# IMPORTATION OF ARMS INTO IRELAND PROHIBITED BY ROYAL PROCLAMATION

Signed by King at Meeting of Privy Council—Based on Customs Consolidation Act of 1876 Instead of Irish Crimes Act which Proved so Odious.

ASQUITH TAKES FIRST STEP IN

EXTENDING THE OLIVE BRANCH.

nnounces Acceptance of Principle of Basis of Agreement Suggested by Carson —Home Rule all Round — No Settlement which Would be Humiliating to any Section.

London, Dec. 5.—The Brilish Cabinet, by a Royal proclamation promutgated tonight prohibiting the importation of arms and ammunition into Ireland, for the first time grasped the nettle of the revolution in Ulster, which it had hitherto ignored, although the followers of Sir Edward Carson for months had been advertising their military preparations in every possible way and daring interference with them.

Aimost simultaneously with the publication of the preclamation, Premier Asquith made the longest step towards the conciliation of the Ulsterites that the government has yet taken by announcing his acceptance of the principle for a basis of agreement which Sir Edward Carson suggested in his last speech. These principles are:

First-That the settlement must not be humiliating or degrading

Second—Ulster's treatment must not be different or exceptional from that meted out to the other parts of the United Kingdom.

Third—Ulster must retain full protection of the Imperial parliament. Fourth—The Home Rule Bill must not be such as to lead to ultimate separation of Ulster from Great Britain.

The proclamation prohibiting the importation of arms and ammunition into Ireland, which King George signed at a meeting of the Privy Council Thursday, and which is published in the Royal Gazette tonight, was milder than rumors had anticipated it would be.

Instead of reviving the Irish Crimes Act, which was so oddous to the old time Home Ruler, against whom it was directed, which prohibited the carrying of arms and gave drastic power of search for arms, it invoked the Customs Consolidation Act of 1876. The only reason given in the proclamation for taking the step is the statement, whereas it is expedient that the importation into Ireland of arms and ammunition and other goods herinafter mentioned, should be prohibited, therefore," and the proclamation proceeds to specify all articles intended for or capable of being used for military urposes as being under the han. It exempts, however, arms and explosives designed solely for sporting or mine uses.

# "ONE MAN" STRIKE IN ENGLAND SETTLED

Engineer Who Refused to Haul Tainted Goods Takes Pledge of Good Behavior in the Future.

London, Dec. 5.—The strike on the Great Western Railway which has tied up traffic since Wednesday, was settled today at a conference of themen with the report of the Board of Trade. The 30,000 men of different trades, most of them miners, who had been thrown out of work by the stoppage of traffic, will now return to their labors. Only 1,200 railway men had quit their employment with the locomotive engineer James, who started the strike by refusing to haul "tainted" goods which had been handled by strike breakers in Dublin. He signed a pledge today not to repeat these tacties. This was done at the digation of the trades union leaders who had not countenanced the strike.



Had that event not eventuated, "Prexy" Wilson mirth still be the occupant of the White House, but he must be glad that he didn't have to take such a chance. The event, seminity unimportant at the time, was the visit of a stork to the McCombs family, residing in the little village of Hamburg, in Ashley county, Arkansas, near the Louisiana border. The bird of joy left a boy, who was christened William F., and who was destined to achieve greatness as the chairman and general manager of the Democratic national campaign committee, in the year which witnessed the election of Woodrow Wilson to the presidency and the institution of a Democratic Ongress.

Mr. McCombs graduated from Princeton in 1898, studied law at Harvard, and began the practice of law in New York a dozen years ago. His only political experience, prior to the last presidential campaign, was sained in running for assemblyman. He was defeated, but ran ahead of his ticket.
