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MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS
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HELD IN THE TOWN OF COBOURG, FROM JUNE 5TH TO JUNE 11TH, 1890.

The SEVENTH SESSION of the BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE was opened in the Division Street Methodist Church, in the town of Cobourg, on Thursday, June 5th, 1890, at 9 a.m. The Conference prayer-meeting, conducted by the President, was a season of much profit and help, and continued for one hour.

At 10 o'clock the Rev. Dr. CARMAN, General Superintendent, announced the 117th hymn, after the singing of which the Rev. Chancellor BURWASH, President of Conference, led in prayer.

The roll of ministerial members was called, and the names of the lay delegates elected by the District Meetings read by the Secretary, when 113 ministers and 34 laymen responded.

The report of the Transfer Committee was presented by the President, showing the following transfers:

Into the Conference.—Aaron D. Miller, Superannuated, from Niagara Conference; C. O. Johnson and Joseph H. Locke, from Toronto Conference; W. L. Rutledge and J. P. Wilson, B.A., from Manitoba Conference.

From the Conference.—James Allen, M.A., and T. W. Pickett, to Manitoba Conference; M. L. Pearson, to Toronto Conference; Foster McAmmond, B.A., to Montreal Conference.

The ballot for President resulted in the election of the Rev. WM. BURNS.

Rev. WM. R. YOUNG, B.A., was elected Secretary.

On nomination of the Secretary, Revs. D. O. CROSSLEY and D. F. GEE were appointed Assistant Secretaries, and Rev. C. W. WATCH, Journal Secretary. Rev. D. S. HOUCK was appointed Reporter for the *Christian Guardian*.

On motion, the hours of Conference were fixed: 9 a.m. to 12 noon; 2 p.m. to 5.30 p.m.; and the Evening Sessions as announced.

Resolved,—That the resolution of last year with reference to the appointment of a Nominating Committee be re-affirmed, viz.: "That one minister and one layman be appointed from each District, the said Committee to nominate all Committees not provided for in the Constitution.

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QUESTION.—What Ministers and Probationers have died during the year?

REV. ROBERT ROBINSON.

Brother Robinson was born in the town of Lettigo, county of Donegal, Ireland, in 1818, and died at his home in Belleville, the 8th of March, 1890. At the age of eighteen, after many conflicts, he struggled into liberty, and was so enraptured with the lofty freedom which the Son gives to the weary and worn of earth who come to Him for deliverance, that he could not refrain from publishing the good news to earth's weary, erring and lost ones. He soon became a local preacher in his native land.

In 1844, he came to this country—attended Victoria College for a time, and was ordained a minister in the Wesleyan Church in 1849.

Our dear Brother Robinson possessed many noble qualities, some of which we may mention. These excellences were peculiarly adapted to the ministry of his early day. Natural amiability heightened by grace, broad and generous sympathies extending to all ranks and conditions. A special aptitude to interest the young, and turn their opening minds and tender hearts toward divine things before the world got the monopoly, joined to a ready and opportune application of Scripture texts to each individual, rendered him a very winsome laborer among the youth of his congregations.

When Mr. Robinson entered the ministry, over forty years ago, profundity of learning, and great brilliance and the arts of philosophical eloquence were not so much in demand as in our day; but what was in demand then as now, and even in a higher degree, was a countenance beaming with Divine love, a joyous and hopeful spirit joined to a holy ardor, tender sympathy for the erring and the sinful, a heavenly unction, and great suavity of manners, these were the qualities above all others which endeared the young pastor to his flock, and in these magnetic amiabilities Brother Robinson excelled. Some of us have pleasing memories of his vivacious and hopeful spirit, which caused his face to shine with a heavenly lustre, when in the more private interviews, or in the great congregation he spoke with ease and grace of the world's Redeemer, and of the great deliverance He offers all.

Furthermore, as we might expect from his unbounded and unquestioning faith in God, Mr. Robinson went without murmuring to his circuits as of divine allotment, and was fully persuaded of his providential path, and though there might be some asperities in the way, a Heavenly Father's hand would smooth the path for His trusty servant, and cause even the hardships and rugged and uninviting things work together for good.

Another excellency of our departed brother was the lively interest he took in his early ministry in our public schools, frequently visiting them and addressing to teachers and scholars words of cheer, words of encouragement, and words of help, always with some happy turn reminding each of them of the exalted relation they bore to their Father in Heaven, and how important to acknowledge Him in all their ways, that He might direct their steps, and render their lives beautiful, joyous, honorable, and in the end ascend to be like their glorious Redeemer forever.

We have found the subject of this brief notice an unostentatious, uncomplaining, meek and joyous Christian, full of faith and good works, a trusty and loving companion, faithful in all his house, a true servant of his adorable Master, with whom he has gone to reign.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee regret to have to report an enormous increase of drunkenness within the bounds of the Annual Conference, the undoubted fruit of the repeal of the Scott Act. We would, therefore, urge our people to support the adoption by municipalities of local prohibition, as permitted by the Act recently passed by the Local Legislature.

Inasmuch as the licensing system is "wrong in principle, powerless as a remedy, and cannot be sanctioned without sin," we hope that our people will lend their influence to, and cast their ballots always and only on the line of prohibitive legislation.

In view of the fact that in 1889 the Dominion Parliament declared that it will give the country a prohibitory law when the people are ready for it, we believe the Christian people of the land should not let this opportunity pass without letting their voice be heard.

We, therefore, heartily endorse the proposition of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church to secure the co-operation of the different churches in advancing prohibitory legislation, by passing resolutions, and circulating petitions on the line of such resolutions among their people. We, therefore, recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:—

Whereas, The traffic in intoxicating liquors is a recognized evil, producing a large proportion of the poverty, suffering, disorder and crime in our Dominion, and unnecessarily adding much to the taxes of our people; *And whereas*, We believe that a law enacted by the Dominion Parliament prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of all alcoholic liquors, except for use in mechanical and medicinal purposes, and containing ample provisions for its strict enforcement by the proper authorities, will greatly diminish these and other evils, and largely increase the prosperity, and promote the health, peace and morals of our country.

