ENGLAND.

IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT. HOUSE OF LORDS—JULY 16.

Lord Holland rose to bring forward a motion which he had given notice, relating to the position in which this country stood with regard to our foreign relations, and concluded by moving for a variety of important documents.

The Earl of Aberdeen did not consider that a discussion of the various subjects alluded to by the noble Baron could be profitably and safely entered upon at the present moment, and he should therefore oppose the motion.—As to the British Government giving sanction to the course pursued by Don Miguel, it would be only necessary to state, in Don Miguel's favour, that the Government of Portugal, obtained supplies of money through our intervention; but, as soon as he had desisted from that course which it was agreed upon should pursue, the supplies were stopped; and remonstrance on remonstrance was daily made to him against the career in which he had embarked.

After a few words from the Marquis of Lansdowne, Lord Goderich, and Earl Dudley, the motion was put, and negatived without a division.—Adjourned.

HOUSE OF COMMONS—JULY 15.

Mr. Huskisson, in moving for copies of the American Tariffs of 1824 and 1825, contended that the imposition of heavy duties on British goods was contrary to the faith of existing treaties.

Mr. Peel had no objection to the production of the papers required. He thought they had been framed in a retail spirit, but with a view to encourage the manufactures of the United States.

It is expected that Parliament will be prorogued on Saturday next.

Lord Amberst and Family, have arrived in the Herald, from India.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has paid the debt of nature. His Grace was son of Lord George Manners-Sutton, third son of John third Duke of Rutland.

A Petition was presented to the House of Commons last night, against the Clare Election. As it was determined that it should be taken into consideration on the 21st of August, when Parliament will not be sitting, the business must be adjourned to the next Session.

Mr. Stratford Canning is anxiously expected at Corfu, where Admirals de Rigny and Codrington, and the Lord High Commissioner, and Count Gellibrand, have arrived to concert the proper measures to be adopted under the present circumstances.

It is understood that the Bishop of London is to succeed to the Archbishopric of Canterbury; and the Bishop of Bath and Wells to the Bishopric of Chester.

Some of the Morning papers speak of troops being about to proceed to Ireland; but these measures are only precautionary; and let us hope, that any other measures will not be rendered necessary.

An opinion prevails at the Bar, that Mr. Brougham will find it absolutely necessary, out of regard to his health, to abandon either politics or his profession, and the idea is, that he will prefer to give up the former,

rather than sacrifice the large portion of his income which depends on the continued exercise of his talents in the latter.

Mr. O'Connell.—The "agitator," declares that "he will never stir a nail in the House of Commons that will not endeavor to expose the abominable corruption by which parliamentary representation is jobbed away from the people."

The fourth report of the Finance Committee has been printed, and occupies 132 folio pages.

In stating the surplus income for the last five years, and comparing it with the sum applied towards the reduction of the national debt for the same period, it appears that the surplus income has fallen short of the Sinking Fund by nearly seven millions.

The Committee having thus submitted their view of the important subjects to which, in this Report, they have drawn the attention of the House, they are, in addition, that while they are deeply impressed with the conviction, that in the present state of the Public Finances, a severe economy in every branch of the National Expenditure is imposed as a sacred duty upon the Government and upon Parliament, they are from their inquiries the strongest confidence in the resources of the country, to fulfil all its engagements, and to maintain, unimpaired, its high station in the world.

In the House of Commons, on the 8th July, the sum of £30,000 was voted for the military works at Kingston, Upper Canada, and Halifax, N.S.

The Liverpool Courier, on this subject, remarks:—The grant passed, by a large majority, for the erection of military works in the Colonies, will, we are persuaded, give satisfaction to all who think soundly on the importance of those Colonies, and who can estimate the claims which they have to our protection.

The United States are ambitious, in saying no more was to be affirmed in different degrees, of all countries, which have any vigor of public spirit, any enterprise of feeling. Forms of government make little difference between them in this respect. It was among the silly common places of the radicals that "war is the sport of kings." The most sagacious statesmen, in all ages, have repudiated; and the war which the Americans last waged with us is sufficiently in proof that republics do not always engage in hostilities on better principles, or with less corrupt motives than monarchs.

That the Canadians are to their objects of ambition, is notorious enough. It is only, however, by consulting the map of the continent, that we can see the extent of their designs, and how far they are generally, and even enthusiastically, attached to the British crown, and as such inimical to the Americans. This is especially the case in the Lower Provinces, where it is much less difficult to see the attachment which arises from the influx of settlers from the States. These, however, will gradually form local attachments, and provided the Colonies are well and wisely governed, will improve in their feelings as British subjects.

