HOW TO DISCOURAGE AMERICAN RAILWAY BUILDING IN CANADA.

If the Government believed in the doctrine of Canada for the Canadians, and applied that doctrine in a practical way, there would be no applications to Parliament, such as Mr. Corbin is making, to build railway lines from the United States into British Columbia. It is only because the Government hasn't yet grasped the national idea that such applications are possible. One United States line already has an entrance into Kootenay before the Dominion realized the importance of the mineral deposits of British Columbia. This railway has been the means of diverting a huge volume of trade from Canada to the United States. But Canada is gradually regaining possession of its own trade. This has been effected not more through the creation of new Canadian railways than because of the 30 per cent duty that is in force in Canada.

Where we have American and Canadian railways competing for business in the same territory it is the tariff alone which gives the Canadian lines the advantage. It is the tariff which has been the means of our regaining the trade which formerly entered Kootenay by way of Spokane to Canadian channels. It is the tariff that is the chief factor in securing for Vancouver and Victoria the big volume of the Klondike trade that is now being done in these cities. We don't want American railways doing business in Canada, and the best way to get rid of them is not by refusing charters, but by putting in force such duties as will retard railway exploiters from applying for charters. Protective duties will kill off all American lines before they reach the charter stage. As for import duties we should have such a tariff as will make trade between the United States and Canada unprofitable for the former. An export duty should be placed on all natural products so that there would be no business for the railways to do in the transport of these natural products from Canada to the United States. And this natural policy should be applied not only to British Columbia, but it should be made general for the whole of Canada. We should have an export duty on gold, silver and lead, and other British Columbia ores; on nickel, which is found in Ontario; on pulp wood, which is found in various provinces; and on all other products of the mine and forest in whatever province they originated.

WHERE THE AMERICAN NAVY IS WEAK.

The United States has unlimited funds, but still a great difficulty is experienced in securing seamen for its navy. Two weeks ago Congress authorized an addition of 1500 men to the strength of the navy, but the enlistment of the men is proceeding at a slow rate. The new ships going into commission, like the cruiser Columbia are still awaiting their complements and can only be partially supplied with drafts from the receiving ships at New York and other Navy yards. In commenting on the situation there is a disposition to attribute it to the fact that under the present law promotion in the navy stops with the rank of petty officer. In other words, it is urged that the inducement for enlistment in the navy is to give the enlisted men the same chance of rising that is enjoyed by the enlisted men of the army. There are others who claim that the complicated machinery and modern appliances found on the new type of war vessel make such demands upon the intelligence of the seaman that the service is unpopular, and that it is shunned in time of national danger instead of being eagerly sought. A much simpler explanation is, however, available. Seemingly cannot be obtained because the supply is not what it should be. With the decay of the American marine the American sailor has been gradually becoming well-nigh extinct.

GROWTH OF PROTECTION IN ENGLAND.

The World has, in several recent issues, published a number of extracts from British trade journals, showing the general dissatisfaction which is being felt among commercial and manufacturing classes there, with respect to the present operation of free trade. In nearly every instance the remedy proposed for existing evils is preferential trade within the empire. The Mercantile Guardian, London, has an article on Mr. Chamberlain's policy, proposed as a panacea for the depression prevailing in the West Indies. It says that his scheme does not meet with very great favor even amongst the supporters of the Government, and is not likely to be received with much enthusiasm in the West Indies, as it is not calculated to permanently restore the sugar trade there. The Guardian says that Mr. Chamberlain does not appear to believe that the imposition of countervailing duties on bounty-fed sugar would be popular, as he fears that they might provoke a charge against the Government of shirking free trade principles, which every citizen is assumed to hold sacred. "It may seem sad, but it is absolutely true, that many thousands of reasonable people fancy we have quite enough academic prattle about free trade. We know it by its fruits, and at present they do not form a very enjoyable dessert dish." The Guardian further says that our fiscal policy towards our colonies may become an important question for statesmen to solve. "The trend of the public mind is clearly in favor of exceptional fiscal treatment for colonial products."

MAYOR AND NIAGARA POWER

Is Energy from the Falls Cheaper Than Steam Made Energy?

Engineer Has a Fat Report for Works Committee—Plenty of Outlay for Paving Required—\$30,000 Asked for Car Tracks—Mayor Says Someone Ought to Go to Bristol—C. W. A. and Good Roads.

His Worship Mayor Shaw has returned from his day's trip to Niagara Falls, N. Y., revolving in his mind a host of the Niagara Falls Power Company that they can underbid in Toronto any company producing electricity by steam. This, too, in spite of the fact that allowance is made for an estimated loss of 25 per cent in transmission. The company does not countenance the idea of transmitting by under-water cable. They claim, however, that when they have installed their full complement of eight dynamos of 5000 horsepower each, which will be towards the end of the year, they can conveniently supply Toronto by land continuously with 10,000 horsepower. To do so will necessitate an outlay of \$1,000,000. Five of the dynamos are yet to be put in, but which they will transmit 2000 horsepower into Buffalo. After July 1 they will send 3000 horsepower more. They could call on, transmit 10,000 horsepower to Toronto.

