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

### STUDIES.

No fixed course of study is prescribed, but the following studies are pursued by the pupils arranged in four general classes.

Class A.—Bible, French, English, Ollendorf, cours de langue Anglaise, Arithmetic, Writing.

Class B.—Bible, French, Geography, History of Canada, Arithmetic, English, Writing, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

Class C.—Bible, French, Grammar and Reading, English Grammar and Reading, History of Canada, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geography, Latin, Book-keeping (elective), Writing and Drawing, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

Class D.—Bible, French Grammar and Literature, English Grammar and Literature, English History, Algebra, Geometry, Latin, Greek, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

The School opens early in October and closes by the first of May.

Preference is given to French pupils, especially those from Roman Catholic families. A very limited number of English pupils is received. When more extensive accommodations are provided, and the applications from French pupils can be overtaken, a liberal course of study may be provided for English students.

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### ANNUAL REPORT

OF

### The Brande=Ligne Mission.

While the country at large has resounded with the war cry of races, of political parties, of prejudice, privilege and passion, while bitter discussions have been incessant, as to whether the French Roman Catholic majority, the first conquerors of this vast territory over the Indians, or the English minority, the second conquerors should have the mastery in this land, we, English and French together, have worked in harmony in forwarding the real and only true brotherhood of men. We, under the eye of Him, whom we serve, claim no superiority of our respective races, who each have enough imperfection and sin to humble their pride, and abate their pretensions; and we believe that the Gospel alone, where sincerely accepted, will effect a true union.

If in the prosecution of our labors essentially in French, we could, while availing ourselves of the impetus and practical business capacities of our English speaking brethren, induce them to make a large use of the language in which we evangelize, we would be nearing perfection.

It can hardly be supposed that while pursuing our humble work among the French Roman Catholics of this Province, we have been unmindful of what is going on in the politics of our country, especially of that aspect of it affecting religious, moral, and educational questions. We could not remain indifferent to an Act of our Provincial Legislature granting \$400,000 to an ecclesiastical sect abolished by a pope more than a hundred years ago, and, who had no legal right to it, said the premier who proposed the grant.

None of us, certainly would allow that a Catholic sect which has deserved the scathing criticism of the Catholic Pascal, and the dismemberment by a pope, can have a moral right to property that had been intrusted to them only for ends of education. If the constitution of their Society, had admitted that they might with time change like other men, opinion and action toward them might change also, but their superiors say they can never alter either their doctrines or themselves: "Sint ut sont aut non sint." We also note that it was an uncalled for insult to British subjects to name in the preamble of the Bill before our Legislature, the Pope of Rome as the first party to deal with. That after the passage of the Bill he should have been appealed to by Catholics for respective distribution among them, would have been quite natural and proper. But all this shows in a clearer light than ever under what disadvantages, and against what odds we labor here. If our powerful English Protestant minority is thus dealt with, what must be the position and the diffculties of our handful of French Protestants engaged in the work of evangelization in this priest-ridden Province!

As we have repeatedly said in our former Reports, we must take higher, diviner views of our work; we must admit more and more in our councils and calculations, God's most important element, time, for the success of everything that is real, doep, spiritual and destined to last. When, at times we have had a transient feeling like our Master as he said: "I am come to send fire on the earth and how I wish it were already kindled." We are also reminded that the same Master said outwardly on leaving his disciples: "It is not for you to know the time of the end, but go and preach the Gospel to all nations."

Our field is confined as yet to only one nationality, but there is more to do here than we can well undertake with our limited means in men and money. Still it has pleased the Lord to bless our humble labors during the past year, as the Reports of the different stations will show.

In the last year's Report we stated that an effort had been begun in raising an Endowment Fund for the Feller Institute at Grande-Ligne, with a view to increase the capacity of our buildings there, to augment the number of our pupils, and the efficiency of our School, and the better preparation of new laborers for our field. The effort has been continued and pushed with vigor, perseverance and lo and w partly amour as belo Ladies from I

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and loving zeal especially by our brother the Rev. P. A. McEwen, and with very encouraging success. The amount subscribed and partly paid is about \$36,000. As yet we have received but small amounts towards it from the United States; if we do not reckon as belonging to that fund, one thousand dollars from the Brocklyn Ladies Association, for Scholarships, and also one thousand dollars from Mrs. Rope in the same intention.