London, July 15.—Consols closed yesterday at 82½. The affairs of Oporto is the only subject of conversation. The Constitutionalists, after all their boasting, have been shamefully beaten, or rather have run away without fighting.

The answer of the Turkish Government to the Russian manifesto, is a most noble document, and cannot fail to make a considerable impression throughout Europe. The Turks throw back the charge of bad faith, in the face of the Russians, and maintain, had we a portion to be presented to the House of Commons this evening, on the subject of the Spanish claims.

Strange rumours have been some time afloat with respect to the Duke of Clarence, without any intelligible object. It is said the price of powder expended in salutes amounts to a very large sum. The Duke of Wellington presided, it was agreed to open a subscription to complete the Thames Tunnel, £27,000 were subscribed the same evening.

The Cotton Factory of Messrs. Joseph Clarke & Sons, in Manchester, was destroyed by fire on the evening of July 7. There was insurance to the amount of £32,000 on the property destroyed.

A "Pig Fever" has occurred at Isleworth, England, in consequence of stench from a sty.

The British have made peace with the Ashantees. The African King deposited 4000 ounces of gold with the British, and gave them two hostages.

Several noblemen and gentlemen are subscribing for a monument to Lord Byron. Goethe (the great German poet) and Mr. Thomas Moore head the list, to pay homage to departed genius.

The proposed reduction in the Duty on Foreign Staves, does not take place.

The quarters receipts of the Liverpool Custom House have been made up, from which it appears that the amount of duties received on the 31st inst. averages about £34,000, presenting an increase over the quarter ending the 31st July, 1827, of nearly £30,000.

It is a lamentable spectacle to witness the havoc which the late heavy rains have created in the agricultural prosperity of the country. Almost all the rivers in Cumberland, Northumberland, Durham, Yorkshire, Nottinghamshire, Lincolnshire, &c. have swollen to an extent unprecedented at this period of the year, and where the banks allowed it, have flooded the adjoining country. Scarcely an instance can be referred to of such a sudden destruction of the farmer's hopes. Arable and meadow land, almost as far as the eye can reach, converted from a luxuriant garden into a vast lake, the hay floating in corrupted masses on its surface.

The houses at Wildcomb, at the bottom of Glavortonhill, were inundated by a land flood to the depth, in some cases, of twelve feet; and so rapidly, that a man and his wife, occupying a lower apartment in Chapel Row, leading to the canal, were drowned in their beds.

The harvest in the midland counties of England will be this year later than usual. Many meadows remain yet uncut, and much of what hay has been cut is destroyed by the heavy rains, and much carried away by the floods.

THE POWER OF ENGLAND.—History offers no parallel to the naval power of England: it is her pride and her safeguard. During the European commotions, she maintained a navy amounting altogether to a thousand vessels, and 130,000 sailors and marines.

In addition to her numerous small colonies, England possesses four great empires: Canada, the Cape of Good Hope, India, and New Holland. The last three are protected by her fleets, as is Canada from all nations except the United States.

The activity, the genius of the British people, the excellent models presented in the civil institutions of England, will not fail, beyond doubt, to diffuse widely a taste for every thing of British origin. The Spaniards, masters of America and the Philippine Isles, have not at all extended their social existence, because they are a stationary people.

It is quite evident, then, that England, by the numerous States which owe their origin to her, by the manner in which she finds herself represented, in all the quarters of the Globe, and above all by the alluring perfection of her institutions, moral, civil, and religious, must be destined to give a new character to the Universe at large.

It is impossible to determine precisely the epoch at which this grand result shall be produced, but it will not infallibly take place; and when the rapid progress every where of the human mind towards the acquisition of intellectual wealth, and to perfectibility, is regarded, we might almost be justified in conjecturing, that the moment of its arrival will not be deferred for any long period.

SCOTLAND.

DEATH OF DR. ANDREW DUNCAN.—It is our melancholy duty to record the death of one of the oldest and most respected of our fellow citizens, Dr. Andrew Duncan, Senior, Professor of Theology in the University of Edinburgh, and First Physician to His Majesty for Scotland, who terminated a long life of indefatigable and useful exertion, on the morning of Saturday the 5th inst. at the advanced age of 88 years.