Manager Rankine of the N. P. Company says the Mayor will shortly visit Toronto to seek out a site for the location of a saltum carbide factory. His Worship also had had a number of capitalists interested in the nickel industry, but failed to locate any.

The Canadian company (the Niagara Power) is planning for a plant on the Canadian side, as well.

Street Railway Pavements.

The City Engineer, in his report for the year, recommends that the balance of \$20,000, standing to the credit of street railway pavements, be transferred to the account for repairs and maintenance of pavements between tracks. He says that the tracks are very worn, and in some places are full of dangerous holes.

An extra appropriation of \$3000 is required for last winter's snow cleaning, only \$2000 was available while the City Engineer's committee so desires, he will recommend proper pavements for Leslie and Curzon streets, but would not repair them with broken stones.

Amalgamation and Economy.

Treating of the amalgamation of the electric and waterworks utility on the island, a work which, he claims, cost \$1700 if the former had been moved to the latter, he states that the saving of \$500 for the season could be effected.

He proposes ordering the Street Railway Company to lay down a single line of track along Bay Street, from Simcoe street to York. He would pave it with scoria block at a cost to the City of \$2500.

He wants \$1700 appropriated to macadamize the ramp leading up to John street bridge.

Many Roadways.

Pavements are recommended as follows: Cedar Street, Elizabeth street, from College to Grenville, at a total cost of \$200; Cedar Street, from College to York, at a cost of \$200; Bay Street, from Cedar Street to the north end, at a cost of \$200; Bay Street, from Broadview Avenue to Logan Avenue, at a cost of \$200; 24-foot brick road from Logan Avenue to Broadview Avenue, at a cost of \$200; 32-foot asphalt on Gerrard Street, from College Church to Dundas street, from Queen to Arthur, at a cost of \$150; 32-foot brick on gravel for Broadview Avenue, from Gerrard to Queen, at a cost of \$150; 32-foot brick on gravel for Broadview Avenue, from Queen to College, at a cost of \$150; 32-foot brick on gravel for Broadview Avenue, from Jarvis to Sherbourne, at a cost of \$150.

Sufficiently signed petitions have been entered against a brick sidewalk on Richmond Street, from Jarvis to the water tower, and on Wyndham, from Brock Avenue to St. Clarens Avenue, and against a wooden walk on Hamilton street, from Elliott to Gerrard.

Cur Hall Notes.

Mayor Shaw does not exactly countenance Ald. Bowman's theory that they want should request the secession of this city at the British Association convention in Bristol, England, this summer. He holds, however, that it would be both expedient and conducive to the public good if the city should send a delegate to Council in the near future.

Ald. Danforth, his colleague, Ald. Frame, in the Property Committee yesterday, all appointments to positions in the new City Hall would be made to the City of Toronto.

The Board of Works of St. Catharines, Ont., are coming to Toronto to plan matters on the matter of street watering.

St. James' Ward in St. James will ask for an extra appropriation of about \$400 to complete the work of leveling the McManis City square.

LUMBERMEN'S MEMORIAL.

Western Section Concur in the Memorial to the Government by the Ontario Lumbermen's Association.

The World on Wednesday gave a synopsis of the report of a deputation of the Ontario Lumbermen's Association to Ottawa to press upon the Government the necessity of imposing a duty upon American lumber coming into Canada. This deputation, composed of Messrs. John Bertram and John Waldo, was to have been joined by a deputation consisting of Messrs. George A. Graham, Fort Arthur; D. C. Cameron and William Ross, Rat Portage, and Mr. Gordon, New Westminster, B.C., but owing to railway misadventure, the Toronto deputation interlegged the Premier and returned to Toronto before the Western deputation arrived on the scene.

On Wednesday afternoon, at the Queen's Hotel, Messrs. John Bertram, John Waldo, Charles H. Warren and J. E. Miller, met the Western deputation and compared notes. The latter deputation had failed to see the Premier, but had interviewed Hon. Messrs. F. Edgington, Sifton and Patterson on Monday last on their journey into Canada from the United States. They presented a memorial setting forth the present need for the imposition of a reciprocal duty. This memorial was in its contents and intent identical to the one presented by the Toronto deputation, and published in The World on Tuesday.

The matter does not stand in statu quo, for measures are being taken to press the matter home. The lumbermen from the Pacific to the Atlantic will be interested in the matter.

Private letters from influential individual lumbermen will be sent to the members of the Government. In military finance, individual firing as well as volley firing will be indulged in. The press is requested to look into this matter and use its influence to promote the desirable end in view.

The Best Claim Not Allowed.

Judge Morgan handed out judgment yesterday in the case of E. L. C. Clarkson and James McCreey, acting for McElmaster & Co., against F. X. Constance, in which the plaintiff claimed two months' rent for the premises at 1700 if the former had moved to the latter, he states that the amount of which was \$404. Judge Morgan dismissed the case without costs.

The Unity of the Bible.
This was again the subject of Bishop Sullivan's sermon at St. James' Cathedral yesterday. The unity, he said, was marvelous throughout 66 books, the work of different writers, whose lives covered a period of 1500 years.
