Act for granting certain Duties in the *British* Colonies and Plantations in *America*; for continuing, amending, and making perpetual, an Act passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, (intituled, *An Act for the better securing and encouraging the Trade of His Majesty's Sugar Colonies in America*); for applying the Produce of such Duties, and of the Duties to arise by virtue of the said Act, towards defraying the Expences of defending, protecting, and securing, the said Colonies and Plantations; for explaining an Act made in the Twenty fifth Year of the Reign of







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Revenue be raised, in Your Majesty's Colonies in America, for defraying the Expences of erecting, and securing the said Colonies, and for the most dutiful and loyal Subject of Great Britain, in Parliament assembled, doth desire some Provision, in this behalf to be made, towards raising the said Revenue, and hath resolved to give and grant unto Your Majesty's Colonies in America, such Rates and Duties herein after expressed, and humbly beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted by the King's Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Spiritual and Temporal, in that behalf sent Parliament assembled, and the same, That from and after the first day of September, One thousand seven hundred and thirty three, there shall be raised, levied, collected, and paid, by His Majesty, His Heirs and Assigns, in and upon all White or Clayed Sugars, and the Manufacture of any Colony or Plantation, under the Dominion of His

 id Act, That from and after the Twenty  
fourth of September, One thousand seven hundred  
and four, every Person or Persons loading on  
 any Ship or Vessel, in any of the British Colo-  
 nial Plantations in America, any Rum or Spirits,  
 Panicles, Molasses or Syrups, as of the  
 said Act,

to whom such Affidavit shall be tendered, shall thereupon grant to the Master, or other Person having the Charge of the Ship or Vessel, a Certificate under his Hand and Seal of Office (without Fee or Reward) of his having received such Affidavit pursuant to the Directions of this Act; which Certificate shall express the Quality of the Goods shipped on Board such Ship or Vessel, with the Number and Denomination of the Packages: And such Collector or other Principal Officer of the Customs shall also (without Fee or Reward) within Thirty Days after the Sailing of the Ship or Vessel, transmit an exact Copy of the said Affidavit to the Secretary's Office for the respective Colony or Plantation where the Goods were shipped, on Forfeiture of Five Pounds.

And it is further enacted, That upon the Arrival of such Ship or Vessel into the Port of her Discharge, either in Great Britain or any other Port of His Majesty's Dominions, where such Goods may be lawfully imported, the Master or other Person taking the Charge of the Ship or Vessel shall, at the Time he makes his Report of his Cargo, deliver the said Certificate to the Collector or other Principal Officer of the Customs, and make Oath before him, that the Goods so reported are the same that are mentioned in the said Certificate, on Forfeiture of One hundred Pounds; and if any Rum or Spirits, Sugars or Paneles, Molasses or Syrups, shall be imported or found on Board any such Ship or Vessel, for which no such Certificate shall be produced, or which shall not agree therewith, the same shall be deemed and taken to be Foreign Rum and Spirits,
