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CONSTITUTION

1st.—The Society shall be called THE WOMEN'S CHRIS-TIAN ASSOCIATION, of Quebec.

'2nd.—The object of the Association shall be to receive young women, who come as strangers to the city; obtaining for them board and employment; attending generally to their temporal and moral welfare; providing a reading room, and library for young women, and premises where meetings of ladies conjected with different benevolent institutions may be held, and for other benevolent purposes of a like nature.

3rd.—The Society shall be strictly undenominational.

4th.—Any person on payment of one dollar annually shall be a Member, and be entitled to vote at the annual or general meeting.

5th—The Officers of the Association shall consist of a President, four Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, and an Assistant-Secretary. The Officers, with not less than thirty other ladies who shall be elected for that purpose at the annual meeting, shall form the Committee of Management of the Association.

6th.—The said committee shall have power to form a code of laws for the general regulation and management of the Association, and to fill up vacancies in their own numbers during the year, provided that nothing shall be enacted which is inconsistent with the constitution.

7th.—A committee of six gentlemen shall be elected every year at the annual meeting, whose duty shall be to advise with the ladies' committee in all matters of importance.

8th.—There shall be an annual meeting of the members of the Society held in the month of March in each year, when the committee of ladies retiring shall present a report of their transactions during the past year, a cash statement of the affairs of the Association, as well as any matters of interest or importance that they may have to submit,

9th!—The fiscal year of the Association shall close on the first of March.

10th.—The visits and religious instruction of the clergy of the city of all denominations shall be gladly welcomed by the Association.

11th .- All elections shall be made by ballot.

12th.—This constitution shall not be amended, nor repealed, nor any addition made to it except by a vote of twothirds of the members present at the annual meeting.

Committee of Management.

1st.—The Committee of Management shall meet on the first Tuesday in each month for the transaction of business; five shall form a quorum. At this meeting the ladies for duty during the month shall be appointed.

2nd.—The office-bearers of the Association, with four visiting ladies, shall form an acting Committee for the month, and shall meet every Tuesday, for the transaction of ordinary business. Three shall form a quorum.

3rd.—General meetings of the Association may be called by the President, at the request of not less than nine members thereof, and special meetings of the Committee of Management, may be called by the President at the request of not less than five of its members. Special meetings of the acting committee may be called by the President at her discretion.

Duties of Officers.

1st.—The duty of the President shall be to preside at all meetings; strictly preserve order, to appoint Committees, and to be arbitress in all debates.

2nd.—The first Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shell act in her stead; in the absence of both, one of the other Vice-Presidents, in the absence of all these officers the Committee shall elect a President pro tem.

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the oth, hese 3rd.—The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive subscriptions and donations, and make all payments authorized by the Committee, she shall keep a list of the inmates, and, when absent, send her book for inspection.

4th.—The duty of the Secretary shall be to take minutes of and record the names of the members of the Committee present at each meeting, to read the reports of Committees and the minutes of the last meeting, and to prepare and read the annual report and correspondence.

5th.—The duty of the Assistant-Secretary shall be to notify all officers and members of the Committee of Management of their election, and members of sub-committees of their appointment, to answer all letters, and keep a list of members and their addresses.

Order of Business.

1st.—The meetings shall open and close with prayer.

2nd.—The meeting shall be called to order, after which no person to speak, except on the subject under discussion.

3rd.—Reading the minutes of last meeting.

4th.—Recording the names of the members of Committee present.

5th.—Reading correspondence.

6th.—Reading reports of Committees.

7th.—Resolutions, Propositions, Debates.

8th.—Reading minutes of the present meeting.

Ladies on Duty.

1st.—The four ladies on duty for the month shall arrange amongst themselves the division of their duties.

2nd.—One or more of them shall visit the rooms daily; see that order and cleanliness exist throughout the establishment, take note of and report, for the information of the

acting Committee, any matters of interest or importance in connection with the affairs of the Association to which their attention has been directed during the week.

Duties of the Matron.

1st.—The Matron will carry out all the rules of the establishment, and endeavor in every way to obey the orders of the ladies on duty.

2nd.—She will have prayers with the inmates every morning and evening.