It is therefore resolved, That in the opinion of this Bay of Quinte Conference it is now the duty of the Dominion Parliament to enact such a prohibitory law.

2. That a form of petition to the Dominion Parliament, asking for the enactment of such a prohibitory law, be agreed upon by the Committees on Temperance of the different Churches, and that each Committee attend to the work, and bear the expense of circulating such petitions among its own people.

3. That such petition be signed by members and adherents of the Churches who are not less than sixteen years of age.

4. That the arranging and carrying out of all necessary details be entrusted to a joint committee to be composed of one member of the Committee of each Church co-operating in this movement.

In compliance with the request of the Executive Committee of the Dominion Alliance, we recommend the endorsement of the principles, constitution and platform of the Alliance, especially in urging upon temperance men to support only those candidates for parliamentary and municipal honors who are known temperance men, pledged to support total prohibition. We also recommend the appointment of the following brethren to represent this Conference at the Council of the Dominion Alliance to be held in Montreal, August 14th, 1890, viz:—Revs. J. C. Wilson, M. J. Bates, J. A. McCamus, and N. Damer Drew.

Your Committee regret to learn that some of our people do not use the unfermented juice of the grape, and hope in the future that only unfermented wine will be used at our sacramental services.

We furthermore respectfully recommend that the following memorial be adopted by this Conference, and forwarded to the General Conference:—

Whereas, the final and lasting success of prohibition will chiefly depend, under God, on the efficient temperance training of the young, therefore we memorialize the General Conference to give this subject special consideration, and take such steps as they may deem best to bring about the most completely organized, systematic and thorough education

of the rising generation ; and pray that such effort be attempted on a larger scale, and with far greater zeal than ever, and that this education should include the scientific, economic, historic, moral and religious aspects of the question.

This involves faithful temperance teaching in the secular schools ; the most effective Christian training in our Sabbath-schools and homes ; the widest and wisest use of temperance literature ; the organization of the young on some simple and practicable plan, and the co-operation of all temperance societies, and temperance men and women, in some well defined system of action.

REPORT OF SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee, having collected the Sabbath-school statistics from the several Districts in this Conference, are prepared to report as follows:—The number of schools, 393, increase, 19 ; number of officers and teachers, 3,482, increase, 276 ; number of scholars, 27,194, increase, 1,882 ; number of conversions reported, 1,326, increase beyond last year, 211 ; 4,945 are reported as meeting in class, a decrease from last year's figures of 202 (this latter item, we think, demands serious consideration) ; number learning catechism, 3,066, an increase of 125 ; total abstainers reported, 4,578, a decrease of 433 ; volumes in libraries, 24,356, a falling off of 296. The aggregate number of our denominational periodicals in use in our schools numbers 38,665, an increase of 2,745. Number of other papers, 2,985, a decrease of 230. Contributions to missions, \$1,711.80, an increase of \$137.52. For the sustentation of our Sunday-schools, \$12,106.49, an amount less than the year previous of \$456.84. Contributions on behalf of Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund, \$286.75, a slight advance of \$2.30. Uniform lessons are for the most part being used, and an increased number of teachers' meetings for their study is reported. There is an increase in the number of schools kept open during the whole year. On the whole, the showing in this department of our work is gratifying. Yet your Committee would not forget to say that there is still room for improvement, and with a field so wide, and interest and object so important calling for continued and even increased earnest effort, it is hoped that the consecrated talent in our Church may with a worthy devotion seek in the use of every available instrumentality to realize through the divine blessing the enlargement and success of our Sabbath-school work.

We recommend that, as the business of the Conference has for the last few years rendered it inconvenient to carry out that part of the Conference programme appointing the Sabbath-school service on the Tuesday evening, that the Conference Sunday-school anniversary service be held in the afternoon on the Conference Sabbath, and the report be presented at that meeting. And further, we recommend that all District schedules be placed in the hands of the S. S. Committee on the first day of Conference, so that the report can be prepared for the anniversary service on Sabbath.

We beg also to recommend that William Jolliffe be the Secretary-Treasurer for the ensuing year.

TREASURER'S REPORT OF THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL AID AND EXTENSION FUND.

The receipts for the year now closing on behalf of this Fund amount to \$286.75. It is encouraging to be able to state that the contributions to this Fund, so worthy and important, have steadily increased from \$191 in 1884, to \$286.75 in 1890. These amounts would have been considerably augmented had every Circuit contributed thereto; but it is a fact much to be regretted that some even independent Circuits have failed to act upon the requirements and discipline of our Church in supporting this Fund. We hope that henceforth our reports in aid of this Fund will be full from every Circuit and Mission within the bounds of our Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee submit that, considering the generally depressed state of finance and trade, and the very prevalent epidemic, both of which have affected the progress, if not the spirit, of the year's work, that still there are abundant evidences of the presence of the Triune God, blending diversities and inspiring through difficulties, and the fact that peace, love and a measure of prosperity have attended the operations of our Church.

The cheering numerical increase of nearly eight hundred in our membership during the year, we hope will arouse to more general longing and praying for the revival spirit to touch every corner throughout the Conference, and by utilizing the growing enthusiasm in our Sunday-school work, the agency and co-operation of the League and other bands for Christian effort, we certainly should look for unheard-of advances and glorious victories.

We find a gratifying increase in the Woman's Missionary department, a small increase in the general receipts, and rejoice in the token of development of the missionary spirit.

We cannot but draw attention to the fact that partial and inadequate grants to the domestic missionaries seriously impair their usefulness to the Church, and depress their spirit of loyalty to this important department of our work.

We are glad to note the continued loyalty of our people to the discipline of our Church, and earnestly request that its regulations and requirements be faithfully and fully carried out; that no previous minister on a charge may prejudice or hinder the success of the work in the hands of his successor, but that we may get inspiration from, and reverence for, those whose footsteps we follow. We would also take the liberty of calling attention to the fact that ministers' visits to public schools are not without beneficial results to all departments of our work.

