SALISBURY'S NEW IDEA.

A Fresh Proposal in Regard to Settlement of Indemnity WHICH GREECE HAS TO PAY TO TURKEY.

He Suggests That Great Britain, France and Russia Guarantee It

And Control the Revenues Spat Apart for the Purpose of Meeting the Obligation—Other Powers Invited to Come In if They Wish to Do So—Another Fort in the Khyber Pass Falls into the Hands of the Rebels—Garrison Held Out for Twenty-Four Hours in a Desperate Hand-to-Hand Conflict—Progress of the Nile Expedition—General News by Cable.

Constantinople, Aug. 26.—Lord Salisbury has made a fresh and important proposal in the matter of the settlement of the indemnity due Turkey from Greece. He suggests that Great Britain, France and Russia jointly guarantee the indemnity loan and control the revenues set apart for the purpose of meeting this obligation.

AFRIDS LOST HEAVILY. Only After the Most Desperate Fighting Did They Enter the Fort.

Simla, Aug. 26.—The Afridis attacked Fort Luni-Kotal Tuesday. The garrison held its own until 10 o'clock Wednesday morning, when, after a long and hard fight, the native commander of the garrison was killed, while gallantly leading his men, the enemy gained an entrance. The fight was continued two hours inside the fortification by the Khyber Rifles in the towers and bastions of the fort.
