Majority Report—For Summary of Faith.

Favors appointment of committee to prepare summary of reformed faith, bearing the same relation to the confession which the shorter catechism bears to the larger catechism. This summary "not to be substitute for the confession, and not to affect the terms of subscription" but "to vindicate and clear the doctrines of the church from false aspersions and misconceptions."

Recommends that new committee be instructed to prepare amendments to the confession of faith, either by modification of text, or by declaratory statements, "so as more clearly to express the mind of the church concerning the love of God for all men, missions and the Holy Spirit, it being understood that the revision shall in no way impair the integrity of the system of doctrines set forth in our confessions."