3rd.—She will see that all meals are properly cooked and served, and promote in every way the health and comfort of the inmates.

4th.—She will examine the persons and boxes of inmates on first entering and on leaving, and superintend a thorough ablution.

5th.—She will be especially careful to see that no spirituous liquors are brought into the house, except by the order of the attending physician.

6th.—At the end of each month she will report to the ladies on duty any loss or breakage of the house property that may have occurred during the month.

SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.

At the close of another year, we again desire to render our tribute of praise and thanks-giving for the goodness and mercy which have followed us all the way through. The retrospect shows such a measure of success, that we can only exclaim in joy and gratitude: "This is the Lord's

doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes."

At the beginning of the year, the outlook was gloomy and perplexing. We were under orders to leave the capacious quarters in the Artillery Park, which the Association, had occupied almost from the beginning of its organization, and every available house in the city and suburbs had been searched, but none could be found suitable alike to the requirements and the finances of the Association. Advisory Committee, after much trouble and exertion, obtained permission for us to remain until the 1st of August; and then, through the kindness and liberality of J. J. Foote, Esq., in making a great reduction in the rent, we were enabled to take the commodious and convenientlysituated house, 125 Anne street. It was not without misgiving that we ventured on so important a step, but the result has been so successful, and we have received so much encouragement in the work, that we have accepted Mr. Foote's generous offer, and taken on the house at the same rent for two years. In order to meet the additional expenses, a collection was taken up throughout the city, and this has met with a very ready and generous response, not only in subscriptions of money, but in other manifestation rec assi The a sl be

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tions of interest and approbation. We have had frequent recourse to our Advisory Committee, and have been much assisted by their sympathy and support on all occasions. They published an appeal in the *Morning Chronicle*, giving a short history of the Association, and caused circulars to be sent to the merchants and others in the Lower Town.

This Association furnishes a home for respectable women of all classes, who from various and often unforeseen circumstances, find themselves alone. It is especially intended for those who are dependent on their own exertions for support, and supplies that want so long felt in Quebec, a home for gentlewomen in reduced circumstances. The regular charge for boarders is two dollars per week; sewing-girls and others who go out by the day, fifty cents per week; those who pay nothing are required to render some equivalent in work. The removal from the Artillery Park of course necessitated a reduction in the number of inmates, and there are now 8 boarders, a smaller number than there has been for some time. During the year there have been 43 inmates; of these 8 have paid the full amount; 18 have paid partially, generally at the rate of \$5 or \$6 per month; the remainder have been unable to pay anything. 14 of these have been strangers, respectable, yet destitute and friendless, to whom this institution has been indeed a refuge. The Matron, Mrs. Cochrane, is admirably fitted for the situation, and does all in her power to ensure the comfort and happiness of those under her charge.

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The subject of emigration is frequently brought before the Committee by communications from the old country, proposing to send out women of all classes, and asking what arrangements exist for their reception. In answer to these inquiries, the Committee have expressed their readiness to receive domestic servants who come well recommended; but they do not feel justified in offering any inducements to those unaccustomed to manual labor and not qualified for any definite post. This class is always the most difficult to provide with remunerative employment; many seek situations higher than they are competent to fill, while on the other hand, the system of lady-helps is equally incongruous, and tends to the perversion of natural talent. We have had 4 emigrants this year, one of whom

after much trouble and disappointment, found means to return to England; 2 were sent to Toronto, and the other

has gone to Montreal.

District Visiting has been re-organized and is now carried on faithfully. In the course of their labors, the ladies often meet with cases of poverty and distress, which they report to Miss Latimer, in whose judicious hands a sum of money has been placed for the relief of the most needy and deserving.

Visits are paid by the Committee to Jeffery Hale's Hospital, and are always gladly received by the patients.

The ladies who were engaged in the work of the Magdalen Asylum have never ceased their ministrations on behalf of erring ones, who perhaps longing to escape from a life of sin and degradation, yet find all doors closed against them; and they have been permitted to witness some fruit of their labors in the peaceful end of one who had long been the object of their earnest solicitude.

