Correspondence of The Times-Star LONDON, Dec. 4. — The day is rapidly approaching when England will call upon France to make some pro-posal for the funding of the debt to this country, and bankers consider that the French hostility to our policy in Egypt has been deliberately designed with a view to countering our demand for settlement. A well-known inter-national financier, who has just come back from Paris, tells me that it is openly said in French official circles that Great Britain will take a more lenient view of France's indebtedness if France can offer, in return for a favorable settlement, a cessation of the hostile criticism of our Egyptian and Soudan policy.
