# POLITICAL PLATFORM

OF THE

# UNITED FARMERS of N. B.

- No. 1 Whereas a call to the United Farmers of the different local branch for the putting up of independent candidates to represent the different consituencies both in the Federal and Local houses and that the responses have been practically unamious in its favor, therefore we the officers and directors of the United Farmers authorize the organizing director of each county to call a convention for the purpose of selecting candidates for both Federal and Local houses.
- No. 2 Since it is absolutely necessary to have campaign funds for legitimate purposes, we would therefore authorize each county to raise and control such funds with the provision that it shall be itemized and audited and forwarded to the Sec'y of the Central Association and the source from
- No. 4 That we are entirely opposed to any form of bribery and corruption
- No. 4 That wilderness and un-improved land be taxed in proportion to the tax on improved land at the same rate and on the same basis
- No. 5 That the registering of Mortgages be changed so that the amount actually due on mortgages can be ascertained at the registry office every year, such mortgage to be exempted on amount of mcrtgage still unpaid, and the holder of the mortgage be assessed on the amount and the taxes paid in the district wherein the land lies.
- No. 6 That we propose an act to be passed by our local legislature compelling any trunk telephone to give proper connections with Local or Farmers line for a reasonable toll.
- No. 7 That before any increase in telephone rates should be made, a full investigation be made before the proper authorities open to all parties interested, showing such increase to be justifiable.
- $No.\ 8$  That any man 18 years old be allowed to homestead 100 acres of land and a returned soldier 200 acres with the privilege of buying 100 acres additional in the Province of New Brunswick.
- No. 9 That we will work for an Abbatoir, an establishment of age plant and stock yard in the Maritime Provinces.
- No. 10 That the Provincial and Federal representatives pledge themselves to resign on being presented with a petition signed by 60 per cent of the members of the U.F. of N.B. asking them to de so.
- No. 11 That we are in favor of total prohibition of the manufacture and the sale of liquor as a beverage and that plebiscite vote be taken at any
- No. 12 That we are in favor of general improvement of the roads of N. B. rather than the building of a speedway for autos in the province, and that we use auto taxes for Highway purposes only.
- No. 13 That we have a uniform system of oreaking winter roads' and that the workers receive pay for doing it.
- No. 14 We should aim to have a government of the day to appoint a Farmer as Minister of Agriculture.
- No. 15 That the Sec'y of Agriculture be a Farmer, a Farmer's son, a native of N. B. and a graduate of the college of Agriculture.
- No. 16 Whereas the United Farmers represent the Farmers more than any other organization, we would ask that the United Farmers be consulted on the general policy of the Agriculture.
- No. 17 That we recommend a rural delivery mail service be established in every country district.
- No. 18 That we adopt the Platform of the Canadian Council of Agriculture with the addition of clause G. to section 4 which reads as follows:

That firms holding charters for the development of the natural resource of the province. That these charters be cancelled unless the work be carried out within a reasonable time.

And the Exception of Section 6 which reads as follows:

Public ownership and control of railway, water and aerial transportation, telephone, telegraph and express systems all projects in the dev lopment of national power and of the coal mining industry.



\*\*\*\*\* Value of Banana as Food

Tested by Two Experts,

Who Speak Well of Fruit

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* HE digestibility of bananas has been the subject of more dispute than any other question in dietetics.

Many physicians have declared them unwholesome for children. Is this true? Undeniably they disagree with children, and even with grown folks, sometimes. Why?

A thorough investigation of the matter has recently been made by two recognized experts, Drs. M. C. Pease and A. R. Rose, who extended series of experiments to infants

and invalids.

Results showed that bananas are perfectly digestible even by weak stomachs, and a most healthful food, if only they are fully ripe. If not really ripe, they are more or less liable to disagree with anybody.

Bananas of a rich yellow color are resulty considered ripe, but they are

not. It is not until they show brown spois on the shin (use to be confused with bruise marks) that they acquire full flavor and are ready for eating.

Little Johnny acquires a large yellow banana, and, divesting it of its peel, proceeds to devour it with reckless haste, swallowing it in chunks. That is not the way to seat a banana. Anyway, he has a pain presently in his small stomach, and his mother decides that the fruit is not good for him.

If the same banana had been fed to Johnny two or three days later, when properly ripened, he would have suffered no ill effects. Indeed, his health would prosper on a det (for a white) of nothing but milk and bananas of full ripeness, the latter taking the place of bread.

Doctors Pease and Rose kept several adults going for a week on bananas and milk, with perfect digestion and unimpaired efficiency. For be it observed, bananas contain 22 per cent. of starch and sugar, and are therefore highly nutritious. Like other fruits, too, they are rich in the mysterious "vitamin" that is such an encourager of health.

Of course, one could not live on bananas alone for any length of time, inasmuch as they contain very little of the stuff that makes muscle and

blood. The "banana stomach." often seen in tropical countries, is a dis-tention due to too many bananas and

too little else.
The moral of the story is that

the moral of the story at that beananas, if ripe, are easily digestible and good for anybody. In the yellow stage they are all right if baked. Freshly detached from the stalk, they are uncontaminated by dirt and

germs, even if bought from a push-cart on the street—so well are they protected by their skins.






