OF THE

**Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Auxiliary Society,
For the Nova-Scotia Western District,**

Held in the Liverpool Church, Tuesday evening, June 7, 1853.

The Rev. Dr. Richey in the Chair.

Opening Services by Rev. Dr. McLEOD.

Report read by the Rev. J. McMURRAY.

1st. Res.—Moved by Rev. J. V. JOST, seconded by Rev. William WILSON :

That this Meeting has heard with unfeigned pleasure the encouraging facts contained in the Report just read, and expresses its devout gratitude to Almighty God for the success which continues to crown the efforts of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, and other kindred institutions.

2nd. Res.—Moved by Rev. H. POPE, 2nd., seconded by Rev. Chas. STEWART :

That while this Meeting devoutly recognizes the hand of God in the past achievements of Missionary zeal, and pledges itself to continued liberality in order to the maintenance and extension of the truth as it is in Jesus—it is solemnly impressed with the conviction of the necessity of the enlarged accompaniment of the Divine blessing in order to progressive victory, and earnestly urges the duty of fervent prayer for the promised abundant effusion of the Holy Spirit upon the Church, and upon the vast field of Missionary labour.

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REPORT.

The Committee of the Nova Scotia Western District Auxiliary Missionary Society at this its First Annual Meeting since the division of what was formerly known as the Nova Scotia District, beg to lay before the Society such facts as will at once justify all its past exertions in behalf of the Mission Cause, and urge to continued, nay increasing effort in support of the same glorious enterprize.

It were a work of supererogation on the part of your Committee to attempt abstractedly to discuss the Divine origin and Scriptural character of Christian Missions, or to descant on the imperative obligations which bind the Churches of Christ vigorously to sustain them—with those aspects of the question you have long been familiar—under the accumulating force of these obligations you have long cheerfully laboured. Facts which shew *whither* the streams of your benevolence have flowed—what lands—what dwellers in benighted climes have, through your instrumentality, been refreshed by the waters of life, and illumined by the light of life, are what we feel it to be our duty to lay before you. A condensed abstract of the Financial and General Report submitted to the consideration of the Parent Society during the last month at its Annual Meeting in London, enables us to present the most recent intelligence.

We will now glance at the state and circumstances of the several fields of labour which the Society occupies.

IRELAND.

Ireland occupies a position which becomes daily more and more hopeful to the eye of the Protestant Church, and all the pleasing signs of the present are so many proofs of the value of our own Missionary labours in the past. During the last year some new Stations have been formed, several of the Missionaries have been directing their minds to the Irish language, and the labours of the Visiting or General Missionary have been much blessed. The indications on several of the Missions are full of hope, and the Schools have yielded a larger result of spiritual good than in any preceding year.

GERMANY.

At *Winnenden*, in the Kingdom of *Wirtemberg*, Mr. Muller and his assistants occupy 67 preaching stations, and notwithstanding various impediments, the cause is advancing;—the number of members is on the increase, and additional preaching places have been opened with a prospect of usefulness.

FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND.

Important arrangements have been entered into during the year, by which these Missions are placed in a new ecclesiastical position, in the organization of the French Conference, which will result, it is confidently expected, in opening greater facilities for the extension of the work of God in that interesting field. Although France will not be henceforth regarded as a sphere of our Missionary labour, yet it will be helped in a pecuniary sense by the Society, and it is highly encouraging to learn that since our brethren in that country have assumed the responsibilities of their new position, the Lord has favoured them with such a revival of His work as has not been known for very many years, if indeed ever before. Many prayers will be offered that this young connexion may have a prosperity as rapid as its field is wide.

SPAIN.

The English and Spanish departments of the work at *Gibraltar* have been consolidated with a view to economise the funds. The five Day-schools connected with this Mission contain 250 children, of whom 224 are Spanish, and it may be expected confidently that the seed thus plentifully scattered among both Protestants and Romanists will not be lost, but will in due time spring up and bear much fruit.

INDIA

May be regarded as one of the most difficult, and at the same time one of the most important, fields of Missionary toil. The condition of the teeming millions peopling that region of the globe—enfettered by superstitions the most galling,—the votaries of systems of idolatry the most licentious and degrading,—calls loudly upon the Church of God to make efforts for their evangelization upon a larger scale than has yet been adopted—and to send unto them, yet more widely, that Gospel which is alone effectual for the spiritual enlightenment and moral elevation of darkened and depraved man.