Cottage meetings were held in the suburbs last summer, and one is held in St. Rochs on Monday afternoon, conduct-

ed in part by members of the Association.

The Flower Mission was carried on during the summer, and the Committee are much indebted to the kind friends who supplied them with bouquets for the purpose.

We have had to mourn the loss by death of James Crawford, Esq. He had been a member of the Advisory Committee since its organization, and took a deep interest

in all the affairs of the Association.

The annual entertainment to the poor took place last month in the Jeffery Hale School-room, and was attended by over 300, the adults first and the children the next day, the fragments of the feast being afterwards distributed to those who from illness or other causes were unable to be present. Music was rendered by a voluntary choir, and addresses were given by ministers of the different denominations. The cost of these entertainments has always before been entirely defrayed by the members and friends, but this year the receipts were not nearly sufficient to cover the expenses, and the balance had to be taken from the general fund. The event is always eagerly looked forward to by the poor, and their hearty enjoyment and grateful

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appreciation amply compensate for the trouble and expense. The Master has said: "When thou makest a feast.....call the poor;" another year we trust that more will assist in

carrying out this injunction.

A Harvest Home Concert, organized by Miss Roberts, took place last autumn, the proceeds of which amounted to \$63. It was held in the large room of the Y. M. C. A. Building, and our best thanks are due to the Directors for their kindness and courtesy in giving the room entirely free of expense. We are much indebted to all who contributed towards the success of the Concert, especially to E. T. D. Chambers, Esq., for his kindness in conducting it.

We must not forget to mention the Bazaar and Picture Gallery held by little girls last summer, in aid of the

Association, and which realized about \$30.

The Government grant of \$200 was received in January, and we have lately been much encouraged by receiving two donations of \$100 each. It has been suggested that we should begin to set apart a sum to form the nucleus of a building fund. It is very desirable that the Association should possess a building, and the house it now occupies could be made to suit admirably. That, however, is a thought for the future; in the meantime, the Committee have had some of the rooms papered, and made other necessary improvements, and much is still required in the way of furnishing to make the house comfortable and homelike. The carpet that was given by a kind friend some years ago, is now worn out; oil cloth or matting is needed for the hall and stairs, and the house-linen, &c., must be replenished.

Our strength has been recruited by a number of volunteers who have rendered service in every branch of the Association. The sewing meetings are held on Thursday afternoon, and a stock of useful articles is always kept ready for sale. Miss Latimer kindly disposed of some on board the steamer "Miramichi," and the usual sale of work

was held in December.

The sewing meetings of the Indore Mission are held

in the rooms on Monday afternoon.

We are indebted to Dr. Marsden for medical attendance; to T. H. Oliver, Esq., for legal advice on several

occasions; to the Editor of the Morning Chronicle for a daily copy of the paper and the insertion of frequent notices; to the Editor of the Daily Mercury for an advertisement of the Concert free of charge; and to the Editor of Faith and

Works for a regular edition of that paper.

We have received a great many favors almost impossible to enumerate; amongst others we desire to mention the following:—A cord of hard wood from Mr. W. F. Lemesurier; a very liberal supply of stationery from Mr. Stanley; a sign-board from Mr. Corneil; a clock for the Committee-room; an Association stamp; 2 barrels of flour; vegetables, books, clothing, Christmas donations, and contributions towards the sale from different friends. All are

thankfully acknowledged.

Another object of the Association is to have rooms for any meetings of women connected with Christian work: these have been utilized by different sewing societies, Bible-readings, and other meetings for benevolent and religious purposes. We desire to draw attention to the prayer meetings which are held on Tuesday afternoon, not only for the purpose of asking a blessing on the Association, but of making all our requests known unto God. Conscious of our own weakness and insufficiency, we have come boldly to the throne of grace in every time of need, and have realized the exceeding faithfulness of His promise to "give good things to them that ask." Fitful and imperfect as our service has been, we have yet received so many tokens of the Master's approval, as to leave no doubt that the work is in accordance with His will. In grateful remembrance of past mercies, and hopeful anticipations of still greater blessings, we will go forward in the work, adopting as our own the motto of the English Associations. "Not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts."
