ENEMY ATTACK THE SUSSEX CAMP

Vigorously Fought Sham Battle Today—Umpires Reserve Decision Till This Afternoon

(Special to Times) Sussex, N. B., July 5.—The annual sham fight was held this morning. Lieutenant Colonel McDougall in command of the 8th Hussars, formed the advance party of the enemy and took up a stand on Ryan's Hill, two miles from Sussex.

The plan of defence of the Sussex troops was to dislodge the enemy from the hill. The 15th infantry, including four regiments in charge of Lieutenant O. C. McKenzie, attacked the face of the hill, while the 28th dragoons, under Major Wilson, attacked the enemy on their left flank.

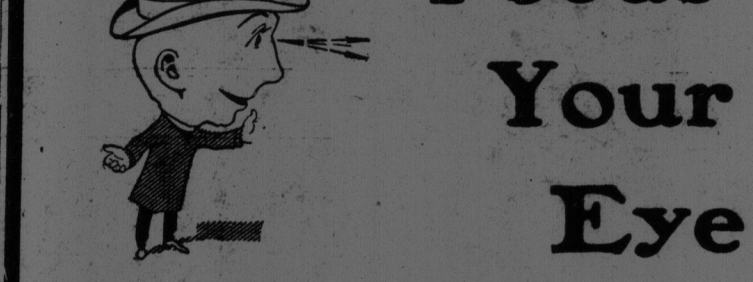

SOOTHING ITS FRIENDS

The Borden government is taking steps to reassure its high tariff friends that it has no intention of depriving them of the profits derived from the protection of a high tariff wall. They are assured that the temporary lowering of the duty on cement is exceptional and not to be regarded as a menace to the general interests of the combine. Thus the Standard has today an inspired message from Ottawa which says—

The bridge at the falls has taken another leap into the future. The elections are over.

The Saskatchewan nominations took place yesterday, elections on Thursday next.

Nearly twice as many people were killed in the railway wreck at Corning, N. Y., as perished in the Regina cyclone.

Parents should take note of the fact that children entering school for the first time, at the close of the summer holidays must first have been vaccinated.

"I stand for a great navy," Mr. Borden is said to have declared. That is easy. Britain has a great navy, and is making it greater. But what about Canada's position?

The chronicler of the great event at Las Vegas informs us that Mr. Jack Johnson "grinned like an ape" as he put it over Mr. Jim Flynn. Ape was the first prize fighter and the griffin is not yet extinct.

Here is a nugget of wisdom presented by Mr. James J. Hill—"Conservation does not mean forbidding access to resources that could be made available for present use. It means the freest and largest development of them consistent with the public interest and without waste. A bag of gold buried in the earth is useless for any purpose. So is an acre uncultivated, a mine unopened, a forest that bars the way to homes and human happiness."

Of medical inspection of schools in Great Britain, Mrs. Tweedie writes in the Fortnightly Review—"General medical inspection of the school children is being tentatively introduced. A sad lesson is being taught from this medical inspection of our industrial population, where among 6,000,000 school children 40 per cent. suffer from bad teeth, 10 per cent. from defective sight, 40 per cent. from unclean noses, and a large percentage from malnutrition."

What would such inspection in St. John show?

The following item should interest St. John people, who still boast of a jaunting—"The Toronto industrial farm, Yonge street, which is being worked by inmates from the jail, is doing quite a business in butter, milk and cream, which are sold in the city. Twenty-seven cows are being milked and the butter made by the prisoners and sold in the city amounting to about \$15 to \$20 a week. The proceeds from milk and cream amount to several dollars a week also."

It quite takes one's breath to learn what some of the farmers are doing in Ontario. The Toronto Globe says—"Electricity on the farm is no longer a mere phrase, it is becoming more and more of a practical nature, and is applied to various kinds of work on several farms in Ontario. Last week at Beachville, in Oxford county, practical demonstrations were given under the auspices of the Ontario Hydro-electric Commission showing how cheap and clean the use of electricity is in cooking, pumping, feed and corn cutting, cream separating, and the like. The lighting by electricity of the farmhouses and farmsteads was shown to be equally cheap and effective. This coming harvest an electric reaper and thrasher will be tested on several farms. Although the electric miller appears to do his work without an abundance of rich comedy, well, the farmers, and there were dozens of them, who saw the test at Beachville left still shaking their heads over the miller."

It is worth while to consider the relative situation and prospects of St. John and Vancouver, in connection with this matter of real estate. The correspondent of the Financial Times says that the population of Vancouver is increasing fifteen or twenty thousand per year, but he is unable to see any exceptional reasons for a boom. Predictions of continued expansion are based on the completion of the Panama Canal, the arrival of the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Northern, and new steamship services to the Orient; but as a matter of fact there are no great harbor developments in progress to provide for the expected rush of business. Yet people are buying in and real estate sells at prices which would make St. John quotations appear ridiculously low.