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From an able pamphlet recently published respecting Missionary labour in India, we make the following extract:—

“Have Indian Missions, then been a failure? Irreligion and fear prophesied in former days that they would be,—that the Hindoos would never be converted, and that the attempt to Christianize them would lead to rebellion. Such notions have long been exploded. Looking at the number of actual converts, and the still larger numbers under regular Christian instruction; looking to the character of many who have died in the faith of the Gospel; looking to the vast amount of efficient agency now at work; looking to the deep and wide impression made upon the native mind at large; looking to the improvement in European society; looking to the removal of several of the most striking evils once prevalent in the land; looking to the large and valuable experience acquired by past labours, and to the preparation made by those labourers for future success;—we must allow that Missions have accomplished *MUCH* during the short period in which they have been carried on. ‘The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad.’” The camp has been planted, and the position of the Christian army has been made good. The battle has begun, and the various bodies of troops have had their several positions assigned to them. The translators, with their heavy batteries of Bible truth; the Tract writers, with their light field-guns; the active cavalry of itinerators; the preaching battalions of foot, and the little band of Christian Sepoys, are all engaged in subduing this vast continent to the “obedience of Christ.” If the work be carried on, what *must* be the end? “The Lord gave the word, great is the company of the preachers.” Shall not “kings of armies flee apace, while they that tarry at home divide the spoil” and share the joy of victory?

In *North Ceylon*, it has been a year of many afflictions to the Missionaries—two of them have had to return home, and the labours of those who remained have been pursued amidst many interruptions.

In *Continental India* one of the most faithful Missionaries, Mr. Cryer, has been removed by death. Among the English Society in *Madras* the work had not declined. The native church at *Royapettah* has received 34 in church-fellowship, with 4 on trial; and at *Negapatam* there have been several converts, one of whom had begun to preach.

During last year, the Rev. Wm. Barber, and the Rev. Arminius Burgess, both sons of Wesleyan Ministers, have gone as a further supply for India.—The fact is appalling that in these territories there is only one Missionary to every million of the population.

CHINA,

For the first time, takes a place in our Report. The population of this vast Empire amounts to between three and four hundred millions. The whole of this immense multitude, being considerably more than one-third of the human race, is in a strict sense, *one people*, cast in one mould, and having but one written language, but who were until the late treaty entirely inaccessible. The hand of Providence has opened the Island of *Hong Kong* and the *five consular ports*, from which easy access can be had to the interior of the country, and in these there are now more than 70 Protestant Missionaries.

The first Wesleyan Methodist labourer among the Chinese was Mr. Geo. Piercy, who went out at his own expense two or three years ago. His letters

have been very satisfactory, and he is now received as one of the Missionaries of the Society. He has free access to about five hundred thousand people in one of the suburbs of *Canton* and has been joined by two additional Missionaries, the Rev. Messrs. Beach and Cox, who went out to *China* a few months since, and are believed to be admirably adapted to that peculiar sphere of labour.

This Mission has strong claims upon the friends of Missions for their earnest prayers to God, for its success. That great Empire is open in answer to many prayers. The appointment of three Missionaries by this Society may be considered a small commencement. But "the little one shall become a thousand, and the small one a strong nation, the Lord will hasten it in His time."

AUSTREALASIA AND POLYNESIA.

The Missions in *Australia* are invested with more than ordinary interest, arising from the altered circumstances of that country, and the present rapid increase of population by the tide of emigration, attracted thither by the prospect of speedily becoming rich. The Committee and Conference, having had in view for some time past the rapidly rising importance of that sphere of Missionary labour, and having matured their plans for the organization of an Australian Conference, have sent the Rev. Robt. Young as a deputation for this purpose. Such a measure, thought to be desirable previous to the discovery of gold in that colony, will be seen under present circumstances to be increasingly necessary, and there is reason to believe that the arrangements about to be entered into, will result in the extension of the work of God, and in provision being made to meet the spiritual necessities of the thousands landing upon those shores from every quarter of the globe. May we not hope that by the blessing of God upon the faithful labours of His servants, many who go thither in search of the gold which perisheth, may find that wisdom which "cannot be valued with the gold of Ophir," and that some from among the heathen may return to their own country to declare "how great things the Lord hath done for them."

