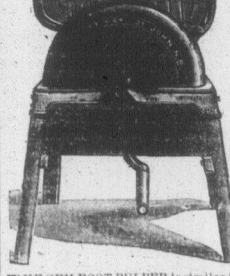

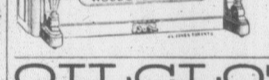

News Summary.

DOMINION. It is proposed to light the town of Kentville, N. S., by electricity.

—The Halifax Sailors' Home had a total of 734 boarders during 1890. The amount deposited by seamen was \$1,738.95, and \$1,722.04 was withdrawn.

—The herring give promise of being late this season again. With the exception of Dark Harbor, Grand Manan, there is scarcely a herring fish to be seen in Bay of Fundy waters, says the Beacon.

—Hon. Mr. Longley, Attorney General of Nova Scotia, has attended banquets and exercised his oratorical powers during the past week in Montreal, New York and Boston.

—The stone piers for the bridge at Hampton Ferry are well under way, and in a few days tenders will be invited for the superstructure which is to be of iron. The bridge will have five spans of about 150 feet each, and will cost in the vicinity of \$30,000.

—Sir Charles Tupper left England on the 27th ult., for Canada. There is much speculation as to the purpose of his visit. Sir Charles himself is reported as saying: "I am going to Ottawa at the request of the Dominion government, to discuss several important public questions."

—Diphtheria is doing deadly work at East Dover, St. Margaret's Bay. Three children of Martin Beck have succumbed to the dread disease, two of those Lynch's and one of John Graves. Several other families are stricken with it. Shad Bay and Blind Bay have several cases, and it seems on the spread.—Halifax Mail.

—Not long since the Dominion government asked the fishermen of this city to let them know what price they would charge for salmon for breeding purposes. A document was prepared and circulated among the fishermen asking their prices. All agreed to charge \$2.50 a piece for salmon delivered alive. Word to this effect has been sent to Ottawa.—Gazette.

—It is announced at Ottawa that a new scale of salaries for postmasters has been adopted by the government and will be put in force as soon as the expenditure is authorized by the parliament. H. John Haggart is given the credit for the change, which will give postmasters substantial increases, and is declared in the post office department to be most just and desirable.

—In reply to a note of enquiry from Senator Baker, of New York, Secretary Blaine wrote on the 29th ult.: "There are no negotiations whatever on foot for a reciprocity treaty with Canada. You may be assured that no scheme for reciprocity with the Dominion, confined to natural products, will be entertained by this government. We know nothing of Sir Charles Tupper's coming to Washington."

—The following chief census officers for the various provinces have been appointed: Prince Edward Island, Richard Hunt; New Brunswick, Edward Beer; Nova Scotia, Jonathan Parsons; Quebec, W. E. Jones, P. E. LeBlanc, M. P. O. P. J. De Melles and J. H. Charbonneau; Ontario, A. Broder, A. F. Campbell, M. P. P. Philip Mellan and Rufus Stephenson; P. M. P. Manitoba, H. S. Donaldson; British Columbia, G. A. Sarjason; North West Territories, B. P. Richardson.

—The Winnipeg Free Press is informed that, owing to the scarcity of deer, the wolves in the region of lake Winnipeg are becoming dangerous to the Indians. A pack of wolves attacked an Indian encampment and killed and devoured many of the Indians. One Indian cudgeled and killed twenty wolves, and one got up on a stage which was not very high, and the wolves got him down and devoured him. There is, therefore, a great panic among the Indians at that quarter.

—Under the new U. S. tariff the custom authorities at Washington have issued a circular stating that all goods imported into the United States after March 1st, 1891, must have the name of the country from which they are imported, placed on each package, whether barrel, box, crate, case or bag. This applies to every barrel of fish, bag of potatoes, crate of lobsters or berries, and boxes of salmon, etc. To comply with the law and avoid the goods to be entered at the custom house from the provinces, they each and all must have the name "Canada" in stencil or other indelible mark on every package.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN. —The report that Mr. Gladstone contemplated resigning the leadership of the liberal party is emphatically contradicted.

—Justin McCarthy and others of the Irish party are reported recently as expressing hopes of a speedy re-unification of the factions, but on what these hopes are based does not appear.

—There is a rebellion in Chili, and late despatches go to show that the insurgents are steadily gaining ground. England has sent warships from Panama to Chili to protect her interests in that country.

—Home Secretary Matthews declares that the sensational reports that there was a dynamite scare among the authorities in England owing to information received from America, is wholly without foundation.

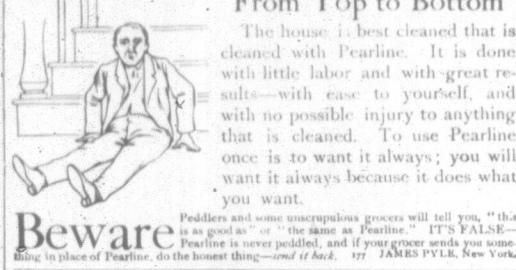