Realizing that enough had been subscribed to justify us in commencing important and necessary repairs and enlargement to the present buildings, especially to the old Mission House which was to be raised one story and a half, we had all our pians and tenders ready to begin work as soon as the School could be closed, at the end of March, when on the last day of January while several members of the Board and the architect from this city were present, the old Mission House was entirely destroyed by fire, in the middle of the day. The work of destruction was hastened by a very strong wind, and it was with the greatest difficulty, arduous and heroic struggle that the new Wing of the Institute was saved. Fortunately no lives were lost, and nobody was hurt; we are deeply thankful for this, and still more that it did not happen in the night.

He must be devoid of all ordinary sentiment, and of religious interest, the man who would not feel a pang in his soul at the sight of the burned and blackened walls of a house which contained rooms where sacred relics and memories were inshrined. Madame Feller's room can no longer be visited, Mr. Roussy's study, books and manuscripts are no more, and we shall only be able to visit the place where those precious rooms were.

But there is something that does not burn, that fire does not destroy, though, that it may purify it, and it is for that our dear old missionaries labored, suffered and prayed; it is for that we shall continue to work, to pray, and perhaps sometimes to suffer, in the new, more spacious and more commodious rooms in which some of us for a longer or shorter time, shall be allowed to labor. May it also be said of us that we have left there unsullied and sacred memories.

It was with great uneasiness and sorrow that we felt compelled to disband our large school so abruptly, especially as the session promised a successful result intellectually and spiritually. But we trust that it is only retarding a little what will largely and fully ripen in another scholastic year.

On the field as a whole we have nothing of a remarkable nature to report. In all our stations the work has been pursued with such instrumentalities as we had at command and with considerable efficiency. We cannot but deplore that two of our important stations, St. Marie and St. Pie have not had the full share of attention and care which they deserve, and that, on account of scarcity of laborers.

Ste. Marie occupied for some time by Mr. Arthur Massé, was left vacant early last Autumn by his being called as teacher in the Grande-Ligne Institute; and St. Pie was left pastorless for five months by the absence of Mr. Lebeau in a collecting tour in Ontario. Ste. Marie and St. Pie have been supplied fortnightly by the missionaries of Montreal, Grande-Ligne and Roxton Pond. The people of those localities have not complained of the quality of preaching they have had, but regret very much that such services on Sundays could not be followed by visits at the homes of the members of the congregation. We hope that ere long we shall be able to fill every vacant place by young and able laborers, now pursuing theological or classical studies.

In the most beautiful month of the year two large and significant meetings of French Protestants were held. The first, on the 14th of June was the Annual Pic-nic of the French Protestants at Otterburn Park. About six hundred French Protestants gathered there for social enjoyment, for the cultivation of more social acquaintance, and to hear discourses that would grace any platform in the land. It was a sight that would have greatly encouraged and delighted all those who have helped the cause of French evangelization in this country.

On the 26th and 27th of the same month the churches, in connection with the Grande-Ligne Mission met in Association at Grande-Ligne. Nobody could forsee that for the last time, many of the laborers and former pupils exchanged greetings in old rooms where they used to meet Mr. Roussy and Madame Feller. The Reports of the churches were encouraging, the essays and discourses searching and inspiring, and the large gathering felt once more that it was a good thing to meet together to review the past, to enjoy the present in Christian fellowship, and to look forward together

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to the great reunion of the immortal church above; assured at the same time that if this work is faithfully carried on, in a few years, there will be more than one Association of French Baptist Churches in the midst of the French population.

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### FELLER INSTITUTE.

In last year's report, reference was made to a work of grace going on in the school, and the hope was expressed that nothing would happen to check it. It pleased God to grant this desire, and the cheering result was that more than thirty young men and women accepted Christ as their Savior. Most of these professed their faith before leaving, and, so far as we have learned, they have all kept near the Lord. One of these, whose mother is a Roman Catholic, and who, on account of illness at home, could not return to school in the fall, wrote a friend saying she would, though some three hundred miles away, walk the entire distance if she could but return again to Grande Ligne. The poor girl's path is not strewn with roses, for it is said that both mother and sister persecute her. Another young girl, situated in very similar circumstances, after striving a long time with the spirit, yielded to the call, came to Christ and confessed her faith. She then went home to take care of her invalid mother, who died shortly after, and soon she had the pleasure of being the instrument, in God's hands, of bringing her unconverted father to Christ.

May the Good Shepherd keep all these lambs and bring many more into His fold.

