JANUARY.—There is no doubt that pigs if well fed will pay handsomely-They should get clean food and clean quarters. If this plan is followed, a pig should gain one pound for every four and a half pounds of grain, a breeding sow should gain one pound for every four and a half pounds of grain, a breeding sow should be carefully fed and allowed plenty of salt; her quarters should be comfortable, not crowded, well ventilated and dry. Give meat in regular supply, warm mess in morning and regular supply of grit, gravel, etc. Supply what the hens can pick up for themselves when outside. Send layers to roost with their crops full to carry them over night. Do not give layers soft feed enough to gorge them or make them lazy. For layers choose White Leghorns; for general purposes, Plymouth Rocks; for both, Wyandottes. Do not continue to inbreed, or the stock will decrease in size, stamina and value. Get rid of the three and four year old hens; keep the pullets; eat or sell the cockerels. Give the poultry as fair a trial as would be given a new kind of seed, vegetable, breed of horses or cattle. Utilize the grain, vegetable and meat waste of the farm by converting it into poultry and eggs.—A. G. Gilbert in Experimental Farm Report.

MARCH .- FLOWERS FOR FARMERS' WIVES .- So many farmers' wives have no place for flowers except, possibly, some far-off garden-spot, that I long to tell them how I have succeeded in raising flowers right at my back door, in spite of chickens and little pigs. I have had flowers in boxes and flowers in beds in the most hopeless situations and under the most discouraging surroundings, that,

nevertheless, were a source of delight all summer.

First, as to flowers in boxes: Never let them get dry; provide good drainage; have the soil one-third sand, and use large boxes. You cannot keep a small box, of dirt from drying out in the long hot days of July and August. I have had the best success with a wash-tub, or a box that would hold as much. Set on a stool to raise it above the reach of the chickens. Set your box as near the place where the men wash as convenient, so they will not have to take any unnecessary steps, and ask them to pour the water on the flowers intead of on the ground, then you will only need to water them in the evening. This arrangement will save you time and strength, and the family will take more interest and pleasure in your flowers than they will if you do all the work yourself.

Unless you provide good drainage and a sandy soil, your plants will suffer during a rainy time. The ground will become thoroughly soaked, and should the water remain in the soil it will cause the roots to rot, and thus stop the growth of the plants, if it does not kill them outright. Without plenty of sand, also, the soil may become packed and soggy. Bore some holes in the bottom of your tub or box. Put in your old broken crockery, bones, etc., and some charcoal. I think the charcoal keeps it pure and sweet, even though it is constantly damp. Cover these things with hay, so that no dirt can get through. Then get some good mellow soil, mix it with sand, fill your box, and it is ready for the plants, The Honoral Private Secr

APRIL.—"Lambs will use cows milk as profitably as any other farm live-stock," says Mr. J. A. Craig. In an experiment for the purpose of testing the value of this method, the lambs were taken from the ewes at ten days old. They were fed from a dipper and not by the bottle, the latter method being too expensive. The greatest trouble after they have learned to drink is to prevent them from taking too much at a time. It has been found a good plan to trellis the bushes like grape vines. Run a wire through the rows about 4½ feet from the ground to this, tie the bushes, and cut them off about six feet from the ground. This will keep them from breaking down, and will increase the crop. Currants like strong clay soil, full of moisture. Old wood should be cut **away, ** and **the bushes should be shaded. Gooseberries like strong soil, but it should be well drained; prune diligently; the bushes require some shade as the berry burns easily. Plant your bushes where the hens cannot get at them; they will leave anything for a gooseberry bush. Grapes require well drained ground with a warm exposure. The trellises should run north and south. JUNE.—There is no doubt that the cabbage grower loses more plants from the cabbage maggot than from any other pest. The female lays her eggs close to the stem of the plant after it has been set out, the eggs hatch in a few days, and the work of destruction begins; suddenly the plant collapses, and nothing will revive it. The best treatment for these maggots is to use white hellebore, 20z. to three gallons of water. Force the liquid around the root of the plant, which should first be laid bare, then restore the earth. The hellebore kills the maggot and the forcible application tends to drive it away from the root. This should be done about the third week in June, and, if carefully attended to, very few of the plants will be lost. plants will be lost.

JULY.—How many farmers understand the points of a good cow, that is, a good dairy animal. She should have a long udder lengthwise of her body, and clastic; her skin should be soft and covered with fine hair; her body should be large and capable of containing enough food for the work expected of her; then the milk veins under the body should be prominent; she should have broad loins with long rumps, a rather long neck with a well cut face and prominent eyes. An authority thus describes the good serviceable dairy cow, and farmers would do well to go through their yards and decide whether they are not feeding some of their cows without any sufficient return for the outlay. The same authority says cows should be fed twice a day and curried once, and always should be kept in a comfortable place.

AUGUST.—A FEW TIMELY HINTS. Do not put off the work of potting plants which have been growing in the garden during summer, till too late. We may expect frosts at the North any time after the first of September, and it is best to be in readiness for them. Therefore begin to take up your plants as soon as September comes, and get this work done as soon as possible. Set the plants away in a cool and shady place, after potting, and water them well. Leave them to get thoroughly established before placing in the sun, and do not bring them into the house as long as there is no danger of their freezing out-of-doors.

The flowering season of such tender fall blooming plants as the dahlia and salvia can be greatly prolonged by covering the plants with sheets of newspaper on cold nights. FIRST CLASS MATTER.

In addressing letters add the name of the county in which the Post-Office addressed is situated; if to a city, add street and number.

Letters for the United States should bear the name of the State as wellas that of the

Post-Office.