We rejoice to know that still leading in the spirit of evangelistic effort, still waving the pure and only spotless flag of prohibition, still greater consecration of gold coming into the coffers of the educational treasury, that though the mighty and the devoted are falling and failing, and God is calling the workmen of yesterday, He is filling the ranks with workmen for to-day, a work of highest hope and noblest endeavor.

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REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee on Sabbath Observance beg leave to report:—

1. That we regard the Sabbath, with its holy quiet and religious privileges, as one of God's best gifts to men ; hence.

2. We are glad to know that the claims of the Sabbath are being regarded more and more throughout our land, and that the capital city of this Province is looked to as a model in relation to Sabbath observance by lands beyond our own.

3. We would urge, however, that as a Church we put forth still greater efforts towards the better observance of the Lord's Day, by actively co-operating with every organization set on foot seeking this end, by discountenancing as far as possible the reading of secular newspapers, social visiting, pleasure driving, travelling by railway or steamboat, and the seeking of mere pastime by any other means on that day ; and we earnestly recommend the discontinuance of funerals, as far as practicable, on the Sabbath Day, and hereby request that every minister be required to read the above resolutions to the people under his charge.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GENERAL EDUCATION.

Your Committee on General Education have pleasure in submitting the following report:—

1. The while we rejoice on account of the continued prosperity of our several Ladies' Colleges, and strongly urge our people to loyally stand by these institutions which are calculated under Divine guidance, not only to be a help to the Church, but form an important factor in scattering light and truth generally, we are also pleased to see that at Victoria University, a number of ladies are meeting with marked success, and we express a hope that College authorities everywhere throughout the Dominion will give equality to the sexes in the Departments of Arts and Medicine.

2. Your Committee would recommend the Conference to place on record its strongest disapproval of the sensational literature of the day. We do this when we view the injurious effects which may easily be traced upon the minds of many of the youths of our land. Your Committee consider the addiction to this class of literature inevitably debauches the mind, debilitates the intellect, perverts the affections, weakens or destroys the power of sustained attention, which is so necessary to success in any of the various paths of learning, fills the head with morbid longings for adventure, in fact, renders the reader worthless for work or study.

3. That whereas the collections of the Educational Fund have given very considerable assistance to the enterprize of the Church for the promotion of higher education, it is in the opinion of your Committee quite possible so to increase that Fund that it might become a very reliable source of income, and your Committee are of opinion that this Fund, if not of equal importance to the Missionary Fund, is next to it in importance, and that Chairmen of Districts should be as active in the proper presentation of the question to the Church as has been observed in the

presentation of the Missionary Fund, and that the Chairmen of Districts, at their Financial District Meeting, see the importance of fully conforming to the Discipline in making arrangements for the Educational Meetings in the various Circuits.

4. We recommend that the Memorial presented herewith, from the Board of Management of Albert College, be forwarded to the General Conference, to be dealt with as in their judgment shall be deemed fit.

5. We recommend that the Rev. E. N. Baker be representative to Alma College, and that the Rev. Dr. Griffith and the Rev. James Anderson be representatives to Albert College from this Conference.

REPORT OF ALBERT COLLEGE.

To the Members of the Bay of Quinte Annual Conference:—

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—The Report of Albert College for the present college year, 1889-90, is as follows:—

There have been 173 students in attendance, 118 males and 55 females. This is the largest enrolment in the history of the College.

It has been possible, nearly every successive year, to report an increased attendance, showing clearly the growing popularity of the school.

The wide spread character of the attendance may be seen by taking the P. O. addresses of the students as shown in the annual announcement.

A good idea may be had from the P.O. addresses of each member of the Senior Matriculation Class, as follows: Atwood, Ottawa, Aylmer, Quebec, Pictou, Cobourg, Wallbridge, Hyndman, Compton, New Haven and Belleville.

Thus it will be seen that the College depends to a very small extent upon local patronage for support, but meets a want in the Methodist Church and in the country not supplied by any other institution. There are 24 students in preparation for matriculation in Arts, 9 senior and 15 junior. Several of these are public school teachers of considerable experience, and all are ready to give a good account of themselves on their Arts course. The number would have been larger but for la grippe and other like causes. It is a source of great satisfaction that "Albert" has proved itself the very right arm of strength to "Victoria."

A very prominent feature of the college work is the preparation of candidates for the Conference preliminary examination. There have been 27 students in attendance for this work, of whom a large number wrote at the recent examinations.

The Academy of Music, School of Fine Arts, Business School and School of Elocution are maintaining the high standard of former years, and are well attended.

A class-room for the "Actual department" of the Business school has been added during the present year, so that with a "College Bank" and "Merchants' Emporium" the College has every facility for imparting a practical business training with a thorough English education.

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It is greatly desired that both the ministers and laymen of the Methodist Church will send their sons and daughters to their own institutions for this class of work.

The School of Elocution has gained for itself considerable reputation from the fact that the prizes in elocution at Victoria of last year and of the present year were won by ex-students of Albert who had received their training in the Albert College "School of Elocution."

The Science Department has been provided with desks and suitable apparatus, so that each student does practical work.

This will be of great service to those studying for teachers' certificates, and will better enable the College to compete successfully with high schools and collegiate institutes in that work.

The College has been greatly blessed with a large number of earnest Christian young men who make their influence for good felt throughout the entire year. They are active workers in the College Y. M. C. A., and many young men coming to the College with very indifferent views of religion go away converted to God.

The Missionary Societies have taken a step in advance during the present college year. The first of the "Annual Missionary Conventions" was held in Bridge Street Church, at which Principal Grant, Mr. Kono and Mr. Livingstone, the representative of the College Missionary Society to Africa, gave addresses, and great good was the outcome of the Convention.

The College buildings were enlarged and improved two years ago, at a cost of over \$7,000. It was then thought that there would be ample accommodation for some years to come, but already during the present year it has been quite insufficient.