School opened the 2nd October with 82 pupils admitted out of 125 applications received. In order to accommodate even so great a number as this, rooms for 15 had to be provided outside. Twelve Roman Catholics applied for admission but of these, three were refused, chiefly because of their age, two decided not to come and seven were received.

We regret not to report more Roman Catholics as attending our school, but we remember it is far easier to produce a lasting impression on a few than on many, as they are likely to form into a clique when numerous, and to hold each other back. Two deserve special mention: The first, a young man of about twenty years of age, came from the States a few days after the opening of the school. His honest, open face and bright eyes, together with his neat appearance, recommended him at once and after no long hesitation he was accepted. Nor have we been in any wise disappointed, for he has proved to be one of the most obedient pupils and ever ready to learn. Already he has opened his eyes to the errors of Rome as "what the Catholics believe." Although most of his personal effects were burned in the late fire, he, at once, invested two dollars in a Bible. We build great hopes on him. The other, much younger, is less interesting in face and appearance, though not less intelligent. He had been the terror of the village where he lived and a source of great trouble to his parents who, I am told, had been on the point of sending him to a reformatory school more than once. One would hardly have known him so great was the change, after staying three months here. Judge of my surprise when I received a letter from his father forbidding me to allow him to be haptized. It appears he had mentioned his desire of joining the Protestant church. The Gospel has already done a great deal for him.

The staff of teachers is the same as last year, excepting Mr. Rainville, who left to resume his medical studies, and who has been replaced by my brother, A. E. Massé, graduate of McGill and since missionary in Marieville, P.Q. As usual the teachers are harmonious, working with a single aim for the best good of the pupils.

On the whole, the progress of the school has been quite satisfactory and could we have kept on steadily working for two months more, a good amount of work would have been accomplished. Early in the season, the good Spirit began to manifest itself very visibly, and to our great joy, the pupils' prayer meetings grew lively and refreshing as well as the Thursday evening meetings. More than once, the pastor had to close while anxious ones were rising to their feet to tell of God's goodness to them. How our hearts filled with gratitude, when we saw those penitent and in great distress of mind who had been the most indifferent and hardened, boasting they had not "the disease of religion," and that sermons had no effect on them. And, too, when we heard testimonies like these: "Dear friends, it was not long ago that

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people called me a hard ticket, addicted to all sorts of bad habits, disobedient to my good parents, but thanks to God, I am a different boy to-day, I love the Lord and enjoy serving Him." How rejoicing also to hear those, naturally timid and hesitating in speech, "speak like a minister,"—to use the boys' expression. May God be pleased to follow all these in their various walks and draw them closer to Himself.

This blessed work has been, temporarily at least, interrupted by the sad calamity that befell us on the 31st January, when the old Mission house with its entire contents was burned to the What a disappointment, just at the time when the Board of Directors had met here to sign contracts for repairs and additions to our buildings, to see the very walls destroyed which, fifty years ago had been dedicated to God with so much joy and gladness by our pioneer missionaries. We regret so many things, the library, the chemical and philosophical apparatus, the fine collection of shells, Madame Feller's picture, the fine parlor set and carpet, Mrs. Miner's piano, and not least of all the closet where we were keeping, with so much pride, so many beautiful flannel blankets, handsome quilts, towels, table-cloths, napkins, white spreads and "tack-downs," all for the re-furnishing next Fall. Friends from Ontario, Quebec, Brooklyn and Vermont had all contributed to this little store until not less than seven hundred dollars worth of bedding alone, had been set aside for the new building, when all should be so neat and comfortable. How we shall miss the rooms, made sacred by the presence of thos dear benefactors, Madame Feller and Mr. Roussy! Can it be that the Lord willed that they should be remembered only by the spiritual work done in this French Canada.

Though deploring our loss we can but be grateful that God in an unmistakable way showed his controlling power through it all. Not one pupil injured nor did any one really receive harm from exposure on that sad day.

Feller Institute was spared to us, most of its furnishings and the girls' clothing. Neither the new piano, organ lately given by Mr. D. W. Karn of Woodstock, nor the new sewing machine was seriously hurt, and though we lost much, it might have been much worse. The pupils were all sent away excepting six, two of whom were preparing for College and three working for diplomas. They

all left regretfully, I believe, and many have since written asking for a place next session. Plans are matured for a new building much larger and more convenient than the old, and supplied with a good heating apparatus. So we trust that next Fall School may reopen under more favorable auspices and that all may work with redoubled zeal.

And may the glory of "this latter house" be greater than that of "the former" and may the Lord of hosts grant us "peace" therein.

