LORD DUNDONALD'S POSITION. Lord Dundonald does not regard the communication from the British government as a rebuke. He has not been ordered back to England, nor has silence been enjoined upon him.

During the debate on the Dundonald question, Mr. Oliver, M.P. for Alberta, said that Lord Dundonald might have the right to criticize the government, but he could not expect at the same time to enjoy immunity from attack as a soldier and a member of a distinguished family.

But while Lord Dundonald had a right to state his own case and uphold his own plans, it is open to question how long he should continue a controversy which must tend to become more and more a party dispute, and to make him the hero of one political party in Canada and the antagonist of the other.

It is now seems likely, the communication to the British government to Lord Dundonald was merely a piece of friendly advice. Mr. Arnold-Forster was hardly justified in announcing it in the course of a debate which began with a violent attack on the late commander-general of the Canadian militia.

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WEIGHING IS NOT HONEST

CHARGE OF RUFUS POPE

His Motion Defeated, But Member for Compton Makes Strong Accusations.

Ottawa, July 21.—(Special).—On behalf of the farmers and dairymen of Eastern Ontario and the eastern townships of Quebec, Rufus Pope today exposed what he declares to be a dishonest system of weighing dairy products in the City of Montreal.

He wound up with a motion affirming that the farmers of Canada had wrongly suffered for many years through the system of weighing butter and cheese at the port of Montreal, and that for this evil the government was responsible.

The member for Compton showed how, after several years of agitation and charges of dishonest weighing, the government was induced to appoint W. C. Parmelee deputy minister of trade and commerce, a royal commission to enquire into the question.

The commission was issued in 1901, the commission made his report in October, 1903, and as yet no legislation has been introduced nor has the government indicated any intention of remedying the evil which has been shown to exist.

Mr. Pope fastidiously pointed out the names of the members of the commission, and Hon. Sydney Fisher, chief of the latter. The part played by Mr. Fisher was revealed in communication which passed between him and Chas. A. Bull of Montreal. Mr. Bull is a strong Liberal, yet a foremost agitator against the prevailing system of weighing at Montreal, and grew wrathful when he found that the report of the commission was being delayed.

Mr. Bull's words in his reference to the report of the commission were not an official weighing, but the member for Compton, Rufus Pope, was stronger.

Mr. Pope made serious charges against John Macleod, weigher for the Montreal Buttery and Cheese Association.

FALL FAIR WITH BIG GRANT NOT DOING THE MOST GOOD

Many of the Smaller Societies Leading the Way, While Some Should Be Closed Up.

According to information being collected by H. B. Cowan, superintendent of agricultural societies, as a general rule, those exhibitions throughout the province that are paying out the biggest amounts for "all the fun of the fair" attractions are giving correspondingly small sums in the direction of contributing to agricultural progress.

"In fact," said Mr. Cowan yesterday, "many of the township societies receiving small grants are holding better shows and doing more for agriculture than a large number of the district societies, altho at the same time there are many which are giving such poor exhibitions that they should be closed up or their funds utilized for other purposes."

It has been found that a township society near Toronto paid out in 1903 over \$500 in agricultural prizes, being the largest sum paid out by any township society for that year of the four societies which paid out the most for agricultural purposes. Another township society receiving a grant of \$100 paid out less than \$50 for agricultural prizes, while a district society receiving a grant of \$500 paid out about \$800 in agricultural prizes.

Among the township societies, one which received a grant of \$121, paid out only \$72 for agricultural prizes. Another one receiving \$90 for a government grant, with total receipts of \$1500, paid out but \$15 for agricultural prizes.

Burned at Sea. Woods Hole, Mass., July 21.—Capt. Kennedy of the British ship Creedmore, and crew, were landed here today, having escaped from their ship, which was burned off Fire-Island yesterday. The captain and men left at once for New York, where the Creedmore sailed yesterday. The Creedmore was oil laden and bound for Liverpool.

Killed by Falling Man. New York, July 21.—Patrick McGuire, 50 years old, was killed yesterday by Samuel Rotashinski, 35 years old, a painter who fell upon him from a scaffold at the fourth floor of a building in Ninth-avenue, this city. Rotashinski was unhurt.

HEAT MADE THE WATER RUN.

City Consumption Was Largely Increased—Like Level Still High.

The consumption of water in the city has largely increased with the hot weather, but it has not affected the supply at all. Last Saturday there were consumed 25,300,000 gallons, an increase of almost 4,000,000 gallons over the preceding Saturday. This is usually one of the smallest days at the pumping station on account of the great number of factories that shut down in the afternoon, but the extra amount pumped was made up by the large number of taps that were allowed to run freely.

There is no danger of any famine, however, so long as the lake is at its present level, about 27 inches above zero. The waters should begin to recede now, according to the records of the lake levels for the past 20 years, and they probably will go down suddenly within the next week.

Killed His Wife. Peoria, Ill., July 21.—Frank Pierce today shot and killed his wife at their home in Canton, Fulton County, and forced the entire Canton police force at bay. The sheriff has summoned from Lewiston. He is insane.

Russian-German Treaty Concluded. Berlin, July 21.—The foreign office confirms the report of the satisfactory conclusion of the Russo-German commercial treaty negotiations. The Associated Press, however, informs that the treaty does not contain concession of imported live stock at the border.

Folk Nominated. Jefferson City, Mo., July 21.—After an all-night session, with intervals of disorder, the Democratic state convention unanimously nominated Joseph W. Foster, circuit attorney of St. Louis, for governor.

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TALK IT OVER ON WAY DOWN.

Controllers Leave for Ottawa With Undecided Minds.

City Solicitor Caswell returned yesterday from Muskoka, where he had been spending his holidays, and at once began work on the preparation of the city's case to be presented to the railway commission to-day in regard to the Esplanade expropriation.

The board yesterday had no settled policy to submit to the commission. The members are prepared to argue the point that the city was not to blame for the delay, but beyond that had decided on nothing definite. The position to be taken was to be discussed on the way to Ottawa.

The bureau credits had a side trip up Mount Washington, 6200 feet high, where the weather was serene. Next year the convention will meet in Quebec.

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TO REVIVE FLAX INDUSTRY.

Conditions in Ontario to be Investigated by Special Commissioner.

Flax industries are among the most profitable and desirable in the world, and Ontario used to be a great flax-producing country. It is believed that the growth of flax may be revived, and the agricultural department has commissioned A. L. McCredie of the O. A. C. to investigate and report on the matter.

He visited yesterday for the first time the flax fields in the county, where flax is still grown for seed, but where both seed and fibre can be used the most profit is naturally obtained.

The excellence of Irish flax is largely due to the quality of the water in which the "flax" is steeped after it is pulled. Only the best water of the proper degree of softness can be had in it possible to produce first-rate "flax," as the tow is called in its early condition after being scutched.

Deputy Minister James believes that Ontario flax, which averages 10.5 bushels to the acre, should supplant the United States yield of 7.50 bushels.

Grand Forks, B. C., July 20.—H. W. Warrington, general superintendent Kettle Valley Railway lines, received instructions today to organize a measuring corps with the object of undertaking a survey of the proposed extension north of Kettle River.

The projected railway will afford transportation facilities to a rich mining region. The project has been voted a subsidy of \$6400 a mile by Dominion parliament for first fifty miles.

The proposal is to make the pension fund available for all the operating staff of the government railways, who will be required to contribute to the fund.
