Many Labor Leaders Forced Out of Procession on That Account-25,-000 Marched in Drenching Rain.

New York, Sept. 2-The weather man HALIFAX HAD BIG failed to make good his prediction of a bright, sunshiny day for labor's annual outing, but in spite of the rain, which began early in the morning and lasted un til after noon, 25,000 members of labor unions paraded the streets, drenched to the skin and were watched and cheered by thousands of umbrella-protected spec-by thousands of umbrella-protected spec-