St. John also is assured of the coming of the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern, and it also stands to profit somewhat by the completion of the Panama Canal, and St. John is getting ready for the business. Enormous expenditures are being made in harbor developments, both on the east and west sides, and large new industries are certain to be established here within the near future. Industrial growth in Vancouver is not so rapid in proportion to the increase in population as it is in St. John. Making a comparison, therefore, between the east and the west coast cities, it is perfectly clear that St. John must experience rapid growth and a much more active real estate movement. One of the reasons for our failure to progress more rapidly is found in the statement, which any broker will confirm, that whereas in Vancouver and other western cities home investment takes first place, enormous sums of money go out of this city and province for investment elsewhere. In years past enormous sums have been sent away, and there is still a disposition on the part of many to look with more favor on an outside industrial proposition than a local one. As time passes and the evidence of local expansion and progress becomes more pronounced, it may be taken for granted that local investors will take a larger part in the business. At present we are hoping for and seeking to attract capital from the old country. There would be great rejoicing if a capitalist from the old country invested \$50,000 in a St. John proposition. Yet it is nothing for \$50,000 of St. John money to be sent out of the city for investment in industrial enterprises elsewhere in Canada. It may be a very excellent investment, yielding good returns, but is there not also a very excellent field at home? If not, why should we attempt, if we are honest, to induce outside capitalists to invest their money here?

TO OPERATE CHAIN OF WAREHOUSES IN CANADA New Ten Million Dollar Company is Organized in Montreal Montreal, July 5.—There need be no car shortage or congestion of business on the Grand Trunk and G. T. P. lines if present plans materialize. The experience of recent years throughout Canadian railway systems has been that the want of adequate warehouse accommodation is a responsible for considerable loss every year. The organization of the "Grand Trunk Terminals Warehouse Company, Ltd." is announced. This company agrees to establish and operate a chain of warehouses on Grand Trunk lines across Canada, in return for the railway's warehousing business for a period of thirty years. The first chain of warehouses on the programme will include Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Vancouver, and other large distributing centres. Then construction will be undertaken in cities of smaller size until, in a year or two, the whole system will be covered. As a preliminary step the property of the Montreal Warehousing Company in Commission street has been purchased and will be immediately enlarged to three-fold its present capacity. J. N. Greenhield, K.C., is the moving spirit in the new company, he being largely responsible for the terms of contract with the Grand Trunk. The capital of the company will be \$10,000,000 bonds, of which \$5,000,000 will be issued now, and \$5,000,000 common stock. In the first offering of bonds made privately by the Quebec Trust Co., more than one million dollars' worth was taken up at once. An arriving at their destination goods

KEEP SONS OF
IRELAND HOME
Steady Decline in Emigration
Is Being Continued
This Year
INDUSTRIAL AWAKENING
Work Being Found For All Who
Want it—Dullness of Country
Life Banished By Gaelic League
and Similar Organizations

(Times Special Correspondence)
Dublin, June 23—Hopeful evidence of the changing conditions in Ireland is returned in the report of the registrar-general on emigration which has just been issued. This shows that in the five months ended May 31 last, 14,070 persons left Ireland, this being a decrease of 2,507 compared with the corresponding period last year.

Another interesting feature of the present emigration is the fact that by far the greater proportion of those drawn from the north, the 'poverty-stricken' south and west are finding work at home for their own people. However, that the northern emigrants are a different class from those who used to go from the south is also evident.

Improvement in Villages
Another feature in Irish life, which is a strong factor in keeping the people at home, is the improvement in the villages. The old insanitary hovels have been swept away and replaced by neat cottages, and in addition to this physical improvement the amenities of village life have been wonderfully increased by the Gaelic leagues and other agencies.

RESULTS OF OBSERVATION BY WRITER ON CENTRAL ITALY JOURNEY. Rome, June 14.—During a month's travelling in Central Italy, chiefly among the mountain towns of Umbria and the Marche, and well off the beaten tracks, I have had some opportunity of watching the attitude of the Italian "man in the street" towards the war, and the general impression I have gathered may be of some interest to our readers. One very striking feature of the war is entering on a new phase without apparently drawing any nearer to a close. One to nearly heads of the war talked about in public places—it seems to be so infrequent a topic of conversation among the people that one might be inclined at first to think that they take little interest in it. But to satisfy himself that this was not a very superficial opinion, one has only to watch the rush that takes place every day, even in the smallest towns, for the newspapers, as soon as the train from Rome or from Milan arrives, and the avidity with which their contents are devoured.