The College is now passing through a financial crisis, but we will appeal to our brethren in the ministry and laity with every confidence that the debt will be removed, and the College be even more successful in the future than it has been in the past. We gladly recognize the interest taken by our brethren in past years in securing students for the College, and we respectfully ask for a continuance of that interest during the coming year.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF ALMA COLLEGE.

To the Members of Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Church:—

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—Through the favor of a benign Providence we are permitted to report a year of most successful school work in Alma College. You will be pleased to learn that, notwithstanding the financial stringency of the year and the prevalent sickness of the winter, our total enrolment and average attendance are in excess of any preceding year—the highest enrolment reached in any past year being 180, and that of the present year 210. Of this number, 160 have been resident students and the remaining 50 day pupils. Nearly 30 pupils came from the United States. The various Churches were represented as follows: Methodist, 105; Presbyterian, 45; Episcopal, 23; Baptist, 21; Disciples, 10; Lutheran, Congregational and Evangelical, each 2.

We have now a staff of 20 professors and teachers, including three University graduates and four certificated teachers in the Literary Department, six teachers in Music, two in Fine Arts, two in Commercial Science, and specialists in Elocution, Calisthenics, etc. Our Literary Course includes junior and senior Preparatory, Academic and Collegiate departments, the latter embracing the work of the High Schools, Collegiate Institutes, junior and senior Matriculation, with certain honor subjects from the University course and Christian evidences and Bible study. Our schools in music, Fine Arts, Elocution and Commercial Science are well organized, and securing increasing patronage year by year. Since the erection of McLachlin Hall our facilities for successful work have been greatly increased, and the large attendance of the present year, filling at one time both buildings with the exception of three rooms, amply justifies the liberal expenditure of the Board in the erection of that magnificent edifice.

The school is now self-supporting and its prospects of increasing usefulness are encouraging.

The aim of the Faculty, whilst not attempting full university work, is to offer to young women such a selected course of study and training in the various departments of a liberal education as will best fit them for woman's true kingdom—the Christian home, and at the same time to make each course to graduation of such a practical and useful character that every graduate shall be fitted for self-support, should such be either necessary or advisable. A large majority of our graduates, as teachers, book-keepers, stenographers, etc., have already turned to practical account the training here received, and twelve of them have received collegiate appointments in Canada and the United States.

The religious interests of the school are guarded and cherished by daily worship, Bible classes, prayer and song services, and the Missionary Society, which have already produced abundant fruit. A number of the students have professed conversion during the year, and united with the various churches.

The thoroughness and efficiency of our work are attested by examinations, conducted by non-resident examiners of high scholastic standing, and in the Art Department by certificates granted upon examinations conducted by the Education Department.

The graduating class for the present year numbers 12.

Alma has no endowment. Its success has been, under God, mainly due to the zeal and devotion of the Methodist ministry and laity in its behalf, and if the same sympathy and practical interest be continued, its future success will be assured. Ministers by calling the attention of their people, either in the pulpit or social circle, to the advantages offered in such schools can often aid materially our work.

We beg to thank the Conference for the excellent appointments made to the Alma College Board in past years, and ask that another appointment be made for the present Conference year.

That permission be given to the Trustees of church property at the Shiloh appointment in the Little Britain Circuit, to sell said church and lot, and apply the proceeds according to discipline.

REPORT OF MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

1. That having read memorials from four different Districts praying for the enlargement of the boundaries of this Conference, we recommend that as the Annual Conferences are capable of being altered so as to make a more satisfactory division of the territory, the General Conference be requested to take steps to accomplish this purpose.

2. That this Committee, believing that the times demand a more widely and generally circulated Church paper, and also believing that a cheapening of the price of our Connexional organ is the only way in which to accomplish this design, we would respectfully ask *this* Conference to memorialize the General Conference to take the matter into consideration, and decide to give our widely extended field a paper for our Church and people at one dollar a year. We seriously believe if this were done, our paper would secure a circulation of 30,000 or 40,000 copies weekly, thus scattering the knowledge of our aims and advancement among multitudes of our people who are now in ignorance of them. This would tend, we are confident, not only to the greater intelligence of our Methodist communities on connexional matters, but to a growing interest in all the work of the Church, and to the advancement of the liberality of our people in the support of all her institutions. We are also of the opinion that the advertising income of the paper would be so increased by its wider circulation, as to compensate in some measure for the lowering of its subscription rate.

3. That we commend to the favorable consideration of the Annual Conference, the memorial from various Districts, praying that our constitution be so altered by the General Conference, as to admit of the election of the District Chairman by the members of their respective Districts immediately after the final reading of the list of stations.

4. Your Committee, having received the memorial asking that certain changes be made in our Church Property Schedule, adding one column for church capacity and a second for average attendance, we recommend that the prayer be granted.

5. That we fully endorse the request of the Prison Reform Association, and recommend the hearty support of this Annual Conference to the efforts of the Association to ameliorate the condition of our criminal classes; and we further recommend that a Standing Committee be appointed by this Conference to co-operate with the Association during the coming year.

6. Whereas the Cobourg District Meeting has requested this Conference to memorialize the Ontario Legislature to make it compulsory that a permanent record of marriages, births and deaths should be kept in each municipality, your Committee most heartily recommend that this Conference urgently press this memorial upon the attention of the Provincial Government.

7. That having considered the memorial requesting that the Missionary Committee of this Conference be instructed to equalize, as far as possible, the grants to the various missions for horse keep, incidentals and travelling expenses, we recommend that the prayer be granted.

8. That we refer to the consideration of Conference, the memorial of the Brighton District, asking for such a ruling to be given as shall clearly define the relation of ordained local preachers.

9. Whereas a Memorial has been received recommending the substitution of a yearly card or token of membership for the present quarterly ticket, your Committee being of opinion that such a change would not be beneficial, recommend that the petition be not granted.

10. That having listened to the memorials for and against the extension of the pastoral term to five years, your Committee is of the opinion that any such change would not be conducive to the interest of our work at the present time.

MEMORIAL FROM LAY CONFERENCE.

