Spanish Fleet Moving.

Washington, D.C., March 24.—The last day before the arrival of the report of the Maine Court of Inquiry was one of unexampled activity in official quarters. Advices came early that the Spanish toped flotilla had sailed from the Canaries for Porto Rico and from the most energetic warlike measures followed one another in constant succession. The movement of this fleet had been watched with the keenest interest, as it was felt to involve serious possibilities which might compel the Union States Government to protest against the movement as of a hostile character. Immediately on the receipt of the official despatches from an American naval attachee abroad, briefly announcing the sailing of the fleet, the fact was made known to the President, and an earnest conference was held between him and Secretary Roosevelt. The seriousness of the move was fully considered, and the President was advised that naval strategists regarded it as essential that this torpedo fleet should not be allowed to reach western waters. What, if any, conclusion was reached, is not known.

English and American Bankers Bring Pressure to Bear.

London (Eng.), March 24.—The imminence of the Cuban crisis has aroused financiers to make efforts to avert war. A movement to make efforts to avert war. The American bankers are endeavoring to secure the influence of inanciers and governments, representing to them the damage to the commerce of all nations which a war would involve. The American bankers tell the diplomats that if the United States demands an indemnity and Spain is willing to pay, the financiers will gladly furnish the funds. 

R. G. Bun's Review.

Following are extracts from R. G. Dun & Co.'s review for the week. The trade situation in Montreal is not materially changed since a week ago. All seasonable lines are in demand, and manifacturers find it difficult to keep up with orders. In groceries the movement has slightly increased, while the leather trade is 2000.