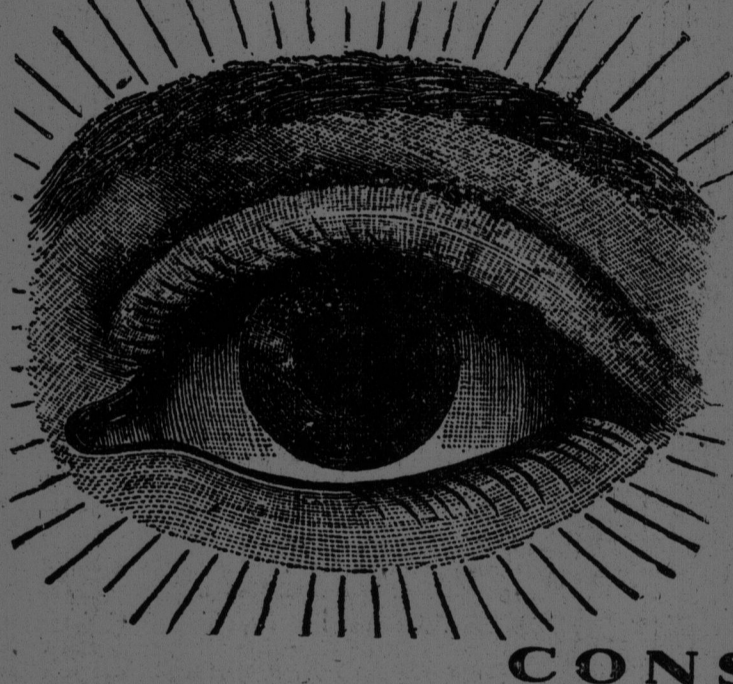

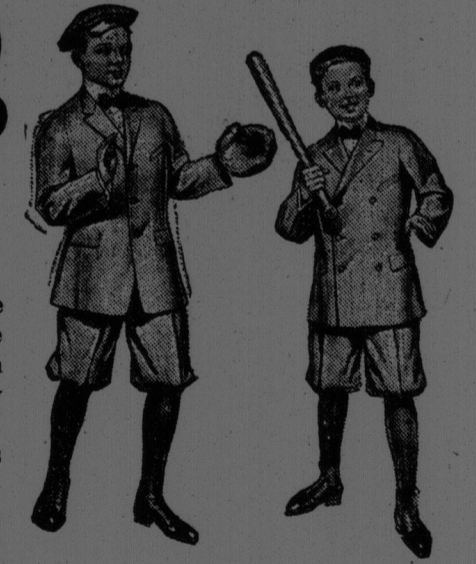

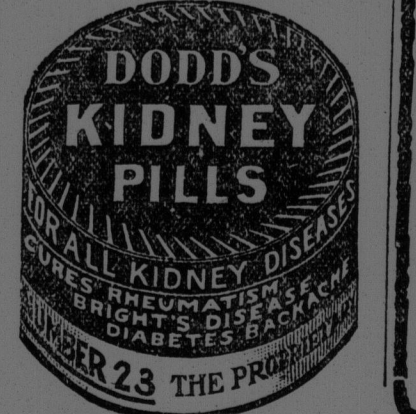

THE GOVERNMENT
SESSIONS IN CITY

Successor to Mr. Wilmet as Immigration Agent—Jordan Sanitarium Commission

The meeting of the local government which commenced yesterday afternoon was continued this morning, routine business being the order of the day. Another session this afternoon will be necessary to complete matters before them. The premier heard in connection with the appointment of Mrs. Freeman to the position of Immigration Agent. It is expected that at this meeting of the government a successor to Mr. Wilmet as immigration agent will be appointed. The names most prominently heard in connection with the appointment are those of L. J. Flowers of McDonald's Corner, and James Gishurst, of Bloomfield, Kings county.

The government yesterday afternoon approved the petitions for the incorporation of the Seakville Plumbing Heating Co., Ltd., Mrs. Freeman Co. Ltd., Marysville General Stores, Ltd., Stuckney-Hall Co. Ltd., Main Ltd., and Miramichi Publishing Co. Ltd. No action was taken on the petition of the St. John Exhibition Association for an exhibit at the fall fair but the premier said they would probably arrange something. The route plans for the Valley Railway were under discussion. The government met in the afternoon as the board of Education when the re-arrangement of certain school districts and other matters of routine business were discussed.

So far no appointments have been made for the new Farm Board to inaugurate the ready made farm policy of the government. Neither has an appointment been made to fill the vacancy on the Public Utilities Commission left by the resignation of M. McInnis.

AGAINST PROJECT
Home for Incurables Management Will Not Consider Matter of New Wing

At the monthly meeting of the board of management of the Home for Incurables held yesterday afternoon, after the routine business had been disposed of, the tuberculosis light question was dealt with. It had been suggested that the Society for Prevention of Tuberculosis be allowed to build a wing on the home and use it as a home for tuberculous patients. The new addition to be under the management of the Home for Incurables. A resolution was passed, however, that this matter be not considered, as it was feared the close proximity of tuberculous patients to old people in the home might prove disastrous. One female patient was accepted.

MATTERS FOR RAILWAY COMMISSION HERE

It is reported that at the session of the Board of Railroad Commissioners to be held on July 8, they will consider the application of the Montreal Board of Trade for an order:
(a) Reducing the rate on ex-lake corn from Georgian Bay ports to Montreal on the same basis as in effect on ex-lake wheat, barley and oats.
(b) Directing the C. P. R. to apply the mileage base as in effect in Ontario and Quebec, as shown in the company's tariff on cornmeal shipped from Montreal to the company's points in New Brunswick.