That the Discipline be so altered as to provide that there shall be a Ministerial Session of the Annual Conference held in sufficient time to get through with the ministerial business, and then, as soon as convenient, the Conference of both ministers and laymen assemble, and that the officers of the Conference be thereupon elected. The laymen, however, suggest that no reason exists why they should not take part in all the work of the Annual Conferences.

3. That the Board for the Stationing of ministers should have authority to station for the entire Church, irrespective of Conference boundaries.

ADDRESS OF MRS J. S. SHERIN, REPRESENTATIVE OF
WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Mr. President, Delegates and Christian Friends.—We bring to you the kindly greetings of the Woman's Missionary Society, and while this honor was placed upon me at the last annual meeting, we naturally shrank, especially coming to this centre of learning, this Athens of our Methodist Church. And now we would present to you the subject of woman's work.

There is nothing that will increase interest and success in our missionary work so much as sympathy and union. In just such an atmosphere is this spirit fostered. Nothing so enlarges and expands the human soul as an active interest in Foreign Missions.

Humbly and gratefully then we come seeking aid and sympathy, and to enkindle a kindly co-operation in this work on which God has set His seal. Millions of women throughout the world are in the darkness of heathenism. To give them the Gospel of Christ is the great task committed to us. It is a difficult work, a Christ-like work. We are banded together as a society, because we can work more efficiently thus than in our individual capacity.

Our aim is to work to the best advantage, and bring the Society to the highest state of efficiency, and upon this solution depends the success and extension of our work. This missionary idea has filled our hearts, not as an occasional, but as an abiding guest; not a spark of inspiration caught up, but a divine enthusiasm which comes from a nearness to Christ, and for suffering humanity.

We want the highest efficiency. We want it for Christ's sake. If we love Him we must obey, and do the work committed to us.

For the heathens' sake Christ was moved with compassion when He saw the multitude. For the Church's sake. The whole Church is benefited by that which every joint supplieth. For the sake of our missionaries—they are our representatives, and we must uphold them.

For the sake of native Christians—they need our prayers and help. We that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak. For our own sake—because of the reflex influence in watering others, our own souls are watered.

Let us unfurl our banner and take for our motto, "The Christian women of this Conference for the cause of missions and the conversion of the world." The conversion of the world is a thought which carries us to the uttermost parts of the earth, to the watchword given by Christ to the infant Church, and to the promises voiced by the prophets, apostles, and our Saviour Himself.

Thank God for these promises. May God in His grace touch all our hearts with a live coal from off the altar. As we seek for direction, let us ask God to give us hearts willing to hear His calls. Many are the reasons why we should seek the enrolment of the whole female membership of our Church in united, devoted, consecrated work for the Master, in the rescuing and uplifting of the millions of heathen women who, secluded, imprisoned and degraded by error and superstition, have never heard the blessed news of salvation.

We hear the call, the Master has come and called for thee; and because we are called we are willing to grant Him a ready obedience, and own His authority. Have we not found in the Gospel of Jesus Christ that which is of so much worth to us, that we are impelled by His gracious power to go and tell to others the glad news of salvation.

To Christ Jesus woman owes everything she holds dear in this world and in the world to come. Only where the glad tidings of a Saviour's love has been proclaimed have the nations acknowledged her power and influence. Did our Saviour mean nothing when He made women the messengers of good tidings? Our marching orders are to-day, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature. As women we must do the work, for only by women can heathen women be reached. Woman's lips, and woman's hands must do the work, or it must remain undone. Then, as mothers, we must try and reach and save the children, and to save the children is to claim the nation for Jesus

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our King. The prayer has been heard, and answered, and now the doors of all heathendom stand wide open. The nations were never more ready and anxious to receive the Gospel than now. The barriers of centuries have been removed in a day. Never were the gates of heathen empires thrown more widely or welcomingly open to the messengers of the cross than now, while the facilities for spreading the Gospel are being augmented every hour. Jesus' name appears now in every language, and spoken by every tongue. Never before have we seen as now the doors of the heathen homes open wide to receive Christian women. With this knowledge we want to work with heart and mind, feeling that we are workers together with God, who hath wrought all this, and hence acknowledge our indebtedness as women to Christ.

Then again, this society is in perfect harmony with all the working organizations of the Church, and instead of conflicting with local Church work or interests, it increases their power and efficiency. Has it not been proven by scores of instances that where a good, live Auxiliary of the Woman's Missionary Society exists, not only has the General Missionary Fund been largely increased, but even other funds have been better sustained? It has, indeed, been an educator in every sense. The organization of Auxiliaries and Mission Bands has created a demand for more suitable missionary literature, and through its influence the membership of our Church are being taught how to give, and how to work for the Master. There is little excuse now for our women not being all aflame, as missionary literature can be had almost for the asking. As to the terms of membership, so easy, not debaring any, even the poorest from the privilege of uniting with this band of women, who are bound in loving fellowship of prayer, and labor for the bringing in that joyous time when "The earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord as the waters cover the sea." Only two cents a week. Is He not worthy to receive even greater than this, from even the poorest, probably the result of some extra work or saving, or self-denial. Who can estimate the reflex influences of this work on the women of our Church? Has it not given a nobler, better meaning to life, taken away selfishness, and filled hearts with gratitude and love? Has not the Church grown richer in intelligent, devoted women, ready to work in any way so that the Lord's name be honored? We cannot afford to lose the precious, blessed promises of those engaged in this work. "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto Me." "He which soweth bountifully shall reap bountifully." "God will bless us, and all the ends of the earth shall fear Him."

It seems to me unnecessary to take up your time in reviewing our past history or organization. All are aware that this work was thrown upon us. At the session of the London Conference, in June, 1880, when Dr. Sutherland introduced and urged its claims on the ladies who met in the Centenary Church, Hamilton, the proposal was accepted, and a Society was formed for the city. Later in April, 1881, at a meeting held in Wesley Church, a resolution was passed that immediate steps be taken to organize an association, known as "The Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, Canada." After much correspondence the final organization took place November 8th, 1881, to which was afterwards united the Ladies' Association for the Evangelization of the French, and also the Woman's Missionary Society of the late Methodist Episcopal Church.