### MONTREAL STA 'ION.

It is gratifying to witness the steady, though slow, development of our work here. Statistics, regularly kept, show, from year to year, a regular increase of number in the membership of the church and in the attendance upon its different services.

Notwithstanding the fact that four families connected with our congregation left the city-three definitely and one to return only in the Fall-we have more than kept our own. Our record shows an encouraging increase over that of last year on all the line. We reported last year a membership of 51; an average attendance at morning service of 55; at the evening service of 40; and at prayer meeting of 29. This year our record shows a membership of 56; an average attendance at morning service of 60; at the evening service of 49; and at the prayer meeting of 32. The total number of Sunday school teachers and scholars the year before was 48 and the average attendance 38. This last year the total membership of the school was 50 and the average attendance 38. There has been an increase also in the number of Roman Catholics who have attended our services. On several occasions we counted from five to twelve of them present, and on a recent baptismal occasion there were no less than thirty. They listened most attentively to the preaching of the Gospel and seemed much impressed, some even to tears, by the administration of the ordinance. The pastor rejoices also in the fact that during the year, he was privileged to tell the story of the Cross to a much

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larger number of Roman Catholics than he ever did in any previous year of his life. Besides those of that class who attended the services of the church he had also the opportunity of speaking, from week to week, to quite a large number of them at the Coteau St. Louis Mission, where, on several occasions, there were from twenty to forty of them present. Moreover, it was his privilege to speak several times during the Summer to large congregations of Roman Catholics and materialists in different halls of the McAll Mission in Paris, where he spent nearly one month. The pastor has not been the only one of our church to participate in that kind Rev. T. Lafleur has had his share of it, having spoken several times at the St. Louis Mission, so has our good brother Clement who did the same a great number of times. Miss Piché, also a member of our church, labored all Summer in connection with that work, and her influence over the young people who attended there—some of them of the roughest class—was simply wonderful. On her departure for Grande-Ligne to teach in the Institute, she was much regretted here. Four or five others of our members have helped that work to some extent; all this being done in connection with levoted earnest young people of the First Baptist Church who have special charge of that work. We were often greatly perplexed in our mind as to the best means to adopt to secure order in those meetings. Sometimes it was almost impossible to do anything on account of the disturbance, while at other times comparative quietness prevailed and the truth spoken was attentively listened to. Some of the workers endured suffering from scoundrels who came there for the purpose of disturbing the meetings. Twice did our brave brother Sparks receive severe blows, which might have had very serious effects, while returning from the meetings at night. We are looking for tangible results, from that work which is still going on in the near future. The pastor looks upon a few evenings he was permitted to spend with Roman Catholics, this year, as memorable occasions.

On two of these, four families evangelized by Mrs. Scott, met in the same house for the purpose of listening to his instructions. These families still attend the R. C. Church, but are much exercised in their minds with regard to the teachings of that church and are deeply interested in the study of the Bible. On the last of the above named occasions the missionary found a chair near the table ready to receive him, and, leaning against the

lamp, a sheet of paper containing an important series of questions which he was requested to answer. It was a great delight to take them up one after another and answer them, the Word of God in hand.

The leaven of the Gospel has begun to work in those families and we pray for their conversion to the truth.

The case of an intelligent and devoted Roman Catholic, who, of late, has become an earnest inquirer deserves special mention. He had had several interviews with a dear sister whose character and life is "an epistle read and known" to all who come in contact with her. When I met him for the first time I experienced great pleasure in pointing out to him the way of life through Christ Jesus. His evenings are spent till late hours in reading the Scriptures, and his heart seems to be thoroughly imbued with their spirit. He has already more than once expressed his conviction that we have the truth. He is already meeting with very strong and bitter opposition on the part of his friends in general and his wife in particular. He attends our services occasionally and drinks in every word uttered. May the Lord lead him into all the truth and give him strength and courage to confess His name.

We had the pleasure of receiving, during the year, three members by letter and very recently three by baptism. We dismissed one.

We have many difficulties to contend with, and many discouragements; but, amidst all these, God shows us his favor and impels us to go forward.

Let those who may read these lines remember the work before the throne of grace.

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The time has arrived once more for us missionaries to come forward and give our account, 1st of the way we have spent our days, 2nd, of the results obtained.

In connection with the work of this station we have to report that the pastor has preached regularly twice every Sunday and sometimes taken charge of a Sunday school class.

