resolution of the said Board amounting to the said sum of six hundred dollars as a full discharge of said claim.

Your Committee and Chairman of the said School Board, having carefully examined the matter agreed to the above settlement as being fair.

Report of Special Committee in re Scott Act Fines.

Your Committee have had submitted to them a petition from one T. D. Stark of the Township of Roxborough, asking that a fine of fifty dollars, imposed on him by Alex. McIntyre, Police Magistrate for the County of Stormont, be returned to him by this Council on the ground that Mr. McIntyre was not a proper person to adjudge a Scott Act case, his appointment having been held by the courts to be irregular in that he was appointed for one county only and not for the United Counties as the law requires.

Also a communication from the Deputy Minister of Justice in reply to a letter from our Clerk asking for information with reference to the allotment of the fines accrued under the Scott Act to the various licensed divisions or municipalities from which they were collected, from which it appears that the Government has no further authority or control over the fund, and that it may be disposed of by the Council as to them seems proper.

It appears also that all the fines have not yet been paid in, and it is probable that there may be some further expense connected with the enforcement of the Act not yet provided for.

Under these circumstances your committee would recommend that no further action be taken in reference to this money until the accounts both of receipts and disbursements are closed.

Report of Select Standing Committee on County Property.

Your Committee have examined the different county offices and find them in a satisfactory state.

In Judge Pringle's room it has been found necessary to add a little to the heating capacity as well as doing some other small

repairs, and it is now very comfortable and satisfactory to the occupant.

In conformity with our report of 28th June last the break in the ceiling of the council chamber has been repaired. Upon examination it was found difficult and expensive to put in a ventilator as recommended in said report owing to the difficulty of obtaining an outlet through the roof, and it was therefore deemed better by the committee to have the break plastered to correspond with the other part of the ceiling. The Turnkey's room was repaired as recommended in said report, as also the leakage in the Caretaker's rooms.

Your Committee are informed that the destitute as well as the insane persons confined in the gaol have been removed as recommended by said report.

Your Committee have also examined the gaol and recommend that a new floor be put in the criminals' room in the northwest corner of the gaol, as the present floor is nearly worn out.

Your Committee have had their attention directed to the insufficiency of the gas light in the offices and council chamber, and having heard a statement from the manager of the Gas Company to the effect that the company would forthwith, at their own expense, make the necessary changes in piping, &c., to insure satisfactory light at the rate of \$80 (eighty dollars) per annum, your Committee would recommend that no change be made before the January Session.

Report of Special Committee re Nation River Drainage Works.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

GENTLEMEN.—Your Committee appointed at the June Session of this Council beg leave to report as follows:—

All the members present, viz.: McArthur, Hamilton, and Bennet.

Your Committee held two meetings at Alexandria on 3rd and 12th of September respectively. The first meeting was occupied in examination of the Minutes and Proceedings of the Counties' Council which related to the Nation River Drainage, but owing to the non-arrival of certain papers relating to the commencement of and continuation of said works from the Chairman of the Drainage Committee, a second meeting became necessary, which was held at Alexandria on the 21st September, all the members being present. The papers submitted by the Chairman of the Drainage Committee consisting of 17 Exhibits, which were all carefully examined, and resulted in the Committee resolving to visit the

scene of the works, and after their examination to interview James McLennan, Q.C., at his office in Toronto, and submit to him all the papers furnished by the Chairman of Drainage Committee as well as that Chairman's statement or review of the case, and propounded the following questions for his opinion hereon, viz.:

1. Whether it is necessary to the efficiency of the works that the dam should be removed?
2. Whether having regard to the By-Law and other proceedings the Counties' Council could be compelled by the municipalities or by the individuals concerned to proceed to remove the dam?
3. Whether the Council has the power to remove the dam against the will of the owners?
4. Whether the Council must complete the works by the removal of the dam in order that they may be able to recover from the Township their share of the debt incurred in the works not provided for by the original By-Law; and
5. Whether the municipalities, the individuals to be assessed, could resist payment on the ground that the works have not been completed?

After having carefully considered the legal opinion furnished by James McLennan, Q.C., pursuant to the request of your committee, which opinion is hereto attached, as to the proceedings proposed to be taken by the Drainage Committee with a view to the removal of the dam at Chesterville without the consent of the owners, and in view of the undesirability of this Council being committed to any litigation of doubtful results, your committee recommend that no steps be taken by this Council in the direction of the removal of the dam at Chesterville without the consent of the owners. Your Committee are of opinion that a Weir might be constructed at the north end of the dam which might to a large extent afford the same relief that the removal of the dam would do. This your committee is given to understand would not be objected to by the owners of the dam. We therefore suggest the consideration of the scheme to the consideration of the Drainage Committee. Your Committee further recommend the introduction and passing of the necessary By-Law to recoup the counties for the over-expenditure amounting to the sum of eleven thousand dollars, as appears by the papers under the consideration of your committee.

S., to make a survey, map, and profile of that portion of the river intended to be improved in the Townships of Charlottsburgh and Lancaster, and also to make an assessment on all the lands and roads to be benefitted by the said improvements according to the provisions of the drainage of this Province.

The said Engineer has made his reports to this committee, and assessed the lands and

roads to be benefitted by the said improvements, and which report and assessment is herewith presented to your honorable body. Your committee recommend that the accompanying By-Law, providing for the said works, be read a first and second time and referred to a committee of the whole in order that the same may be provisionally passed at the session of the council.
