MONTREAL, Feb. 5 .- (Can. Press)-H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught, in his capacity of grand master of the Grand Lodge of Freemasons in England, is to be the recipient of a warm fraternal greeting, inscribed on parchment, from Col. J. E. C. Bendon, grand master of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, which boasts of being the oldest grand lodge on this hemisphere.

Hon. L. C. Southard, presiding worshipful master, and a former member of the Massachusetts Legislature, and Mr. Philip T. Nickerson, presiding worshipful master of the Winslow Lewis Lodge in Boston, arrived from Boston to-day, on their way to present the greeting to His Royal Highness at Ottawa.