Major-General David Stewart, of Garth, who has just been appointed Governor of the Island of St. Lucia, is an officer of long service and high military reputation. He entered the army in 1792, and has been engaged since in every campaign to which his Majesty was with-in Holland, in the West-India Islands, which were wrested from the French—in Egypt, Mainz, the Peninsula, and Waterloo.

The Duke of Atholl has commenced preparations for building a residence at Dundell, which, it is said, will cost not less than £100,000. Quarters are preparing for 250 laborers to be employed at the erection. The site, it is understood, will be about fifty or sixty yards west of the present house.

MARRIAGE.—The herring fishing commenced last week at Banff, under very promising appearances. Great numbers of the fish have been seen, and a highly favourable season is anticipated in the Moray Firth.

IRELAND.

DINNER TO MR. O'CONNELL.—A Grand Dinner has been given to Mr. O'Connell, in Dublin, at which upwards of 300 persons were present.

At a separate meeting of the Catholic Association, held in the Corn Exchange, Dublin, on Saturday last, Mr. O'Connell said that at the opening of Parliament, which will probably be about the beginning of next February, he will attend to Parliament by deputations from all parts of Ireland, and from many parts of England.

The celebration of Mr. O'Connell's success at Clontarf, brought together a large assemblage of persons, who paraded the town with green banners, and ribbons, and flags, forcing every body to join in their huzzas.

OUR latest accounts from England are to the 26th July, which contain such intelligence from the seat of war as satisfies us that the progress of the invading armies is gradual and marked by success, though manfully resisted.

It will be seen, by an advertisement in this day's paper, that Mr. KEENE intends favouring the inhabitants of St. John, with a CONCERT, at the Masonic Hall, on Friday evening.

Arrived, by the Steam-boat, on Thursday last, from Fredericton, His Honor Judge CHAMBERLAIN, from a tour in the United States and Canada.

At Halifax, on Wednesday Morning last, in the 83th year of his age, James Gibson Esq., Esq. Mr. Pike was a native of England, and resided in Nova Scotia seventy-nine years, a large portion of which time was most usefully spent in the service of the Public.

CORNER OF QUARTER SESSIONS AND OF COMMON PLEAS, was holden in this City last week. The state of the Sheriff's Calendar, containing no less than thirteen criminal charges, naturally forced on our attention the very unwholesome subject of the vast increase of crime, which, however it may grieve us, need not excite our astonishment, when we consider the accessions which are almost daily making to our population by an influx of strangers, and the various characters composing the mass of adventurers from the Mother Country.

OUR Port seems to be a general rendezvous for all ends of the earth. By the brig Highlander, which arrived here on Friday last from Rio de Janeiro, we have had 216 Irish emigrants landed upon us from South America, a great proportion of whom are strong, and young, and healthy, but all of them miserably poor.

It is to be hoped that His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, who arrived last evening from St. Andrews, may have it in his power to do something to save us from such a load of pauperism as must be the consequence of their settling among us.

It appears that some very thoughtless persons (to call them by no harsher epithet) have been practising the shooting of dogs in the streets at

unseasonable hours, to the endangering the peace and safety of the inhabitants. Some shots lately entered the house of N. DISROW, Esq. which might have been attended with the most serious consequences.

THE HARVEST is now general throughout this Province, and we believe it is proving abundant. Last week, we had some heavy rains, which excited our fears, as they not only interrupted the labours of the field, but threatened serious injury to the grain both cut and uncut.

LADY DOUGLAS and Daughters arrived here on Sunday evening last, in the Steam-boat from St. Andrews. We are gratified to learn that her Ladyship's health has been re-established.

THE CONCERT.—Mr. Keene gave his first Concert on Monday evening and, we are to judge by the praise of applause which followed every song, we might say gave very general satisfaction.

Assistant Commissary General's Office, St. John, 9th August, 1828. PERSONS desirous of Contracting to supply His Majesty's Troops with FORAGE at the undermentioned places, for one year, commencing on the 25th October next, are hereby informed that Sealed Tenders will be received at this Office on or before the 23rd day of September next, at 12 o'clock.

The number of Rations required daily, will be about Ten at Saint John, and Fifteen at Fredericton; liable, however, to some variation during the summer months, when some of the parties entitled to Forage, change their residence from Fredericton to this place. The Ration of Forage to consist of 10 Pounds of OATS, 14 Pounds of HAY, and Per diem, 6 Pounds of STRAW.

The Contractor will issue the Forage on orders from the Commissariat, to the Staff Departments and Regiment every week, (if required) at his depot in the Town of the respective places.