A letter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and must be forwarded according to its direction.

Letters containing gold or silver money, jewels or anything liable to Customs duties, cannot be forwarded to any country beyond the Dominion except to the United States.

Letters addressed to initials, or fictitious names, will not be delivered unless addressed in care of a resident or to some box in the Post-Office.

Letters bearing mutilated stamps, or stamps so soiled and defaced as to make it impossible for the sorting clerks to decide whether they have been used before or not, will be sent to the Postmaster General for his adjudication.

Letters addressed to places in Canada and United States, 3 cents per ounce or fraction thereof.

Great Britain and all European Countries, 5 cents per ½ oz. or fraction thereof.

Letters addressed to places in the United States must be prepaid at least one full rate (3 cents), otherwise they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

Partly prepaid Letters addressed to places in Canada will be forwarded to destination, subject on delivery to double the amount of postage remaining unpaid; and letters on which no postage has been prepaid will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

Letters re-directed to places in Canada and the United States, without being taken out of the Post Office, are not liable to any additional postage.

REQUEST LETTERS.

Letters for places in Canada, the United States and Newfoundland sent in Envelopes having printed thereon, on the address side, a request that the letters be returned to the sender if not delivered within a certain specified time, will be returned as requested if not delivered in the time stated.

LEGAL AND COMMERCIAL DOCUMENTS.

The Postage on Legal and Commercial Papers for the United States, Great Britain and all European countries is 5 cents for the first 10 oz., and 1 cent for every additional 2 oz. These Papers, when posted for delivery in Canada, must be prepaid at Letter or Parcel Post Rates—but Deeds and Insurance Policies may be sent if prepaid 1 cent per

POST CARDS.

SEPTEMBER.-Apples should not be gathered for keeping until the seeds are fully colored, as the fruit makes considerable growth while the seeds are coloring; after the fruit is carefully gathered, the whole question of keeping resolves itself into a question of temperature with due attention to moisture. Pears, apples and grapes require a low and uniform temperature and proper protection from fungus attacks. Aside from the latter danger, which may be favored by dampness, a saturated atmosphere is not objectionable, but care must be taken not to allow cold fruit to be taken into a warm air. In Russia it is a custom to preserve apples fresh in cold water, and a case is on record of Fameuse, which were sunk in a canal boat, having kept until they were raised in April, although they can rarely be kept in air beyond the first of Feburary. An even temperature near to freezing is the best, and should be taken to have the fruit go into storage in good order. Fruit designed for long keeping should be gathered early in the day or in cloudy weather. A barrel of sun-heated apples, even if put at once into a cool cellar, has lost greatly in keeping quality.-T. H. Haskins in Garden and Forest.

Cuttings, Bulbs, Roots and Scions, or Grafts, can only be sent to the United

Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbs, Roots and Scions, or Grafts, can only be sent to the United States as 5th Class Matter; when posted for delivery in Canada, the postage is 1 cent per 4 oz., and the limit of weight 5 lbs.

PATTERNS AND SAMPLES.

Actual Patterns and Samples of Merchandise, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, may be sent to any place in Canada for 1 cent per 4 oz. Goods sent in execution of an order, not being actually Trade Patterns or Samples, are not admissible as such. FOURTH CLASS MATTER. PARCELS.

Sealed tins containing fish, lobster, vegetables, meats, etc., if put up in a solid manner and labelled in such a way as to fully indicate the nature of their contents, may be sent as 5th Class Matter within the Dominion; but no sealed matter can be forwarded to the United States under this head. REGISTRATION.

All classes of matter addressed to places in Canada the United States, Newfoundland, Great Britain or any Postal Union Country may be registered for a fee of 5 cents for each article in addition to the Postage, and letters may be registered to most of the countries not included in the Union.

Every article intended for registration must be handed in at the wicket, and a receipt obtained therefor; on no account must it be dropped into a letter box. The registration fee should be paid by registration stamp.

NOVEMBER.—Smut is a miscroscopic plant that starts from a minute body called a spore. The spores when in considerable numbers make up the so-called smut of the corn, as seen in the affected ear or other parts of the infected plant. These spores may fall to the ground and remain there a long time, and when the field is planted the smut will make its entrance into the young plant. The smut spores may become lodged in the folds of the grain and remain there until planted with the corn. It is on this account that it is important to plant clean seed. The grain can be freed from the smut spores by killing them while upon it, and this may be accomplished by soaking the seed in a strong solution of blue-vitriol or blue-stone, using one pound to a gallon of water, and leaving the corn in the solution only long enough to get thoroughly wet over all the surface. A better way now recommended by many is to let the grain lie in hot water between 130 and 135 degrees Fahr. for a few minutes, then let it be spread out and dried.

DECEMBER.—PERENNIAL PHLOX.—This plant is to the herbaceous garden what the geranium is to the window-garden—hardy, free-flowering and of the easiest cultivation. It comes into bloom in July and August, and continues until the latter part of September. It grows to a height of three feet, and a foot of the upper portion of the stalk will be completely covered with flowers of about the size of a silver half-dollar. The colors range through all shades of red, crimson, pink, mauve and purple to the purest milk-white. Some varieties are striped with contrasting colors, while other varieties are marked in the centre or on the base of each petal. No flower gives a more brilliant effect. Those who have never grown it will be surprised at the results to be obtained from planting it in masses or in rows, with the colors arranged in such a manner as to bring out the beauty of each by striking contrast. A most beautiful bed is made by planting rose-colored varieties in the centre with white ones on the outside. The plants form strong roofs, which can be divided, from time to time, until one has as many
