

Waterhouse & Company, who have since 1917 been checking up the revenues and expenditures of New Brunswick. The tables found herewith cover the ordinary receipts and

expenditures of the year as well as the capital assets and expenditures. It will be noted, of course, that the revenues for 1924 were somewhat larger than those of 1923, but the expenditures kept pace with them.

SURPLUS OF \$10,000 IS SHOWN

The important result is that the province had a surplus of \$10,000, without considering the deficit on account of the bonds of the St. John and Quebec railway. That deficit this year, as last, amounts to about a quarter of a million dollars. There are other outstanding features of the financial report, that will attract the attention of those intimately acquainted with provincial affairs. The revenues from stumpage were much larger than usual and about a half a million dollars was paid in to the treasury of the province out of the profits of liquor sales.

Those who take a keen interest in the financial standing of the province will be much interested in the amount of the capital expenditures and the additions by reason of them, to the public debt as well as the standing of the sinking funds. All of the figures will be found herewith.
