Strong Resolutions Against the Liquor License System—A Political Action Policy Considered.

[Special to the Advertiser.]

Montiell, Sopt. 24.—The delegates are getting restive and anxious to get home. Secretary Heustis hopes Conference can finish Friday night. In the Temperance Committee this morning, Rev. Mr. Brethour moved a series of resolutions denoancing license and any support direct or indirect to any candidate of a political party not favoring prohibition. This was debated for nearly two hours. The resolution against every form of license passed unanimously. Rev. Mr. Brethour was willing to amend the political action policy to the extent of recommending that all Governments not having prohibition as a plank in their platform should be opposed. This was not accepted, and after spirited speeches the committee agreed to recommend the indorsement of the Dominien Alliance political policy of nominating independent candidates, and to recommend the support of such candidates.

Very strong condemnation of the Northwest permit system was passed. The committee recommends making the signing of a liquor license application a breach of church discipline.

WHY RECIPROCITY MUST TRIUMPH The revival of the discussion of the best means to extend foreign trade has resulted in bringing out in a marked degree the popularity of the reciprocity movement. We can scarcely find a public man or a newspaper on either side of the line that is openlý opposed to reciprocity, but we discover many who, in the interest of the monopolies, are covertly trying to make establishment of reciprocity - the natural extension of international trade-as difficult as possible. We would rather have

such men open enemies. As professed friends of reciprocity, while ready to stab as opportunity offers, they can retard the prog-ress of the movement in favor of freedom to trade, though they cannot prevent its final Prof. Goldwin [Smith, president of the

ercial Union Club, which held its meeting in Toronto last night, set forth the remarkable progress which the movement in favor of unrestricted re-ciprocity had made since members of the club, but a year or two ago, systematically set about convincing the people of the enormous benefits to be derived from freedom to buy and sell with our neighbors in the United States. 