There is progress in financial matters. Besides meeting our usual obligations we have renewed for three years our insurance policy on the Church building and we have some improvements and repairs done to that building. The Ladies' Aid Society last year raised the sum of \$55.00; this year they have presented us with the sum of \$117.00. There is also a slight increase in the subscriptions, and that notwithstanding a "hard year."

The spiritual tone of the Church has improved. Greater interest seems to be taken in Church matters; each one feeling to a certain degree at least that the business of the Church is his business, and while this exists there is less party-spirit than before, but a desire to avoid hurting a brother's feelings without necessity. We record also with pleasure a larger attendance of adults at Sunday school. Many of those who were wont to slip out as soon as the benediction is pronounced remained to study the Scriptures and by their questions showed a spirit of inquiry.

Last but not least we register an increase in membership. Nineteen persons, most of them pupils of the Institute, have professed their faith by baptism since our last report. These remain united with us until they find an opportunity of joining a church of the same faith where they may happen to live. Two of the pupils, however, are likely to remain here with their families. One is a young man whose father has been for a long time a respectable member of the congregation, but who decided last year to follow his Lord more closely and was baptized on the same day as his son. The mother is still a Roman Catholic and naturally opposed to such an act, and yet when the son politely asked her permission to be baptized, said: "Do as you think best." The other of the two is an amiable young girl whose father was for a long time very indifferent as to religious matters, though an honest man, and whose mother was a staunch Roman Catholic. A year

ago last Fall the father awoke to the fact that through the influence of her mother the girl was sliding into Romanism. He decided to send her to the Mission School. The girl tried all possible means of escape, she even feigned sickness, but the father remained firm, taking the advice of the teachers who understood the trick, and she remained. Finally she was converted. When she descended into the waters of baptism the father could not withhold his tears at the thought that his dear child for whom he had been so anxious was now going before Him into the Kingdom of Heaven. He there and then decided to give his heart to Christ and become a member of his visible Church; he was baptized the following Sunday.

A still greater harvest was ripening before our eyes this Winter when the fire broke out and scattered our pupils like the ashes of the dear old building to the four winds. But God knows it all.

### CLARENCEVILLE & ST. SÉBASTIEN.

Clarenceville and St. Sébastien being given me as my two mission fields, I must confess that the prospects at first seemed anything but encouraging. As to the church at Clarenceville it had been without a pastor for over a year, and as is always the case, when there is no shepherd to lead the sheep, they are soon scattered, so it seemed to be the case here. However the attendance at the services was large and encouraging, and quite an interest seemed to have been awakened, especially among some of the young, who were anxious to find Christ as their Saviour, and had I been able to remain, or had there been some one to take my charge as I left, I believe that with the interest that had already been awakened a grand revival would have been the result, but as is known the work had to be dropped there, the members not feeling able as yet to support a pastor. As to St. Sébastien, where I held two services every other Sunday, one being in French and the other in English, the French work especially is not very encouraging, the Catholics seemingly being afraid to attend, yet now and then one or two dropped in to our meetings, one evening especially I was much pleased to see six or eight Catholics come out to the meeting, but instead of entering which they seemed much afraid to do, they stood

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in the porch, and listened respectfully until the service was over, when they immediately departed. Whether they were afraid to be found in a Protestant meeting, or whether, they had been warned by the priest not to attend the meetings, I do not know, but such a gathering did not occur again. The most of the French Protestants here understand the English language, so they have the benefit of the preaching of the Methodist minister of Clarenceville, and so are not without the Gospel. It is my opinion, that by a great deal of perseverance and faith in God a good cause could be worked up in Clarenceville, providing the one who took charge of that field, instead of taking St. Sébastien as his other chief station, only preaching there now and then when he could, would preach at a place this side of Noyan, called the West Shore which place I also preached at during my last month at Clarenceville.

### STE. MARIE DE MONNOIR.

The scarcity of laborers obliged us last Fall to call Mr. A. Massé who had been stationed there for about a year only, as a teacher in the Grande-Ligne Institute. It was with sincere regret that we saw this important station left once more without a permanent missionary laborer. In the meantime the services on Sunday were kept up regularly fortnightly by the other missionaries, the Secretary oftener than others to fill the vacant pulpit. On all favorable circumstances the meetings have been well attended, often by a few Roman Catholics, and on one occasion, the funeral service of a child of one of the prominent members of the congregation the church was filled to overflowing, by eager Catholic listeners, who had come there in spite of the standing opposition to it of bishops and priests. The day is drawing near when people will assert their rights to go wherever they please to get religious instruction. Mr. Arthur Massé has again been called to minister to Ste. Marie Station, since the fire at Grande-Ligne, and until he is recalled to teach next Fall at Grande-Ligne. During that time we hope with some certitude to be able to find a suitable and permanent pastor for that growing congregation.