In September, 1882, at the first general meeting, reports were received from 20 Auxiliaries organized during the year, showing a membership of 800, with 34 life members, and an income of \$2,968.78. This year, with gratitude we tell our income was \$22,306.28. The whole amount raised since organization being \$88,286.12. We now have 300 Auxiliaries, with 7,216 members, and 393 life members; Mission Bands, 123; Mission Band members, 3,551.

Our work comprises the mission in Japan, which Miss Cartmell began in 1882. Many marked evidences of the Divine favor have attended this part of

the work of the Woman's Missionary Society. In a peculiar manner the guiding hand of Providence may be recognized, and in nothing more it seems to me than in the type of woman it was privileged to send as its first missionary. One whose impress has been upon our work there from that hour, whose spirit to a greater or less degree has permeated every part and portion of the work. When compelled by failing health to return to her home land, it seemed almost an irreparable loss. Even the personal pleasure and profit in association with her, scarcely compensated for the sense of loss to our work by her absence therefrom. "But God's ways are not as our ways, or His thoughts as ours; but as the heavens are high above the earth, so great are His ways, and His thoughts above ours." This school now being under the able management of Mrs. Large, it has earned a most enviable reputation for thoroughness, and is always full. The spiritual results are a cause for profound thankfulness, nearly all the boarders having professed conversion, and have become earnest workers among their fellow-students. Who has not had his sympathies and emotions stirred by the sad tragic end of the Rev. Mr. Large, whose love and devotion developed a spirit of heroism, and who has not admired the loving devotion of his admirable wife? The burden of whose prayer was, God forgive the sin of the murderers of her husband, and that his death might be turned to the benefit of this land. Her stroke was a heavy one; but far from making her rebellious, it melted her heart and brought her into more perfect sympathy with the will of God.

The school at Shidzuoka is working favorably under Miss Cunningham's superintendence, all the five Japanese teachers are now Christians, so that all the influences in the school are decidedly Christian.

A new school has been opened in Kofu, and is rapidly finding favor with the people. Miss Wintemute in charge, needs our prayers in this work so providentially opened up. The work in Japan divides itself into scholastic and evangelistic. The work to be accomplished by Bible-women in Sabbath-schools, women's meetings, and house-to-house visitation cannot be overestimated. The accounts of this phase of the work from Miss Lund, is most encouraging. From year to year our French work is becoming more and more prominent. The work of evangelizing the youth during the past year has been very encouraging. The work itself is becoming more generally known among the French, and more highly appreciated by them as its results are seen.

The school at Actonvale has been last year filled to overflowing, and through the faithful labors of the pastor and teachers every soul in the house was converted. The work at Actonvale is consolidated with the new Institute, and all energies are bent in making the girls' department a success. Three schools are in operation, doing good work and well attended.

The first people which stands at our door is the French people in Canada. We are placed in close relationship with this nation, and surely it is for a wise and generous purpose. "Go ye forth," therefore says Christ, "and lo, I am with you always." Then further in our own Dominion we have the Crosby Home, Port Simpson, with twenty girls and four boys, under the care of Miss Knight and Miss Hart, and a yearly grant is made to the McDougall Orphanage at Morley, North-West Territory.

Our third Indian home is at Chilliwhack, for which we are wholly responsible, having purchased the land and erected upon it a two and a half story building, costing about \$3,600, apart from the furnishing. There is room for forty children. At present there are eighteen, several of whom have been converted—a very welcome reward. Our Home for Chinese girls in Victoria has been greatly favored during the year. "Showers of blessings" were granted, and all the six inmates were converted to God, becoming indeed new creatures. All the reports are encouraging. The tree has taken root, the branches are spreading.

In conclusion, dear pastors and friends of this Bay of Quinte Conference, we do want your co-operation. The work is growing upon us, and it will grow.

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We need the interest of every woman in our congregations; when we think of how few ladies are in full accord with the work, there remains much to be done. How shall we reach the Circuits yet unorganized, and get our Christian ladies interested in this grand and blessed work? Many of our ministers have given valuable aid in organizing Auxiliaries on their respective Circuits.

We have the sanction of the Conferences as a whole, and what more do we want? We do ask not only each minister, but layman here, his individual sympathy and co-operation in this work. We would ask you to aid the organizer appointed on your District; and don't, I beseech you, tell her to go her way, and when you have a more convenient season to call for her. Oh, that we may help one another to help forward the coming of the Son of Man, to bring the life of the Lord Jesus Christ into the hearts and lives of all our people.

QUESTION OF PRIVILEGE.

Rev. Dr. Workman rose to a question of privilege, and said that because of a resolution that appeared yesterday in the report of the proceedings of the Guelph Conference in the Toronto daily papers, he desired to make a word of explanation to the members of this Conference. The resolution, he stated, was an utterly incorrect representation of the lecture to which it referred, and contained statements that were absurdly contradictory and false. He assured the Conference, moreover, that there was nothing in the lecture itself that was either un-Methodistic or un-evangelical. He neither cherished nor presented rationalistic views in reference to the subject of Messianic Prophecy. His purpose throughout the lecture was to combat sceptical rationalism and to confirm and strengthen earnest evangelicism by sound principles of Biblical interpretation. He thought it exceedingly unjust for any person, minister or layman, to pass judgment upon his lecture from a partial and incomplete report, and requested his brethren to keep an open mind until they should have an opportunity to read the lecture in its entirety after its publication. "Doth our law judge any man," he asked, "before it hear him and know what he doeth?" He made this explanation, he said, not because of himself, but because he felt that the resolution in question was unworthy and unfair, and that its circulation might be prejudicial to the interests of Victoria College and the Methodist Church.

Whereupon it was moved by Rev. A. B. Chambers, LL.B., seconded by Jas. Ferris, Esq., and

Resolved,—That having heard the statements of Rev. Dr. Workman in reference to the action of the Guelph Conference *re* his lecture on Messianic Prophecy, we request the President and Chancellor of the University to nominate a committee to draft a suitable resolution for adoption by this Conference.

