

Farmers, for instance, complain that agricultural labor never has been so sparce and so dear and in the industrial lowns of the north it has actually been bound necessary to import workmen from England and Scotland.

Another interesting feature of the present emigration is the fact that by far he greater proportion of it is drawn from he north. The "poverty stricken" south and west are finding work at home for heir own people. It is only fair to say, lowever, that the northern emigrants are different class from those who used to o from the south and west. In the old ays the Irishmen who left the old land were almost all agricultural laborers, who cent out in the hope of earning higher ages in the new countries, but with little immediate prospect of being anything ut wage-earners.

WEEK'S MARKET MOVEMENTS

(Toronto Globe).

A reaction came finally in the local cattle market on Monday. The finest grades sold at 25c. less, and common stuff, of which there was abundance, changed hands at a dollar lower. Both sheep and spring lambs were reduced and hogs went cheaper by 25 cents.

Butter and eggs keep firm in price, under a steady demand. Cheese is weakening a little. Beans from Hungary have been distributed to the trade, and were a little disappointing, while cheaper. New imported potatoes are worth \$4 per barrel. Strawberries sold at 10 to 12 cents per box, in large quantities. Crop impaired by bad weather. Cherries are more plentiful at from \$1 to \$1.50 per basket.

Dressed lamb declined three cents per pound, and dressed hog market weaker.

Hay has steadily weakened, \$21 being the outside price paid yesterday for loose, and \$18 for baled. Farmers are clearing barns for new crop. Prospects are for fine crop of hay, but farmers want rain badly. Hay and hogs lower in Provincial markets.

The grain situation steadily strengthened last week, with No. 1 northern at \$1.14 1-2. Feed wheat has been the feature of the market, large quantities being sold. Foreign demand strong. Stores of highgrade wheat seriously low.

THE CEMENT SITUATION

Ottawa, July 4—The recent cut in the cement duty has apparently not had the expected effect either in increasing the importations of cement from the United States or in decreasing prices to the consumer.

portations of cement from the United States or in decreasing prices to the consumer.

The customs department reports that so far there has been in eastern Canada, at any rate, very little increase in importations of cement. There has been a slight increase reported from Toronto, but as far as the departmental reports go any increase is due rather to the normal increase in department and the same conditions of price through the cut in duty. Ret ports from the west have not yet been received in any detail, but the same conditions appear to exist there.

The reason given is that the United States cement manufacturers have in creased their prices to Canadian buyers, so as to practically offset the decrease in duty and cement is now said to be procurable just as cheaply from the Canadian manufacturers as from across the line.

Indications point to a combine among the cement manufacturers in the States, and a governmental investigation is now being made as to the facts. The customs department here is also endeavoring to find out if there is any such combine either in Canada or the United States, with a view to unduly keeping up the price of cement to the consumer.

TWENTY-FIVE OF DEAD

NOTED REDEMPTORIST PRIEST DIES IN CHAIR

Father Henning Was 74 Years Old and Only Recently Celebrated Golden Anniversary

The Rev. Joseph Henning, one of the leading orators and teachers of the Redenptorist Order, was found dead in a chair in his study on Wednesday, in the parish house of the Church of the Immaculate Conception, at 150th street and Melrose avenue, New York. Death was due to heart disease.

Father Henning on June 11 celebrated his golden aninversary as a priest. He was ordained in Baltimore on June 11, 1862. He was born in New York seventy-four years ago, and received his early education at the parochial school of the church of the Holy Redeemer.

He afterward went to the College of St. Francis Xavier, and then entered the Redemptorist Seminary in Cumberland, Md. He took his vows in 1855. He was a professor of mathematics, classics and philosophy in various places in Europe and Canada. Five years ago he returned from Quebec to the church at which he died and where he had been a young priest.