The Churches in that colony will need large supplies of grace to enable them to stand in the present season of temporal prosperity. It is very gratifying to learn from some of the Stations that the cause of God is flourishing, the Congregations overflowing, and the people exceedingly attentive to the Word preached, and that numerous doors of usefulness are opening.

The Mission to the *Friendly Isles* never presented circumstances of greater interest than it has done during the last year:—

The war which has occasioned so much, and so just uneasiness, has been brought to a happy termination; and the King by his forbearance and generosity in the hour of triumph, and by the practical wisdom of other parts of his conduct, has eminently adorned his Christian profession. The chiefs of the fort, called *Houma*, having first notified their intention to submit, a day was appointed to receive their submission; and as the custom of the nation is to destroy the vanquished, the Missionaries thought it right to be present at the ceremony, that they might intercede for the captives if needful. But their good offices were not required, for the King caused it to be proclaimed, that he did not intend to take from these chiefs either their lives, their dignity or their lands, but that he freely forgave them for the sake of *lotu* alone. The pardoned chiefs returned from the assembly to the King's house, and that same night they renounced heathenism, and at the family prayer of King

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George, for the first time in their lives, they bowed the knee to the Lord Jesus. More than a hundred persons followed their example, when Mr. West visited the fort a few days afterwards.

In the *Tonga Circuit* a considerable increase of members has taken place. At the Normal Training Institution nineteen persons have completed their course of study—one of whom has been recommended for the work of the ministry—the rest have been appointed to the charge of schools in various parts of the group. A new supply of students has been obtained, and the institution is in full operation—a course of Theology has been compiled and added to the other course of Lectures. The press has been continually employed. The translation of the Scriptures of the Old Testament continues to engage attention, and two thousand copies of the portion from Job to Solomon's Song, inclusive, have lately been printed.

The *Feejee Islands* present a small increase in the number of members, and a large increase in the number of scholars. A Feejeean and English Dictionary has been completed and published—and an English and Feejeean Dictionary is near completion. It is proposed to print three thousand copies of the New Testament. Education proceeds, and its beneficial results are apparent.

The *Lakemba Circuit* prospers, and in *Yandrana* many have been savingly converted to God. The Missionaries in those far-distant Isles have been greatly encouraged by the advice and commendation of that gallant officer, Sir James Everard Home, who has in various ways supported and co-operated with the Society's agents, both in the *Friendly and Feejee Islands*.

SOUTH AFRICA

The long continued and sanguinary war in South Africa now happily brought to a termination, entailed upon the cause of religion an amount of danger which it is not easy to over-estimate. The Station at *Mount Coke* has been preserved in safety through the year. More than once has it been attacked by rebel Hottentots and Kaffirs, and eleven Natives and one European have fallen victims to the violence of these misguided men; many have been wounded, and exposure and want have affected the health of many more; so that the year has been one of great sorrow and perplexity; yet the usual services have been continued with increasingly large and attentive congregations, and the Sabbath-school has been well attended.

WESTERN AFRICA.

It is cause of sincere thankfulness that the Missions at *Sierra Leone* continue to prosper. Those who witnessed the struggles which marked their early history, must see with unspeakable delight, the realization of their hopes. The returns for the past year are seven Missionaries, fifty-two Teachers and Salaried Agents, with nearly six thousand Church members, and upwards of four hundred on trial. "What hath God wrought!"

In this Mission not only are its material interests in a state of progressive improvement, but the work of God also. In every Circuit there has been an increase of members; and the Wesleyan Methodists now constitute the largest of the religious denominations which find a place in the annual return of the population.

Since the rebuilding of the Chapel at *Murray Town*, the Spirit of the Lord

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has been poured out, many backsliders have been reclaimed, and thirty-seven idolators have voluntarily given up their idols and idol worship, and commenced meeting in Class, twenty-eight of these have found peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.

From *Cape Coast*, a recent letter states, "Never has the work of God in this District been known to assume so cheering an aspect. The influence of Christianity is rapidly extending itself into the interior. All the out Stations, expect, perhaps, Kumasi, are in a healthy, vigorous, and flourishing condition. Our pastoral visits to the Stations in the interior delight us much; they are seasons of special grace to ourselves."