The Committee was appointed as follows:—Rev. W. Williams, D.D., Rev. A. H. Reynar, LL.D., Rev. J. M. Hodson, M.A., J. M. Ferris and Wm. Johnston.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

1st. That this Conference has heard with much pleasure the statement of the Rev. Dr. Workman on the question of privilege raised by him, and his repudiation of the opinions attributed to him in a resolution reported as passed by the Guelph Conference.

2nd. That this Conference cannot help expressing its deep regret that, even with the best of motives, an attempt should be made to pass judgment on one of its members to those to whom he is not responsible in the first instance, without giving him an opportunity of a hearing, without the evidence essential to a well-considered judgment, and in disregard of the Discipline of our Church which provides a reasonable and righteous course of procedure in such cases.

3rd. That after due and careful investigation by the constituted authorities of the Church, and with all the knowledge of the case at present available, no grounds are found on which a charge of heresy could reasonably be brought against Dr. Workman, and no occasion to withdraw the confidence and esteem in which he has always been held and is still held by his brethren.

The report was unanimously adopted by the Conference.

Resolved,—That the hearty and cordial thanks of this Conference be presented to the retiring President, Rev. Nathaniel Burwash, S.T.D., Chancellor of Victoria University, for the efficient and painstaking manner in which he has discharged the heavy and responsible duties of his office during the past year, and we unite in thanks to Almighty God that his health and life have been preserved during this year of unusual pressure in church and educational work, and of deep family sorrow and bereavement.

Resolved,—That, having heard the statement of President Dyer of the work of Albert College, and of the movement for its more efficient maintenance, we desire to express our sympathy with the President and Faculty in their noble work, and we rejoice in the divine favor which has crowned the work of the past year. We assure the President and Board of management that we will give them our practical support in the present effort to remove the debt, and will welcome them to every part of the Conference in the prosecution of the movement, and we recommend them everywhere to the support of our people.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Burwash, seconded by Rev. John Lawrence, and
Resolved,—The Conference desires to recommend to the consideration of our Central Missionary Board the proposal of the Rev. E. Arnold, of the Northern New York Conference, to carry forward to completion a work commenced by the late Rev. Joseph Onasakerat, a minister of the former Methodist Church of Canada, who, prior to his death, translated into the Iroquois language the four Gospels. They believed that the translation of the whole New Testament would be of benefit to the furtherance of the work of God among the Iroquois, both in Canada and the United States.

Resolved,—Whereas our Lord and His apostles fully recognized and warmly welcomed the co-operation of holy women in the work of the Gospel; whereas such co-operation is most efficient when best organized; whereas the primitive Church possessed its deaconesses, and the mediæval and modern Churches their various sisterhoods, whose annals are illustrious with the memory of saintly characters and of heroic deeds; and whereas our own Methodism has recently organized its Sisters of the People in England and its Deaconesses in America; therefore be it resolved that this Conference recommend the General Conference to establish an order of Deaconesses whose duties it shall be to nurse the sick, succor the poor, pray with the distressed and dying, and in general consecrate their whole time and energies to the assistance of the pastorate in the work of God.

Resolved,—That whereas during the past two years the work of the General Superintendency has been discharged by one person without any injury or perceptible disturbance of any interest of the Church; and

Whereas the Methodist body has such ample provision for its own government as to render the General Superintendency necessary only in exceptional instances, and as the General Conference Fund is inadequate to meet the demands made on it, thereby causing serious financial embar-

rassment, the members of the Bay of Quinte Conference urgently request the General Conference not to appoint a successor to our lately deceased General Superintendent, Rev. J. A. Williams, D.D.

Moved by Rev. E. N. Baker, B.D., seconded by Rev. A. Wilson, M.A., and

Resolved,—That this Conference would memorialize the General Conference to institute or appoint a central Board of Examiners who shall prepare all the examination papers submitted to the candidates for our ministry during their probation, said papers to be sent to the Chairmen of Districts where probationers may reside; also that all the examinations take place on the same day.

Moved by Rev. James Anderson, seconded by R. W. Clarke, Esq., and

Resolved,—That the financial year end on May 15th, 1891.

Moved by Rev. A. C. Wilson, seconded by Rev. Geo. Marvin, Ph.B., and

Resolved,—That each Circuit shall report through the Official Board to the next Conference the number of copies of the Minutes of Conference it requires.

The Secretary was instructed to print 2,500 copies of the Minutes of Conference, and Rev. W. R. Young, B.A., Wm. Johnston and C. W. Watch were appointed a committee to prepare a basis of distribution.

Moved by D. H. Minaker, Esq., seconded by Wm. Johnston, Esq., and

Resolved,—That this Conference memorialize the General Conference in favor of a Connexional Insurance Company.

On motion, it was

Resolved,—That this Conference gives permission to the Branch Theological Union to hold its next anniversary services on the Saturday evening preceding the Conference Sabbath of 1891.

Moved by Rev. J. M. Hodson, M.A., seconded by Rev. J. S. Clarke, and

Resolved,—That this Conference heartily endorses the following resolutions, passed by the Montreal Conference:

Whereas, The Constitution of the Dominion of Canada knows nothing of the union of Church and State, recognizing all sections of the Church as standing on the ground of perfect equality.

Whereas, On the Table of Precedence we have the following order: The Governor-General, Lieutenant-Governors, archbishops and bishops, members of the Cabinet, etc., etc., thus ignoring the very existence of the great Protestant Church, which represents the majority of this Dominion;

Whereas, in the aforesaid order of precedence pre-eminence is given to archbishops, the appointees of the primate of Rome, to the official degradation of the clergy of all Protestant churches; therefore be it

Resolved, 1. That we, the ministers and laymen of this Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church, hereby utter our decided protest against the aforesaid order of precedence, and declare our purpose to employ all legitimate means to secure its abrogation in view of the prominence it bestows upon the hierarchy of the Church of Rome, thus creating invidious distinction between the religious bodies to the disadvantage of the Protestant majority of the Dominion. 2. That we memorialize the ensuing General Conference to take such action as it shall deem best to secure the abrogation of the offensive clauses in the said order of precedence.

