Members of Royal Family May Be Shielding the Wrecker.

Implicating Letters Said To Be in Hands of New York Police.

Wright Was Traced from London to ? Paris and Thence to America by His Bank Notes.

New York March 16. - Whitaker Wright, the London promoter, accused of a fraud in connection with various financial corporations, was arrested here Saturday at the request of the London police upon his arrival on the French Line steamer La Lorraine. With Wright was a young woman who was on the passenger list as Miss Florence F. Browne, and whom Wright represented to be his niece. Wright was at once turned over to the United States authorities and taken to Ludlow

HOW HE WAS TRACED. March 16. - Whitaker London. Wright was traced to Paris by the bank notes which he cashed there at the offices of the French Steamship Line and elsewhere. When he left his country seat at Godalming he traveled by way of Southampton and Havre to Paris, taking pains to conceal his movements by the redirection of his baggage and other means. This pro-cedure was apparently quite successful, for it was only Saturday morning that the detectives got the clue as to his movements through the numbers of the bank notes he had cashed, after they had been vainly watching for days the principal British ports. This clue was easily followed up owing to Wright's marked personal appearance. Miss Browne joined him at Havre on the eve of their sailing.
