LEGISLATURE AND SUNDAY CARE.

Important Point Which the Metropolitan Railway Company Has Raised in Its Defence.

The document filed in court by the Metropolitan Railway Company in their defence to the charge preferred at the present, and adjourned to the May, session, is of legal and general interest.

The main reliance of the defence when the argument takes place will be upon a recent decision in the Nova Scotia Supreme Court. The Halifax Electric Traction Company were prosecuted before the Police Magistrate for running their cars on Sunday, and the company applied to the highest court in the province for a writ of prohibition restraining the magistrate from adjudicating upon the case. They set up the plea of no jurisdiction, the same as raised by Mr. Harvey. Three of the judges granted the application, while the fourth, Chief Justice McDonald, dissented, holding that the magistrate had the power to sit on the case.

The judgment of Mr. Justice Ritchie, B.N.A. of 1891, the criminal law of Nova Scotia was placed within the exclusive legislative authority of the Parliament of Canada, and declared that in his opinion any legislation of the province amending the criminal law is ultra vires. He said: "I wish to be distinctly understood as giving no opinion as to whether the Legislature could or could not by any legislation prevent the performance of service or other labor on Sunday, but I think it cannot be done in the way attempted, that is, by trying to amend the criminal law."

In respect to Civil Rights. Mr. Justice Graham, in his judgment, says: "The first question, I think, is whether the second section relates to a subject coming within 'property and rights' under section 92, or 'the criminal law' under section 91 of the British North America Act. It is almost a public wrong or is it a 'small not in respect to civil rights'?"

METHODIST PROHIBITIONISTS

An Important Conference Took Place at Ottawa Yesterday.

Rev. Doctors Carman, Potts and Saunders and Mr. J. T. Moore Tackled the Premier, Mr. Fielding and Mr. Fisher—Sir Wilfrid Not a Prohibitionist—Mr. Fielding Wrote for Direct Taxation

Ottawa, March 24.—(Special.)—An important conference was held to-day between Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. W. S. Fielding, and Hon. Sidney Fisher, one hand, and Rev. Dr. Carman, Rev. Dr. Potts, Rev. Dr. Saunders and J. T. Moore, of Toronto, representing the Methodist Church of Canada. The visitors represented that it would not do to include any consideration on the plebiscite ballot, aside from the single issue as to whether the prohibition of the liquor traffic shall or shall not become the law of the land. They asked for no snap verdict, but a fair and honest expression of opinion by all classes of the community. It was pointed out that the Methodist Church represents the largest Protestant community in Canada. It is independent as to politics, and if there is any one thing that would tend to unite it, that thing would be the fight for prohibition. They are prepared to take any consequence which the passage of a prohibitory law may involve in the matter of revenue. Whatever the Government may decide, even to the extent of direct taxation, will be concurred in. If the consequences of prohibition are to be considered, let them be put forward in a subsequent plebiscite.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier in reply said, there was no organization, so far as he was concerned, whose opinions would carry more weight than the Methodist Church. While he might not agree with all

R. G. Dunn's Review.

Following are extracts from R. G. Dunn & Co.'s review for the week.

The market for wool is not materially changed since a week ago. City retail dry goods trade is improving, and the wholesale trade report travelers' and mail orders as well coming in quite freely, though the bulk of spring goods are now forwarded. The boot and shoe factories are all well employed, some of them working overtime and being obliged to decline further business. There has been a decline of half a cent in hides, and this has led to a decline in the demand for leather, but prices are very steady, held by the fact that leather values are still relatively lower than hides. The London wool sales now show quite an advance in prices in the last series, and local importers of raw wool are, as a consequence, endeavoring to get something in the way of better prices from woolen manufacturers, but not with much success so far.

The wholesale trade at Toronto has undergone little or no change. The demand for millinery continues good, and the movement is active for the season of the year. In dry goods and hardware, reports are most satisfactory, and the volume of business for the month will compare with the corresponding month for many years. All reasonable lines are in demand, and manufacturers had it difficult to keep up with orders. In groceries the movement has slightly increased, while the leather trade is good.

The enormous sales of boots and shoes, greater than ever before this season, ensure full production for a long time, large makers having orders for 100 to 200 dozen in women's, men's, and children's shoes, and for men's shoes in the range of 100 to 200 dozen. The reduction in price is more satisfactory to buyers than to makers who have to look for profits in a very tight market. Shipments continue the largest of the year for three weeks, the week of 27,238 cases, against 22,228 last year, or 14.4 per cent. increase, 14.7 per cent. larger than in 1895, and 24.2 per cent. larger than in 1892.