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Moved by Rev. J. S. Clarke, seconded by Rev. Dr. Burwash, and *Resolved*,—That Wilmot G. Clarke, B.A., and George R. Clare be ordained for special purposes.

On motion, Rev. Joseph Young was re-appointed Treasurer of the General Conference Fund.

The President, on behalf of the Conference, presented Mr. Burwash, son of the ex-President, with a purse, in recognition of his services as postmaster during the session of Conference.

3. RECEPTION SERVICE.

THE PASTORAL ADDRESS
OF THE BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE TO THE MEMBERS
OF THE CHURCH UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—Another ecclesiastical year has closed, and again we send you our annual greeting. We come to you in the name of our common Saviour, Jesus Christ. Receive us as His ambassadors and as fellow-workers with you in the salvation and sanctification of all who may be reached and edified by our united ministry.

The past year has been one of general peace and prosperity within the bounds of our Conference. No disturbing agitation has been permitted to interfere with the appointed ministration of the Board. For this we are devoutly thankful, and pray that the peace of God may abide with us during another year, and that brotherly love may continue and abound.

To render our ministry effectual to the fullest extent possible, the various agencies of the Church must be associated with the public and social means of grace. Methodism is not a congregation, but a denomination, covering a wide geographical area. Unity and success can only result from the loyal and hearty co-operation of each with the entire organization. The branch needs the vine, as also the vine the branches. This federated life is represented by the General Conference, the *Christian Guardian*, our University and Colleges, the Missionary Society, and various other benevolent enterprises. To paralyze these is to weaken our influence, limit our growth, and jeopardize the harmony and integrity of the Church. "United we stand, divided we fall."

No church organization can fully meet the demands of to-day unless evangelical labor and the earnest preaching of the Word are united with educational effort. The progress and strength of Methodism are associated with the one no less than with the other. Agencies that have so satisfactorily vindicated their usefulness cannot be dispensed with now. As there are always souls to be born anew, so there will always be minds needing intellectual quickening. The two are of kindred nature, and we should not attempt to put asunder what God hath so evidently joined together. With this end in view, the *Christian Guardian* should find a place in every Methodist home. We cannot, as Methodists, afford to be ignorant of what is transpiring on a neighboring Circuit, or in a sister Conference. Revival news reported from one field of labor may kindle a revival in your own soul and in your own community. A plea for help from some struggling missionary may awaken a spirit of liberality and interest in you that will prove a life-long benediction to yourself and others. See to it that neither spiritual nor intellectual impoverishment comes to you because of indifference in this regard.

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Our University and Colleges have had a year of very satisfactory prosperity. In the past they have been fruitful agencies in leading many to Christ. A revival at College, and the conversion of the students in successive years, have been the history from the beginning. They are safe homes for your sons and daughters, and justly appeal for every possible encouragement and help in our effort to "spread scriptural holiness over these lands." They are, to say, the centres of missionary zeal and earnest cause—creation to the cause of Christ. To the best of your ability, aid in increasing their efficiency, and still further justify the wisdom and honor the sacrifice of our fathers in thus providing for the youth under our care.

This is emphatically the day of missionary enterprise. "The world for Christ," is the watchword of the hour. The heroism, devotion, and spirit of sacrifice are equal to anything recorded in the apostolic age. "The fields are white unto the harvest." The world is waiting for the Gospel as never before. Heathenism presents an open door everywhere, and the "isles are waiting for the law." The signs are indicative of the speedy and universal reign of Christ. The supply of laborers is limited only by the inability to provide for their support. Much as has been done, there is room for yet larger sympathy, greater liberality, and more hearty co-operation. In carrying the Gospel to others we also kindle anew the divine life in our own souls. An unaggressive church is either dead or dying. Let the spirit of your liberality abound more and more, so shall ye be fruitful in every good word and work.

No more fruitful agency for permanent and satisfactory results can be found than the Sabbath-school. It is the nursery of the Church. From its ranks comes the largest percentage of conversions, especially on the fields of labor longest under our influence. To the Sabbath-school we must look more and more for candidates for the ministry. A life early secured for the service of God will accomplish far more than one converted at a more advanced age, with scriptural truth and doctrine yet to learn. A special qualification of Timothy was "that from a child he had known the Scriptures." Save the children, and train them for Christ, and not only the present but future generations will thereby be richly blessed. A more vigorous, more aggressive and better equipped Church will be the result because of the scriptural instruction and early piety thus secured.

Suffer, dear brethren, a word of exhortation. In these times of general unrest manifested in social and political life, as also in ecclesiastical organizations, cultivate a spirit of patience and Christian forbearance. Any grievance, real or supposed, is most easily and most satisfactorily rectified by constitutional methods, rather than by undue antagonisms and party strife. Difference in judgment must be expected, but where all have the mind of Christ such difference may be speedily and happily adjusted. Devotion to the Master and loyalty to our Church polity should characterize us, firstly as Christians, and secondly as Methodists. Bound thus by a two-fold cord, we ask that you receive, as the ambassadors of Christ, those sent to labor among you, that the Word of God may have full course and be glorified. In the same spirit, do not try to "mend our rules" or our legislation, but "keep them," and thus give to every agency and enterprise, duly authorized and appointed, the best opportunity for development and consummation.

And now, brethren, we come to you in the name of the Lord Jesus, whose servants we are. "We beseech you, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service." By your sympathy and prayers you can make our ministry among you much more effectual. Forget not the assembling of yourselves together. Let your place be always filled in the house of God. And forget not that other place of worship, where man talks with God as friend with friend; where faltering faith has so often been quickened into a new and higher life; where thoughts have been conceived and hopes inspired that have kindled anew the torch of Christianity and sent it forth with renewed power upon its life-giving mission; "Enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret; and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly."