### ST. JOHNS.

Our venerable brother and friend, Rev. T. Riendeau, writes: "Though still very feeble from my last attack of sickness, and easily fatigued, I must drop you a few words to say that I have been encouraged in my humble work in this place. When I get a little better I intend to go further to visit families where I am welcome to read the blessed Gospel and pray with them.

"Dear brethren, I need not tell you how much I have suffered with you and others on learning that our dear old Mission House had been burned, the place where many of us have become acquainted with the Gospel of Salvation, and where we have learned in some measure how to teach it to others. How many things I would wish to say on the good work that this blessed Mission has accomplished for people near and far, as well you know."

### ST. CONSTANT, ST. PHILIPPE AND ST. MICHEL.

It is now nearly a year since I was sent to this field. Looking back on what, by the grace of God, I have been able to do, I cannot but bless God for the result and feel encouraged for the future.

This is a vast field, divided into three stations separated from each other by great distances, which makes the working of them difficult. We have there seven French Protestant families in connection with the Mission. Altogether they number fifty persons, adults and children. Besides these there are several English families, scattered in those stations and many of them attend regularly our meetings, as they understand French quite well. The field having been somewhat neglected for want of a permanent laborer, there was a great need of spiritual instruction among them. From the first our meetings were well attended. The usual number was about thirty and sometimes forty, when weather and roads were good.

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This station has been occupied only a little more than half of the year by the pastor, Mr. Lebeau, as he has been absent during five months on collecting trips. During his absence preaching has been kept up regularly fortnightly, and some visiting has also been done. The work has not been attended to as during his ministrations. Something has been accomplished spiritually, and materially a good deal more than in the few years that have preceded. Though only one was added to the Church by baptism, there has nevertheless been an interesting state of things, spiritually among young and old.

Our church and congregation have contributed more than formerly; few in number as we are, nearly two hundred dollars have been raised here for the church, the parsonage and the Endowment Fund.

Besides, Mr. Lebeau writes, we have spent uearly one hundred and fifty dollars in repairs on our church. With the help of the Mission we are building a parsonage at the cost of seven hundred and fifty five dollars (\$755), which will give a comfortable building and a comfortable air of stability. I am happy to see generous giving gaining among us. I hope that ere long, in this field, that was at one time so productive of good and witnessed many conversions, we may see it revived, and by the grace of God we shall be able to give you more encouraging reports.

### ROXTON POND.

I had fondly hoped to be able to add a few interesting items to last year's Report, seeing that the Gospel seemed to have penetrated into the heart of several Roman Catholics. What had raised my hopes in that direction was the recent arrival in our midst of a parish priest of agressive dispositions towards Protestants. In course of time I had with him a discussion which lasted five hours, and this had afforded me the opportunity of an interview and conversation with several Roman Catholics. I fully expected to have other occasions to meet thus this champion of Romanism, and that in the presence of many persons. But great was my

surprise when I learned that this man had been ordered by the bishop to leave the parish. His successor came with strict orders to avoid all public discussion. Thus the fire of religious combat died out for want of fuel.

As a church and congregation we regret to state that several of our families have emigrated to the United States. Some of them will come back doubtless, but the children, most of them will have no strong attachment to their fatherland, and in all probability will return to the States. Death has also diminished our flock. Old and young have been taken from our midst, and even young mothers from their children. With much sorrow do we recall the sudden and unexpected death of Mrs. Auger, the wife of the exmember of Parliament, who leaves a large family mostly grown up.

Our meetings on Sunday have been very well attended, and on week days, though diminished in numbers, they have retained their excellent standing. Our Sunday School has continued in spite of the departure of many of the children, there still remain twenty. Mrs. Racicot has the charge of the younger ones, and I teach the older ones.

Our congregation is not composed of rich people but of willing people to contribute according to their means. They have, I think generously responded to the appeal on behalf of the Endowment Fund—it is an object which met with their approbation and sympathy. Many wished themselves able to do a great deal more. The amount contributed among us to that object is \$656.

