### THE SITUATION IN SALT.

The tone of the sait market is firm and prices seem to have settled on a good, solid basis. Jobbers and handlers of the article generally thruout the summer have been much hampered by the tardiness of manufacturers in making deliveries from the wells. The producers seem to have made an agreement amongst themselves to curtail the output, but the reasons given for delays in the shipments are that there has been an excessive demand for sait from the West, and that the railway companies have failed to supply sufficient cars at the wells to carry away the product, which, it is claimed, has accumulated to a great extent in the last two months. At any rate, the scarcity in Toronto and thruout the country at present is without satisfactory relief, and the producers are, in most instances, a month behind with their orders.

One or two wholesale firms in Toronto have been compelled on one or two occasions to procure their supplies of sait from the United States, and, should the Canadian prices advance, there is a danger of the foreign article obtaining a hold on the markets of Canada. But, one thing in favor of Canadian sait is that it is more suited to the tastes of Canadians.