Respecting the *Gold Coast* and *Ashanti* Missions, the General Superintendent remarks, "accustomed as I have been for years past to watch the progress of Christianity in these regions, it is to me unusually interesting to observe this great remedy for the world's miseries operating here with a growth of unprecedented vigour. About the public services of the Lord's House there is an unusual freshness enjoyed in common both by people and Preachers, and the attendance of the public at the week-evening services is almost as good as it is on the Sabbath-day. The Prayer-meetings are delightful services. The body of our Chapel here, which is seventy feet by forty, is generally nearly filled at the Prayer-meeting at five o'clock on Sabbath mornings. This state of things is, as you would suppose, associated with the sound conversion of sinners to God, the reclaiming of backsliders, and the building up of many in our holy faith."

WEST INDIES.

The Missions in the *West Indies* appear to be in general, in a more encouraging state than they were last year; though by the recent mortality in those Islands several of our beloved brethren have been removed from their toil to their rest and reward.

In *St. John's, Antigua*, the people are advancing in piety and in love for the cause of God. At *Barbadoes* there has been an increase of nearly three hundred members. At *Georgetown, Demerara*, upwards of sixty have been added to the Church, and the congregations have been enlarged by African Emigrants, who have crossed the Atlantic, to find on its Western shores the knowledge of the one true God and Jesus Christ, whom He hath sent."

Of *Jamaica*, it is observed, "The recent visitation of affliction has been sanctified to the prosperity of the Mission."

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

In the various sections of this wide expanse of British territory, that may rightfully be regarded as an appropriate sphere for Missionary exertions, the cause of God steadily advances, both among the scattered remnant of the ancient races—the former lords of an uncultivated soil—and among the otherwise spiritually destitute descendants of Britain's own energetic sons.

The following extract from a Canadian Missionary's Letter will be read with interest:—

"Could the supporters of this noble Society have witnessed what I did, while visiting the distant Missions in this widely-extended District, the past year;—could they have heard the thanks expressed, and have seen the tears of gratitude flow from the emigrants in the woods, that they were not forgotten; that, through this agency, they were favoured with the ministry of the word, and the ordinances of God's house; that they were permitted still

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to behold the face of their spiritual guides, causing them, for the hour, to forget their deprivations and toils; could they have beheld, as we have, scores of converted Indians clothed, and in their right mind, and have heard them in Love Feast, expressing their thankfulness that they had been sought after by Methodist Missionaries in the woods, and, by their instrumentality, brought into the fold of Christ;—then would they not regret that they have, year after year, been contributing according to their ability to spread Scriptural holiness throughout the land.

I hope I shall be pardoned for observing—for my soul is drawn out in love for the destitute settler, and the Indian in the woods—that much remains. We want men and means to cultivate this widely extended field. The harvest in this north-western country is great, but the labourers are few. Parents, we want your sons of promise and piety for this work. Our aged ministers are falling:

'And we are to the margin come,
And we expect to die.'

Oh, for young men to rise up and take the place of the zealous, evangelical, devoted men who rest from their labours! Their duties may be arduous; their sacrifices may be many; but honourable will be their calling, and heaven will be their reward."

CONCLUSION.

Seeing then the mighty field which whitens beneath our gaze—the glorious first-fruits which have already been gathered—the fewness of the fainting labourers that thrust in the sickle—and the encouraging smiles of the Lord of the harvest which bless our labours of love—may we not appropriately conclude with the glowing appeal of the Committee of the Parent Society:—

The Committee venture once again to ask for a more frequent participation in the fervent, solemn, believing prayers of their Christian friends, in the social family circle, and in their private devotions, as well as in the great Congregation. They ask for larger, more systematic, and better-proportioned liberality; for offerings to the cause of truth, such as those which superstition has often placed at the disposal of Romish priests, or consecrated to the honour of abominable idols. They ask that mothers would exercise their sacred and inalienable prerogative, and as they teach their infants to pray for the coming of God's kingdom, and the doing of his will, would train them to regard this as the paramount object of Christian ambition and effort. The Committee earnestly beg of the Collectors and other officers of the Branch Societies, that they would apply themselves afresh to their respective duties; and particularly that they would spare no pains in circulating intelligence, and making all the subscribers, as far as possible, cognizant of the case of the Society, and of its varied and extending operations. And along with all, and above all, they will not cease to implore Him whom they recognize as the Great Author and Patron of Christian Missions, "*Let thy work appear unto thy servants, and thy glory unto their children. And let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us: and establish thou the work of our hands upon us; yea, the work of our hands establish thou it.*"