Owing to the efforts made for the Endowment Fund, the annual collection has not been quite as large as in former years, it amounts to \$120. Our Sunday collections have amounted to \$37.45. I am happy to say that the congregation has no debts, and that it has a small sum \$92 in reserve, with what may be raised later on towards bailding a new chapel, when the need of it shall be felt.

Mr. S. F. Willard has made his will, in which he donates, at his death, four hundred dollars—half that sum to the church at Roxton Pond and the other half to the Grande-Ligne Mission.

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LET.

Having come here only in December last as a laborer of the Grande Ligne Mission you will easily understand that I have not as yet been able to accomplish much. The season was not favorable, and I found a good many things needing immediate repairs on the mission buildings, the chapel and the other buildings on the mission lot. In this I found the Protestants of the neighborhood very ready and zealous in giving aid for necessary repairs. I immediately began my work on Sundays and week day meetings and visiting, especially those at first who from inability, age, sickness or distance could not attend meetings at the chapel. I was everywhere very cordially welcomed.

Our Sunday morning services have been attended by a congregation varying from thirty to seventy persons, according to the state of the weather and the roads. They appear to be much enjoyed.

Our Sunday school is divided into three classes, one under the direction of my daughter, a former pupil of the Grande Ligne Institute, the other by my wife, and the third by myse.f. The adults of the congregation also attend this exercise. It is perhaps the best occasion to instruct our Protestant followers.

At our prayer meetings, on Sunday and Wednesday evenings, we often have Roman Catholics present. The brethren and even the sisters take an active part in these. It is the religious service which suffers most on account of the scattered condition of the congregation. The singular irregularity of the temperature has had its effect on the attendance at public worship.

At some of these meetings several of the brothers take an active part. As we have no place of worship in out stations, we hold our meetings from house to house, and though attended with some inconveniences, it has had the advantages of bringing them closer together in Christian fellowship.

I am happy to say that the Lord has blessed the feeble but sincere efforts of his servants. I find generally more interest and more zeal for spiritual things. We also see that the grace of God has been extended to the children on whom we lay our great hopes.

As for Roman Catholics they are of difficult access. However, on many occasions, they have heard of the truth of the

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Gospel, for our brethren have been faithful with them. The missionary himself has had interviews with some of them, to read the New Testament and even to pray with them. On one occasion four of them attended one of our meetings, quite a number were present at a lecture given by one of the missionaries, and they seemed much pleased with what they heard. These are only small results as yet, but He who opened the eyes of the blind may enlighten these minds.

This year of labor has had its difficulties, and some painful incidents which I sincerely regret. But in the hands of God, our Saviour, they will turn to our ultimate good.

The church and congregation have certainly suffered for want of more regular ministration, and the privation of the Lord's supper, and still I can bear my joyous testimony to a marked progress among them since my arrival to work here.

Though no great efforts have yet been put forth in labors among Catholics, we have, nevertheless, seen as many as ten Roman Catholics attend our meetings. Three of our Protestant families have left the place to go to the United States or else-

### ANNUAL REPORT OF MRS. SCOTT'S BIBLE WORK.

Presented by Mrs. A. L. Therrien, to the Ladies Grande-Ligne Association of Montreal, at their Annual Meeting, Nov. 26, 1889.

In compliance with the request of our esteemed President and Secretary, I again present you, dear sisters, Mrs. Scott's report of her work during the year just passed. If we compare it with her preceding annual report we shall notice several features in which they differ considerably, while the same spirit of devotion and consecrated zeal is manifest in both. This difference comes in mostly in the numbers of Bibles and Testaments sold, which is considerably less this year than it was in either of the two previous years. There were three good reasons for this. The first is the

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fact that according to advice given her, Mrs. Scott has devoted less time than previously to mere book selling, and given more of it to visitation for the purpose of following up her colporteur work by endeavoring to interest and help in the study of God's Word those to whom she has sold copies of it, thus cultivating to some extent the field wherein the seed had been previously sown. The second is the no less important fact that within the last three years Montreal has been more thoroughly canvassed by colporteurs of different societies than it ever was before. The third is the old painful fact of the strong, persistent opposition on the part of priests and nuns to the distribution of the Bible among their people, even though it be a version formally, at least, approved by their church.

Mrs. Scott's reports show that a great deal of her time has been employed in reading the Word with Roman Catholic families, in protracted conversations, in visiting families already supplied with the New Testament, or the whole Bible, and in relieving the suffering. One word regarding the last part of her work. It is easily understood that this house to house work in the French part of our city necessarily brings the worker into frequent contact with the poor, the sick and the afflicted. Can the laborer be indifferent to this suffering? Ought she to be? Must she priest and Levite like, pass the suffering ones by, without ministering to them by pouring in their wounds the oil of sympathy and the wine of help. By following such a course would she be interpreting the mind and exhibiting the spirit of her Master? We think not; and we believe that it is by the imitation of the good Samaritan that her work will be most prospered. We should not think it strange, therefore, to hear of her vigils with the sick, of her visits to the hospital with many of them, and even of her securing for destitute families the necessaries of life.

Notwithstanding this division of her time, Mrs. Scott has sold during the year 353 portions of Scripture, 207 New Testaments, and six Bibles. She has made 200 protracted visits, read to Roman Catholics 964 chapters of God's Word and entered on the average forty houses daily, to offer to their inmates the sacred volume. That is besides doing a great deal of work in connection with the church. I will cite a few of the interesting facts she relates:

"An invalid woman who receives my visits joyously, and is deeply interested in the study of the Bible, told me that the priest

came to administer the Sacrament to a sick person in the neighborhood, and afterwards came in to confess her. She refused to confess, and said she would 'let him know when she needed his services.' This she could not have said had she not found, through the Word of God, that Christ is the great and only Confessor to whom we may at all times go.

A discussion occurred in a certain house as to whether or not the New Testament I wanted to sell them was "good," as they expressed it, several persons present insisting it was not good. "Well," I said, "I'll let the book speak for itself." While I read to them I overheard them say among themselves, in a whisper, "That cannot be the book the priest forbade us to buy; it is surely a good book." But, in the meantime, a woman from an adjoining house had entered, while they were preparing to buy three copies of the New Testament. "Don't you buy those books," she said ; "the priest has forbidden us to buy them, and they don't contain a single word about the Virgin Mary." I said to her, "You have evidently not read them, madame, for they do speak . of 'Mary, the Mother of our Lord,' and I opened my Testament, and read in the first chapter of Luke and elsewhere. She looked snrprised and said, "They must be good. Will you come with us to the priest, and if he says, they are good, I'll buy one, too; so that you will sell four of them instead of three 4" I did my best to sell them the Testaments without going to the priest, but in vain. Finally I agreed to go, hoping that the twelfth priest I was to visit, with the same view, would be found honest enough to to acknowledge one of their own versions of the New Testament. We went, but with the same result as before; and I returned home with an aching heart at the sight of such dishonesty.

In a certain family I was at first refused admission, but having somewhat insisted, I was finally allowed to go in. I was at once told they did not want any of my books; that they were "bad books." "My books are not bad," I said; "read for yourselves." "I cannot read," said the man, "and my wife has sore eyes." I laid my books aside, and began to talk about the woman's eyes, which seemed to be perfectly well. I afterward asked for the permission to read a chapter, to which request they assented. I read about the reasing of Lazarus. "Why, that's beautiful," they exclaimed, "the book is worth buying," and they bought it. They also invited me to come again.

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ey ey It may be well to say that several of the persons whom Mrs. Scott has evangelized attend the meetings of our church occasionally, and that two or three families are interested enough to have invited the minister to visit them, and teach them the truths of the Bible. Others are interested also, but none have come to that point yet where they can take a bold stand on the side of truth, so strong are the bonds that chain them to their church, and especially to the world.

Let us continue to do and pray for this work, feeling assured that our labors, our prayers, and our gifts "will not be in vain in the Lord."

### CONCLUSION.

At the end of another year of labor, which has been for some of us a season of hard and almost unceasing work, we have little else in our hearts but feelings of gratitude to our heavenly Father for his ever loving and fostering care, and to his many children around us for their kindly and generous efforts on our behalf, amounting in some instances to real sacrifice.

If it were not in some measure boasting of ourselves, we would gladly name several members of our Board, first of all our worthy and devoted President, who have given to this work and to the larger enterprise of this year, much of their time, energy, ability and even needful rest, to see it put on a footing which promises a much larger increase in the years to come.

On account of unavoidable circumstances, such as the absence of permanent laborers in two of our important stations, and as the sudden breaking up of our large school at Grande Ligne, the increase of membership in our churches, and the number of baptisms, have been less than in former years. But we trust that a near future has great blessings in store for us, and for the good of this people, to the enlightment and eternal welfare of which some of us have given the best of their energies, their life thoughts, and sacrificed some of the comforts of life. May the God of the Gospel grant it, for His name's sake.
